REPORT OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER.

Hon. CALVIN TOMKINS, Commissioner of Docks:

Sir—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge and supervision for the quarter ending June 30, 1912.

Battery, North River.
The landings in this locality have been maintained and repaired during the quarter by the force of the Department.

Temporary buildings have been erected along the Battery wall by the United States Government for the use of the Commissioner of Immigration until the completion of the new Barge Office now in course of construction near the foot of White-

Pier "A," North River.

This pier, upon which are located the executive offices of the Department, have been maintained and kept in repair during the quarter.

Pier (New) 1, North River. This pier has been repaired by the force of the Department.

Cortlandt St. Section, North River.

The Pennsylvania Railroad Company has in progress the work of improving the water-front in accordance with the new plan, beginning at the northerly line of Liberty st., and extending northerly 203.03 fcet. This work is being done under a permit from and under the supervision of this Department. This work includes the erection of a ferry terminal, the lower end of which has been practically completed, and the Department has filled in along Marginal st., and paved the area with second-hand paving

Pier 33, Canal St., North River.

The unleased portion of this pier has been repaired by the force of the Depart-

Gansevoort Market, Pier Middle, North River. This pier is being repaired by the force of the Department.

Gansevoort Market, Pier North, North River.

This pier is being repaired by the force of the Department.

Chelsea Section, North River.

Work on this section was entirely completed some time since, but during the present quarter the Department force has been engaged in making general repairs along the section and cutting openings in bulkhead shed for ventilation of engine room.

At West 22d st., the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals

have erected a granite drinking fountain under permit. 23d St., North River.

The Pennsylvania Railroad Company having vacated the ferry at this street and the old ferry buildings having been removed, the pier at West 23d st. is being reconstructed and lengthened by the force of the Department. The large room on the upper floor of the old ferry house has been made available for recreation purposes during the summer months.

Pier 39th St., North River. Repairs have been made to this pier during the quarter by the force of the Department.

West 42d St. Section, North River.

The Department force has been engaged in repairing sheathing, laying foundation timber and placing headers on approach to ferry at 42d st.

42d and 44th Sts., North River. Repairs are being made to the granite pavement along the marginal street at this location.

45th St., North River. Repairs are being made to pier at this street by the force of the Department.

40th St., North River. Shed has been constructed on the pier at this street by the Central Railroad Com-

pany of New Jersey, under permit from this Department.

46th St., North River. Repairs are being made to the pier at this street by the force of the Department, and test piles have been driven in connection with the proposed extension to the pier.

47th St., North River. Repairs are being made to the pier at this street by the force of the Department, and test piles have been driven in connection with the proposed extension to the pier.

48th St., North River. Repairs are being made to the pier at this street by the force of the Department, and test piles have been driven in connection with the proposed extension to the pier.

49th St., North River. Test piles have been driven in connection with proposed extension to pier at 49th st., North River.

50th St., North River. Repairs are being made to the pier at this street by the force of the Department.

W. 52d St. Section, North River. During the quarter the Department force has been engaged in building a dry wall to retain the filling at this section, and in making repairs to the pier at 52d st., North

Pier, 55th St., North River. Repairs are being made to this pier where necessary by the force of the Department.

Pier 58th St., North River. This pier is being extended out to the pierhead line by the force of the Department. The work was begun on the 16th of February, 1912, and is still in progress.

Pier 57th St., North River. This pier is being repaired by the force of the Department.

Riverside Improvement, North River.

An extensive improvement is in progress by this Department in conjunction with the Department of Parks along the water-front between W. 72d st. and W. 129th st., North River. This improvement involves an extension of Riverside Park out into the river to about as far as the bulkhead line established in 1868. Dredging was done during a prior quarter preliminary to the depositing of a rip-rap embankment for the purpose of retaining the filling. This embankment is outshore of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company's embankment. The material used for this filling is taken from the shafts and headings of the high-pressure water tunnel on Manhattan Island. At W. 83d st. the Department force has been engaged in erecting a temporary pile retaining structure.

77th and 80th Sts., North River.

Repairs are being made to the granite pavement on the marginal street between these two streets by the force of the Department.

95th St., North River.

A new pier under the new plan is in course of construction at this street by the force of the Department. Work was begun on the 8th of June, 1911, and is in

Pier, 129th St., North River. The Department force has been engaged in making repairs to the unleased portion of this pier.

Claremont Section, North River. During the quarter the Department force has been engaged in pointing concrete bulkhead wall and in making and fastening grate and repairing sewer at this section.

Pier, 132d St., North River. Repairs have been made to this pier by the force of the Department.

135th St., North River. The work of constructing a pier at the foot of this street is in progress under Contract No. 1306. Rip-rap has been deposited under the second class of this contract, and cobble has been deposited under the third class. The actual work of constructing the pier will shortly be begun.

Carmansville, Section, North River. The only work that has been done at this section during the quarter has been the regulating, grading and paving of the marginal street, building of a sewer and the removal of temporary bulkhead.

155th St., North River.

Ten piles have been driven at the foot of this street, rip-rap deposited and the work of building a new pier has been commenced by the force of the Department. 155th and 158th Sts., North River.

The sheathing on the platform between these two streets is being repaired by the force of the Department. 156th St., North River.

A new pier is being built at the foot of this street by the force of the Department. Work was begun March 1, 1911, and is in progress. Pier. 158th St., North River.

Repairs are being made to this pier by the force of the Department.

Man-of-War Landings, North River. The Department force has repaired and maintained the man-of-war landings along the North River from time to time during the quarter, as required.

Marginal St., North River. The granite pavement along the North River has been taken up and relaid where necessary by the force of the Department.

East River. Whitehall Terminal, East River.

The work of this section will be found described further on in the report under the heading of "Ferries."

Pier 7, East River. An extension is being constructed to this pier by the Erie Railroad Company. Jefferson Section, East River.

The authorization for this section is resolution of the Board of Docks, passed February 23, 1900, also action of the Commissioner of Docks of March 23, 1908, Bureau Order 6049. This section extends from the northerly side of Rutgers slip, East River, to the southerly side of Montgomery st., a distance of 1,237.92 feet. During the quarter work has been in progress on the bulkhead wall proper. Rip-rap has been deposited on westerly side of Pier 32, East River, for breakwater for oyster

Pier 32, East River. Alterations are being made to the shed on this pier, and mooring and fender piles are being driven preparatory to shifting the oyster basin from the North River to this locality.

Corlears Section, East River. The authorization for this section is action of the Commissioner of December 23, 1909, Bureau Order 8029. Mud was pumped and stone tubbed off foundation area. Base blocks have been set and chain holes filled with concrete. Granite has been set on the wall and filling has been placed in rear of that portion of the wall built. 169.37 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made by the work done during the

Pier 50, East River. Extensive repairs to this pier necessitated that the work should be done under contract, and plans and specifications have been prepared and will shortly be let for doing this work.

34th St., East River. The work of constructing a ferry house is in progress at this locality by the Long Island Railroad Company, two ferry racks have been removed, and the ferry bridge repaired. The work is being done under permit from this Department.

Yorkville Section, East River. The authorization for this section is action of the Commissioner of Docks, dated October 10, 1904, Bureau Order 2757. This section extends from the centre line of E. 64th st. to the southerly line of E. 74th st., a distance of about 2,648.22 feet. Work on this section has been in progress during the quarter. Stone has been tubbed and mud pumped from foundation area. Joints in the granite have been pointed. Dry wall has been built to retain the earth filling, and filling has been placed in rear of the wall built.

Blackwell Section, East River. The work at this section is being done under action of the Commissioner of Docks of October 10, 1904, Bureau Order 2756. This section extends from the southerly line of E. 74th st. to the northerly line of E. 81st st., a distance of 1.958.02 feet. Work has been in progress on the bulkhead wall proper during the quarter. Joints in the granite have been pointed and a dry wall built back of the bulkhead wall to retain filling. Earth filling has been deposited in rear of the bulkhead wall and graded off.

E. 90th St. Section, East River. The authorization for this section is action of the Commissioner of Docks of April 24, 1912, Bureau Order 10733. This section extends from the southerly side of E. 90th st. to the southerly side of E. 91st st., East River, making a joint with the lower end of the E, 91st st. section, a distance of about 404.05 feet. Sights have been put up preparatory to beginning the work of dredging for this section.

103d St., East River. Contract No. 1324 has been prepared and let for building a pier at the foot of this street and work will shortly be begun thereunder. 110th St., East River.

Crib bulkhead is being constructed at the foot of this street by the Consolidated Gas Company under permit from this Department. E. 123d St. Section, Harlem River.

The work at this section is being done under action of the Commissioner of Docks of October 2, 1911, Bureau Order 10010. This section begins at a point in the pierhead and bulkhead line as established by the Secretary of War in 1890 at its intersection with the southerly line of E. 123d st., distant 271.25 feet from the easterly line of Pleasant avenue; thence northerly along said bulkhead and pierhead line a distance of 294.24 feet to its intersection with the southerly line of E. 124th st. at a distance of 137 feet from the easterly line of Pleasant avenue, the total length of the section being 294.24 feet.

Work on the bulkhead wall proper has been in progress during the quarter.

131st St., East River. Piles were driven at this locality for the purpose of mooring floating bath for the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

136th St., Harlem River, Manhattan. A one-story brick structure has been erected at this locality by the estate of H. A. Cram under permit from this Department. Work was begun February 19, 1912, and finished May 18, 1912.

South of 178th St., Harlem River, The Bronx. Filling is being placed back of canal boats at this locality by the Lees Estate under permit from this Department. Work was begun March 25, 1912, and is in progress.

132d St., East River, The Bronx. Pier is being constructed at this locality by the Harlem and Port Chester Railroad Company under permit from this Department.

Viele Ave., Tiffany St., East River, The Bronx. Rip-rap embankment is being constructed at this locality by the East Bay Land and

Improvement Company under permit from this Department. Other work done by private parties in the Borough of The Bronx has been supervised and a general supervision of the water-front made.

Pavement on East and Harlem Rivers.

The pavement along the marginal street on the East and Harlem Rivers has been

Harts Island. Repairs have been made to dock at this location by the force of the Department

for the Department of Correction. Borough of Brooklyn.

Whale Creek Section, Brooklyn. In that portion of the Borough of Brooklyn adjacent to Newtown Creek, near Greenpoint ave., proceedings have been instituted and the necessary property has been acquired to secure pier room which exists only on Whale Creek, an arm of Newtown Creek. Near the mouth of Whale Creek the property acquired will not only enable the City to build over 1,000 feet of bulkhead wall with the adjacent marginal street, but also two piers. The work of preparing for and building a new concrete bulkhead wall at the mouth of Whale Creek was completed on the 1st of November, 1910, under Contract No. 1027, and during the present quarter the filling already placed in rear of the bulkhead wall has been graded and made ready for receiving temporary pavement.

Between 28th and 64th Sts., Brooklyn. A plan has been submitted and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund establishing new lines for bulkheads and piers, with marginal streets, wharf or place, extending from 28th to 64th sts., South Brooklyn. Plans and studies are in progress for the dock development of this water-front. Gowanus Section, Brooklyn.

The work at this section is being done under authorization of the Commissioner of Docks of September 21, 1909, Bureau Order 6647. This section extends from the northerly side of 28th st. to the southerly side of 38th st., South Brooklyn, a distance of 2,142.82 feet, more or less. There have been completed up to date 2,022.24 linear feet of bulkhead wall on the top course of granite under the coping, leaving a balance of about 120 linear feet to be completed. During the quarter work has been in progress on the bulkhead wall proper.

Test piles and wash borings have been taken between 28th and 61st sts., in Erie Basin and Gowanus Canal. Backing log, cleats and mooring posts have been placed along the bulkhead wall. The approaches to the piers at 33d and 35th sts. are being graded and paved, and the roadway in rear of bulkhead between 28th and 36th sts. is being curbed.

30th St., Brooklyn. A contract, No. 1209, was prepared during a prior quarter for building a new pier at the foot of 30th st., South Brooklyn, to be known as the 30th St. Pier, but the contract has not yet been let.

33d St., South Brooklyn. A contract, No. 1279, was awarded for building a new steel freight shed with appurtenances on the pier at this street, and the work was begun on the 20th of June, 1911, and is still in progress.

39th St., South Brooklyn. 10th St., East River.

The old pier at this street was removed and a new pier has been built by the relaid under Bureau Order 6918. Ashes are being deposited under the trolley plat51st St., South Brooklyn.

The work of extending bulkhead platform, reinforcing bulkhead, pier, etc., is in progress under Bureau Order 8711, and the granite pavement is being relaid.

Bay Ridge Ave., Brooklyn. The work of constructing a ferry at this point to St. George, S. I., is in progress by Frank G. Montag, under permit from this Department and Bureau Order 10981. South 2d and 3d Sts., Brooklyn.

Boiler house is being built and bulkhead constructed at this locality by the American Sugar Refining Company under permit from this Department. Work was begun April 20, 1911, and is in progress.

Rodney St., Wallabout, Brooklyn. A two-story building has been erected at this locality by the Corporation of F. Scholes under permit from this Department. Work was begun October 25, 1911, and finished May 20, 1912.

Kent Ave., Bushwick Creek, Brooklyn. Filling is being placed at this locality by the Bureau of Highways under permit from this Department.

Gold St., Brooklyn. Discharge tunnel and screening walls are being constructed at this locality by the Kings County Electric Light Company under permit from this Department. Work was begun on January 25, 1912, and is in progress.

Otsego St., Brooklyn. Filling is being placed at this locality by the Robins Dry Dock Company under permit from this Department.

20th and 21st Sts., Gowanus Canal, Brooklyn. Temporary shed has been erected at this locality by S. T. Schotter under permit from this Department. Work was begun March 25, 1912, and finished May 24, 1912.

Manhattan Beach, Ocean Side, Brooklyn. Sea wall is being built at this locality by the Manhattan Beach Estates under permit from this Department. Work was begun May 10, 1911, and is in progress.

Mill Island, Jamaica Bay, Brooklyn.

Dredging has been done and filling placed at this locality by the Atlantic Gulf and Pacific Company under permit from this Department. Work was begun July 13, 1911, and finished January 1, 1912.

E. 61st and 66th Sts., Jamaica Bay, Brooklyn. Dredging has been done and filling placed at this locality by the Atlantic Gulf and Pacific Company under permit from this Department. Work was begun Novem-

ber 11, 1911, and finished June 1, 1912. Other work done by private parties in the Borough of Brooklyn has been supervised and a general supervision of the water-front made.

Borough of Queens.

Berrian Island, East River, Queens. Filling is being placed at this locality by the Astoria Light, Heat & Power Co., under permit from this Department. Work was begun December 30, 1910, and is in progress.

Wavecrest and Cedar Aves., Edgemere, Queens. Pier and structure have been built at this locality by William Scheer, under permit from this Department. Work was begun December 28, 1911, and finished May 27, 1912.

Dodge Ave., Hammels, Queens. Two frame buildings have been constructed at this locality by Ella D. Carr under permit from this Department. Work was begun April 10, 1912, and finished

Hollands Pier, Jamaica Bay, Queens. Platform and dwelling have been constructed at this locality by Austin G. Jones, under permit from this Department. Work was begun May 28, 1912, and mished June 18, 1912.

Other work done by private parties in the Borough of Queens has been supervised and a general supervision of the water-front made.

A number of permits have been granted to occupy land and to erect structures thereon at Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens.

Jamaica Bay Improvement. Surveys of the westerly portion of Jamaica Bay, between Fresh Creek and Barren Island, have been completed and plotted to a scale of 200 feet to the inch, forming the enlarged sectional maps. The plotting to a scale of 100 feet to the inch on the regular sheets showing minute detail is completed. These maps extend from the head of Sheepshead Bay to the eastward as far as and including the Long Island Railroad Trestle. Since the establishing of bulkhead for the entire Jamaica Bay system by the Federal Government in May new plan maps have been prepared and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. These maps show the bulkhead and pierhead lines and marginal way.

Contracts for dredging the main channel and filling in behind bulkheads to be constructed in connection with the dredging have been prepared but cannot be advertised until the question of title to property in the bed of Jamaica Bay in the vicinity of Canarsie, as between The City of New York and certain individual owners, is settled. This matter is now being adjudicated by the proper authorities. The proposed contract work comprises dredging the main channel and basin-dredging with filling in of the marginal way behind cheaply constructed bulkheads at the mouth of Fresh Creek, Paerdegat Creek and in the immediate vicinity of Ca-

A contract for dredging the main channel from Barren Island to Mill Basin has been prepared and is now practically ready for submission.

Borough of Richmond.

A description of the work being done for the ferry terminals in this Borough will be found later on under the heading of "Ferries."

Work Supervised. At St. George, a shed is being erected on Pier 6 by the Staten Island Rapid Transit Company, under permit from this Department.

At Port Richmond, the existing crib bulkhead has been repaired and a ferry slip constructed in the vicinity of Richmond ave., by the Port Richmond and Bergen Point Ferry Co., under permit from this Department. Work was begun October 21, 1911, and hnished June 7, 1912. Alterations have also been made to the ferry house at the above locality by the Port Richmond and Bergen Point Ferry Co., under permit. Work was begun January 24, 1912, and finished June 5, 1912. Crib bulkhead is being constructed and filling placed at Sharp ave., Port Richmond, by J. E. Donovan, under permit from this Department. Work was begun March 20, 1912, and is in progress.

At Port Ivory, Howland Hook, filling is being placed by the Proctor & Gamble Mfg. Co. under permit from this Department.

At Tompkinsville, shed is being constructed over pier extension to Piers 4 and 5 by the American Dock & Trust Co. under permit. Work was begun November 22, 1911, and finished April 13, 1912. At Arrietta st., Tompkinsville, pier has been widened and extended and frame building constructed by J. McHenry under permit from this Department.

At Stapleton, a frame structure has been erected between Front and Canal sts. by Hugo Jaburg, under permit from this Department. Filling is being placed on City property at Canal st., Stapleton, by the President of the Borough of Richmond, under permit from this Department.

Other work done by private parties in the Borough of Richmond has been super-

vised and a general supervision of the water-front made. Pavement on Marginal Street, North, East and Harlem Rivers.

The granite pavement along the North, East and Harlem Rivers has been repaired from time to time, and the asphalt pavement where taken up to repair gas pipe by the Consolidated Gas Co. has been relaid. Repairs have been made to the asphalt pavement on the North, East and Harlem Rivers from time to time as required under Contract No. 1307.

Old Material Storage Basin, Nott Ave., Queens.

Old material has been rafted and cared for.

Pile Basin, Shermans Creek, Harlem River.

The Pile Basin at Shermans Creek, Harlem River, has been maintained and

Timber Basin, 75th St., North River. At the Timber Basin, timber has been received under Department orders and contracts, cared for and issued as required.

Department Yards at W. 57th and E. 24th Sts. At the Department Yards, the force of the Department has been engaged in construction of concrete blocks, the handling and cutting of granite, the care of materials and the issue of supplies for various pieces of work. At the W. 57th st. yard a concrete building has been in course of construction since April 26, 1907, for use as a blacksmith shop, power house, etc. This structure is provided with a reinforced concrete coal pocket. The Department stores removed from the old building to suitable places were subsequently stored in the new storehouse. A new concrete oil house is also being constructed at W. 57th st. yard.

Floating Property. All the floating property of the Department has been cared for during the quarter and repaired where necessary.

Dredging. All the dredging has been supervised whether done by the Department or by private parties.

Surveying Party. All the necessary lines, levels, grades, soundings, surveys and examinations have been made and given. Work done by private parties has been supervised, automatic tide gauges have been attended to, and the daily and weekly reports have been made. The records of the anemometer and weather vane, etc., have been compiled. An extensive survey of the water-fronts of Brooklyn, Queens, The Bronx and Richmond is in progress.

Recreation Structures. The recreation structures have been maintained and cared for during the quarter and made ready for opening of the piers for the recreation season of 1912.

Ferries.

Staten Island Ferry-Whitehall Terminal. A contract, No. 1335, has been prepared and let for painting portions of the ferry houses at the Whitehall Terminal of the Staten Island and 39th St., Broadway, Ferries.

Staten Island Ferry—St. George Terminal. The work of removing the present wooden trolley platform and building a new platform of steel and concrete and furnishing and installing electroliers, railings and electric cables at the St. George Terminal is in progress under Contract No. 1290. This work is about 35 per cent, completed.

The southerly ferry rack of the southerly slip of the St. George Ferry Terminal has been reconstructed by the force of the Department.

Stapleton Terminal. The proposition for establishing a municipal ferry to Stapleton was consummated on the 27th of May, 1909, by preparations made for the running of ferryboats from that point to Whitehall st., Manhattan. Plans and Contract No. 1182 have been prepared for the construction of new ferryboats for service on this ferry. Plans and specifications have also been in course of preparation for constructing a

new ferry terminal at this locality. South Brooklyn Ferry-Whitehall Terminal. A contract, No. 1335, has been prepared and let for painting portions of the ferryhouses at the Whitehall Terminal of the 39th St., Brooklyn, and Staten Island Ferries.

A contract, No. 1326, has been prepared and let for making three additional rooms on the third floor of the 39th St. Ferry, Manhattan Terminal. Contract is in course of preparation for installing elevator at this terminal.

39th St., South Brooklyn. On November 1, 1906, the City came into possession of the property of the New York & South Brooklyn Ferry and Steam Transportation Co., operating a ferry between Whitehall st., Manhattan, and 39th st., South Brooklyn, and since that time the City has been operating the ferry as a municipal ferry.

The work of building a new ferryhouse, etc., at the 39th St. Ferry Terminal, Brooklyn, is in progress under Contract No. 1294.

West Side Freight Terminal and Elevated Distributing Railroad. In connection with plans submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Commissioner of Docks for the consolidation of the traffic requirements of the various trunk line railroads for the reception of freight and merchandise directly from car floats and piers into factories and warehouses, and the reverse movement of freight and merchandise from the warehouses to car floats, the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Co. has submitted to the Board of Estimate plans for extensive alterations and additions covering its installation from Spuyten Duyvil Creek along the North River to the W. 30th st. yard, and from the W. 30th st. yard to the St. Johns Park Terminal and thence to Cortlandt st., with the ultimate object of removing all its tracks south of the 80th st. yard from the street surface. These plans have been referred to the Commissioner of Docks and are now being looked into and studied by this Bureau with the object of determining the necessary modifications in order to meet the requirements of The City of New

Plans for pier extension, 49th st., North River. New plan map, Conover st., Brooklyn. Elevator for 39th St. Ferryhouse, Manhattan.

Plans for Pier (New) 43, East River. Plans for development of west side, Manhattan. Plans for development, Navy Yard to Bay Ridge, Brooklyn. Plans for development, Oak Point to Throgs Neck, The Bronx. New plan, points in vicinity of Tompkinsville, S. I Substructures for Robert Fulton Memorial, W. 116th st. Plans for Dockmaster's office, Jamaica Bay.

DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING.

Report for the Year 1911. Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor:

Sir-I take pleasure in submitting the report of the Department of Street Cleaning

for the year ending December 31, 1911. The paved area on December 31, 1911, as reported to me by the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, was: Manhattan, 9,153,584 square yards; The Bronx, 3,341,811 square yards; Brooklyn, 11,624,836 square yards. A total of 24,120,231 square yards.

It should be noted that there is an apparent decrease of yardage from that reported for 1910, but I imagine it is due to a revision of the figures of the Bureaus of

Highways. To clean these areas there were employed on the broom 2,875 sweepers, as follows: Manhattan, 1,700; The Bronx, 275, and Brooklyn, 900. This gives the average area allotted to each sweeper as 8,390 square yards, and by Boroughs: Manhattan, 5,384; The Bronx, 12,152, and Brooklyn, 12,916. Of course, with this force given these large areas the ideal condition is impossible and we have used them to the best ad-

vantage with fair results. To augment the work of hand sweeping there have been used a number of horsedrawn sweeping machines, averaging: Manhattan, 43; The Bronx, 1, and Brooklyn, 19. The use of these machines aids materially in removing all but the fine dust, but neither hand nor machine work entirely frees the paved surface of the finer materials. The Department now owns 5 flushing machines and 9 squeegee machines, and these are used continually when the weather and the water supply permit. Hose flushing has been used from time to time. The water situation during this year has prevented the general use of these methods with even the limited plant, to my regret. I experimented with a portable pump for using the crude water from the rivers when the water from the mains is not available, and found this method quite efficient. There is, however, an objection raised by many citizens to the use of this water through a fear that the sewage pollution would prove a menace in the spread of disease breeding germs through the distribution of it. At my request the Metropolitan Sewerage Commission investigated the matter to find if there was a danger from either a chemical or bacteriological standpoint, and in an exhaustive report on conditions advised me that no such menace existed, provided the water was taken at points remote from sewer outlets. They closed their report as follows:

'Sentimental objections may be urged against the use of harbor water for street flushing on account of the discharge of the City's sewers along the riverfronts. The Metropolitan Sewerage Commission does not believe that any danger would lie in the use of harbor water if taken at properly selected points. The number of bacteria of various diseases, such as tuberculosis, diphtheria, typhoid fever, etc., per unit of street area present in the dirt of uncleaned street surfaces exceeds by far the number that would be left on the surface after flushing with the harbor water; and the net results of such a washing, even though the flushing water be itself badly polluted, would be to reduce the likelihood of the spread of disease by reducing the amount of

Up to the present time the use of these flushing machines and squeegees has proven the most advanced method for obtaining good results, and I had hoped to obtain an appropriation sufficient to purchase a plant or enter into a contract for the use of such methods in the work. A demonstration was given of the efficiency of the various types of flushers and squeegees, both in Manhattan and Brooklyn, but the Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment which was considering these methods reported adversely on my request. I greatly regret this action of the Committee, as experience here, as well as in other cities, has proven this method as an efficient and economical Dropped from Rolls (absence without one, especially in view of the cost of increased manual labor sufficient to clean the ever-increasing area of pavements being laid yearly. The Department was instructed, however, to test an automobile mechanical pick-up sweeping machine, known as the Emerson sweeper. This test was carried on for some time, but mechanical defects of construction developed and their adjustment prevented a fair test of the device. I am impressed with the availability of this machine when properly constructed. and believe a further test will prove it to be of great efficiency and an economical

The usual night cleaning has been performed in the downtown business section by gangs of sweepers, and I am about to introduce this system into the congested dis-

For the sanding of the streets in slippery weather I have been testing machines to spread the sand and have one which does the work effectively, provided the sand is fairly dry. As it is almost impossible to get dry sand when needed, I have not adopted this machine, but am investigating methods of drying. In the meantime, sand and ashes are being spread by hand. I have experimented with sand boxes, containing a cubic yard, located at the curb at convenient intervals, and so constructed as to facilitate the emptying by a sweeper with his shovel. These devices have proven effective, and will be found available until the drying proposition is solved.

The wastes collected during the year were approximately: Ashes, 2,184,243 tons; street sweepings, 546,061 tons; light refuse and rubbish, 188,659 tons; garbage, 313,575 tons. A total of 3,232,538 tons, or an increase over 1910 of 534 per cent. Of this amount the collection by Boroughs was: Manhattan, 2,069,046 tons; The Bronx, 221,348 tons; Brooklyn, 942,144 tons.

Of this tonnage 29 per cent. is ridden by private carts serving those who prefer such service. To do this work the force of drivers was 1,425: Manhattan, 725; The Bronx, 150, and Brooklyn, 550.

Thus, the Department force collects 7,342 tons daily, or an average of about 5 tons per man per day. As the percentage of increase of these materials annually is greater than the percentage of increase of the population, I feel that the service rendered is improving, as I do not believe that climatic conditions in this year have been severe enough to account for it. I still am of the opinion that the vehicles used in collection are not proper, and that we should have trucks of large capacity instead of carts. I am having a five-ton, three-horse truck constructed which I believe will prove my point. I am also actively investigating automobile trucks, and find that these trucks are now a commercial success. To meet the source of complaint which has been made against the nuisance attending the waste collection I tested a system of night collection for one month in a part of the City and was so well satisfied that on June 25 this method was put in general operation with excellent results. The commendation of the citizens greatly exceeded the few complaints made against this style of operation, and am convinced that this method is the proper one. As a matter of fact, this system had been in operation for years in the downtown business district, with great success. Cleaner streets, sidewalks free from litter during the day, the absence of cans and the freedom from the dust nuisance was the result.

In April during the cleaning up time which occurs annually at that time in the

congested districts, I employed 200 extra carts with excellent results.

The same methods of final disposition of the wastes have been in vogue as formerly. The service of the Department has been extended to the other bureaus and departments to a greater extent than formerly and has been systematized. Arrangements were made on a permanent basis for the removal of the ashes from the buildings on Blackwells Island, and a vexing question which had existed for some time between this Department and the Departments of Charities and Correction was settled to

the satisfaction of those Departments. The contracts for final disposition of garbage in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx expired on August 1, 1911, and these two were combined and bids were received for a contract for the term from August 1, 1911, to September 1, 1912, making the contract in these Boroughs expire coincident with that in the Borough of Brooklyn for the purpose of combining all these in one. The bid was \$45,000 for the thirteen months, a substantial reduction of approximately \$150,000, which was a source of gratification to the Department. The contract for the final disposition of ashes and rubbish from the dumps on the North River and Clinton street on the East River was abandoned in May, on account of the failure of the contractor to do his work properly, and a contract for the completion of the abandoned contract was let.

The contract for snow removal in the three Boroughs for the season of 1910-1911 was substantially the same as that for 1909-1910. The amount of snow removed under these agreements was 2,628,890 cubic yards and as there was 24.7 inches of snow fall, this amounted to an equivalent of 497.73 miles of 60-foot street cleaned of the total fall. The cost was slightly lower than in former years, partly due to the fact that the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough of Manhattan allowed the use of a number of manholes for the purpose. It was found that the use of sewers was possible without detriment and it is hoped that a more liberal policy of co-operation in this regard will be adopted by the Bureaus of Sewers in the various Boroughs for the benefit of the City. A number of protests were made against dumping snow in vacant lots in the Boroughs of The Bronx and Brooklyn, and I trust that the citizens will use judgment in raising such arguments as the cutting off of these relief dumps will impede the work of snow removal and add largely to its cost.

The Annual Parade was held as usual and although the men had to march in the pouring rain, the showing made by them was a source of pride to all who witnessed it.

The Pension Bill for the benefit of the uniformed and clerical forces was passed and signed and all of those benefited by this act appreciate the value to them and also feel grateful to your Honor for your firm stand in this matter. As a Department measure I believe it means much, as we may now expect younger men to enter upon the work with the knowledge of reward to come to them for faithful service when they become superannuated.

Through the action of a large number of the drivers in opposing the system of night collection, the Department was forced to reorganize the driving force and the result has been the replacing of some 1,100 of the disgruntled regular drivers and 750 extras by new men under the Civil Service rules. It is a pleasant duty to record the loyalty of the remaining number of drivers at this time. I also desire to record the thanks of this Department to your Honor in the firm stand taken by you in this matter and the support given by you in the work of reorganization.

We are about to put the supply bureau of the Department in a better shape by providing a building for the proper care of the stores on the plot under the Williamsburg Bridge which has been set apart by the Sinking Fund Commission for this

I have always believed that it would be economy for the City to own more Department stables and hope to be able to convince the Commissioner of Bridges of the advisability of setting apart room under the approaches to the East River Bridges for the construction of stables at these points. I am investigating the introduction of improved methods for dumping and disposing of the various wastes.

The statistical records of the various details of the work are attached.



NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or all others whom it may concern, to wit:

First—That the undersigned, Commissioners of Estimate, have completed their estimate of dan exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause

or permit the building or buildings, etc., pur-chased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free. for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale hereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the prem-ises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the sur-rounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and reg-ulations of the Department of Water Supply. hat this has been performed The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a

certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on ac-count thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the suc-cessful bidder will provide and furnish all ma-terials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between huildings purchased by different bidders, the ma-terials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate pur-

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its depart-ments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the him therein, and, if no other person be so inter-ested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the con-tract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties mak-ing the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the adver-tisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five 1 :r centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or esti-mate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifica-tions, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract

awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there,
