

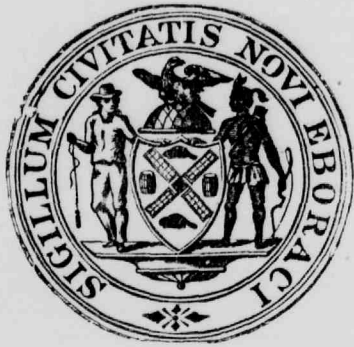

2d. Reporting as to estimated cost of dredging and excavation of building the bulkhead wall and three piers, and also for paving at the present site of West Washington Market, between Dey and Vesey streets, North river.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Counsel to the Corporation:

1st. In reference to the title to the south half of Pier 62, East river.

2d. Approving form of contract for repairing the bulkhead at the Department yard at Seventeenth street, East river.

3d. In reference to the occupation of the pier at Fortieth street, North river, by James McClenahan, and respecting the suit commenced by the lessee against the city. Secretary directed to have same recorded, and to advise the Counsel to the Corporation that the Board desire to have either the possession of the pier or that the rent therefor be paid in full, without abatement or deduction of any kind.

4th. Enclosing transcript of judgment recovered against Frederick Schedler for rent of the pier at Fifty-seventh street, North river, for the quarter due November 1, 1881, amounting to the sum of \$996.59. Secretary directed to advise that credit was given therefor on the books of this Department.

From Joseph McDonald & Co.—In reference to incumbrances on the Pier at Twenty-eighth street, North river. The Corporation Wharfinger to be directed to examine and report thereon, and to have all obstructions removed.

From Department of Public Works—Advising this Department that all the public baths have been removed and laid up in winter quarters. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to remove all the property and material belonging to the Department in use by the baths, and to replace the string-pieces on the several piers where the same were removed.

From Henry Dubois' Sons—Requesting permission to repair the Bulkhead north of Twenty-eighth street, East river. Permit therefor granted October 18, instant, to W. H. Harrison.

From Michael Brennan—In reference to stone breaking through the Pier at Fifty-seventh street, North river, and requesting the Board to have the same raised by the Department derrick. Application denied.

From Warren Roosevelt—Requesting permission to drive piles at Sixty-third street, East river. Granted; work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From R. J. Cortis, agent Oceanic Steam Navigation Company—In reference to paving at the approach to Pier, new 45, North river. Secretary stating that by direction of the President he had replied thereto that the matter would be attended to, his action was approved.

From Starr & King—In reference to and claiming damages for injury to canal boats "A. Noxon," and "W. S. Farwell," at Pier foot of Horatio street, North river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report thereon. Ridgewood Ice Company, Pier 43, East river, ice-bridge.

Ridgewood Ice Company, bulkhead between Piers 43 and 44, East river, scales.

William Montgomery, Pier at Fortieth street, North river (north side), ice-bridge.

Scott & Company, Pier at Thirty-fourth street, North river (south side), ice-bridge and scales.

F. F. Bean, Pier at Seventeenth street, North river (south side), ice-bridge and scales.

Brewers' Ice Company, foot of Sixty-third street, East river, ice-bridge.

A communication from Dugliss and Peterson, in reference to removing within the established bulkhead lines the bulkhead constructed at foot of and north and south of Seventy-fourth street, East river, and stating that they were only the lessees of the premises south of Seventy-fourth street, East river, extending to the bulkhead line, and consequently they had nothing to do with the matter.

On motion of Commissioner Voorhis, the following preamble and resolution were unanimously adopted.

Whereas, It appears by the report of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, that the bulkhead constructed at the foot of and extending north and south of Seventy-fourth street, East river, are unlawful constructions, being erected outside of and extending beyond the established bulkhead line; and

Whereas, Thomas Patten and John Macarthur, the owners of the said bulkheads respectively, have been duly notified and directed by this Board to remove and replace the same within the established bulkhead line, but have failed so to do; therefore,

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to prepare, as soon as practicable, specifications for the removal thereof to within the established bulkhead line, the said work to be done by contract.

And the Secretary directed to notify the owners of the said premises respectively of the action of the Board.

A communication from the New York, Ontario and Western Railway Company, proposing to lease a new pier to be built at the foot of Forty-fourth street, North river, was received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, and the following resolution in relation thereto, offered by Commissioner Voorhis, was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the communication from the New York, Ontario and Western Railway Company be received and placed on file, and the company notified that the Department has directed the Engineer-in-Chief to prepare plans and specifications for the construction of a pier at the foot of Forty-fourth street, North river, to be sixty feet in width and about five hundred feet in length, in accordance with the plan for the permanent improvement of the river front as adopted by the Department of Docks and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and when said plans and specifications are approved, it is the intention of the Board to contract for the building of the proposed pier with the object of leasing the same on its completion; and, in view of the application this day received from the New York, Ontario and Western Railway Company, they are notified that their application and proposal for a lease of the pier proposed to be built at the above-mentioned locality, at the rental of \$15,000 per annum, for the first term of ten years, and \$20,000 per annum for a renewal term of ten years, is considered by this Board to have priority of all other applications, and that whenever this Department is prepared to make an agreement to lease said proposed pier, the said Railway Company be further advised.

A report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 2438, that the slip between Piers 14 and 15, East river, had been dredged by the owners thereof, was received, read, and,

On motion, the report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 2399, submitting specifications and form of contract for dredging the said premises, was taken from the table, and, with the report, ordered on file.

A communication from the Comptroller of the City, approving the sureties to the estimate of John B. Devlin for paving, etc., was received and read.

On motion, the bids received and publicly opened on October 2, instant, for removing the existing plank roadways, paving, earth, etc., from the newly-made land extending from about the southerly side of Pier, new 38, to about fifty feet northerly of Pier, new 41, North river, and for paving the same with granite blocks, and for laying crosswalks, were taken from the table and ordered on file, and the following resolution, offered by the President in relation thereto, unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the contract for removing the existing plank roadways, paving, earth, etc., from the newly-made land extending from about the southerly side of Pier, new 38, to about fifty feet northerly of Pier, new 41, North river, and for paving the same with granite blocks, and for laying crosswalks, be and is hereby awarded to John B. Devlin, of No. 812 Lexington avenue, his bid for doing said work being the lowest under estimates publicly opened the 2d instant, and the Comptroller having approved of the sureties thereto this day.

On motion, the communication received from James Quin, applying for lease of land under water between Seventy-seventh and Seventy-eighth streets, East river, was taken from the table, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report thereon; also, to furnish the Board with a diagram of the premises.

The consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of this contract, and herein stated, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities, as bail, surety, and otherwise; and that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith and with the intention to execute the bond required by law. The adequacy and sufficiency of the security offered will be subject to approval by the Comptroller of the City of New York after the award is made and prior to the signing of the contract.

Should the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded neglect or refuse to accept the contract within five days after written notice that the same has been awarded to his or their bid or proposal, or if he or they accept but do not execute the contract and give the proper security, he or they shall be considered as having abandoned it and as in default to the Corporation, and the contract will be readvertised and relet as provided by law.

If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited to and retained by the City of New York as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the contract within the time aforesaid, the amount of his deposit will be returned to him.
