By reference to the accompanying sketch, furnished by the Commissions of States and States

be paid as hereinatter provided.¹⁷ By reference to the accompanying sketch, furnished by the Commissioner of Street Improve-ments, it will be seen that the said Brook avenue is actually more than a mile in length. I am, therefore, of the opinion that under the provisions of the Consolidation Act above cited the City would be liable for one-half of the cost and expenses of the opening of said avenue.
