The 774 deaths represent a death-rate of 23.76, against 22.51 for the previous week, and 20.33 for the corresponding week of 1890.

The increase of 41 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 5 in the deaths from scarlet fever, of 6 from bronchitis, of 24 from pneumonia and of 7 from Bright's disease. There was a decrease of 4 in the deaths from diphtheria and of 7 from croup.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth and Twentieth Wards, from scarlet fever in the Twelfth, Seventeenth, Nineteenth and Twentieth Wards, and from typhoid fever in the Twelfth, Seventeenth and Twenty-second Wards.




