North Hospital.

Plumbing—Dining-room and Drug-store: Put in 2 radiators, and connected same to main with 120 feet 1¼-inch pipe; 24 elbows, 1¾ inches; 4 angle valves, 1 inch, and 3 angle valves, ¾ inch.

Plastering and Masonry—Renewed in hallways of first and second floors, also in Wards 7 and 8, 130 square feet fallen plaster.

Tinsmithing—Renewed gutters and valleys with 13 sheets tin.

South Hospital.

Carpentry—Made and framed door entrance to bath room, and hung door leading to same; put up board division partition 6 feet high, 180 square feet, to separate the boys from the girls; set in plaster partition of small room looking into hallway 1 stationary sash, 3 feet square; cutting and repairing 18 feet flooring for plumber.

Plumbing—Put in 5-feet bath tub and 1 flush closet, with cistern and all necessary connections.

Plastering and Masonry—Cut out plastering for door entrance into small room to be used for children's bath room and closet, and closed up former opening in Chaplain's room, 2 feet 6 inches by 6 feet.

Painting—Two coats on partition across ward, 360 square feet, and large extension clothes room, northeast end; also small room in southwest end, used for bath room and closet.

Ward 15.

Carpentry—Repaired 3 locks and renewed 18 sash cords.

Plumbing—Removed former cesspool and made necessary connections direct to main sewer with 8 lengths 8-inch earthen pipe; renewed 65 feet ¾-inch iron pipe Croton supply in basement and removed former lead pipe.

Wards 21, 22, 23 and 24 Building.

Carpentry—Repaired 5 closets, 4 locks, 20 sash ventilators, 7 small chairs and 3 benches; renewed 11 sash cords and planed floor of Ward 22.

Plumbing—Took down 3 double drop lights and replaced them, and cleaned out the pipes in Ward 23.

Plastering—Renewed at ventilators 30 square feet fallen plaster in Ward 24; renewed 13 feet fallen plaster in Ward 23.

Ward 25, 26 27 and 28 Building.

Carpentry—Repaired 4 closets, 3 locks, 22 sash ventilators, 6 small chairs, 2 benches and renewed 10 sash cords, 3 commodes, Ward 25.

Plumbing—Cleaning out 3 side-lights and 2 drop-lights, and clearing out stoppages in closets in Ward 25.

Plastering and Masonry—Renewed 15 square feet fallen plaster, Ward 26.

Painting—Painted wainscoting, Ward 28.

Pavilions A, B and C Building.

Carpentry—Laid for coal shed 240 square feet 2-inch plank for flooring; renewed 7 sash cords, 3 commodes, Pavilion A.

Plumbing—Cleaning 108 feet ¾-inch gas-pipe in Pavilion A.

Plastering and Masonry—Renewed 16 square feet fallen plaster in Pavilion B.

Tinsmithing—Cleaned out and renewed stoves with 30 feet 6-inch pipe.

Pavilion F.

Carpentry—General repairs to piazza: Put up 1 new yellow pine upright, three stories, 35 feet long, 8 inches by 8 inches; 10 cross headers, 3 inches by 8 inches; 120 feet wall strips; 34 feet guard-rail, 2 feet 6 inches high; 260 square feet yellow pine flooring, 1½ by 3½ inches, and 5 anchor bolts, 1¼-inch by 9 feet long; renewed 39 sash cords; repaired 7 benches.

Plumbing—Put in a gas supply for bath room and closet with 35 feet ¾-inch pipe.

Plastering and Masonry—Renewed 9 square feet fallen plaster and pointed up cracks on ceiling and girder for painters.

Tinsmithing—Repaired roof with 22 sheets tin; stoves supplied with 80 feet 6-inch pipe; made 12 ventilators for extension roof, 2 feet by 4 feet.

Painting—Washed down ceiling and side walls of large dining room and calcimined ceiling in white.

Pavilion G.

Carpentry—Repaired 3 doors and stoop at entrance.

Dormitory 2.

Carpentry—Repaired rear stairway, 10 window sashes, 6 doors and renewed 17 sash cords.

Plumbing—Made connection from leader pipe rear end of playroom to main sewer; put in 10 lengths 6-inch earthen pipe, 2 bends and 1 tee; built one mason trap, 2 feet wide 3 feet high.

Plastering and Masonry—Pointed up cracks for Painters in 4 rooms and hallway second floor; built brick mason trap to connect leader pipes to main sewer at east end of playroom, 2 feet x 3 feet, and reset curbing at rear.

Tinsmithing—Renewed 40 feet 4-inch galvanized iron leader pipe.

Painting—Painted ceiling and side walls of 2 large rooms and 2 small rooms on second floor formerly occupied by Attendants; also painted side walls on stairways leading from first to third floor.

Quarantine Wards 17, 18 and 19.

Tinsmithing and Roofing—Renewed portion of roof with 148 sheets of tin and painted entire roof, 540 square feet; put up 189 square feet tin roofing on the roofs of the 3 porches; renewed roof of Ward 19 with 340 sheets of tin; repaired and put up 2 scorcher stoves with 30 feet of pipe in Wards 17 and 19, and put up 72 feet 4-inch leader pipe on rear of building.

Feeble Minded School Building.

Carpentry—Made and set in 2 sash windows, 14 inches by 3 feet in front of building in basement for light to plumber shop; made and put down 80 feet ¾-inch bedstead strips; made for springs 22 strips ¾-inch thick, 2½ inch wide, 2 feet 8 inches long; repaired 8 window sashes, 7 doors and locks and renewed 28 sash cords; put 4 saddles on doors 1½ inches thick, 3 inches wide and 4 feet 5 inches long.

Plumbing—Repairing boys' closet and 8 gas jets.

Plastering and Masonry—Rebuilt 2 arches rear end of 2 boilers in basement.

Tinsmithing—Renewed 38 square feet gutters.

Painting—Washed down ceiling and side walls of large dining room and painted same in two coats, and painted a wainscoting 3 feet 6 inches high all around and varnished all wood work.

School Building.

Carpentry—Put up storm doors at entrance, put up ceiling in class room; 50 square feet ceiling boards 1 by 9 inches.

Plumbing—Repaired steam radiators in rear class room and renewed 20 feet ¾-inch pipe and 4 elbows.

Plastering and Masonry—Renewed in school room 180 square feet loose plaster and lathing from ceiling, same to be ceiled with board; also renewed 15 square feet fallen plaster on stairway leading to chapel.

Tinsmithing—Repaired roof and gutters with 15 sheets tin and 5 pounds solder.

Painting—Painted, in 3 coats, new board ceiling in class room.

Kitchen and Laundry Building.

Carpentry—Repaired 13 drying room horses.

Plumbing—Made alterations to hot water tank; run 83 feet 2-inch pipe return and connection, 1-inch exhaust supply to drying room, 26 feet and 45 feet 1 1/4 inches relief pipe to tank and 55 feet 3/4-inch blow off pipe with 4 globe valves, 13 elbows, various sizes, 1 pair union flanges, and renewed 4 angle valves 3/4-inch to boiler in kitchen.

Plastering and Masonry—Cemented the flagging in main kitchen.

Tinsmithing—Renewed 17 square feet of tin to gutters and 35 feet 4 inches galvanized leader; renewed 10 sheets tin on extension roof of kitchen.

Attendants' Dormitory.

Plumbing—Changed basins and set up in two rooms 2 double porcelain lined wash basins and set in 1 small sink with Croton supply.

Plastering and Masonry—Cut 3 openings, in stone foundation, 2 by 3 feet; also cemented face.

Tinsmithing—Cut 2 holes through the roof in bathroom and put up 3 stoves, connected with 45 feet 5-inch pipe; 112 square feet sheet iron back of stoves; repaired gutters on roof with 23 sheets of tin.

Office.

Carpentry—Made 1 desk top book rack with 44 pigeon holes and 36 book spaces for books and papers proportioned, 2 feet wide, 26 inches high, 7 feet long; also altered large desk to suit same by cutting down and lowering it 16 inches; 6 feet wide, 7 feet long, 33 inches high, with six drawers; made 1 large desk for outer office 4 feet high, 2 feet 6 inches wide, 7 feet long, with 3 drawers; cut pockets in floor for steam pipes and radiator connections; made and laid under ground to preserve steam pipes leading from main to supply the radiators in office, 140 feet 2-inch spruce boxing.

Plumbing—Set in 1 closet and made connections to cistern at rear end hallways in small room, run steam main and returns 155 feet 1 1/2-inch steam pipe and 150 feet 1 1/4-inch return pipe to supply; set up 5 radiators in different places and made the necessary connections with 45 feet 1-inch and 55 feet 3/4-inch pipe, 2 globe valves 3/4-inch, 3 angle valves 1-inch and 3 angle valves 3/4-inch, 16 elbows 1-inch, 15 elbows 3/4-inch, 20 nipples 1-inch and 3/4-inch; put in 2 double drop gas lights with 13 feet 3/4-inch and 6 feet 1/4-inch pipe and 3 double cocks 3/8-inch.

Plastering and Masonry—Pointing up cracks for Painter; rebuilt 30 square feet stone in foundation wall where steam had been run into office to radiators.

Painting—Washed off ceilings and side walls of front office and painted same in 2 coats; also wainscoting 3 feet 6 inches high; grained all wood work and windows in mahogany color and varnished all wood work, also rail and desk in cherry color and varnished same; washed down ceiling and side walls in Superintendent's office and painted same in 2 coats; also wainscoting 2 feet 6 inches high, and all woodwork; in rear office painted in cherry color and varnished double desk with top 5 feet high, in all 7 feet long and 6 feet wide; painted in japan 5 radiators.

Office Record Room.

Carpentry—Made and put in 21 small partitions, 18 inches long, 14 inches deep, and 28 uprights for book racks, 14 inches high and changed 48 feet shelving.

Green House.

Carpentry—Made 180 flower sticks to support flowers and 8 feet boxing for flower beds.

Plumbing—Removed 2-inch angle valves leaking on return main and placed instead 1 2-inch globe valve; also run 3/8-inch drip pipe 20 feet.

Blacksmith Shop.

Carpentry—Built a frame structure, 15 feet high, 20 feet in width and 30 feet in length, width peaked roof, and shingled with 12 bundles of shingles.

Miscellaneous.

Carpentry—Built chicken yard inclosure of wire with 24 spruce joists 2 by 4, 10 upright studs 3 by 6, 8 feet high, 70 feet 3/8-inch base board; made 5 mason's horses 4 1/2 feet high, 4 feet long; made for kitchen use 2 large potato mashers; repaired for the several wards and dining rooms 16 chairs; renewed 16 sash cords in chapel.

Plumbing—Run pipe and put in 1 drop light; put in 2 radiators rear end and made necessary connections to main with 50 feet of 1-inch and 3/4-inch pipe, 4 elbows 1-inch and 4 elbows 3/4-inch; running 16 feet 3/8-inch pipe and put in 1 drop light in dining room, Ward 11; put in 1 drop light and run 15 feet 3/8-inch to connect same.

Plastering and Masonry—Renewed 22 square feet fallen plaster; also pointed up cracks in ceiling in Ward 11.

Tinsmithing—Put up 2 stoves and connected same with 30 feet 6-inch pipe in Nurses' Dormitory; renewed 18 feet gutter and repaired roof with 16 sheets tin in storehouse; general repairs to 12 ranges and stoves in the various buildings.

Painting—Painted in japan 3 radiators in Ward 6 and drug store; repainted 68 bedsteads and renewed in the several wards 213 lights glass; painting and touching up the ceiling in the chapel.

Laborers.

Firemen are employed attending to fires and hot water heaters, wheeling out ashes and bringing in coal and all other work connected with the several boiler rooms.

Work House laborers under Attendant dug up stone and gravel path leading from cross road to Branch Work House building down to Dormitory 2, and made a new path of mixed tar and ashes; cut off wagon road running between Pavilion 24 and 25, which was dangerous to children as a crossing. In this space is laid out a large circle, with flower bed in centre and tar and ashes paths, the whole number of square feet thus improved being 975; also dug up and sodded 2,900 square feet surrounding above-mentioned improvement and finished off with a wire fence around circle composed of 890 feet galvanized iron wire, 94 iron pipe posts with 2 1/2-inch holes drilled in each, 7 round locust posts, 6 feet long, 8 spruce posts, 2 1/2 by 4 by 5 feet long; made ash paths 1,125 feet on north and south sides Dormitory 2, and dug up earth and sodded 1,440 square feet at sides of same; digging for plumbers and removing cesspool at Ward 15; placed screened ashes and leveled off 1,500 square feet on south side of Pavilion G; washed down ceiling in South Hospital and Ward 13, and also School for Feeble Minded; removing leaves from paths and grass plots and cutting sods for the various improvements.

Branch Work House laborers under Keeper have been engaged in sifting ashes and coal and loading and unloading same; carting from boats to the various boiler rooms and filling up the cellars of the various buildings; also digging and excavating to main sewerage for plumbers, chopping wood, removing snow and doing all necessary laboring work.

Miscellaneous.

Carpentry—Framed doorway leading from balcony to reception room, and made and hung panel sash door, 3 by 7 feet, with sash ventilator, 18 inches by 3 feet; made handrail for chapel, 10 feet long 2 feet high; framed doorway leading to clothes room on first floor, and made and hung panel sash door, 3 by 7 feet, with ventilator, 18 inches by 3 feet; made and hung 2 panel sash doors, 2 feet 6 inches by 7 feet, leading from balcony into hallways, and refitted and hung double swinging doors, rear end main entrance hallway; built in same hall new stud partition, 10 feet high, 11 feet wide, 110 square feet, with 11 feet baseboard; put down double doors leading to Ward 4, and altered same from solid panel to sash doors, with ground glass, and rehung same; made box and covered 36 feet pipe, and put on 75 feet lease moulding in lower hall; made and set in 4 new sash bars on doors of balcony in east side; repaired 2 lounges, 4 chairs and 2 tables for Medical Staff; general repairs to laundry horses; renewed flooring in 3 coal carts, 60 feet 1 1/2-inch flooring. The following items comprise the work done in the several wards: Renewed 65 sash cords; made 50 oak slats for blinds, 3/8 inch by 9 feet; renewed 50 square spruce flooring; repaired 3 gates in Ward 12 and 3 in Ward 19; renewed 30 feet door saddles; took down, repaired and rehung 64 pairs double-slat blinds in Wards 10 and 12; repaired 30 locks and keys and 18 window sashes.

Painting—Main Office—Washed down ceilings and sidewalls and painted same in 2 coats; also painted and varnished all woodwork. Staff Office (formerly Drug-store)—Washed down ceilings and sidewalls and painted same in 2 coats; also painted and varnished all woodwork and stained floor. Hallways—Stained in walnut 4 doors leading from clothes room, reception room and balconies; also cleaned and varnished 1 hardwood door at end of passage; washed down ceilings and sidewalls of rear hallway and stairway leading from first to second story; calcimined same and painted wainscoting 3 feet high; washed down ceiling and sidewalls of main entrance hallway and painted same in 3 coats; also painted and varnished baseboard and put 6-inch stencil border all round. Ward 4, washed down ceilings and sidewalls; also Nurse's room and bath-room, and painted all in 2 coats; painted wainscoting around Ward, 3 1/2 feet high, and varnished all woodwork. Double Ward 10, washed down ceilings and sidewalls; also Nurse's room, pantry and bathrooms, and painted all in 3 coats; also cleaned all woodwork and varnished same, and

painted a 3 1/2-feet wainscoting around both wards; painted 38 cribs and 16 bedsteads and renewed 63 lights of glass in the various wards.

Plastering and Masonry—Lathing and plastering new partition erected at rear end main hallway, 220 square feet, and renewed 30 feet fallen plaster and pointing-up for Painter. In Ward 12, renewed 17 feet fallen plaster; built up doorway opening at lower end of main hallway, former entrance to clothes room, 3 by 8 feet, and also cut down brick and removed sash and frame for an entrance to same on east side leading from balcony; relaid 35 square feet brick walk at bathhouse entrance.

Tinsmithing—Repaired portion of roof; renewed 18 feet stovepipe.

Plumbing and Steam-fitting—In Ward 2, repaired 100 feet 3/4-inch return pipe from radiator; 80 feet 1/2-inch relief pipe from steam main; cleaned out and renewed tips to 4 drop lights and 3 side brackets; renewed 8 feet 3/4-inch lead pipe to water supply to pantry. Cellar, renewed rubber packing in 4 union flanges; replaced 3 2-inch elbows, 4 2-inch nipples and run 75 feet 2-inch pipe, and 80 feet 1/2-inch pipe to supply main and relief from main return. In the several wards the packing was renewed in 34 angle valves and 30 globe valves; overhauled drips and repacked valves of 16 steam tables. Run line pipe to supply a radiator on balcony, west side of building with 150 feet 1 1/4-inch supply pipe and 125 feet 1-inch pipe (return), made all necessary connections with 4 1-inch nipples, 2 3/4-inch angle valves and 6 3/4-inch elbows. Relined fire box of large boiler with 300 fine brick and renewed arch; put in 8 brick piers for saddles and reset in cement 35 feet flagging; repaired breakages to 60 feet 6-inch earthen pipe leading from rear end of building and repaired the mason traps in basement with cement.

Employment of Work-house Help—Firemen in boiler-house and gas-house; drivers and hostlers in stable; drivers and laborers on farm; oarsmen in row-boat; cleaning around the grounds; doing kitchen work; helping in the laundry and all other general labor.

Work Done by Engineer.

Verplanck—Repaired and cleaned out waste pipes of bath tubs, water-closets and sinks; repaired hot and cold water faucets, etc.; packed steam valves on radiators and repaired steam pipe on mangle in Laundry; repaired Croton water supply-pipe and hot and cold water faucets in Attendant's kitchen; repaired steam valve on main in basement; also repaired cables and machinery on elevators; regulated air-cocks on steam-heaters in all the halls of Verplanck; cleaned out leader pipe from roof of Verplanck.

LABOR REPORT.

Of the male patients, a daily average of 171 have been engaged as follows: 25 in kitchens, 6 in bake-shop, 3 in boiler-room, 7 driving horses and in stable, 8 working on the farm, 9 in laundry, 2 making mattresses, 2 making soap, 4 painting, 23 in pavilions, 1 in carpenter shop, 1 in tin-shop, 1 in blacksmith-shop, 1 in drug-store, 2 in storeroom, 2 in offices, 1 tailoring, 8 in dining-room, 10 working on sea-wall, 20 unloading and drawing coal, 3 as help for Medical Staff and Officers, 32 removing freight from dock, shoveling snow, delivering bread and stores, repairing and making roads and keeping the grounds around the pavilions clean. Of the female patients, a daily average of 660 have been engaged in the following manner: house-work, sewing and knitting, 465; in the sewing room, 5; in the general dining-room, 9; in laundries, 68; in the vegetable cellar, 14; teasing hair and making mattresses, 70; out-door scrubbing, 15; as help for Medical Staff and Officers, 9; and making fancy work, 5. 200,378 pieces have been laundered during the quarter. 42,343 articles of clothing and bedding have been repaired, and 5,715 articles made. The Engineer, Plumber, Firemen and Assistants, put up 1 washing machine in Laundry, and 10 radiators with connections in Pavilion 2; put 2 steam-traps on return-pipe of Pavilion 3, and 1 on return-pipe of Pavilion 1; put 2 new closets and cisterns in Pavilion C; repaired copper boilers in kitchen, main water-pipe to laundry, water-pipe to Pavilion E, pipes to water column in boilers, blow-off pipe of horizontal boilers, and radiators in laundry; put up new copper urns and connections in general dining-room; put Hitching's heater in Pavilion 1, and new ball-cocks on tanks of Pavilion 3; hoisted coal on dock seventeen days; worked on electric-lights and wires fifty-five days. At North Hospital, put new sewer in kitchen, Hitching's heater in dining-room, urinals and connections in Wards 1, 2 and 3, and sink and pipes in Physicians' quarters; repaired waste-pipes of bath-tubs and closets in Physicians' quarters and Ward 7, also lined tank with lead in Ward 7; put 6 faucets in laundry, and trap in sewer pipes of kitchen; repaired water-closets and sewers in Ward 9, water-pipes in bakery and green-house, water-closets in Wards 1, 2 and 3, and placed Hitching's heater in day-room.

The Carpenter and Assistants built framed extension, 38 by 12, to Ward 6, North Hospital; made 4 window frames, 3 door frames, 2 four-panel doors; laid 1,121 square feet of yellow pine flooring, 192 feet pine base-boards, 100 feet door saddles, 500 feet of weather strips on windows, and covered 1,000 square feet of roof with new shingles; sheathed up sides and ceilings of 1 bath-room; made 2 pine water-closet seats, 4 feet long, 3 pine tops for bath-tubs, and 1 medicine chest; built 2 outside stoops and made hand-rail for same, a storm porch, 20 pine coffins, 2 pairs of shafts for wagons, 2 flights of steps for boat landing and 1 for new extension to building; made 1 pair of 6-pane sashes for boiler-house; put new cords in 28 windows; put on 6 new pass locks and new hinges on 12 doors; repaired roof of Pavilion E, and covered same with tar paper, 10 doors with panels, floor of engine-room, 4 coal-carts, and kept all furniture, etc., in repair.

The Painter and Assistants painted the Attendants' rooms, the water-closets, bath-rooms and water-rooms of Pavilion 5; painted the inside of the hospital, access halls and Attendants' rooms of Pavilion 4; repaired paint in all Pavilions, and put in window lights where required.

The Stone Mason and Assistants built chimney, 8 feet by 2 feet 4 inches by 2 feet 4 inches on Pavilion 1; built 340 cubic feet of brick work, 480 cubic feet of cement wall, and 5,700 cubic feet of dry wall.

The assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in Wales avenue, from summit south of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to Kelly street, and in Kelly street easterly to existing sewer, and objections, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of November 23, 1894, for further consideration of the apportionment of the assessment in respect to the objections of Mr. B. C. Murray, filed by Mr. Thomas S. Bassford, attorney, were presented by the Comptroller, having been returned by the Board of Assessors, under date of December 3, 1894.

The Board of Assessors states that since the return of the above assessment list it has reconsidered its former action and amended the same by reducing the assessment upon the property situated on the west side of Wales avenue from Beck street to Kelly street twenty-five per cent. No objectors appearing to the assessment as now apportioned after notice, on motion the said assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Board of Assessors states that the said assessment list has received further consideration, and is re-transmitted, without alteration. Mr. McCarty, attorney, was heard in opposition to the assessment, with respect to the cost of the improvement. Mr. Gumbleton, of the Board of Assessors, referred to the testimony of Samuel C. Thompson, Engineer of Regulating, Grading, etc., of the Department of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, taken by the Board in said matter.

On motion, the objections filed to the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

On motion, the said assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

No objections having been filed to the assessment, on motion the said assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

Any person making an estimate for the above work shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope to the head of said Health Department, indorsed "Estimate for altering the building near the foot of East Sixteenth street, known as the Disinfecting Depot of the Willard Parker Hospital, City and County of New York," and also with the name of the person or persons presenting the same and the date of its presentation.

Any bidder for this contract must be known to be engaged in and well prepared for the business, and must have satisfactory testimonials to that effect; and the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to give security for the performance of the contract by his or their bond, with two sufficient sureties, each in the penal sum of \$2,500.
