

TWENTY-FIRST DISTRICT, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

MINUTES.

East One Hundred and Forty-first Street Repaving, from Third Avenue to Brook Avenue.

Petition of Henry L. School and others was read, and on motion of Councilman Hottencoth,

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that East One Hundred and Forty-first street be repaved with asphalt-block pavement from Third avenue to Brook avenue, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

East One Hundred and Seventy-eighth Street, Gas-mains, from Third Avenue to Lafontaine Avenue.

Petition of Herman Wauer and others was read, and the matter recommended to the Board of Public Improvements.

Nuisance between Tracks of the Manhattan Railway Company between One Hundred and Thirty-third and One Hundred and Thirty-fourth Streets.

The Secretary was directed to communicate with the Railway Company, the Gleason Real Estate Company and the Board of Health in reference to the complaint signed by Charles Bowne, Thomas T. Dempsey and others.

Receiving-basin Northwest Corner One Hundred and Fifty-sixth Street and Morris Avenue.

Laying Out a New Street Along Line of Old Croton Aqueduct, from One Hundred and Ninetieth Street to Kingsbridge Road.

East One Hundred and Eighty-Seventh Street, Granite Paving, from Webster Avenue to Southern Boulevard.

Laid over until completion of regulating and grading.

Hughes Avenue, Change of Grade, between One Hundred and Eighty-first Street and Kingsbridge Road; and Kingsbridge Road, Corner of Hughes Avenue, to Conform to the Grades on which Twenty-five Houses are Built on both Sides of Hughes Avenue, and on South Side of Kings-bridge Road and Hughes Avenue.
