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## BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

### Report for Quarter Ending June 30, 1903.

Dear Sir—In accordance with section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter I submit the following report of the business of the Department of Public Works for the quarter ended June 30, 1903:

Seventy-one paving contracts, estimated cost \$668,978.38, and 3 miscellaneous contracts, estimated cost \$33,311.30, were entered into, making 74 contracts, at a total estimated cost of \$702,289.68.

The contracts completed were: 50 paving contracts, cost \$248,248.77; 1 regulating

and grading contract, cost \$6,840.97; 3 flagging contracts, cost \$1,013.31; 5 sewer contracts, cost \$14,057.96; 1 contract for receiving basin, cost \$2,576.50; 2 miscellaneous contracts, cost \$6,569.95; making a total of 62 contracts completed at an actual aggregate cost of \$279,307.46.

The principal items of work done under the contracts for regulating and grading are: 14,540 cubic yards earth excavated, 3,250 cubic yards rocks excavated, 29,260 cubic yards filling furnished, 10,458 linear feet curbstones set, 37,708 square feet of flagging laid, 1,400 cubic yards mould furnished, 800 cubic yards retaining wall built, 6,000 square feet sod laid and 5,800 linear feet gutter paved.

The new asphalt pavement laid during the quarter amounted to 6.40 miles, making the total mileage of paved streets in the Borough of Manhattan, 414.19.

The repair force took up and relaid 64,110 square yards of stone block pavement.

Permits were issued as follows: 63 to construct vaults, 54 to repair vaults, 7 to place guy posts, 148 to place kettles on streets, 70 to place boilers on streets, 3 to place banner poles on streets and 14 to repair pavements at expense of applicants.

The amount collected for vault permits is \$62,500.

The macadamized and unpaved roads in the upper section of the City were repaired and maintained as usual. The area of macadam roads repaired is 5,647 square yards. In performing this work 1,118 loads of broken stone, 97 loads of stone, 187 loads of stone screenings, 8 loads of gravel, 257 loads of gravel screenings, 33 loads of ashes and 623 loads of earth were hauled and used.

Corporations laid 42,771 feet of electric main conduits, 3,640 feet of gas mains, 60 feet of steam mains and 3,992 feet of services for electricity, making the total length of trenches opened for mains 25,786 miles.

Permits were issued to corporations to open streets as follows: 176 to lay and overhaul electric pipes, 117 to lay and overhaul gas pipes and 2 to lay and overhaul steam pipes, 1,299 to lay and repair electric mains, 3,886 to lay and repair gas mains and 101 to lay and repair steam mains, also 889 to construct and repair railways. In addition to these permits, 593 were issued to lay, repair and overhaul water mains and 284 to lay, repair and overhaul sewer pipes.

Work is in progress under 18 contracts for sewers, the total estimated cost being about \$160,000.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment having authorized the expenditure of an additional sum of \$100,000 for repairing old sewers, plans and specifications are being prepared for as much of this most necessary work as can be performed for such a limited amount.

Seventeen thousand three hundred and ninety-eight linear feet of new sewer and 41 new receiving basins were constructed, making the present length of the sewerage system in the Borough of Manhattan 504.26 miles, with 6,075 receiving basins. In addition to this 1,190½ feet of repair work was done, 158 feet of sewer and 3 receiving basins were altered and improved.

For new sewers, 133 permits were issued; also 149 to repair sewers.

The Bureau of Incumbrances received and attended to 796 complaints of obstructions, made 291 seizures and removals of obstructions, and issued permits as follows: 1,230 to place building material on streets, 240 to cross sidewalks with horses and carts, 189 to erect temporary sheds over sidewalks, 290 to construct bay-windows and 6 to construct ornamental projections. The Bureau also removed 335 loads of dirt, stone and rubbish and 64 fallen trees, dangerous stumps and posts.

The report of the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices gives a detailed account of alterations and repairs made to public buildings, offices and markets, and to the free floating baths; also of supplies furnished.

The total number of baths taken during the quarter was 169,430, of which 108,885 were taken by males and 60,545 by females.

I also have the honor to report the relaying of pavements by the Rapid Transit Commission, where same had been disturbed for the purpose of Rapid Transit construction, has progressed under favorable conditions on Broadway, where the asphalt has been restored to a good condition in a large proportion of the same from Sixty-sixth street north to Ninety-fifth street.

Several blocks have been relaid north of Ninety-fifth street on Broadway.

The macadam surface of Broadway disturbed between One Hundred and Fourth street and north, under the elevated railroad structure, has not been repaired, it being deemed advisable to await the final completion of the work before making the extensive restoration. On either side of the elevated structure the roadway has been kept free and clear for the use of vehicles.

On Fourth avenue, between Thirty-second and Twenty-fourth streets, the pavement has been restored and accepted by the City, and the contract has already been let for laying upon the present stone foundation asphalt blocks.

Elm street has been regulated and paved under your own direction.

Other parts of the Rapid Transit work, so far as the restoration of the pavement to as good a condition as existed before it was disturbed, have progressed very favorably.

Dear Sir—I respectfully submit the following statement of the financial condition of the Division of Roads, accompanied with an accounting of the work performed and materials used during the quarter ending June 30, 1903.

The work of this Division consists of the maintenance of 20.72 miles of macadam and gravel roads and 22.39 miles of dirt roads in the Borough of Manhattan. This includes the repairing of washouts and repairing gutters to insure proper drainage. An examination of this report will show that a great amount of the work of this division cannot well be tabulated, yet calls for a considerable expenditure on the part of the City, such as washouts, which have been limited almost wholly to Boulevard Lafayette, Fort Washington avenue and Marble Hill.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SEWERS.

President of the Borough of Manhattan,  
Offices, Commissioner of Public Works, Bureau of Sewers,  
New York, July 14, 1903.

Hon. GEORGE LIVINGSTON, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—In compliance with your instructions I herewith forward the Quarterly Report of the Bureau of Sewers for the quarter ending June 30, 1903:

Statement No. 1 contains a complete report of the financial transactions during the quarter.

Statement No. 2 is the report of Chief Engineer Loomis, which contains in full and detail an account of work completed and in course of construction under his immediate supervision.

Statement No. 3 shows the amount of work done and the materials used by the laboring force in the cleaning and repairing of basins and sewers during the quarter.

During the quarter five large sewer contracts, amounting to about \$160,000, and which were under construction for the last eighteen months, have been completed and accepted, and assessment lists for the same have been forwarded to the Board of Assessors.

Eighteen other contracts, amounting to about \$250,000, have been in course of construction and have progressed favorably, notwithstanding the delays occasioned by the strikes among the mechanics and laboring men in the city.

Fifteen new contracts have been advertised and let at public letting, and work on them will be commenced in the near future.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment having allowed the Bureau an additional \$100,000 by bond issue for the repairing of old sewers, the engineering force is now busily employed in preparing plans and specifications for such repairs as are absolutely necessary and of such an amount as the limited bond issue will admit of.

The Mechanics and Laborers employed on small repairs and the cleaning of sewers and basins have performed considerable work, as an examination of the report annexed hereto will show.

Hon. WILLIAM H. MICHALES, Superintendent of Sewers:

Dear Sir—In compliance with your instructions, I hand you herewith a report of the work done under my supervision for the quarter ending June 30, 1903, with a statement of work done by Mechanics and Laborers.

17,398 linear feet of new sewer and 41 new receiving basins connecting therewith have been built, making the present length of the sewerage system in Manhattan Borough 2,662,500 feet (504.26 miles), with 6,075 receiving basins, which number includes 9 basins built under special contract, as hereinafter stated.

In addition to the above, there were built 1,190½ feet of repair work, 158 feet of alteration and improvements and 3 receiving basins altered and improved, all under contract at public letting, which amounts are not included in the above length of sewerage system and the total number of basins.

In the schedule accompanying this report you will find a detailed statement showing the status of the several contracts under charge of this Bureau.

## Sewer Contracts.

Nine sewer contracts have been completed, viz.:

Sewer in Fort Washington avenue, between Broadway and One Hundred and Eighty-first street.

Sewer in Wadsworth avenue, between Broadway and Eleventh avenue.

Sewer in One Hundred and Eighty-first street, between Fort Lafayette and Fort Washington avenues, and in Fort Washington avenue, between One Hundred and Eighty-first street and summit north.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in One Hundred and Second street, at Harlem river.

Repairs to sewer in Sixty-fifth street, between Madison and Fifth avenues.

Repairs to sewer in Seventy-second street, between Avenue A and First avenue.

Repairs to sewer in Sixth avenue at Fifty-seventh street.

Repairs to sewer in Hamilton terrace, between One Hundred and Forty-first and One Hundred and Forty-fourth streets.

Repairs to sewer in Central Park West, between Eighty-eighth and Eighty-ninth streets.

Repairs to sewer in Greene street, between Waverly place and Washington place.

Receiving basins, southeast corner of Eighty-fourth street and Columbus avenue; southeast corner of Fifty-sixth street and Twelfth avenue, etc., etc.

There are now in progress contracts for 15 new sewers and 2 basin contracts:

Sewer in Union square East, between Fourteenth and Sixteenth streets.

Sewer in Broadway, east and west sides, between Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets.

Sewer in Fort Washington avenue, from end of present sewer at a point 1.240 feet from Broadway (Kingsbridge road) to summit south.

Sewer in Wicker place, from end of present sewer to Van Corlear place, and in Van Corlear place, between Wicker place and Kingsbridge road.

Outlet sewer into Harlem river, between Ninety-second and Ninety-third streets, with alteration and improvement to existing sewers in Avenue A, between Ninety-second and Ninety-third streets, and in Ninety-second street, between Avenue A and Second avenue.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in Fifty-first street, between Park and Fifth avenues.

Extension to outlet sewer at foot of West Seventy-second street.

Repairs to sewer in Forty-fourth street, at Hudson river.

Repairs to sewer in Fifty-sixth street, between Eighth and Ninth avenues.

Repairs to sewer in Stanton street, between Mangin and Ridge streets.

Repairs to sewer in Twelfth and Thirteenth avenues, between Twenty-seventh and Thirtieth streets, and in Twenty-seventh, Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth

streets, between Eleventh and Thirteenth avenues, and in Thirtieth street, between Eleventh avenue and North river.

Receiving basins on the north and south sides of Sixty-sixth street and adjoining the wall of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad; on the northwest corner of Lenox avenue and One Hundred and Thirteenth street; on the southwest corner of One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street and Columbus avenue; on the northwest corner of One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street and Convent avenue; on the southwest corner of Central Park West and Sixty-third street, and alteration and improvement to receiving basins on the northeast and southeast corners of Seventy-ninth street and Riverside Drive.

Receiving basins on the southwest corner of Park and Mulberry streets and on the east and west sides of Mulberry street, between Park and Bayard streets; near southeast corner of Elm and Great Jones streets; on northeast corner of One Hundred and Twelfth street and Manhattan avenue; on southwest corner of One Hundred and Nineteenth street and Eighth avenue; on northwest corner of One Hundred and Fifty-first street and Eighth avenue, and on northwest corner of Forty-sixth street and Eleventh avenue.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

President of the Borough of Manhattan,  
Office of the Commissioner of Public Works,  
Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices,  
New York, August 14, 1903.

Hon. GEORGE LIVINGSTON, Commissioner:

Sir—In accordance with your instructions I have the honor to submit the transactions of this Bureau during the quarter ending June 30, 1903.

## Criminal Court Building.

The usual orders were issued for cleaning the glass in windows, doors and skylight, and for the necessary repairs to plumbing work. Janitor's, Engineer's and electrical supplies were supplied. The tubes in one of the boilers were put in perfect repair, and six inside cast-iron plates for caps of boiler tubes and bolts and nuts for the same were furnished. Twenty-eight new awnings were placed over windows in above building, also sixty-nine new window shades were furnished and hung, and repairs made to thirty-six old shades. The outside railing on the Franklin street side of the building was repaired.

The Elevators—The contract for repairing the elevators has been completed and they are now in first-class condition. A thorough examination was made of the pumping engine connected with the elevator system and the following repairs were made. The brass plungers, plugger rings, valve rods were renewed complete; a complete set of rubber valves and brass valve seats furnished and put in place, and new brass piston rods put in the water end of pump.

District Attorney's Office—Sixty-one window shades hung on Hartshorn spring rollers and made of best quality shade cloth were furnished.

## County Court House.

The usual orders for supplies, steam heating and cleaning glass were renewed. No repairs have been made on this building in anticipation of the contract for alterations and completion of the building being let.

## City Hall.

The usual orders for supplying steam and furnishing current to operate motor fans were renewed. Also orders to clean glass in windows and doors of above building, and necessary Janitor's and Engineer's supplies were furnished.

All the awning frames on the windows of above building were recovered. Repairs were also made to the roof and gutter. Two lanterns of a design selected to conform to the furnishings already installed in the building were furnished and hung in the rotunda. Nine gas and electric fixtures were installed and connected. Thirteen chandeliers were refinished, rewired and connected with the several offices in the above building. Three combination chandeliers were removed from the City Clerk's office.

Mayor's Office—Sixteen window shades, made of opaque shade cloth, hung on Hartshorn spring rollers, and sixteen sun-bursts, made of satin on the frames over windows, were furnished and put up. Three mats and two rugs as selected; one Washington desk table 5 feet 6 inches; one Washington desk table 4 feet 6 inches; one Washington mahogany desk table 24x48, and one 20x40 as selected; twelve side chairs of mahogany; four arm chairs of mahogany; one chair for Mayor and one for Mayor's Secretary; one hand-tufted rug, 22x25, of special design as selected; models of two extra seals of the United States; models of two extra seals of the State of New York, and models of two extra seals of The City of New York; one rug in Mayor's private office, and one rug for the Mayor's counsel were furnished. The sale in the Chief Clerk's room of Mayor's office was painted as directed. On several windows in the Mayor's reception room and one door, long curtains made of velour of selected color, satteen lined, interlined with canton flannel, trimmed with border, and necessary loops and hooks were furnished, hung and put up complete on two-inch brass poles. One fireplace with necessary fixtures was furnished and set in the Mayor's office and reception room. Three-eighths-inch parquet flooring was laid in the Mayor's offices, vestibule and reception room. One rug for the Mayor's private office and one for the Mayor's Counsel.

Necessary professional services were furnished to do such drafting and lettering as was required in altering the Mayor's office. Two eight-light electrical reflectors; four two-light electrical brackets, and two two-light combination electrical brackets were furnished and delivered. Three four-light combination chandeliers; one six-light gas chandelier, and one six-light combination chandelier were taken down, refinished and replaced as directed.

President of the Borough of Manhattan—Three-eighths-inch parquet flooring was laid in the above offices as directed, together with linoleum and corrugated rubber matting. Two rugs were furnished for the office of the President, and one for the Secretary of the Borough.

City Clerk—Three-eighths-inch parquet flooring in selected sections were laid diagonally with butt joint oak and mahogany strip border around the base for a finish. Material of standard grade of Indiana white oak and Cuban mahogany, thorough kiln dried, furnished, laid and finished complete. The walls and ceilings of the office were cleaned off and painted as directed by the Consulting Architect of the Borough of Manhattan. Two hundred yards of "A" linoleum were furnished and laid, and eleven two-light combination brackets installed on new partitions in the above office. Six four-light combination fixtures furnished and put up. The walls and ceilings were cleaned off and painted as directed in the offices occupied by the City Clerk. The documents, books, papers, etc., and file cases refitted, altered and reset in the office of the Custodian of the Records of the Board of Aldermen.

Governor's Room—Paintings in the above room were cleaned, oiled and rehung as directed.

City Hall Police Station—About thirty linear feet of iron railing 3 feet 6 inches high, with 2-inch diamond mesh, made of No. 7 wire  $\frac{3}{8}$  channel iron, wooden hand rail on top with swinging gate furnished and erected.

## Brown Stone Building.

The glass in the windows and doors were cleaned in the usual manner, and the necessary Janitor's and Engineer's supplies were furnished.

## Harlem Court House.

The usual Janitors' supplies were furnished, together with a supply of material for the Steamfitter and Engineer. Two entirely new 6-inch iron galvanized leaders were furnished and set up; two of the old leaders were taken down, repaired and reset, and two galvanized iron receiving water heads were furnished and set. The broken seams in the roof and gutters were riveted and soldered, and the roof made water-tight. The glass in the windows and doors were cleaned as usual.

## West Fifty-fourth Street Court House.

The usual Janitor's and Engineer's supplies were furnished, together with one 3,000-gallon cedar tank and cover for water supply, and labor and material necessary to connect the same, also one 9-foot flag pole with bracket. Repairs were made to the steam and gas leaks.

## Children's Court.

Electric wires were extended; six 16-inch adjustable fans were furnished and connected; one water closet cleaned and new wash basin furnished and put in in above court.

## Fifty-seventh Street Courthouse.

The skylights, roof, gutters, etc., of above building were repaired, riveted and soldered where necessary; all rubbish was removed from the premises, and same left broom clean.

## Jefferson Market Courthouse.

Urinals were removed, and one wash basin was furnished and connected in the Judge's chamber in above court. Hand elevator was also repaired. Repairs were made to gas leaks, and 24 L burner cocks were furnished. That portion of the tin and slate roof over the Municipal Court was repaired and painted. All dirt was removed from the premises and same left broom clean. One barrel of soap powder and one length (50) feet rubber hose, with couplings, were furnished for use of the above building.

## Essex Market Courthouse.

Necessary repairs were made to the pipes and water closets in above courthouse;

doors, etc., were stained and varnished as directed. One barrel of soap powder was furnished and also 50 feet of rubber hose for use of the above courthouse.

## Rivington Street Bath.

The usual Janitor's and Engineer's supplies were furnished, together with two leather mats, 4 feet by 6 feet; one barrel of disinfectant, four barrels of soap powder, three pairs of rubber boots, one half dozen each R and L spindles and H and C cones for Gegenstroms, ice, one barrel kerosene oil. One Worthington steam pump, brass lined, was furnished and connected to replace broken one. One 20-foot flag pole was furnished and erected. One Rochester engine lubricator was furnished and put in place; main steam pipe was repaired and one 6-inch Jenkins valve furnished. The electric lighting system in the above building was thoroughly overhauled and repaired as directed by the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices. Repairs were made to all steam leaks and one Kiely pump governor.

## Free Floating Baths.

The usual orders for cleaning supplies, disinfectants, lumber, services of carpenters, storage quarters, coal, rope, etc., were issued. Repairs were made to lamps, pumps, handles, etc. Also labor and material furnished to blow out gas pipes, examine all fixtures and connect baths with main pipes at different locations on the North and East rivers, as directed.

The interior of swimming wells, stairways, etc., were painted as per specifications; 84 white duck caps were furnished for use of Attendants, and necessary labor and material were furnished to tow the fourteen floating baths from their winter quarters in South Brooklyn to their respective berths in the North and East rivers, as directed.

## New York County Jail.

Water closets were cleaned and repaired, and one new one was put in above building. One barrel of soap powder was furnished, together with one carpet sweeper and 125 feet of garden hose, with nozzles.

## First District Municipal Court.

Necessary repairs were made to the roofs, gutters and leaders on above building. All dirt and rubbish was removed from the premises and same left broom clean. Necessary painting work, etc., was done in accordance with specifications; the water pipes in above courthouse were also changed and altered as directed.

## Second District Municipal Court.

The usual cleaning and Janitor's supplies were furnished.

## Fourth District Municipal Court.

The usual cleaning and Janitor's supplies were furnished. Twenty-eight window awnings were re-covered and put up on the above building, as directed.

## Fifth District Municipal Court.

The usual Janitor's supplies were furnished. Eighteen new window shades were furnished and hung, as directed.

## Sixth District Municipal Court.

Nine window awnings were furnished and put up on above building, as directed.

## City Paymaster's Office.

One awning at window on Chambers street in above office was covered and put up as directed; two window shades furnished and hung on Hartshorn spring rollers, and one barrel of disinfectant furnished for use of the above office.

## Register's Office.

Necessary labor and material was furnished to erect and change voltage of eight electric fans in the above office and do necessary connecting, etc.

## Building No. 128 West Seventeenth Street.

Two school sinks were removed from above building and pipes sealed up.

## Public Comfort Station.

Repairs were made to the mosaic flooring in above station; necessary mason work was done, iron frames, etc., furnished.

## Volunteer Firemen's Association, No. 220 East Fifty-ninth Street.

Necessary repairs were made to tin roof of above building; new galvanized iron gutter and flashings set up along walls, and all dirt and rubbish caused by work were removed, and premises left broom clean.

## Building No. 72 Elm Street.

The usual Engineer's and Janitor's supplies were furnished; necessary repairs were made to roof, and premises left broom clean.

## Brown Stone Building.

Necessary repairs were made to the elevator in above building, and one barrel of disinfectant furnished.

## The Markets.

## Gansevoort—One barrel of disinfectant furnished.

Washington—Necessary repairs were made to the roof of the above market and one barrel of disinfectant furnished.

West Washington—One 4-inch galvanized iron leader with new tubes connected with leaders, etc., and necessary painting was done at the following stands in the above market:

Nos. 16, 33, 49 and 63 Grace avenue; Nos. 31 and 33 Gansevoort street; Nos. 16 and 64 Bloomfield street; No. 21 Lawton avenue; No. 21 Thirteenth avenue; No. 48 Thompson avenue; corner Thompson and Grace avenues, and one leader at the corner of West and Bloomfield streets.

Gutters were relined and defective tin cut out and replaced with new tin over stands Nos. 38 to 48 and Nos. 35 to 64 Loew avenue, and Nos. 14 to 26 Hewitt avenue, also Nos. 60, 62, 64, 66 and 68 Bloomfield street; Nos. 4, 5 and 6 West street; No. 2 Grace avenue, and the south side of Grace avenue corner of West street; and all new tin received one coat of metallic paint on bottom and top.

The gutters were relined and repairs made to roofs at Nos. 33 to 49 and No. 51 Grace avenue; corner of West and Grace avenues; Nos. 38 to 51 Thompson avenue, and Nos. 1, 3, 5 and 7 Loew avenue, and all dirt was removed from the premises and same left broom clean.

Six dozen corn brooms and six dozen street brooms with handles were furnished. Fulton—The sewer pipe in above market was cleaned and repaired, and one barrel of disinfectant furnished.

## OFFICES OF COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

Orders were issued for the use of switchboard and extension station, also for supply of newspapers daily. One awning recovered.

Bureau of Buildings—Fifty-three yards of tapestry Brussels carpet were furnished and laid on floor of Superintendent's room of above Bureau; also three rugs furnished as selected. Six No. 31 and twelve No. 26 chairs were furnished; also two desk chairs, as selected; one roll top desk and one table, as selected. Seven new window shades were furnished and hung. One barrel of soap powder and one keg of soda were furnished. The electrical wires for lights and bells were extended, and the ceilings and walls of the Superintendent's room and room adjoining; also the partition of two toilet rooms were washed off, plastered, painted and tinted as directed.

Bureau of Highways—Forty-three square yards of plain brown linoleum were furnished and laid in Rooms Nos. 1610 and 1628 of above Bureau.

## Office of Consulting Architect, Borough of Manhattan.

Labor and material were furnished to extend the partitions, etc., in the above office, as directed by the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices, the work being done at such times and in such manner as not to interfere with the business transactions.

## Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

Supply of coal and wood for heating, and ice for various offices; sponges, soap, brooms, pails, dusters, mops, brushes, etc., were furnished and delivered for use of public buildings in care of this Bureau. Orders for the use of horse and wagon, and telephone instruments were renewed.

Among the many items of repairs not otherwise specifically referred to, are plumbing, steamfitting, gasfitting, moving safes, mason work, plastering, painting, carpentering, glazing, electrical work, cabinet work, iron work, tin work, cleaning and laying carpets, etc., and for the use of Mechanics in the employ of this Department.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC BATHS AND COMFORT STATIONS.

President of the Borough of Manhattan,  
Offices of the Commissioner of Public Works,  
Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices,  
New York, August 12, 1903.

Hon. WILLIAM H. WALKER, Superintendent Public Buildings and Offices:

Dear Sir—I submit herewith my second quarterly report in relation to the free floating baths and the Rivington street interior bath, also comfort station, ending June 30, 1903.

The fourteen floating baths were wintered at the foot of Twenty-second street, Brooklyn, in good condition. Necessary repairs to them have been made. Two new pontoons and twenty-nine of the old ones removed, recaulked and returned to their positions.

The baths have been thoroughly cleaned on the interior; the chutes under the toilet rooms all rebuilt and are now in a more sanitary condition than ever before, though improvement might still be made by putting in seats instead of earthen hoppers.

On June 12 Bath No. 2 was placed at the Battery.

On June 13 Bath No. 10 was placed at East One Hundredth street.

On June 14 Bath No. 8 was placed at West Eighty-second street.

On June 17 Bath No. 12 was placed at East Third street.

On June 19 Bath No. 14 was placed at East Third street.

On June 20 Bath No. 7 was placed at West Thirty-fifth street.

On June 21 Bath No. 9 was placed at West Thirty-fifth street.

On June 24 Bath No. 13 was placed at East Ninety-seventh street.

On June 26 Bath No. 4 was placed at East Twenty-fourth street.

On June 28 Bath No. 15 was placed at West One Hundred and Fifty-second street.

The other four baths are all ready to be placed in commission, but are delayed on account of not having berths in readiness.

The larger portion of the repairs, except pontoons, were made by our own men, with material furnished by the City at a considerable saving of expense, and with better results. All of the floating baths are very much in need of painting.

The Rivington street bath has been open every day to the public, except on two occasions, when it was closed for a short time to make repairs to steam pipes.

The gegenstroms, which were all taken out and overhauled recently, have already begun to get out of order, leaking and returning cold water to boilers. They will soon have to be repaired again. I fear they (the gegenstroms) will never give satisfaction, but be a continual source of expense to keep them in condition. About the usual amount of repairs have been made.

The number of individual baths taken for the last quarter is as follows: Males, 108,885; females, 60,545. Total, 169,430.

I am very glad to state that the service to the public seems to be giving almost entire satisfaction, and is spoken of highly by those making use of it. Am also glad to inform you that the conduct of the attendants at this bath, except in one or two instances, has been highly commendable.

The comfort station in Borough Hall Park has given very much better satisfaction during the past quarter than heretofore, and is now in good condition, except the ventilating apparatus, which is out of order, and has been for more than a year. The fresh air inlet fan should be put in working condition at once that the place may be properly ventilated.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk thereof, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

And said City Record, and the newspapers now by law designated as corporation newspapers in the present City of Brooklyn, shall be the only papers to be included within the term corporation newspapers, as the same is used anywhere in this act; . . . . There shall be inserted in said City Record nothing aside from such official matters as are expressly authorized. . . . All advertising required to be done for the City, except as in this act otherwise specially provided, and all notices required by law or ordinance to be published in corporation papers, shall be inserted at the public expense only in the City Record, and the publication therein shall be a sufficient compliance with any law or ordinance requiring publication of such matters or notices. . . . The Comptroller shall cause a continuous series of the City Record to be bound as completed, quarterly, and to be deposited with his certificate thereon in the office of the Register of Deeds of the County of New York in the County Clerk's office of said County, and in the office of the City Clerk, and copies of the contents of any of the same, certified by such Register, County Clerk, or City Clerk, shall be received in judicial proceedings as prima facie evidence of the truth of the contents thereof.—§1526. *Greater New York Charter.*
