### Resolution to Establish Rules and Regulations to Govern Massage Operators and Massage Institutes.

Resolved, That the following shall be the governing rules and regulations for massage operators and massage institutes, made in accordance with Ordinance No. 171:

#### Requirements—

No person shall be licensed by the Department of Licenses in accordance with the provisions of an ordinance to amend chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances relating to licenses, entitled Massage Institutions and Operators, Approved November 27, 1916:

(A) Who is less than 21 years of age.

(B) Who does not present satisfactory references from (1) at least two reputable physicians licensed to practice in the State of New York; or (2) five reputable citizens residents of New York City.

(C) Who does not hold the occupational certificate of the Board of Health of New York City of freedom from communicable disease, as of date not more than 30 days prior to the date of application.

(D) Who does not (1) present evidence by the affidavits of at least two reputable physicians licensed to practice in the State of New York, or of three citizens, that he or she has practised massage continuously for five years, last passed, or for at least five years within the last ten years; or (2) file a certificate that he or she has satisfactorily completed the full course of training given by a school of massage duly recorded in the office of the Commissioner of Licenses; or (3) if application to be licensed in accordance herewith is made prior to April 1, 1917, offer the affidavits of five licensed massage operators that they have examined the applicant and that he or she is qualified, in their opinion, to give massage.

#### Schools—

Certificates—Schools of massage duly licensed under this ordinance shall be recorded in the office of the Commissioner of Licenses upon receipt of a certificate signed by a majority of commission consisting of three physicians licensed to practice in the State of New York and two masseurs duly licensed under this ordinance to be appointed by the Mayor for a term of one year, certifying that, in their opinion, the course of instruction in the school is adequate and the staff competent to give the necessary instructions in massage.

Structural—No place shall be licensed as an institute which has not at least two

rooms equipped with massage tables, with toilet facilities, having hot and cold running water adjacent thereto. These rooms shall have at least eighty square feet of floor area and at least six hundred cubic feet of space therein, with a window or windows, with not less than eight square feet of surface opening upon a street, open court, light shaft or open air, with independent access to each room by a door opening from a hallway, and these rooms shall not be furnished or apparently used as bedrooms.

### Resolution to Authorize the Board of Education to Purchase Two Auto Trucks or Auto Buses Without Public Letting.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the Committee on Supplies of the Board of Education be and it is hereby authorized and empowered to purchase in the open market, without public letting, two auto trucks or auto buses, to be used for the transportation of crippled children and for the delivery of supplies, at a cost not to exceed six thousand dollars (\$6,000) for the two.

### Resolution Amending Special Revenue Bond Issue for Use of the Committee on Buildings.

Resolved, That the following resolution adopted February 1, 1916, and effective February 15, 1916:

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of four thousand four hundred dollars (\$4,400), the proceeds whereof to be used by the Committee on Buildings of the Board of Aldermen for the purpose of carrying to completion the work of revising the Building Code. Expenditures hereunder to be incurred during the six months commencing February 1, 1916, and to be divided as follows:

Services of Rudolph P. Miller, as expert on revision, at the rate of \$500 per month .....	\$3,000 00
Stenographer, at \$150 per month .....	900 00
Office supplies, postage, telephone and contingencies .....	500 00
	\$4,400 00

—be and the same is hereby amended by striking therefrom the words "during the six months commencing February 1, 1916," and inserting in lieu thereof the words, "until the completion of said Building Code," and by transferring from the item "Services of Rudolph P. Miller, as expert on revision, at the rate of \$500 per month, \$3,000" services discontinued, the unexpended balance of \$1,338.71 is hereby transferred to the item "Stenographer, at \$150 per month, \$900, so that said Stenographer may be retained by the Committee on Buildings to the work of completion of the Building Code. And further, until the enactment into law by the Board of Aldermen of the theatre section of the Building Code, and in any event not beyond December 31, 1917.

Subdivision 2 of section 2 of article 1 of chapter 11 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to the discharge of small arms, as amended, is hereby further amended by adding at the end thereof the following words: the grounds of the Harlem Yacht Club, Inc., at Hunter avenue, about 150 feet north of Dittmar street, on Pelham Bay, City Island.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

### An Ordinance to Amend Article 3 of Chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances by Adding a New Section to Be No. 45 in Regard to Garages.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Sec. 1. Article 3 of chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended by adding thereto after section 44 a new section to be numbered 45, to read as follows:

Sec. 2. S. 45. No charitable institution in The City of New York which serves the public free of charge shall be required to pay any fees for the maintenance and operation of a storage or non-storage garage which is exclusively used for the housing of a motor vehicle, or motor vehicles, owned by and employed in connection with such institutions.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

### An Ordinance to Amend Subdivision 3 of Section 111 of Article 8 of Chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances in Regard to Boat Supplies.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Sec. 1. Subdivision 3 of section 111 of article 8 of chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 2. 3. Boat supplies. Wherever the physical conditions along the shore front are such as to make it impracticable to place under ground a storage tank for the storage of volatile inflammable oils, to be delivered to launches and other vessels for generating motive power, a special permit may be issued authorizing the storage of such oils in a tank above ground in a quantity not to exceed 10,000 gallons; provided that such oils shall be conveyed from the storage tank to the tanks of vessels directly by a pipe line or by approved portable tanks or approved safety cans.

Sec. 3. This ordinance to take effect immediately.

**Resolution Amending Corporate Stock Issue for Required Improvements at the Terminals of the Manhattan Bridge.**

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following amended resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a stated meeting held December 8, 1916:

Resolved, That, subject to concurrence herewith by the Board of Aldermen, the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 3, 1910, and amended on January 26, 1911, February 23, 1911, and May 12, 1916, and approved by the Board of Aldermen on June 28, 1910, February 21, 1911, March 7, 1911, and May 29, 1916, respectively, to read as follows:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of corporate stock of The City of New York to the amount of two hundred fifty-two thousand six hundred dollars (\$252,600), to provide means for required improvements in connection with the Brooklyn Terminal of the Manhattan Bridge, namely, the construction of retaining walls, sidewalks, stairways, railings and pavement, and the necessary architectural work, to the extent of two hundred and twenty-seven thousand one hundred dollars (\$227,100), and to provide means for the improvement of the southerly portion of the Manhattan Plaza of the Manhattan Bridge, to the extent of twenty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$25,500), and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue corporate stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter to an amount not exceeding two hundred fifty-two thousand six hundred dollars (\$252,600), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid; provided, however, that no encumbrances or expenditures shall be made against the proceeds of corporate stock herein authorized, nor shall bids upon such contracts be advertised for until after approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the plans, specifications, estimates of costs and forms of such contracts which shall be submitted to said Board by the Commissioner of Bridges, nor shall any architect, engineer, expert or departmental employee be engaged or employed as a charge against such proceeds except after approval by said Board of such employment and of the fee or wage to be paid by preliminary and final contract, voucher or budget schedule, which are to be similarly submitted unless in the case of departmental employees, such employment is in accordance with schedules approved by said Board, the amendment herein having the effect of rescinding twenty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$25,500) in the corporate stock authorization for the fund "C. D. B.—48," which sum is herein authorized for another purpose.

**An Ordinance to Amend Paragraph g of Section 72 of Article 4 of Chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances Relating to Classification of Buildings.**

AN ORDINANCE to amend paragraph g of section 72 of article 4 of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to classification of buildings.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Paragraph g of section 72 of article 4 of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to classification of buildings, is hereby amended to read as follows:

g. every business building used as a garage within the fire limits; every garage within the suburban limits exceeding 600 square feet in area or 15 feet in height, or not located as provided in §91 of this chapter; and every garage, outside these restricted areas, over 40 feet in height; except that garages not exceeding 1 story in height may have non-fireproof roofs, and garages not exceeding 2 stories in height may likewise have non-fireproof roofs, provided the same are covered on the inside with approved fire retarding material in all cases where motor vehicles, with volatile

inflammable oil in their fuel tanks, are stored or kept on the upper floor. Window openings and outside doors in such garages removed at least 30 feet from the nearest exposure, may be non-fireproof.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal or shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant, free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.
