

SANITARY BUREAU.

Summary of Work.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases, for the quarter ending June 30, 1888:

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police was 82.410.

The number of causes of complaint returned was 7,898.
The number of causes of complaints received from citizens was 4

The number of causes of complaint returned was 7,998.

The number of complaints received from citizens was 4,969, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 712 permits to discharge cargoes, upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 906 permits to scavengers to empty privies; 24 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; and 19 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

82.35 per cent. of the deaths from scarlet fever occurred in children under five years of age, of which 42.9 per cent. were complicated with diphtheria.

As compared with the corresponding quarter for 1887, the following tables show an increase in number of cases admitted of forty-eight cases of scarlet fever and forty-six of diphtheria, a total increase of ninety-four. Also as compared with the first quarter of this year, an increase of twenty-one cases of scarlet fever and twenty of diphtheria, a total increase of forty-one. The admission for the past quarter (of scarlet fever and diphtheria) shows an increase over any previous quarter since the opening of the hospital, and only nine less than for the entire year 1886.

On April 1 the method of recording deaths was changed. The change would have been made at the beginning of the year, but the new blanks necessary for the purpose were not then ready. Instead of recording the actual daily mortality, the event is now kept by weeks, and only of the registered mortality, the former method requiring an amount of detailed labor, which has been found increasingly difficult year by year as the city has grown.

The result of this change is that in the present quarterly report, three different numbers will be found representing the deaths for the quarter. The number 10,171 is the registered mortality; 10,138 is the actual mortality, and 9,965, in the table of nativities, is the registered mortality minus the deaths that were reported during the first sten days of April, but which actually occurred in March and were included in the report of the first quarter of the year.

The annual report will contain only the actual mortality of the year 1888.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the three months ending June 30, 1888, the number of notices issued by the Board was 6,830. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning, and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon re-inspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

The Chief Engineer presented, with his approval, an application from Edward Whitehouse, Rodman, for an indefinite leave of absence without pay, from September 26, 1888, on account of ill health.

On motion of the Mayor, the leave of absence was granted.

The Comptroller, under date of September 8, 1888, gave notice of the issue of warrants for the payment of vouchers not certified to by the Aqueduct Commissioners, for—

Which were ordered entered upon the books of the Commission and filed.

The Secretary gave notice of the filing of a copy of a notice of lien by John R. Barron against Contractors O'Brien & Clark for Section 7 of the New Aqueduct for \$7,424,26. Ordered filed.

An opinion was received from the Counsel to the Corporation, dated September 6, 1888, having reference to the manner of payment by the contractors upon the New Aqueduct of their laborers or employees; and advising the Commissioners to call the attention of the contractors to that part of section 1 of their contracts which refers to "store pay"; and advised them that unless the practice of making payment in that manner is discontinued, the Commissioners will consider it a violation of the terms of their agreements with the City.

Whereupon Commissioner Howe offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the opinion of the Corporation Counsel concerning the payment of laborers employed upon the Aqueduct by contractors by means of "store orders" instead of cash, is approved; and that the Secretary be directed to send a copy of such opinion to all contractors now engaged upon the Aqueduct; and to state that the Board request that all payments to laborers and employees be made hereafter in cash; and that upon any further violation of law in this respect, the Board will proceed as advised by the Corporation Counsel.

On motion of the Mayor, the resolution was adopted.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

Section 210. In every public hospital and dispensary in the City of New York there shall be provided and maintained a suitable room or rooms and place for the temporary isolation of persons infected with contagious disease, who shall immediately be separated from the other persons and other patients at such dispensary or hospital. It shall be the duty of the physician or physicians, of the officers, managers and of every one in charge of a hospital or dispensary, and of every one who has any duty or office in respect to patients in the course of treatment, or persons who apply for treatment or care at a dispensary or hospital, to see that a report is immediately made to the Health Department of the City of New York of every person infected with a contagious disease who comes to their knowledge, and that such person or persons so infected are properly isolated and kept separate from other persons and other patients.

That no owner or lessee of any building, or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which, or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said buildings or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person rent, let, hire out, or allow, having power to prevent the same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height and s ace above the level of every part of the sidewalk and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms less clevated than aforesaid, and as a part of any building rented or let, when hey are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

Soda, Mineral Water and Root Beer Fountains shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

Steam Engines, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

MATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum each.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, rallway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures. No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced. Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a valation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed with become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents :

ing water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after
June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in
arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters
are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water
by meter measurement shall be the only charge against
such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through
meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1881, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by dejective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willfut waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

ises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore awen to all householders that, in all turther applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.
