



NEW YORK, May 7, 1878.

The Board of Health met this day.

Reports Received.

From the Sanitary Superintendent: On operations of the Sanitary Bureau; on contagious diseases; on work performed by Disinfecting Corps; on slaughter-houses; on application for permits; weekly report from Riverside Hospital; on certain street pavements; on condition of Nineteenth Ward, between Fortieth and Forty-seventh streets, with special reference to the sources of certain odors; monthly report of Vaccinating Corps; on glanders and farcy; on unclean condition of certain streets; on privy-vault at Primary School No. 44; on relief from certain orders.

Resolved, That Dr. Edward Vanderpoel, Dr. Moreau Morris, Dr. J. E. M. Lordly, and Dr. E. G. Trimble be and are hereby appointed Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for one month, with salary of \$100 per month, and that they be detailed by the Sanitary Superintendent for service in the Vaccinating Corps.

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to commence the annual inspection of tenement houses.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending May 4, 1878. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,368, as follows, viz.:

6 public buildings, 467 tenement-houses, 175 private dwellings, 93 other dwellings, 22 manufactories and workshops, 25 stores and warehouses, 45 stables, 1 market, 42 slaughter-houses, 5 soap factories, 16 fat-rendering establishments, 3 manure dumps, 1 glycerine work, 1 public drain, 31 sunken and vacant lots, 54 yards, courts, and areas, 75 cellars and basements, 141 waste-pipes and drains, 110 privies and water-closets, 23 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 3 dangerous stairways, 8 smoky chimneys, 1 violation of the Code, 1 cess-pool, 3 piggeries, 16 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 604.

During the past week 141 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 92 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

126 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 41 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 38 houses, 38 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

1 person sick with measles was removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending May 4, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 467 burial permits for city deaths, 29 for bodies in transitu, and 39 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 467 deaths, 199 marriages, 450 still-births, 29 applications for transit permits, and 50 returns from coroners. There were 29 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 6 transcripts of birth record, 4 of marriage and 19 of death were issued from this Bureau.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—During the week ending Saturday, May 4, 1878, 467 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city; which is a decrease of 36, as compared with the preceding week, and 5 less than the number reported during the corresponding week of 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending April 27, was 513, which is 22 below the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.68 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,080,835.

The 7 most fatal causes of death during the week, were the following: Phthisis pulmonalis, 82; pneumonia, 61; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 39; bronchitis, 25; Bright's disease and diphtheria, 24 each, and diseases of the heart, 23. The decrease in the mortality during the week, compared with that of the preceding week, was from the following causes, viz.: Measles, 1; scarlatina, 11; croop, 2; malarial fevers, 1; puerperal diseases, 7; diarrhoeal diseases, 1; rheumatism and gout, 3; cancer, 2; bronchitis, 10; pneumonia, 2; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 11; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2, and premature and pretermatal births, 3; while the following diseases showed an increase: Diphtheria, 5; whooping cough, 1; erysipelas, 1; inanition, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 7; diseases of the heart, 2; marasmus and scrofula, 3; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3, and drowning, 5.

The number of deaths reported from measles during the month of April was 55, of scarlatina, 98, of diphtheria, 93, of membranous croup, 55, of whooping cough, 18, of cerebro-spinal fever, 10, and of malarial fevers, 33. The number of deaths in tenement-houses from measles was 34, scarlatina 63, diphtheria 53, membranous croup 37, whooping cough 15, cerebro-spinal fever 5, and malarial fevers 17. The number of deaths in houses containing three families and less from measles was 8, scarlatina 33, diphtheria 34, membranous croup 13, whooping cough 3, cerebro-spinal fever 10, and malarial fevers 33; 13 of the deaths from measles, 2 from scarlatina, 4 from diphtheria, and 5 from membranous croup were in institutions, and 2 deaths from diphtheria were in hotels and boarding-houses. The percentage of deaths to the total monthly mortality of measles in tenement-houses was 61.8, of scarlatina 64.5, of diphtheria 56.9, of membranous croup 67.3, of whooping cough 83.3, of cerebro-spinal fever 50, and of malarial fevers 51.5. The wards which had the highest number of deaths from measles were the Nineteenth, 12; Twenty-second, 7, and Seventeenth, 5; from scarlatina were the Seventeenth, 12; Twenty-second, 10, and the Nineteenth, 9; from diphtheria were the Nineteenth and Twentieth, 16 each, and Ninth, 10; from membranous croup were the Nineteenth, 9; Thirtieth, Seventeenth and Twenty-second, 5 each; from whooping cough were the Sixteenth, Eighteenth and Twentieth, 3 each; from cerebro-spinal fever the Eighteenth, 2; from malarial fevers the Twentieth, 4; Eleventh, Twelfth, Seventeenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-fourth Wards, 3 each.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 86 were in institutions, 242 in tenement houses, 123 in houses containing three families or less, 9 in hotels and boarding-houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 3 were on the basement floor, 102 on the first, 111 on the second, 91 on the third, 53 on the fourth, 14 on the fifth; 463 were stated to be residents of this city, and 4 non-resident; 58 were stated to be single, 110 married, 48 widowed, and the condition of 251 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 449 deaths and still-births, or 88.77 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 12; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 185; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 66; Greenwood (undenominational), 27; Lutheran (undenominational), 71; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 16; Evergreen (undenominational), 34; Woodlawn (undenominational), 18; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 1; Union (Methodist Protestant), 1; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 2; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 6; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 6; Washington (undenominational), 4.

The distribution of deaths for the week ending April 27, 1878, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 6; Second, 0; Third, 1; Fourth, 11; Fifth, 5; Sixth, 7; Seventh, 16; Eighth, 15; Ninth, 23; Tenth, 18; Eleventh, 34; Twelfth, 41; Thirteenth, 15; Fourteenth, 9; Fifteenth, 10; Sixteenth, 17; Seventeenth, 37; Eighteenth, 29; Nineteenth, 88; Twentieth, 43; Twenty-first, 26; Twenty-second, 47; Twenty-third, 6; Twenty-fourth, 9.

The mean temperature for the week ending May 4, was 61 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.738, the mean humidity was 76, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 818, and the total amount of rain-fall was .53 inch of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

An application was received from John B. Devlin, for permission to occupy certain piers on North and East rivers, for the landing of gravel under his contract with the Department of Public Parks; and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby granted to John B. Devlin to use for the purpose of landing gravel, under his contract with the Department of Public Parks, the north side of the pier at Seventy-ninth street and pier at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, North river, and pier at Eighty-sixth street, East river, provided he shall pay the regular rates of wharfage for the vessels landing cargoes thereat.

A report was received from the Engineer-in-Chief, relative to the extension of Pier 34, East river; and, being read,

On motion, the application of the Union Ferry Company, for permission to make such extension was taken from the table and placed on file, and the following resolution adopted, to wit:

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to the Union Ferry Company, of Brooklyn, to drive piles and erect, free of cost and expense to the city, an extension to Pier 34, East river, extending 75 feet southerly from the outer end and from 42 feet to 37 feet in width, in order to afford a safer entrance to the ferry slip at the easterly side thereof, provided that the work be done in conformity with plans to be first approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and under the supervision of that officer; and that the said company shall first obtain and file in this office the written consent of the lessee of the westerly half of pier to the said extension being made; and it is understood and agreed by the accepting of this permission and the giving of such consent that the said extension and improvements for ferry purposes thereon, shall revert to and become the property of the city at the termination of the said company's and said lessee's leases for said pier, respectively, free of all claim for cost or otherwise.

The leases will contain a covenant requiring the lessees
to pay rent quarter-yearly to the Comptroller.

The successful bidder will be required to pay to the
Collector of City Revenue the sum of fifteen hundred dol-

down to him, as security for the execution and perform-
ance of the lease, such amount to be credited on the rent
when the same becomes due.

executed, or forfeited if the lessee neglects or refuses to
execute the lease and bond after being duly notified that
the lease is prepared and ready for signature, or, in case
