SIR—By direction of the Board of Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction, I transmit the following resolution, adopted at a meeting held this day.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board be directed to forward a communication to the Honorable Board of Apportionment, requesting the transfer of unexpended balances of the year 1877, for the purpose of erecting two surgical pavilions and a building for insane patients at Bellevue Hospital, setting forth that appropriations for these objects have been repeatedly sought, and that the additions are highly desirable in the interests of humanity.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue, from time to time, as may be required, and at such rate of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, "Croton Water Main Stock," as authorized by chapter 477, Laws of 1875, to the amount of seventy-seven thousand dollars, as called for in requisition of the Department of Public Works of May 26, 1877.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue, at such time and at such rate of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, "Assessment Bonds" for the sum of ten thousand dollars, in pursuance of chapter 447, Laws of 1876, for improving and constructing Riverside avenue.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the sum of thirteen thousand one hundred and fourteen dollars and fifty-seven cents be and the same is hereby appropriated from the Excise Fund to the "Institution of Mercy," for the support of 600 children in said institution committed by Police Magistrates, pursuant to chapter 173, Laws of 1875, from December 1, 1877, to February 28, 1878, aggregating 45,908 days, at two dollars per week, being at the rate of about 28 57-100 cents per day, for the support of each child; the appropriation being made in accordance with the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, dated January 16, 1877.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the sum of two thousand and sixty-five dollars and seventy-one cents be and the same is hereby appropriated from the Excise Fund to the "Asylum of the Sisters of St. Dominic," for the support of 100 children in said asylum, committed by Police Magistrates, pursuant to chapter 173, Laws of 1875, from December 1, 1877, to February 28, 1878, aggregating 7,230 days, at two dollars per week, at the rate of about 28 57-100 cents per day for the support of each child; the appropriation being made in accordance with the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, dated January 16, 1877.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the sum of nine hundred and forty-six dollars and eighty-five cents be and the same hereby is appropriated from the Excise Fund for the support of thirty-nine inmates of the "Home for Fallen and Friendless Girls," from January 1 to March 31, 1878, inclusive, at the rate of \$150 per annum, pursuant to chapter 868, Laws of 1873.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller presented the following communication:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT—COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
NEW YORK, April 20, 1878.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

The annual distribution of the excise moneys among charitable institutions was not made, as usual, for reasons explained in my communication to the Board on the 12th day of last December. It appears, however, that the amount of the fund now in the City Treasury is more than will probably be required to meet any demands for the return of license fees that may have been illegally received and paid into the treasury, and as these institutions are greatly in need of aid to help them through a season which has taxed their means of bestowing charity among the poor severely, I recommend that the small sum which is available for distribution shall now be fairly apportioned among them.

For this purpose I have caused a schedule of the charitable institutions entitled under the law to a share of the excise moneys to be prepared, with proportionate amounts appropriated to them respectively, in accordance with former distributions, which is herewith respectfully submitted.

And offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 221 of the Laws of 1875, the Board of Estimates and Apportionment hereby appropriate from the excise moneys to the charitable and benevolent institutions in the City of New York, which "gratuitously aid, support, and assist the poor," the sums stated, as a per capita allowance for the poor and destitute persons actually treated, cared for or educated in and by them respectively, as designated in the following schedule, and amounting in the aggregate to the sum of \$54,750, which appropriation is made with the distinct provision that no part of these moneys is to be used or applied by any of said institutions as a permanent fund, or for the purpose of erecting or furnishing any building, or for the payment of the salary of any employee, but the whole amount allowed to each institution is to be used and applied to the purposes above stated, as provided by law, viz.: to "gratuitously aid, support, and assist the poor."

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Department of Public Parks for the week ending Saturday, April 13, 1878.

MEETING HELD APRIL 10, 1878.

A small building for the use of the camels at the menagerie in Central Park was directed to be constructed at a cost not to exceed \$200.

The Commissioner of Public Works having objected to the amount of water used in the public fountains on the parks, the size of the nozzles of the fountains in Stuyvesant square and Bowling Green were directed to be reduced.

Permission was given to the Memorial Committee of the Grand Army of the Republic to use a room in the cottage on Union square until Decoration Day, May 30, 1878.

The pay to be allowed for double teams employed by the Department for the care and maintenance of the roads, etc., in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, was fixed at \$3.50 per day.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That James F. Wenman, the President of the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, be and he hereby is designated and directed by the said Board to certify and file, as provided by law, the three similar maps or plans and profiles showing the grades of Eagle avenue and the intersecting streets from Westchester avenue to One Hundred and Sixty-third street, in that portion of the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York which formerly constituted the town of Morrisania, as altered, amended, and established, and as the same have been laid out and are hereby determined by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, and which said maps, or plans and profiles, are entitled, "Plans and Profiles, showing the grade of Eagle avenue and the streets intersecting the same, from Westchester avenue to One Hundred and Sixty-third street, in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York, as altered, amended, and established by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, in pursuance of chapters 329 and 604 of the Laws of 1874," dated "New York, February 12th, 1878," and signed "J. J. R. Croes, Civil and Topographical Engineer, Department of Public Parks."

Resolved, That it be referred to the President, with power, to direct the Secretary to prepare, and publish advertisements for proposals for supplying illuminating material to, and lighting, cleaning, reglazing, etc., all or any portion of the public lamps on the public parks, squares, places, and bridges under the control of the Department, from May 1 to December 31, 1878, both days inclusive.

Resolved, That hereafter no applicant be appointed a Gate-keeper on the Police force until he has first appeared before the Board.

Resolved, That Mr. John Jay be and he is hereby authorized to cause to be painted the buildings in Washington square, at the expense of himself and his associates, the same to be done under the direction of the Superintendent of Parks.

WEDNESDAY, April 17, 1878.

The Board of Education held a stated session on Wednesday, April 17, at the Hall of the Board, corner of Grand and Elm streets, at 4 o'clock P. M.

Present—Wm. Wood, Esq., President, and Commissioners Beardslee, Bell, Donnelly, Dowd, Goulding, Halsted, Jelliffe, Kelly, Manierre, Place, Traud, Vermilye, Walker, Watson, West, Wheeler, and Wickham—18.

Absent—Commissioners Cohen, Katzenberg, and Wetmore—3.

The minutes of the preceding session were read and approved.

Commissioner Wetmore was excused for absence on account of sickness.

The President laid before the Board a communication from Hon. Joseph P. McDonough, transmitting a certified copy of chapter 106, Laws of 1878, relative to the age for admitting school children, and fixing the same at five (instead of four) years. Ordered to be entered in the minutes, and on motion of Commissioner Manierre a vote of thanks was adopted and directed to be certified and forwarded to Mr. McDonough.

Also, from Hon. Alexander Thain, transmitting a copy of Assembly Bill No. 381, relative to principals and vice-principals of schools. Referred to a special committee.

The President laid before the Board communications from the trustees of several wards, as follows:

Resolved, That a Standing Committee of this Board be appointed, to be known as the Committee on Corporate Schools, with special powers and duties to be hereafter defined.

Referred to the Committee on By-Laws, Elections and Qualifications.

Commissioner Jelliffe offered the following—

Whereas, By subdivision 3 of section 8 of the Act relative to Common Schools in the City of New York, passed July 3, 1851 (p. 26 of the Manual), it is declared to be the duty of Commissioners of Common Schools, "To visit and examine all the schools entitled to participate in the apportionment," generally known as Corporate Schools;

Resolved, That to provide for the more regular and orderly performance of this duty, the President of the Board of Education be requested, on or before the 30th of June, to assign to each member of this Board one or more of such schools to be by such commissioner visited and examined. The President put the question whether the Board would adopt said resolution.

And it was decided in the affirmative.
