

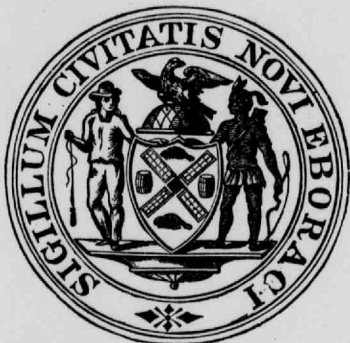

The Board met in pursuance of the following call :

In pursuance of the authority contained in the 112th section of chapter 335, being an act entitled "An act to reorganize the local government of the City of New York," passed April 30, 1873; and section 1 of chapter 779, being an act entitled "An act in relation to raising money by taxation in the County of New York, for county purposes," passed June 14, 1873; and chapter 304, being an act entitled "An act to consolidate the government of the City and County of New York, and further to regulate the same," passed April 30, 1874; and chapter 303, being an act entitled "An act in relation to the estimates and apportionment for the support of the government of the County of New York," passed April 30, 1874; and chapter 308, being an act entitled "An act in relation to the estimates and apportionment for the support of the government of the City of New York," passed May 1, 1874—a meeting is hereby called of the Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, constituting a Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to be held at the office of the Mayor, on Monday, June 25, 1883, at 12 o'clock M., for the purposes specified in request of the Comptroller, dated June 23, 1883.

The minutes of the meeting held June 19, 1883, were read and approved.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, called up and offered the following resolution, laid over at meeting held June 19, 1883 :

Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 426 of the Laws of 1883, entitled "An act relative to the office of the Commissioner of Jurors in the City and County of New York," and upon the requisition of the Commissioner of Jurors, dated June 13, 1883, the sum of two thousand dollars is hereby appropriated for the contingent expenses of the office of said Commissioner, including the reasonable compensation of his assistants, clerks, and messengers, and for necessary printing and advertising, and for books, stationery, and other necessary expenses, in addition to the amount heretofore appropriated in the Final Estimate for 1883, and which amount shall be added to such Final Estimate, and included in the Tax Levy for such year under its appropriate head of account.

Negative—The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

SIR—There were 551 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, June 16, 1883, which is a decrease of 107, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 57 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1882. The actual mortality for the week ending June 9, 1883, was 629, which is 72.4 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.87 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,315,429.
