

Painters—Painted halls, walls of cells, doors, windows and railings, in female prison; halls, corridors and iron railings in old prison; halls, walls in cells, iron doors, railings and stairs in-boys' prison; hall, iron railings, cell doors and window sashes, new prison; walls and windows in counsel room; halls, ceilings, windows and railings in Warden's office; walls, doors and windows of rooms in female prison; storm-house at bridge, old prison; storm-house at office; iron bars and window in hospitals old prison; partitions in female and in new prison, hydrants, wire screens, gratings and iron gates, etc., etc., calcimined ceiling of old prison and ceiling of cells in female prison. prison

Carpenters—Built closet for telephone, 2 ventilators in skylights on Magdalen, 10 ventilators on old prison; 7 windows in female prison; windows in counsel room; wooden bar-door in kitchen partition in female prison; wainscoted Warden's office with black walnut; floor in Warden's office; 3 large tables and benches, 2 sash doors, and 37 windows on pivots in old prison. Masons—Built a doorway in kitchen, 9 feet high by 6 feet wide; 10 ventilators in female

prison; and 2 windows in rooms. Blacksmiths—Placed 44 bars in windows and an iron partition in hall of new prison, and fire-brick, frame and grates in boiler. Roofing-Repaired roof of old prison with 428 sheets tin, etc.; repaired roof of female

prison.



The Carpenters have made general repairs to Bathing-house and built new platform for same, repaired 25 chairs and benches, 3 carts and 80 feet hand rails around grounds, put 86 new window cords in windows of different Pavilons, repaired run at Ice-house, made repairs to balconies and balusters of Wards 12 and 18, put up 3 guard rails at Pavilion H, and a new picket fence at Pavilion A, 3 new posts at Wards 11 and 17, and attended to general repairs throughout the Wards. They have also made or built the following new work : Made 40 crutches for cruppled children, 2 leg rests for surgical purposes, 3 new drawers for Drug Store, 2 large meat boxes, 3 large boxes for retiring Physicians, 4 screens for Female Adult Ward 16, 4 screens and 1 door for Doctors' Rooms, built extension to Carpenter's Shop, and a room in Druggist's Cellar, made a new bridge at Store-house and laid 2,000 feet flooring at Feeble-minded School and School Play-room.
The Painters have attended to the following work: Painted Bathing-house and railings around same, the play room for Idiots in Pavilion C, Nurses' Rooms in North Hospital, and wainscoting work in Ward 0, bath-room and tub for Doctors, general repaining of the Office, doors and woodwork grained, walls and celling painted, Pavilion M for children repainted throughout, the Poathouse and walling rooms connected with it; also the Dispensary at Harlem Hospital thoroughly repainted, 68 lights of glass put in windows.

The 671 deaths represent a death-rate of 20.57, against 21.91 for the previous week, and 20.66 for the corresponding week of 1890. The decrease of 43 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 10 in the deaths from diarrhœal diseases, of 5 from whooping cough, 5 from cancer, of 11 from diseases of the nervous system, of 8 from pneumonia, and 11 from other diseases of the respiratory organs, and 12 from diseases of the urinary organs. There was an increase of 14 in the deaths from scarlet fever, and 14 from phthisis. The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards, from

measles in the Nineteenth Ward, from scarlet fever in the Nineteenth Ward, and from typhoid fever in the Twelfth and Twenty-second Wards.


