#### PETITIONS.

By Alderman Hart—

OFFICE OF THE FIFTIETH STREET, ASTORIA FERRY  
AND CENTRAL PARK RAILROAD COMPANY,  
TEMPLE COURT, No. 5 BEEKMAN STREET,  
NEW YORK, March 28, 1892.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

The undersigned "The Fiftieth Street, Astoria Ferry and Central Park Railroad Company," a corporation incorporated under and by virtue of the Laws of the State of New York:

Respectfully petitions your Honorable Body to grant to it your consent, permission and authority under such provisions, conditions and restrictions as are provided and required by the said laws to construct, maintain and operate a surface or street railroad to be operated by electricity or such other means, excepting locomotive steam power, as may be consented to by the property-owners, through, upon and along the following streets and avenues in the City of New York, upon such terms and conditions as shall to your Honorable Body seem meet and proper:

Commencing at or near West Fifty-seventh street and Hudson or North river, with connections to any ferry which may be established at or near that point, and running thence, with double tracks, on West Fifty-seventh street to Eleventh avenue; thence on Eleventh avenue, with double tracks, to West Fifty-fourth street; thence on West Fifty-fourth street, with double tracks, to Tenth avenue; thence on Tenth avenue, with double or single tracks, to West Fiftieth street, or by continuing on Eleventh avenue, with double or single tracks, from West Fifty-fourth street to West Fiftieth street; also at both West Fiftieth street and West Fifty-first street at or near Hudson or North river, with connections to any ferry which may be established at or near those points and with connecting tracks on Twelfth avenue, and running thence on West and East Fiftieth street and West and East Fifty-first street—or portions of those streets, with connections on any avenue or avenues to make the equivalent of a double tracked railroad that cars may pass in opposite directions—with single or double tracks, to Park or Fourth avenue; thence along the west side of Park avenue, with double or single tracks, to a bridge spanning the cut of the Harlem Railroad between East Fifty-first and East Fifty-second streets; thence across such bridge and along the east side of Park avenue, with double or single tracks, to East Fifty-first and East Fiftieth streets; thence on East Fifty-first street and East Fiftieth street—or portions of those streets, with connections on any avenue or avenues to make the equivalent of a double tracked railroad that cars may pass in opposite directions—with double or single tracks, to First avenue; thence on First avenue, with double or single tracks, to East Fifty-third street or East Fifty-fourth street; thence on either or both of those streets, with single or double tracks, to Avenue A; thence on Avenue A, with double or single tracks, to East Eighty-sixth street; thence on East Eighty-sixth street, with double tracks to Avenue B, or to East river, with connections to any ferry which may be established at or near that point; also on Avenue A, with double tracks, from East Eighty-sixth street to East Eighty-ninth street, when arrangements can be made for the use of tracks of existing railroads. Also from the intersection of Avenue B, and East Seventy-ninth street on Avenue B, with double tracks, to East Eighty-eighth street or East Eighty-ninth street; thence on either or both of those streets, with single or double tracks, to Avenue A; thence with double tracks on Avenue A, to East Ninety-third street; thence on East Ninety-third street, with double tracks, to First avenue; thence with double tracks on First avenue to East Ninety-sixth street; thence, with double tracks, on East Ninety-sixth street to Central Park, and to connect with any railroad which may be constructed on the transverse road through Central Park at or near that point; also from the intersection of Madison avenue and East Ninety-sixth street on Madison avenue, with double tracks to East Ninety-seventh street; thence on East Ninety-seventh street, with single or double tracks, to Central Park, and to connect with any railroad which may be constructed on the transverse road through Central Park at or near that point; thence by such railroad through Central Park to Eighth avenue; thence, with double tracks, on Eighth avenue to West Ninety-sixth street; thence, with double tracks, on West Ninety-sixth street to or as near to Hudson or North river as practicable and to connect with any ferry which may be established at or near that point; also from the intersections of East Sixty-fifth street and East Sixty-sixth street with Avenue A, westwardly on East Sixty-fifth street and East Sixty-sixth street, with a single track in each of those streets, to Central Park and to connect with any railroad which may be constructed on the transverse road through Central Park at or near those streets, thence by such railroad through Central Park to Eighth avenue and to connect and co-operate with any railroad which may be constructed on West Sixty-fifth and West Sixty-sixth streets; also from East Seventy-ninth street at or near East river, with connections to any ferry which may be established at or near that point, westwardly on East Seventy-ninth street, with double tracks, to Central Park and to connect with any railroad which may be constructed on the transverse road through Central Park at that point, thence by such railroad through Central Park to Eighth avenue; thence on Eighth avenue, with double or single tracks, to West Eighty-first street and West Seventy-seventh street; thence on either or both of those streets, with single or double tracks or single track and turnout, to Ninth or Columbus avenue; thence on Ninth avenue, with double or single tracks, to West Seventy-ninth street and thence on West Seventy-ninth street, with double tracks, to or near Hudson or North river, with connections to any ferry which may be established at or near that point; with all necessary connections, turnouts, sidings, switches, turntables and convenient stands for the proper working and accommodation of said railroad.

The object and purpose of this railroad is the conveyance of passengers between its termini and any point on its line and branches for a single fare of five cents; transfers being given when necessary.

#### MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

CITY OF NEW YORK—OFFICE OF THE MAYOR,  
March 29, 1892.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

I return, without approval, the resolution of your Honorable Body, adopted March 15, 1892, which provides for the placing and keeping of an ornamental lamp-post in front of No. 116 West Twenty-third street, for the reason that the accompanying diagram and description of the proposed structure is not sufficiently comprehensive. In fact, there is nothing on which to base an opinion as to the merits of the resolution.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to C. P. Woodworth to place and keep an ornamental lamp-post and lamp in front of his premises, No. 116 West Twenty-third street, provided the lamp be kept lighted during the same hours as the public lamps, that the post shall not exceed the dimensions prescribed by law (eighteen inches square at the base), the lamp not to exceed two feet in diameter and not to be used for advertising purposes, the work to be done and gas supplied at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Which was laid over, ordered to be printed in the minutes and published in full in the CITY RECORD.

CITY OF NEW YORK—OFFICE OF THE MAYOR,  
March 28, 1892.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

I return, without approval, the resolution of your Honorable Body, adopted March 15, 1892, which permits the placing of a watering-trough in front of No. 116 Eighth avenue, on the ground of the report of the Commissioner of Public Works that the overflow and drippings, which would be a necessary consequence of the maintenance of the trough, would work injury to the asphalt with which this part of Eighth avenue is paved.

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be and he is hereby respectfully requested to return to this Board for further consideration two resolutions now in his hands, one calling for the regulating and grading of One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, from the Boulevard to Twelfth avenue, and the other providing for exempting Tony Eiser's place at One Hundred and Eighty-third street and Amsterdam avenue from the provisions of the ordinance relating to the discharge of firearms.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

Subsequently the papers were received from his Honor the Mayor, and are as follows:

Resolved, That One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, from Boulevard to Twelfth avenue, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 183 of article XIII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, as amended March 5, 1883, etc., relating to the firing of firearms.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section I. That section 183 of article 13 of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances, approved December 31, 1880, as amended by the said resolution of March 5, 1883, be further amended by inserting at the conclusion of the section the following words: "The premises of Tony Eiser, on the northeast corner of One Hundred and Eighty-fifth street and Amsterdam avenue."

Sec. II. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. III. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Alderman Harris moved a reconsideration of the vote by which the above resolutions were adopted.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

On motion of Alderman Harris, the papers were then placed on file.

By Alderman School—

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be and he is hereby respectfully requested to return to this Board for further consideration a resolution now in his hands calling for the regulating and grading of One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, from Alexander to Willis avenue.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

Subsequently the paper was received from his Honor the Mayor, and is as follows:

Resolved, That One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, from Alexander avenue to Willis avenue, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set, and the sidewalks flagged a space four feet in width, and that the carriageway, from the easterly crosswalk of Alexander avenue to the westerly crosswalk of Brook avenue, be paved with trap-block pavement and that crosswalks be laid at each intersecting and terminating street and avenue where not already laid, under the direction of the Commissioner of Street Improvements, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Alderman School moved a reconsideration of the vote by which the above resolution was adopted.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

On motion of Alderman School, the paper was then placed on file.

By Alderman School—

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be and he is hereby respectfully requested to return to this Board for further consideration a resolution, now in his hands, providing for the regulating, etc., of Woodruff street, from Southern Boulevard to Main street.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.



Subsequently the paper was received from his Honor the Mayor, and is as follows :

Resolved, That Woodruff street, from Southern Boulevard to Main street, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, under the direction of the Commissioner of Street Improvements, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Alderman School moved a reconsideration of the vote by which the above resolution was adopted.

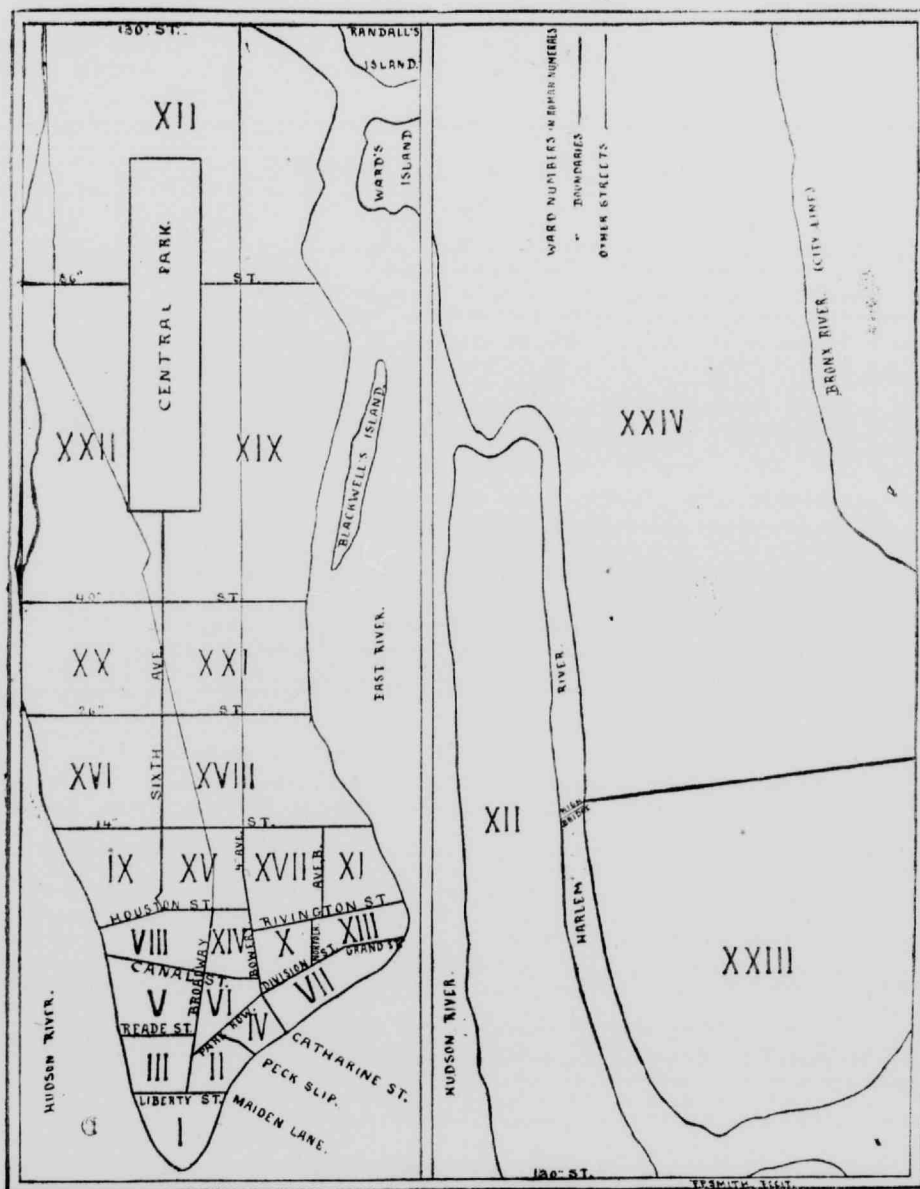

The 885 deaths represent a death-rate of 26.89, against 27.94 for the previous week and 26.29 for the corresponding week of 1891.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a considerable decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox respectively being 100, 248, 11, 2 and 2, against 107, 331, 223, 6, 12 and 1 for the previous week, a total of 581 against 680, and the decrease being especially marked in measles. Diphtheria increased between Division and Fourteenth streets, west of Norfolk street, and Avenue B, above Eighty-sixth street, and in the upper part of the annexed district, varying little or decreasing elsewhere. Measles increased below Liberty street, south of Canal street, between Broadway and the Bowery, and between Houston and Fortieth streets, west of Sixth avenue, the decrease being most marked between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, East and West. Scarlet fever increased between Canal and Houston streets, west of Division and Fourteenth streets, west of Norfolk street, and Avenue B, above Eighty-sixth street, and in the lower part of the annexed district, with a considerable decrease between Twenty-sixth and Eighty-sixth streets, from river to river.

## TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

**ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT** act of the Legislature chapter 449, Laws of 1889, which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage, on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

Third—That the limits of our assessment for benefit include all those lots, pieces or parcels of land, situate, lying and being in the City of New York, which taken together are bounded and described as follows, viz.: Northerly by an irregular line commencing at a point in the easterly line of Aqueduct avenue, distant 600 feet northerly from the northerly line of Tremont avenue, and running thence easterly to a point in the easterly line of Webster avenue, opposite the junction of Tremont and Burnside avenues, said line being parallel with and distant 600 feet northerly from the northerly line of Tremont avenue, except where the said line, if so drawn, would be less than 200 feet distant southerly from the southerly line of Burnside avenue, and in such places being coincident with a line parallel with and distant 200 feet southerly from the southerly line of Burnside avenue, and a line parallel with and distant 600 feet northerly from the northerly line of Tremont avenue, and extending from Webster avenue to Boston road; easterly by the westerly line of Boston road, southerly by a line parallel with and distant 600 feet southerly from the southerly line of Tremont avenue and extending from Boston road to Aqueduct avenue; and westerly by the easterly line of Aqueduct avenue; excepting from said area all the streets, avenues and roads, or portions thereof heretofore legally opened, and all the unimproved land included within the lines of streets, avenues, roads, public squares and places shown and laid out upon any map or maps filed by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 604 of the Laws of 1874, and the laws amendatory thereof, or of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, as such area is shown upon our benefit map deposited as aforesaid.

Fourth—That our report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, at a Special Term thereof, to be held at the Chambers thereof, in the County Court-house, in the City of New York, on the first day of April, 1892, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.
