#### MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor :  
CITY OF NEW YORK—OFFICE OF THE MAYOR, {  
October 14, 1893.

#### To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen :

I return, without approval, the resolution of your Honorable Body, adopted October 3, 1893, to regulate, grade, etc., One Hundred and Sixty-third street, from Brook avenue to Courtlandt avenue, on the ground of the report of the Commissioner of Street Improvements, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, that :

" East One Hundred and Sixty-third street is not legally opened and no assessable improvements can be made thereon."

Resolved, That One Hundred and Sixty-third street, from Brook avenue to Courtlandt avenue, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and sidewalks flagged a space of four feet in width through the centre thereof, under the direction of the Commissioner of Street Improvements, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards ; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

I return, without approval, the resolution of your Honorable Body, adopted October 9, 1893, to regulate and grade Thirtieth street, from Twelfth to Thirteenth avenue, on the ground of the report of the Superintendent of Street Improvements, that :

" There is no Thirteenth avenue at Thirtieth street. The resolution and ordinance would, therefore, be inoperative if passed and approved in the present shape."

The Railroad Committee, to whom was referred the accompanying ordinance requesting this Committee to inform the Board by what authority the Second Avenue Railroad Company were running electric motor cars on the tracks of that company, respectfully

#### REPORTS :

That notice of the passage of the resolution was given to the Second Avenue Railroad Company and a request made that it furnish the Committee with any evidence of its authority to use electric motor power which it might have. In response thereto the railroad company forwarded to the Committee a certified copy under seal of an order made by the Board of Railroad Commissioners of the State of New York, on July 13, 1892, in the following words :

" It is ordered that the change of motor power from horses to the storage battery system of propulsion by the Second Avenue Railroad Company, along Second avenue from the Harlem river to Tenth street, and thence westerly through Stuyvesant street to Astor place, and thence through Astor place to the easterly side of Broadway, be and is hereby approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners."

It therefore appears that the Second Avenue Railroad Company has authority to make an absolute change of motive power by substituting for horses the storage battery system along the route set out in the order of the Board of Railroad Commissioners.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE SANITARY PROTECTION OF THE CROTON RIVER AND ITS TRIBUTARIES IN THE COUNTIES OF WESTCHESTER, PUTNAM AND DUTCHESS, AND OF SO MUCH OF THE BRONX AND BYRAM RIVERS AND THEIR TRIBUTARIES AS ARE NOW USED FOR THE SUPPLY OF WATER FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The State Board of Health, at a meeting held in the City of New York on the 25th day of August, 1893, a quorum being present, did then and there, after having heard the report of a committee of the Board, duly appointed for the purpose of examination into the subject, which committee was appointed at a meeting of the Board, held in the City of Albany, the 27th day of July, 1893, at which meeting a quorum was present, amend and alter the rules made by it for the sanitary protection of the Croton river and its tributaries in the Counties of Westchester, Putnam and Dutchess, and of so much of the Bronx and Byram rivers and their tributaries as are now used for the supply of water for the City of New York, in accordance with and under the provisions of article V. of chapter 66 of the Laws of 1893, in the following particulars, to wit:

That, taking into consideration the character of the soil, and of the substrate of the soil and the angle of the slopes, the distances at which privy vaults, slaughter houses, hog pens, barn yards, or any and all places or things which tend to pollute and render impure and dangerous water taken from the several sources enumerated and set forth in said rules, may be maintained, is increased to three hundred feet, horizontal measurements, of the high-water mark in any lake, pond or reservoir in said water-shed, and to two hundred and fifty feet, horizontal measurement, of the high water mark or precipitous bank of any spring, stream or water-course tributary to said lakes, ponds or reservoirs.
