The Board then took a recess, and reconvened at 2,50 F. M., the full Board being present. The minuter of the meeting held March S. 1901, were approved.

Thomas L. Maulana, Clork, cited to appear before the floard to show cause why he should not be discharged for interication and neglect of daty, was not present. Allen N. Spooner, Amistant Engineer, appeared in support of the charges preferred against said Maclean March S. 1901, and the matter was then referred to executive session.

Bernard Roll appeared in relation to the construction of Fire, new 31, East river. He stated that the men referred to were not employed in the construction of the pler, but were sugaged in the driving of additional foundation piles for shed for the Bridgeport Strambeat Company thereat, which information the Secretary was directed to transmit to the 5tate Factory Inspector.

A representative of the firm of Ellis & Company appeared in relation to the order of the Board for the removal of the oil-heat from the bulkhead between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, East river, and stated that no other bulkhead in that washing could be secured for the purpose, and that if allowed to remain there the boat would be covered or protected in any manner desired by the Board. The President stated that the matter would be fivered for one week.

R. L. Scott again appeared in relation to the application of the white front in the vicinity of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, Harlem river. He was informed that the application had been referred to Commissioner Moyer, who now has the matter under consideration.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 20705, submitting plan for the improvement of the water front in the vicinity of the Third Avenue Bridge on the Harlem river, was again tabled for two weeks.

The communication from A. E. Osterbridge & Company, presenting against the resular charged for the use of the bulkhead on the enterly side of the approach to Pier, new 47, North river, was referred to the President.

The communication from the Engineer-in-Chief, stating that the Brooklyn and New York Furry Company commenced this day the use of the new dip adjoining the northerly side of the pier foot of East Twenty-account street, was referred to the Treasurer for the purpose of fixing the rental to be charged for the use of the north side of said pier, in accordance with the resolution adopted April 28, 1899.
