The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board :

Al. Foster, to land the steamer "Angler" at the Battery Wharf, the time of landing to be fixed by the Duck Superintendent and the compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

3d. Reporting repairs required to Pier, now 24, North river, and recommending that the



Central Hudson Steamboat Company, lessee, be directed to repair same. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Reporting damage to the pier foot of West Forty-fourth street by the ferry-boat "Buffalo," and recommending that the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company be directed to make necessary repairs. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Recommending that dredging be ordered to a depth of 15 feet at mean low-water on the north side of the pier at the foot of East Forty-sixth street; in front of the bulkhead, between East Sixtieth and East Sixty-first streets; in front of the bulkhead, between East Seventy-eighth and East Seventy-ninth streets, and in front of the bulkhead at the foot of East Seventy-eighth street. Recommendation adopted.

6th. Recommending that a new order be issued for repairs to the pavement, between West Eleventh and West Fifty-seventh streets, North river, to be made from time to time as required, at an aggregate cost not to exceed \$500. Recommendation adopted.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify the Corporation Counsel that this Board approves Assembly Bill No. 1776, introduced by Mr. Hasenbug, prohibiting the assignment and subletting of public contracts without the consent of the department or bureau awarding the contract; and that the Board disapproves Assembly Bill No. 32, introduced by Mr. Van Name, in relation to the granting of applications for land under water made to the Commissioners of the Land Office.

On motion, an extension of time to April 1, 1901, was granted the Central Vermont Railway Company in which to vacate Pier, old 36, East river, and adjoining bulkheads and land under water.

The minutes of the meeting of April 10, 1901, were read, and, on motion, approved.

Plan 520, New Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow frame ice storage buildings to be constructed, same to be fireproofed, with sheet-iron covering on outside, as stated in petition; west side River avenue, 500 feet north One Hundred and Fiftieth street. Plan 477, New Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow brick walls to be built 86 feet 3 inches high, as per section, viz.: 20 inches in first and second stories, 16 inches in third and fourth stories, and 12 inches in fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth stories; also to allow two bay windows to be built on front, 7 feet 6 inches wide, and to extend through four stories, to be constructed with angle iron framing, filled in with 3-inch terra cotta blocks and supported by the floor construction, properly braced at end story; blocks will be laid in cement mortar and will be covered with galvanized wrought-iron, all as stated in petition; Nos. 120 and 122 East Thirty-first street. ## CHAPTER 530.

AN ACT to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

## ACCEPTED BY THE CITY.

Became a law April 23, 1900, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, a majority being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the comptroller of the city of New York, in his discretion, to provide for the extension of all or any part of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, as the same may from time to time mature, by the issue of bonds or notes, or by any other means, and such bonds or notes shall be stamped across their face with the terms of such extension, which shall be for a period not exceeding twenty years.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately. Proposals will be received by the Comptroller at his office, No. 25 Broadway, New York City, from the holders of six per cent Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, for extending the maturity of all or any part of the respective amounts of such stock held by them to the following dates:

JULY 1, 1917,  
JULY 1, 1918,  
JULY 1, 1919,  
JULY 1, 1920, and  
JULY 1, 1921.

Stock so extended will be payable in gold and will bear interest from July 1, 1900, at the rate of three and one-tenth (3 1/10) per cent. per annum, payable, also in gold, semi-annually, on the first day of January and of July in each year. The Comptroller proposes to apportion the amount of stock thus extended so that, as nearly as practicable, one-fifth of the whole amount extended shall be redeemable at each of the five maturity dates above mentioned. Preference will, as far as possible, be given to the proposals received according to priority in the date of their receipt, the proposal first received being entitled to the privilege of the longest extension period, unless such proposal shall indicate a preference for the shorter terms. The stock which is to be extended in accordance with the terms of this circular must be delivered to the Comptroller upon demand, when the certificates will be stamped across their face with the terms of the extension, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 530 of the Laws of 1900, provided, however, that such stock now outstanding in coupon form when presented for extension will be extended in the form of registered stock. Thereafter transfers may be made of such stock on the books of the Corporation in accordance with the general provisions of law and the rules of the Department of Finance in regard thereto. The right to annul the offer contained in this circular at any time without further notice is expressly reserved.
