## BOARD OF REVISION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision of Assessments was held in the Council Chamber, City Hall, on Thursday, February 25, 1909, at 11.05 a. m.

Present at Roll Call—N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy and Acting Comptroller, and Lawson Purdy, President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

On motion of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments the minutes of meeting of February 18, 1909, were approved as printed in the CITY RECORD.

### BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Sewers in Concord Avenue, etc.

The assessment list for sewers and appurtenances in Concord avenue, between St. Josephs street and East One Hundred and Forty-second street, and objections of J. & M. Haffen, filed by A. C. & F. W. Hottenroth, attorneys, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 19, 1909.

Messrs. A. C. & F. W. Hottenroth, attorneys, appeared by representative.

On motion of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Sewers in West Two Hundred and Twenty-ninth Street, etc.

The assessment list for sewers and appurtenances in West Two Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, between Bailey avenue and Heath avenue, and in Heath avenue, between Kingsbridge road and Boston avenue, and objections of John Parsons, filed by Hugo Hirsh, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 19, 1909.

No one appearing in opposition, after notice, on motion of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Paving, etc., Garrison Avenue.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for paving with asphalt blocks, and curbing, Garrison avenue, from Hunts Point road to Whittier street, and objections of Julius H. Dreher, in person, received from the Board of Assessors, under date of February 19, 1909.

No one appearing in opposition, after notice, on motion of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

### BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

The Assessors reported that they had made a reduction in the assessment of 10 per cent., pro rata, as determined by them at meeting held February 9, 1909.

Ditmars, attorney, was heard; also Mr. A. W. Linton, of counsel of Mr. E. W. Ditmars, attorney, and Mr. J. H. Foster, in opposition to the assessment.

No others appearing in opposition, after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to make a further reduction in the assessment of 5 per cent. pro rata, and to confirm the assessment as so reduced, all the members voting in the affirmative.

At 11.47 o'clock a. m., on motion of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Board adjourned for one week, all the members voting in the affirmative.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
