REPORT OF THE BUREAU OF STREETS FOR THE THREE MONTHS ENDING OCTOBER 31, 1873.

BUREAU OF STREETS, }
November 1, 1873. }

Hon. George M. Van Nort, Commissioner of Public Works:

SIR—In accordance with your instruction I have the honor to submit herewith a report of the transaction of the Bureau of Streets and Roads for the months of August, September and October of the present year.

In addition to the ordinary work of maintaining and sprinkling the various roads and avenues, under the care of this Bureau, repairs have been made on 8th avenue, from Avenue St. Nicholas to Macomb's dam bridge, and on 124th and 132d streets, from 6th to 8th avenues; also on 152d street, between Boulevard and Hudson river; and on 151st street, from Avenue St. Nicholas to 10th avenue; and extensive repairs have been made on Breakneck Hill, from 8th avenue to Avenue St. Nicholas; and Kingsbridge road, from 155th to 162d streets. Culverts have been built on the corner of 184th street and Kingsbridge road, to carry the water from the bend of the road. Lawrence street, from 9th avenue to the Boulevard—there has been extensive repairs made in this street, on account of Croton water pipes having been laid, and as the street is constantly sinking, it requires filling and rolling to keep it in order.

BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

CONDENSED STATEMENT OF MORTALITY.

REPORTED MORTALITY (week ending Nov. 29th,) AND THE ACTUAL MORTALITY (each day in the week, ending at noon, Nov. 22d, 1873,) WITH AN ENUMERATION OF THE CHIEF CAUSES OF DEATH.

Table with columns for Annual Death-rate per 1,000, Total actual Mortality during the week ending Nov. 29, and Actual number of Deaths each day (Nov 22-29). Rows list various causes of death like Zymotic Diseases, Local Diseases, etc.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending Nov. 29, 1873: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,706, as follows, viz: 2 public buildings, 982 tenement houses, 158 private dwellings, 2 uninhabited dwellings, 96 other dwellings, 18 manufactories and workshops, 11 stores and warehouses, 64 stables, 2 markets, 31 slaughter houses, 2 breweries, 4 fat-rendering establishments, 31 sunken and vacant lots, 45 yards, courts and areas, 83 cellars and basements, 28 waste pipes and drains, 73 privies and water closets, 46 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 3 dangerous stairways, 4 cisterns and cesspools, 21 other nuisances, and 2 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 451. During the past week 46 complaints were received from citizens and been referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 50 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 50 houses, 50 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, &c. Two cases of small pox were removed to the hospital by the ambulance corps.

Permits have been granted to consignees of 37 vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

77 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks. The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported for the week ending Nov. 29, 1873: typhus fever, 2; typhoid fever, 6; scarlet fever, 61; measles, 13; diphtheria, 54, and small-pox, 2.

240 loads of night soil were removed by night scavengers from the privy vaults of the city.

The amount of meat and fish condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending Nov. 29, 1873, was: sheep, 7 carcasses; hogs, 6 carcasses; veal, (bob), 12 carcasses; 264 pounds of beef; 1,418 pounds of veal (cut); 138 pounds of poultry; 1 1/2 pounds of Bologna sausages, and 325 pounds of fish.

BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

During the week ending Nov. 29, 1873, there were issued from this Bureau 492 burial permits for city deaths, 28 for bodies in transitu, and 48 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 492 deaths, 176 marriages, 469 births, 48 still-births, 28 applications for transit permits, and 51 returns from coroners. There were 19 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths, and 2 transcripts of of marriage, and 16 of death were issued from this Bureau. 2 cases of deaths were referred to the Coroners.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS, December 2, 1873.

SIR:—In the week that ended on Saturday, November 29th, there were 492 deaths reported in New York, against 519 reported and 505 that actually occurred in the preceding week. Infant mortality continued at the minimum which it reached four weeks ago, there being 205 deaths in children under five years of age. Deaths of persons upwards of 70 years of age reached the highest number for the season; namely, 35 in the week. Pulmonary diseases are charged with an unusual number of deaths, phthisis having caused 87, pneumonia 55, and bronchitis 31 deaths.

The mean temperature in the week was 34.2 Fahr, and the minimum was 22. The mean pressure of the atmosphere was marked at 29.86 inches of mercurial column. The average humidity was 74, saturation being 100. The snow and rainfall was equal to 2.20 inches of water.

The 19 deaths by diarrhoeal diseases were all in children under 5 years old. The total number of deaths by all zymotic diseases together was 123, or exactly 25 per cent. of the mortality in the week. Diphtheria continues to be the most wide-spread and fatal of the zymotic maladies. Though most prevalent and fatal in the 19th Ward, and in the midst of some special local conditions of unhealthfulness, the 37 fatal case occurred in 29 different streets and in 15 different Wards. The 9th and 16th Wards had each four fatal cases, and the 19th had nine. Four adult were among the fatal cases, and 30 were under six years of age. This destroyer of life evidently requires that the most enlightened sanitary and medical care should be promptly at hand wherever it begins to prevail. Like scarlatina it is some respects amenable to sanitary precaution especially as regards the conditions that promote its propagation and its malignancy. Having caused 405 deaths in the city the past twelve weeks, and being now the most destructive of diseases among us, no effort is spared to watch prevalence with reference to any sanitary cause that may diminish its fatality.
