

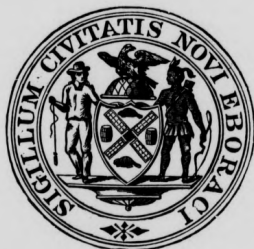

Hon. ABRAM S. HEWITT, Mayor City of New York:

SIR—Pursuant to section 40, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York hereby respectfully submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force for the three months ending September 30, 1887:

REPORT.

On the 30th day of September, 1887, the number of members of the force, of all grades, including Surgeons and Probationary Employees, was 3,225.

SICK TIME.

NOTE.—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses on felony report and on general report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the general report is made up from the daily returns from the station-houses and the felony report from quarterly returns. An offense charged in the station-house, at the time the arrest is made, is liable to be and frequently is changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the magistrate.
