The 743 deaths represent a death-rate of 23.10, against 24.01 for the previous week, and 22.43

for the corresponding week of 1890.

The decrease of 29 deaths was chiefly due to a decrease of 9 in the deaths from heart disease, of 14 from pneumonia, of 8 from Bright's disease, and of 8 from violence; there was an increase of 7 in the deaths from diphtheria, and of 9 from measles, while the deaths attributed to influenza fell from 22 to 9.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth Ward, from measles in Twenty-second and from scarlet fever in the Eleventh and Thirteenth Wards.
