Whereupon the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, By a concurrent vote of the Mayor, Counsel to the Corporation and Commissioner of Public Works that, pursuant to the provisions of section 68 of the New York City Consolidation Act, and deeming it for the best interests of the City, all printing, stationery and blank books for the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York mentioned in Requisitions Nos. 119, 120, 121, 130, 131, 132, 135, 136, 138, 140, 141, 142, inclusive, this day submitted, shall be done and procured under the direction of the Supervisor of the City Record without contract.

The Supervisor was directed to communicate with Justice T. E. Murray and request the attendance of himself and his Clerk for to-morrow's meeting. He was also instructed to invite Justice Lachman and the Clerk of the First District Court to meet and confer with the Board in relation to the question of printing District Court blanks in large quantities for all the courts.

A like invitation was ordered to be extended to Mr. Golderman, of the Board of Health, and Col. Cregier, Secretary of the Board of Police Justices.

County Clerk Reilly appeared and said he had some blanks on hand, and would be able to report to morrow what number he could transact his business with pending the drawing of specifications and letting by contract of the larger quantities.

The Supervisor reported that he had, pursuant to the directions of the Board, written tot he Comptroller, asking for the views of Mr. Angell as to the practicability of purchasing stationery in large quantities after competition, in the hope that thereby the cost to the City might be reduced, and had received the following reply:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK, January 8, 1889.

THOMAS COSTIGAN, Esq., Supervisor of the City Record:

Sir.—In compliance with your request of yesterday, and in accordance with a resolution adopted by the Board of City Record on January 5, I have had a report prepared by Mr. Stephen Angell, of this Department, upon the subject of purchase of stationery for the City in bulk, and herewith transmit the same for such consideration as may be deemed advisable.

SIR—Having conferred with the Supervisor of the City Record on the subject of "purchasing stationery supplies in large quantities," etc., as referred to in his note addressed to you, asking my "views and suggestions" on the subject, I would respectfully report that we are substantially

agreed in suggesting:

1. That it is not feasible to purchase "large quantities" to be kept "in bulk" at the CITY

1. That it is not feasible to purchase "large quantities" to be kept "in bulk" at the CITY RECORD office; but
2. That for all leading articles of stationery, to be furnished as called for by requisitions, bids should be invited from reputable dealers, as is done by the Board of Education.

And, as the Supervisor is of the opinion that the same request applied to printing and blank books, we would further suggest, that bids be invited for all regular blanks and blank books, and for exceptional orders involving a large expenditure, say \$500 or over.

And in order to do this, it is desirable to have on file at the CITY RECORD office, samples of all regular blanks used in the Departments, Courts, etc., together with an estimate of the quantity of each required for a year's supply. Jobs not embraced in the above classification to be paid for as now, according to the scale adopted by the Board of City Record.

Although section 68 of the Consolidation Act seems to be a bar to regular contracts, except for specific quantities, I see no reason why the "Board of City Record" could not call for bids from dealers, to continue in force till terminated by written notice by either party.

If either mode is adopted, it will be necessary to have specifications carefully drawn, based substantially on the regulations, etc., adopted December 17, 1886, modified October 10, 1887, by the "Board of City Record."

Intelligent scrutiny of the requisitions, and the repression of unnecessary expenditures, the exercise of sound judgment in issuing orders, and the critical examination of goods delivered, would, in my opinion, sensibly diminish the cost of these supplies.

That no owner or lessee of any building, or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which, or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said buildings or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person rent, let, hire out, or allow, having power to prevent the same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COM-MISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and theywill be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them. The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wit:

wit: KERIES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Com-missioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bath-

five dollars per annum shall be made for each bathtub therein.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum. DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows: Horses, Private.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSES TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half

Printing Offices, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

DA. Mineral Water and Root Beer Fountains shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

Steam Engines, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars is a rannum; for each exceeding ten, and not over afteen, the sum of five dollars.

ATER-Closets And Urinals.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet rurinal will be charged as hereinafter stated, All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." *

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent. per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water. Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC. No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to

another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waster to make the context of the context.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be per-

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs o norse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permit must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures. No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths land urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws 7:887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887 the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

ing water rents:

1. It is a superior water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretorier been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or metersare now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful maner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1881, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

out the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore even to all householders that, in all turther applications for reduction of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Départment in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.

GRANTS OF LANDS UNDER WATER.

THE OWNERS OF LANDS IN THE CITY OF New York, which were formerly under water, and which were granted by the City of New York, are notified that nearly all of the grants of such lands contain covenants, on the part of the grantees, and their successors and assigns, to maintain and keep in repair the adjacent streets. The condition of many of these streets is such as to make it necessary that they should be repaired and repaved, and that the obligation resting upon the present owners of adjacent lots to do this work should now be enforced. Many of such owners have requested that such covenants be commuted, and wholly released, upon the payment by them of a certain sum per lot.

The matter will shortly be presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their consideration, and application for releases should therefore be made at once.
