The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending May 27, 1882 : The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1793, as follows: 4 public buildings, 677 tenement-houses, 139 private dwellings, 51 other dwell-ings, 19 manufactories and workshops, 29 stores and warehouses, 27 stables, 47 slaughter-houses, 4 lodging-houses, 1 market, 1 brewery, 1 foundry, 3 dangerous buildings, 1 university building, 42 sunken and vacant lots, 1 public sewer, 80 yards, courts and areas, 114 cellars and basements, 206 waste-pipes and drains, 286 privies and water-closets, 20 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 4 smoky chimneys, 7 cesspools, 24 other nuisances. The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 719. During the past week 187 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. 115 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port. 166 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

Health Officer of the Fort. 166 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks. The Disinfecting Corps have visited 201 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 191 houses, 191 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. 12 cases of contagious diseases wereremoved to the hospital, and one dead body to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 463 births, 57 still-births, 214 marriages, and 688 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, May 27, 1882; this shows a decrease of 31 births and 72 deaths, and an increase of 6 still-births and 37 marriages when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was a decrease of 57 births and 9 still-births, and an increase of 13 marriages and 49 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scalatina decreased 13; diphtheria, I; hooping cough, I; ery-sipelas, 6; puerperal diseases, 5; cancer, 2; bronchitis, 15; pneumonia, 25; aneurism, I; hydro-cephalus and tubercular meningitis, I; apoplexy, 3; cirrhosis and hepatitis, I; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 12; cyanosis and ateletasis, I; premature and pre-ternatural births, I; surgical operations, 3, and drowning, 2; while the deaths from small-pox increased 2; measles, II; croup, 3; malarial fevers, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 2; inanition, I; rheu-matism and gout, 4; phthisis pulmonalis, 7; heart diseases, 4; marasmus, tabes-mesenterica and scrofula, 3; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; convulsions, 6; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 7. Of the total number of deaths reported for the week 161 were in institutions, 357 in tenement-houses, 156 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 8 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 9 were on the basement floor, 112 on the first, 170 on the second, 139 on the third, 68 on the fourth, 21 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth. 674 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 14 non-residents ; 74 were stated to be single, 133 married, 70 widowed, and the condition of 411 was not stated ; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age. The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz. : City deaths, 688 ; still-births, 57 ; bodies in transitu, 23 ; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 71 were upon certificates received from the Coroners ; 465 births ; 214 marriages ; 57 still-births ; 688 deaths ; 23 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 71 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 4 transcripts of the birth record, 6 of marriage, and 43 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending May 27, 1882, was 61.1 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.918, the mean humidity was 65, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1, 139, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.88 inch depth of water, as reported by D.
