

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioner of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting hel March 5, 1875.

Present—Hon. William H. Wickham, Mayor Chairman; Hon. Andrew H. Green, Comptroller J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain, and Magnus Gross, Esq., Chairman of the Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

approved.

A communication was received from the Commissioners of Docks, acknowledging the receipt of a copy of the preamble and resolutions adopted at the last meeting, requesting the said Commissioners to furnish this Board with certain information relative to their expenditures and operations for the year 1874, stating that the information asked for would be furnished as soon as possible; and calling attention to their requisition of January 14, 1875, for the issue of bonds for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks.

Which, on motion, was laid on the table.

The Chairman stated that this meeting was called for the special purpose of considering the requisition of the Commissioners of Docks, submitted to this Board at the last meeting, and referred to the Comptroller, for the issue of \$1,000,000 Dock Bonds, for the uses and purposes of the Dock

In reply to the inquiry of the Chairman, the Comptroller stated that he had not prepared a resolution for the action of this Board, authorizing

In reply to the inquiry of the Chairman, the Comptroller stated that he had not prepared a resolution for the action of this Board, authorizing the issue of the amount of bonds asked for by the Commissioners of Docks, as he was opposed to the issue of so large an amount at this time, without further information as to its necessity.

After a general discussion of the subject, in which the Mayor, Comptroller, and Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen participated, the Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen submitted the following resolution, which was seconded by the Chamberlain, viz.:

Resolved, That the Comptroller, in accordance with subdivision 11 of section 6 of the Act, Chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, be and hereby is directed to prepare and issue, from time to time, \$1,000,000, Dock Bonds of the City of New York, for the purpose of raising the moneys necessary to carry out the provisions of said Act relating to the Department of Docks, its powers and duties, being the amount of the requisition by the Commissioners of Docks, dated January 14, 1875.

The Comptroller moved to amend the resolution by substituting \$200,000 in lieu of \$1,000,000.

The question was taken on the motion to amend and was not adopted; the Compuroller voting in the affirmative, and the Mayor, Chamberlain, and Chairman of the Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, in the negative.

The Comptroller then moved to amend the resolution by making the amount \$300,000 in lieu of \$1,000,000, which was not adopted; the Commissioners voting as on the previous motion.

The subject was further discussed, when, on the suggestion of the Comptroller, the resolution was modified by adding after the words from time to time the following: "as he may deem necessary to meet the requirements of the Dock Department;" and as thus modified was, on motion unanimously adopted, as follows, viz.:

REORGANIZATION OF THE MEDICAL BOARD OF BELLEVUE HOSPITAL.

NEW YORK, March 10, 1875.

At a meeting of the Board of Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction, held this day, the following Rules, presented by Commissioner Cox, were adopted for the government of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital:

Ist. Resolved, That the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital shall, on the fifteenth day of March, 1875, be organized in the manner following; and thereafter the Board, as at present constituted, shall cease to exist.

10th. That the resolution passed July 28, 1874, making the service of members of the Board continuous through the year, be and is hereby rescinded.

11th. That the Attending Physicians and Surgeons shall serve twice each year, and each service shall continue for two months.

12th. That the Medical Board shall at their first meeting divide themselves into three classes—eight members to serve three years; eight members to serve five years; and eight members to serve seven years; the classification to be determined

13. That the Rules and Regulations of the Hospital, not inconsistent with the foregoing, be continued in force.

Resolved, That Captain Erwin be directed to immediately provide a room at the Dock-house, in which the sick can be provided for until the arrival of the steamboats, and that a bed be placed therein; also, that he make requisition on this Board for every article needed for their temporary accommodation. Resolved, That the Wardens and other officials in charge of prisons in this Department be ordered to keep a book to record any unusual appearance in persons committed to their custody, when first received. Adopted March 10, 1875.

By Commissioner Bailey— Resolved, That the Chief of Staff of Charity Hospital be authorized to procure for the table such small articles for daily use as cannot be purchased in quantities, and needed to be procured fresh for immediate use. Adopted March 11, 1875. Ayes-Commissioners Bailey and Cox.
