At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held Thursday, January 14, 1897, at 12 o'clock M.
Present—The full Board.
The President stated that a hearing would be given to-day at 1 o'clock before the Greater New York Charter Commission, on that portion of the proposed charter relating to the Department of Docks, and,
On motion, the Board adjourned until January 15, 1897, at 12 o'clock M.

At an adjourned meeting of the Board of Docks, held Friday, January 15, 1897, at 12 o'clock M.
Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meetings held January 7, 11, 12 and 14, 1897, were approved.
Erastus Wiman appeared on behalf of the Consolidated Canal and Lake Company and requested a lease of 750 feet of bulkhead at Sherman's creek, Harlem river, for a term of ten years, with two renewal terms of ten years each.

On motion, the report of the Engineer-in-Chief, on Secretary's Order No. 16880, stating that there is no objection to leasing the bulkhead to said company, was placed on file, and the Secretary directed to request the Counsel to the Corporation to prepare a form of resolution to be adopted by this Board, agreeing to lease said bulkhead to the Consolidated Canal and Lake Company upon the following terms and conditions:

The lease to be for a term of ten years, with the privilege of two renewal terms of ten years each, the rental for the first two years to be at the rate of \$100 per annum, for the next eight years at the rate of \$4,800 per annum, and the rental for the renewal terms to be at the rate of ten per cent. advance on each renewal term.

Lessees to have the privilege of erecting a shed 750 feet long by 40 feet wide, in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by this Board, and to be erected under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, the shed to revert to the City at the expiration or sooner termination of the lease.

This Department to do all dredging, whenever it shall deem it necessary at said bulkhead, to a depth of not exceeding 15 feet, and in case any greater depth is desired by the company during the continuance of the lease, such additional dredging to be done at the expense of the lessee.

The lessee to keep and maintain said wharf property and the structures thereon in good and sufficient repair and condition.

The company to agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions embodied in leases of wharf property now used by this Department, and the bulkhead to be set aside for the special kind of commerce carried on by canal boats.

The following communications were referred to the Counsel to the Corporation, for his opinion:

From Abel Crook, attorney—In relation to the rental of platform occupied by the Fulton Market Fish Mongers' Association, between Piers 23 and 24, East river.

From the Chapman Slate Company—Requesting permission to remain in possession of the premises now occupied by them on the southwest corner of Jane and West streets, North river.

The communication from the Engineer-in-Chief, reporting filling-in required at the East One Hundred and Sixteenth street section, was referred to the Treasurer with power.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 15384, submitting cost of dredging in front of the bulkhead south of Pier, old 54, North river, \$492.80, was referred to the Treasurer for collection from the Farmers' Loan and Trust Company, trustees.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Brush Electric Illuminating Company, to reset defective poles at Jay and opposite Harrison and Chambers streets, North river. All pavements that may be taken up to be replaced by this Department at the cost and expense of said company.

Central Gas Light Company to drive piles north of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, Port Morris, said piles to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board.

Department of Street Cleaning, to extend dumping-board on south side of Pier foot of East One Hundred and Tenth street, East river, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted as amended in red.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Department of Excise—Requesting information respecting the traffic in liquors in the vicinity of Gansevoort and West streets. The Secretary directed to reply.

From the Finance Department—

1st. Approving sureties on Contract No. 560 for filling in behind crib bulkhead at Sherman's creek, Harlem river.

2d. In relation to substitution of sureties on Contract No. 563.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the substitution of George H. Bressette, No. 1 Broadway, and H. D. Heissenbuttel, No. 1 Broadway, New York City, as sureties, in the place of Theodore Young and John Kingston, on the estimate of William C. Moquin, contractor, for furnishing and delivering about 700 tons of anthracite coal, under Contract No. 563.

From the Counsel to the Corporation—

1st. Approving forms of Contracts Nos. 560 and 562.

2d. Requesting six maps of property owned by E. A. Hoffman, in the vicinity of Catharine slip.

Engineer-in-Chief directed to furnish.

3d. Requesting copy of map or plan adopted by Department of Docks, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, for the improvement of the westerly side of the Harlem river, between Second and Third avenues. Engineer-in-Chief directed to furnish same.

4th. Requesting information in relation to the discharge of George Sparks, formerly a Ship Carpenter in this Department. Secretary directed to furnish same.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify the Department of Street Cleaning that it will be allowed to remain in possession of said premises as long as such occupancy does not interfere with the work of improvement in that vicinity.

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of dredging in Sherman's creek, Harlem river, under Contract No. 553, Morris & Cumings Dredging Company, contractors, be and hereby is extended to February 1, 1897, provided that the written consent of the sureties to said extension is filed in this office.

From the Citizens' Steamboat Company—Requesting dredging in the half slips adjoining Pier, new 46, North river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order dredging, under Contract No. 535.
