Whereas, The Legislature of the State of New York did, on the 26th day of May, 1881, pass an act (chapter 367) entitled, "An act to create a Department of Street Cleaning in the City of New York, and to provide for the cleaning of the streets of said city; for the removal of snow and ice therefrom, and for the collection of ashes, garbage and street sweepings and the disposal of the same," and thereby created a Department of Street Cleaning to have exclusive charge of cleaning the streets, etc., as in said act provided, and

Whereas, It is further provided for in and by said act that the head of said Department shall be called the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, and

Whereas, J. S. Coleman has been duly appointed and qualified as such Commissioner, and due notice having been given of the organization of such Department and of such appointment; now, therefore, pursuant to and in conformity with the terms and provisions of said Act of the Legislature, be it

Resolved, That all books, papers, records, property, leases, moneys, accounts, claims and things of every kind and description, belonging to or in the custody of the said Police Department and used by the existing Bureau of Street Cleaning in the work of cleaning the streets in the said city, or of the removal of ashes and garbage, be and the same are hereby transferred by the said Police Department to the said Department of Street Cleaning provided for and created by said Act of the Legislature.

Resolved, That the term of office and employment of Superintendents, Foremen, Deputy Inspectors, Dump Inspectors, Steamboat Captains, Pilots, Engineers, Firemen, and Deck-hands on Steam Tugs, Watchmen, Mechanics and all other employees of the Street Cleaning Bureau, shall cease and terminate on the 16th day of June, inst., at 7 o'clock A. M., of said date—all aye.

Resolved, That the following persons be informed that the Board of Police propose to remove them severally from the positions held by them in the Police Department Bureau of Street Cleaning; that the cause of such proposed removal is that by chapter 367 of the Laws of 1881, the Bureau of Street Cleaning in the Police Department is abolished, and there are no longer any duties to be performed by said persons in said Bureau, and there are no moneys appropriated applicable to the payment of their several salaries; and that they be allowed opportunity to make any explanation before the Board of Police at 10 A. M., 16th inst.—all aye.

SIR.—There were 633 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, June 11, 1881, which is a decrease of 27, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 154 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1880. The actual mortality for the week ending June 4, 1881, was 624, which is 166.8 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.17 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,239,873.

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to effect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing laws.

Section 4.
