SIR—There were 633 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, June 11, 1881, which is a decrease of 27, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 154 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1880. The actual mortality for the week ending June 4, 1881, was 624, which is 166.8 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.17 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,239,873.
