DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks held October 13, 1886.

Present—Commissioners Stark, Matthews and Koch.

The minutes of the meetings held October 7 and 8, 1886, were read and approved.

A communication from James J. Coogan, requesting the Board to construct a crib-bulkhead at the north end of Eighth avenue, about One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, was referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

A communication from the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, requesting permission to amend former application and extend platform at Pier 27, East river, and erect shed, etc., on the pier and platforms adjoining, as per plans and specifications submitted, was referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

A communication from J. M. Toucey, Superintendent of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, requesting a conference respecting the building of the bulkhead wall and piers between Thirtieth and Thirty-third streets, North river, was referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

The communication from H. E. Tallmadge & Co., counsel, etc., of the New York and Long Island Ferry Company, respecting the occupation of premises foot of Ninety-ninth street, East river, was laid on the table.

Thomas C. E. Ecclesine appeared before the Board and presented a petition signed by a number of stevedores, requesting the Board to repeal so much of Rule 7 of the Rules and Regulations which states that "No vessel of any kind shall be loaded or discharged by horse-power, nor shall stones or similar cargo be discharged from any vessel upon any pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure, unless proper planking be provided to protect the surface of such pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure from injury consequent upon the travel of the horse," which was referred to Executive Session.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit: From Counsel to the Corporation—Opinion in reference to the application of the Consolidated Gas Company for permission to extend Pier between Forty first and Forty-second streets, North river. The Secretary directed to have the same recorded in the Book of Opinions.

From Consolidated Gas Company—Requesting the Board to postpone the work of dredging in front of bulkheads between Sixteenth and Eighteenth streets, North river, until the slips at piers adjoining are dredged by the Department. Request granted.

From Hoboken Land and Improvement Company—Agreeing to the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted October 6, 1886.

From S. A. Frost—Requesting permission to repair Pier 16, East river. The action of Commissioner Matthews in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, was approved.

From Police Department—Reporting that repairs are needed to Pier at One Hundred and Fifty-second street, North river. The action of Commissioner Matthews in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Central Vermont Railroad and Steamship Line—Requesting permission to drive spring-piles on the southeast corner of Pier 36, East river. The action of Commissioner Matthews in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, was approved.

From New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company—Acknowledging the receipt of checks sent by error to this Department.

Resolved, That the plans, form of contract and specifications, as prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief, for repairing Pier, old 54, foot of Perry street, North river, and Pier at West Nineteenth street, North river, be and hereby be approved, subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of proposals printed and proper advertisements, inviting bids for doing said work, inserted in the papers designated by law.

The attorney of the New York Floating Dry Dock Company appeared before the Board and requested that the time to repair Pier 49, East river, be extended until January 15, 1887.

On motion, his request was granted.

A communication was received from George H. Brown, executor of the estate of James Brown, deceased, requesting permission to construct a pile-platform on the water-grant of the said estate between West Fifty-first and West Fifty-second streets, from the existing bulkhead to the established bulkhead line, and enclosing plans and specifications for the same. In answer to the letter of the Corporation Counsel, under date of October 8, 1886, in reference to the injunction of the Anchor Line in relation to old Piers 20 and 21, North river, the following resolution is hereby adopted:
