Referred to the Counsel to the Corporation.

On reading and filing report of Captain John W. England, Manhattan Parks, and communication from Edward F. Brown, relative to case of Isaac C. Tyson, Manhattan Park Police, referring to chapter 432, Laws of 1897, legalizing the appointment of Isaac C. Tyson on Park Police Force as Park-keeper and Roundsman, it was

Resolved, That the name of Roundsman Isaac C. Tyson be placed upon the pay-roll of Manhattan Park Police, and that the Treasurer be directed to pay him the salary due for months of January and February, 1898.

Resolved, That the salary of Michael R. Brennan, Superintendent of Police Telegraph, City of New York, be fixed at \$4,000 per annum, and that the salary of Edward H. Murphy, Assistant Superintendent of Police Telegraph, Borough of Manhattan, be fixed at \$3,000 per annum, to take effect February 1, 1898.
