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## EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

Office of the Mayor, July 18, 1906.

Pursuant to the authority vested in me by law, and on the requisition of fifteen members of the Board of Aldermen made in accordance with the provisions of section 37 of the Greater New York Charter, I, Patrick F. McGowan, Acting Mayor of The City of New York, do hereby call a special meeting of the Board of Aldermen, to be held in the Aldermanic Chamber, in the City Hall, in the Borough of Manhattan, on Tuesday, July 24, 1906, at 1.30 o'clock in the afternoon, for the purpose of considering the following enumerated matters, in the aforesaid requisition mentioned, to wit:

1. Veto of the Mayor of a resolution to permit the Orphans' Aid Society of Charleston, S. C., to play in public places.
2. Communication of the District Attorney of New York County in the matter of a request to investigate the books of the American Ice Company.
3. Resignation of Alderman John T. McCall as a member of the Board of Aldermen for the Thirtieth Aldermanic District, and the filling of the vacancy in the membership of the Board caused thereby.
4. Reports of the Committee on Finance affecting all propositions for the issue of Corporate Stock remaining undisposed of at the last stated meeting.
5. Resolution appointing various persons Commissioners of Deeds.

The matter of the renewal of the lease of the building occupied by the Department of Health in the Borough of Richmond was submitted and referred to Commissioner Doty and the Secretary.

The matter of the selection and approval of the site in the Borough of Brooklyn upon which to erect an office building for the Department was submitted by the Secretary, and, on motion, the following preambles and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, On or about the 15th day of February, 1905, a site was duly selected by the Commissioner of Health of The City of New York, in the Borough of Brooklyn, whereon to erect and maintain borough offices for the use of the Department of Health of The City of New York, as authorized by law, and said site is bounded and described as follows, to wit:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the westerly side of Fleet place with the southerly side of Willoughby street, and running thence westerly along the southerly side of Willoughby street 101.98 feet to the easterly line of a street as shown on a "draft damage map in the matter of acquiring title to the street as an approach to Manhattan Bridge, extending from Nassau street to the intersection of Flatbush avenue and Fulton street, in the Fourth, Fifth and Eleventh Wards, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York," filed in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated New York, October 14, 1904, and approved by the Commissioner of Public Works on that date; thence running southeasterly along the easterly line of said street 184.17 feet, more or less, to the northwesterly side of Fleet street; thence northeasterly along the northwesterly side of Fleet street 61.53 feet to the westerly side of Fleet place, and thence northerly along the westerly side of Fleet place 115.19 feet to the point or place of beginning; and

Whereas, The Board of Health duly approved of such site on or about March 1, 1905, and thereafter and on or about March 15, 1905, requested the approval of such selection by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and the same was duly approved by resolution of said Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 12, 1905; and thereafter said resolution was concurred in by the Board of Aldermen by resolution duly adopted on December 19, 1905; and

Whereas, The Board of Health inadvertently omitted to formally approve the selection of such site by resolution entered in its minutes; now therefore be it



Resolved, That the site so selected as aforesaid by the Commissioner of Health be and the same is hereby approved by this Board; and further be it

Resolved, That this resolution be and the same is hereby adopted nunc pro tunc as of March 1, 1905.

The matter of the interpretation of a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen April 3, 1906, and approved by his Honor the Mayor April 10, 1906, authorizing and empowering the Board of Health to apply a sum not exceeding \$20,000 for the purpose of preparing the sanatorium for the occupancy by and treatment of patients, making repairs, additions and alterations in the present buildings on the site acquired by The City of New York, at Otisville, in the Town of Mt. Hope, Orange County, N. Y., and in the erection of tents and portable houses, etc., etc., was submitted, and the Secretary was directed to request the Comptroller to furnish a ruling as to the interpretation to be placed upon same.

A form of proposal for the care of alien immigrants at the port of New York, suffering from contagious diseases, also for the ambulance transportation for said immigrants during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1906, and ending June 30, 1907, was submitted, and, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the President of this Board be and he hereby is authorized and requested to execute or cause to be executed, a contract or agreement with the Commissioner of Immigration at the Port of New York, to receive and care for immigrants sick with contagious diseases, in the hospitals of the Department of Health, in the following form:

Port of New York, July 1, 1906.

The Department of Health of The City of New York hereby agrees to receive from the Commissioner of Immigration at the port of New York immigrants sick with contagious diseases, as follows: Typhus fever, small pox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, measles, chicken pox and cerebro-spinal meningitis, and to care for them in the hospitals of said Department; compensation for such service to be at the rate of two dollars (\$2) per day for each patient. The compensation for the proper burial of such immigrants as may die and are buried by the Department of Health, to be at the rate of fourteen dollars (\$14) for each and every burial.

The said Department of Health further agrees to furnish promptly, whenever called upon by the authorities of the United States Immigration Service at the port of New York, comfortable and suitable ambulance transportation either by boat or by conveyance adapted to the purpose, from any dock or pier in New York City, including all boroughs, Jersey City or Hoboken, N. J., and the Immigrant Hospital on Ellis Island or any hospital under contract with the Immigration Service at the port, located within the territory of Greater New York, to the contagious disease hospitals of the Department of Health, and from said contagious disease hospitals to Ellis Island, for the sum of two dollars (\$2) each way for every person transported to and from the above named places.

We further agree to use the utmost vigilance and care to insure the proper delivery of immigrant patients so transported, and to carry their own ordinary hand baggage when accompanying them, free of charge.

It is further agreed and understood that the authorities of the United States Immigration Service of the port of New York will furnish and deliver to the ship's officers at the steamship dock the necessary papers for the release of immigrants sick with contagious disease for transportation to hospital by the authorized agent or employee of the Department of Health.

It is further agreed that if, in case of an emergency, it should become necessary to transport by ambulance instead of boat contagious diseases developing on Ellis Island, that the Immigration Service will provide a necessary escort to deliver such cases to the Department of Health ambulance at the Barge Office.

It is further agreed and understood that all alien immigrants released from the hospitals of the Department of Health, shall be delivered direct to Ellis Island by conveyance in the event of an emergency.

It is hereby stipulated that the Commissioner of Immigration at the port of New York will pay to the Department of Health of The City of New York the compensation herein above specified within ten (10) days after the expiration of the month within which the service was rendered.

This proposal is made for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1907, and it is understood and agreed that the same shall take effect when accepted by the Honorable, the Secretary of Commerce and Labor, but may be terminated by either party upon thirty days' notice.

Revised bills in duplicate for extra work performed by Joseph Johnson's Sons, to whom was awarded the contract to ditch, drain, fill or otherwise improve certain areas in the salt marsh lands located in the Borough of Richmond, City of New York, with a view to their extermination as a breeding place for mosquitoes, by the Board, September 6, 1905, were received and, on recommendation of Commissioner Doty, it was

Resolved, That the resolution of this Board adopted January 10, 1906, awarding to Joseph Johnson's Sons the contract to fill in certain places in the cat-tail marshes located at points near Midland and South Beaches in the Borough of Richmond, containing about 30,000 square feet, and the driving of the necessary piles at the inlet located under the tracks of the South Beach and Midland Beach Trolley Line, as provided under an estimate dated January 3, 1906, for the sum of \$995, be and the same is hereby rescinded; be it further

Resolved, That the additional and extra work performed by Joseph Johnson's Sons, to whom was awarded the contract to ditch, drain, fill or otherwise improve certain areas in the salt marsh lands located within the Borough of Richmond, City of New York, with a view to their extermination as a breeding place for mosquitoes, by this Board September 6, 1905, as shown in a certain bill dated May 14, 1906, be and the same is hereby approved and accepted by this Board, and the sanction for same given by Commissioner Doty to said Joseph Johnson's Sons, is confirmed, and the Secretary is directed to cause a proper voucher to be prepared and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment as follows:

Resolved, That, in view of the violations of the contract awarded to Theodore Linington, Jr., of No. 56 Hudson street, by this Board January 24, 1906, for furnishing and delivering grocery supplies (Lines 1, 4, 5, 7, 11, 18, 20, 22, 24, 45, 56, 78, 82, 83, 86, 100, 105, 106, 108, 109, 110, 111, 114, 115, 122, 124, 126, 127, 128, 130, 159, 170, 180, 187 and 198), as required to the Hospitals of the Department of Health during the year 1906, for the sum of \$2,979.97, and in view of the manner in which the said contractor is performing his work under said contract, now, therefore, this Board is of the opinion and so certifies in writing, that the said contractor is wilfully violating the conditions of the contract and is executing the same in bad faith, and that the deliveries are not being made according to the terms of the contract.

Sir—In compliance with the Laws of 1905, chapter 724, section 2, which provides that it shall be the duty of the Board of Water Supply to proceed immediately and with all reasonable speed to ascertain what sources exist and are most available, desirable and best for an additional supply of pure and wholesome water for The City of New York, the said Board, under date of October 9, 1905, made a report, accompanied by maps, plans, specifications, etc., to your Honorable Body. This report was duly acted upon, and an application was made to the State Water Supply Commission at Albany.

Under date of May 19, 1906, the State Water Supply Commission made its report, granting the petition of The City of New York in its application as set forth therein, except so far as said application applies to the rights affected by taking the real estate in the Schoharie watershed, the City having failed to give the notice required by law by publishing it in the Counties of Schenectady and Montgomery, and the State Water Supply Commission modified the petition of The City of New York by striking out from the said application and the maps, profiles and surveys accompanying the same, the Schoharie watershed.

It is important that the said Schoharie watershed be obtained, for the reasons as set forth in the report of the Board of Water Supply of the City of New York to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under date of October 9, 1905, and for the further reasons as shown in a report of the Chief Engineer and the Consulting Engineers to the Board of Water Supply, dated June 12, 1906, accompanying this communication, together with maps, plans and specifications.

The Board of Water Supply respectfully requests the consideration of the maps and plans herewith submitted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and their

adoption at the earliest date possible in order that the same may be submitted to the State Water Supply Commission for approval, and that the work of construction may proceed without delay.

The Department is not bound in any way by such estimate, and bidders must satisfy themselves of the actual quantity required to fill in the above-described area by examination of the premises or such other means as they may prefer, the intention of the Department being to fill in the whole of the said premises behind the bulkhead wall within the above-described limits, and no allowance will be made to the purchaser from the purchase price on account of any discrepancy which may be found between the above-estimated quantity and the actual amount of filling required. All the filling shall, unless otherwise directed, be placed directly in the rear of the bulkhead wall and carried from the bulkhead wall toward the shore until the bank of same has been carried out at the finished grade for a distance of about 30 feet from the face of the bulkhead wall, at which time, if so directed by the Engineer, the filling shall be started at the bank and carried outshore toward the bulkhead wall or close row of piles.

All material must be dumped and filled in only in such manner, at such points and in such order of procedure and at such times and seasons as may, from time to time, be directed, and the work of filling in may be entirely suspended for such periods of time as may be directed by the Engineer. The purchaser shall have no claim for damage or for any allowance from the purchase money on account of such suspension of the work.

All directions shall be given by the Engineer, and wherever the word "Engineer" is used in these specifications it refers to and designates the Engineer-in-Chief of the Department of Docks and Ferries, or such officer or employee as may be designated by him.

Rip-rap stone coming directly on or against the bulkhead wall must be deposited carefully in such manner as will not injure the same.

All the filling, except as otherwise specified herein, shall be of ashes, culm dirt, broken

stone, etc., entirely free from garbage or any organic matter objectionable in the opinion of the Engineer.

At any section of the bulkhead wall the filling shall be brought up level with the under side of the backing log of the bulkhead wall at such section, and no higher, unless otherwise directed.

The filling shall be commenced within five days after the date of the receipt of a notification from the Engineer that the work, or any part of it, is ready to be begun. The Department reserves the right of ordering the Contractor to deposit not less than 100 cubic yards per day, as directed by the Engineer, and the whole amount of the filling called for to bring the above-described basin up to grade shall be completed within 60 calendar days from the date of the receipt of said notification. At the expiration of this time this agreement shall be considered closed unless a further extension of time shall be given by the Commissioner of Docks. Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
