Hon. Salem H. Wales, President of the Department of Public Parks:

SIR:-I received your letter of the 30th ultimo, stating that Mr. David B. Williamson, one of the Commissioners of your Department, has been duly appointed treasurer thereof, and asking my opinion whether the Board has the authority to designate a salary to be paid Mr. Williamson, as such treasurer.

Section 12, of chapter 290, of the laws of 1871, provides that the treasurer of the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks "shall, from the date of his appointment as such, be entitled to receive such compensation as the Board shall designate and allow, not exceeding the amount paid by the late Board of Commissioners of the Central Park to the Treas-

Section 89, of the Charter of 1873, provides as follows: "Each Board may, except as herein otherwise provided, choose, in its own pleasure, one of its members, who shall be its President; and one who shall be its Treasurer, and may appoint a chief clerk or secretary."

In view of these provisions of law, and of the power vested in the heads of Departments by section 28 of the Charter of 1873, to fix the salaries of all officers in every Department, I am of the opinion that your Board has authority to designate a salary to be paid to Mr. Williamson, as treasurer, provided such salary does not exceed the limit prescribed by the statute of 1871, above cited.

That the Sanitary Committee be directed to prepare a report on the markets and the market system of New York, embodying such evidence as they may deem important in regard to the sanitary condition of the present markets, and how far their location, construction and management subserve the present and prospective wants of the people, in the proper care and economical distribution of food, together with the suggestions of such measures of reform as they may deem advisable. deem advisable.

That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be adopted and declared to form a portion of said Code:

Sec. 182. That the owners, lessees and occupants of any building in the city of New York, in which hatchways or well-holes exist, or shall hereafter be constructed, shall cause the same to be effectually barred or closed by a railing, gates, or by other contrivance, approved by the Board of Health, for the prevention of accidents therefrom

Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the building situated upon the lot No. 414 West 17th street, New York City, has become dangerous to life by reason of want of repair.

want of repair.

Ordered, That all persons in said building, situated upon lot No. 414 West Seventeenth street, New York City, be required to vacate said building on or before 25th day of October, 1873, for the reason that said building is dangerous to life by reason of want of repair; and further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of said building, and be served as the law requires under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent; and further, that said building be not again used as a human habitation without a again used as a human habitation without a written permit from this Board.

That the same effect shall be given to burial or transit permits, issued by the Medical Officer of the Board of Freeholders of Hudson County, in the State of New Jersey, known as the County Physician, as to a burial or transit permit issued by this Department when the death of the person named in the permit shall have occurred in said County. said County.

Whereas, the party served with Order No. 1,665, Form 2, Current Series, relating to premises No. 267 Broadway, before the execution has been commenced, has applied to this Board to have said order or its execution stayed or modified.

Resolved, That the said order be suspended until the further order of this Board, and that the party served therewith be allowed a reasonable and fair opportunity to present facts and proofs in favor of the modification of such order, and that George S. Hasting be appointed a referee to hear and receive such facts and proofs, and to report the same in accordance with the rules of this Board for such further action as may seem just and reasonable. seem just and reasonable.

SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a record of the work per-formed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending Oct. 11, 1873:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 2,141, as follows, viz.: 5 public buildings, 874 tenement houses, 218 private dwellings, 116 other dwellings, 42 manufactories and workshops, 26 stores and warehouses, 127 stables, 27 slaughter houses, 1 lard-rendering establishment, 3 manure dumps, 3 gut-cleaning establishments, 9 fat-rendering establishments, 9 fat-rendering establishments, 2 breweries, 60 sunken and vacant lots, 54 yards, courts and areas, 74 cellars and basements, 48 waste pipes and drains, 118 privies and water-closets, 208 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 4 dangerous stairways, 2 cisterns and cess-pools, 22 other nuisances, and 18 visits The total number of inspections made by the pools, 22 other nuisances, of the Health Inspectors to cases of contagious

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 623.

During the past week 58 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 53 premises where contagious diseases were found and have disinfected and fumigated 53 houses, 53 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, &c.

One case of small-pox was removed to hospital, and one dead body to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

75 permits have been granted to consignees of vessels for the discharge of cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

634 62 110 permits have been granted for scavengers 288 46 to disinfect, empty and clean privy sinks.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

SIR:—The total number of deaths reported in this city last week was 452. The number that actually occurred in the preceding week was 462. Last week was one of the most favorable to life. There were only 25 deaths of persons over 70 years of age, 198 children under 5 years, 53 by diarrheal diseases, 31 by bronchitis and pneumonia, and 61 by phthisis. Diphtheria is charged with 29 deaths in each of the past three weeks, and typhoid fever is charged with 8 deaths last week, and 12 the previous week.

The death rate last week was equivalent to 23.50 per 1,000 of the living annually. The rate of mortality in 21 of the chief cities of Great Britain, the week ending Sept. 27th, was equal to 21 per 1,000. London reported its death rate at only 18 per 1,000; Edinburgh, 19; Glasgow, 21; Liverpool, 24; and Dublin 25 per 1,000; yearly. In the same week Paris reported 951 deaths, or a death rate equal to 27 per 1,000; Brussels, 24; Berlin, 48; Vienna, 41; and Rome, in the third week of September, 24.8 per 1,000 yearly.

From no part of the United States a report of death by cholera reached us in the past week.

The persistence of this disease in various parts of Europe, and the efficiency of Sanitary measures against it, justly interest the people of our country. While in Hungary and the lower Danubian provinces, and in Gallicia, the most northern province of Austria, cholera has prevailed very fatally from early summer, and Vienna and its fatally from early summer, and Vienna and its suburbs have suffered heavily. Berlin and Paris have escaped thus far with far less cholera than hundreds of the towns in the remoter districts, where it began early in the summer. The following abstract, compiled from the weekly records that the sanitary authorities of Paris, Berlin and Pest exchange with this bureau, shows the pregress of cholera in those cities:

CHARITIES AND CORRECTION.

BLACKWELL'S ISLAND INSTITUTIONS. A Midnight Inspection by Commissioner Stern The Improvements Suggested.

Commissioner Stern presented the following re-port of his nocturnal visit to the Department of Charities and Corrections:

To the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction:

Correction:

Gentlemen: Though we are regularly informed of the condition of the institutions under our charge by the reports transmitted to us, and by actual observation during our visits, yet there are many things that escape our attention in the hurried inspections and many defects are overlooked that would demand our serious consideration when they are brought before us in the proper manner. A visit to the Island one night this week (commencing at 9 o'clock P. M. and ender manner. A visit to the Island one night this week (conumencing at 9 o'clock P. M. and ending at 1 o'clock A. M.) convinced me that there remains much to be done to make the institutions as nearly perfect as possible in order to respond with the benevolent and humane spirit in which they are conceived. I must state, however, in justice to those officers who are placed in charge of them, that they are vigilant and earnest in the discharge of their duties and do all they can to execute faithfully the task imposed upon them with the means placed at their disposal. Particularly gratifying was the attendance and regular administerings of medicine to the patients at the CharityHospital by the night physicians, the watchful matron and nurses whom I found promptly engaged in their respective duties in each and ly engaged in their respective duties in each and all the wards of the hospital.

all the wards of the hospital.

At this time, however, I propose to discuss two serious defects, both of them arising out of want of room. The first is endangering the safety of the Penitentiary; the other a violation of the trust imposed on us by the people of New York in placing under our care the unfortunate beings who are bereft of reason—the inmates of the Female Lunatic Asylum, As stated above, both arise from lack of accommodation to lodge properly those who are assigned either to our protection or correction.

Permit me to call your attention to the want of room for placing the temale prisoners confined in the Penitentiary. It appears that all the available cell room is needed for the accommodation of the male prisoners. There are 726 cells in the Penitentiary and 765 male prisoners. Room has to be found for placing the 133 female prisoners now confined in the Penitentiary. Seventy-eight of them have been located in the work-house and forty-seven in the hospital room, within the Penitentiary building. The hall may be roomy enough, but it seems to me very questionable to place forty-seven Penitentiary prisoners in one apartment, and still more so with no one present to control their conduct, and as a safeguard against mischievous intent. Any number of them might complot together; some of ners in one apartment, and still more so with no one present to control their conduct, and as a safeguard against mischievous intent. Any number of them might complot together; some of them having been found in the middle of the night enjoying the luxury of tobacco smoking, though they are punished when detected. A continuance of a practice so dangerous to the safety of the institution against fire is not easily prevented. The movements of all the female prisoners cannot be kept under such strict surveilance as those of the male prisoners. They are engaged in the kitchen, washhouse, and other portions of the buildings, gardens, and grounds, and thereby come frequently in contact with outside parties that have more or less business to visit the Penitentiary. Even during my visit in the middle of the night, I smelled the fumes of tobacco, and who will guarantee us that, either through a want of caution or the malice of one more desperate than the average class of prisoners, the place is not set on fire, endangering the lives of a thousand human beings? There is only one radical remedy to this defect, and that is the erection of an additional wing to the Penitentiary for the accommodation of female prisoners. In the meantime, some temporary safeguard must be provided. We cannot wait until we shall have an additional building. The remedy, I think, consists in using part of the chapel as a dormitory, thus diminishing the number of prisoners confined in one room, and in appointing two female keepers to take charge of those prisoners. Forty of fifty prisoners, or even twenty, confined for crime, must not be left by themselves without control or guard, and propriety demands that none but a female should remain in a dormitory of females. The prisoners should be carefully searched before being locked up for the night, to prevent them from smuggling in materials dangerous to the safety of the inmates of the house. This precaution will at least secure us against accidents dreadful to contemplate.

My visit to the female de

My visit to the female department of the Luna-tic Asylum revealed the fact that the demands made upon that institution far exceed its ability of proper accommodation. The single rooms of proper accommodation. The single rooms available at present have been exhausted, and, available at present have been exhausted, and, in order to find lodgings for those intrusted to the care of the Asylum, it became necessary, in the language of the officials, to "double up." This means that two patients are placed in a room calculated only for the accommodation of one person; and, as there is not sufficient space for two bedsteads, one of the inmates must be satisfied with having her matteres statched on the floor. with having her mattress stretched on the floor. In some rooms the bedsteads have been re-In some rooms the bedsteads have been removed altogether, as a means to increase the available space for lodgers, so that I found several rooms where six inmates occupied a room that ought not to contain more than three bedsteads. Even with stretching thus the capacity of the present building, it became necessary to transfer a number of the patients to the Workhouse, so that the latter contains people from the Penitentiary, the Lunatic Asylum, and those assigned to it as alone coming within the proper sphere. I am

aware that it is only necessary to state this condition of things to insure the efforts of the Board aware that it is only necessary to state this condition of things to insure the efforts of the Board to provide the proper remedy. During the summer months no great harm might ensue from the use of the floor as a couch, but in the winter it cannot and ought not to be tolerated. I am also aware that there is a class of patients in the Lunatic Asylum, either of a violent character or of such filthy habits as to make it an imperative necessity to lodge them on the floor; but when this unfortunate necessity does not exist we are compelled to provide proper accommodation for the patients. This can easily be done. I would recommend the erection of additional pavilions, with a capacity each for accommodating not more than forty patients. They are, in my opinion, best fitted for dormitories for gentle patients, while those of a more violent character can be housed in the rooms of the main building, the Lodge and the Retreat. Economy in this case would be misplaced and inhuman, and in direct conflict with the benevolent and humane intention of our people, and a violation of our duties as the trusted guardians of these unfortunate creatures that are handed over to the wardenship of the city and county.

The time occupied in this nocturnal inspection was too brief to enable me to lay before you a carefully drawn statement of the exact number of inmates that exceed the nominal number. ot inmates that exceed the nominal number. This can be ascertained, if required, by a subsequent inspection. It seems to me, however, that no time should be lost in taking the necessary steps to afford the relief required as speedily as possible, and therefore offer the following resolutions for the adoption of this Board:
