#### Report for the Quarter ending June 30, 1880.

To the Honorable EDWARD COOPER,  
Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR—Pursuant to section 27, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York hereby respectfully submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force for the three months ending June 30, 1880:

#### REPORT.

On the 30th day of June, 1880, the number of members of the force of the several grades, including Surgeons, was 2,535.

#### SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the Police force, by reason of sickness, disability, and injuries, for the quarter ending June 30, 1880, and the details thereof, are shown in the annexed table, marked "A," from which it will be seen that the time lost was 5,865 1/4 days.

## DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

SATURDAY, August 14, 1880.

Special meeting 9:30 A. M.

The Board met pursuant to the following:

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS,  
36 UNION SQUARE, August 10, 1880.

Mr. E. P. BARKER, Secretary:

SIR—You will please call a meeting of the Board governing the Department of Public Parks, to be held on Saturday next, August 14th, at nine and a half o'clock A. M., for the transaction of such business as may be brought before the Board.

Yours, etc.,

Present—Commissioners Wenman (President), Conover, Lane, and Green.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read, and were on motion of Commissioner Lane amended by striking out "Article three" in the resolution to amend the by-laws, and inserting in lieu thereof "Article two," and in the matter of the resolution for the filing of the Woodlawn map, correct the same so as to read "Commissioner Lane called up the resolution offered at the meeting held May 22d, etc.," and as so amended and corrected were approved.

On motion of Commissioner Lane, the regular order of business was suspended.

Commissioner Lane offered the following:

Resolved, That the following statement of the grounds for the removal of John F. Dawson as Superintendent of Parks, prepared in compliance with the provisions of section 28 of chapter 335, Laws of 1873, be entered upon the minutes:

The distinct violation of the rules of the Department, growing out of his general neglect of duty, which renders Mr. Dawson unfit for the place of Superintendent, is as follows:

He has undertaken to suspend four laborers, which he had no power to do, and to exercise a right which belongs exclusively to the Department.

The powers given to the Superintendent under the by-laws, Article II., Section 2, are "to supervise all the foremen, mechanics, and laborers employed in the parks." This corresponds with



the provisions of the previous by-laws of 1873. No power of appointment or suspension has been ever given to the Superintendent. The power of appointment and suspension belongs exclusively to the Department, and when exercised in an emergency by the President or by two Commissioners, under Article III., Section 3, of the by-laws, the suspension must be reported and continued only until the next meeting of the Board.

These by-laws are supported by good reasons of public policy. The Board itself is to determine what work is to be done, and the number of men, and the individuals to be employed. The Superintendent is to supervise the actual labor directed by the Board. The men on the force are to owe their appointment and to be liable to be discharged by action of the Board alone. No inferior subordinate can exercise the power. The men are to be protected from any influence or intimidation on the part of the Superintendent.

In point of fact Mr. Dawson suspended four laborers.

When notified verbally that he had exceeded his powers he refused to restore the men. When the matter was first presented to the Board a resolution to approve the suspension of the four men was lost.

This disapproval was a respectful way of calling Mr. Dawson's attention to his error, but he did not heed it.

To permit him to exercise the powers of the Board, and to hold the men subject to his personal control, is a direct violation of the by-laws. It is a great injustice to the workmen, and tends directly to impair the discipline and efficiency of the force.

His general neglect of duty which had been tolerated by the Board, led him to this express violation of its rules. The parks were neglected, and were in bad condition. He did not give his time fully to his work. His habitual language was disrespectful to his superiors, and defiant of their legal control. He constantly assumed to do things beyond his authority. His conduct toward the laborers was violent and abusive, and his language was habitually profane to everybody. He did not receive the respect to which his office entitled him, and his influence over those under him was prejudicial to the public service, and this influence and his evil example manifested itself through all the work of the Department.

When, in this state of affairs, he persistently determined to violate the by-laws; to assume powers vested exclusively in the Board, and to hold the men subject to his will, and to suspend them in violation of their legal rights, his misconduct reached a point where it had to be met with decision, or the whole discipline of the Department would be broken down, and the time arrived when for the protection of the men, and the public good, his connection with the Department must terminate.

Commissioner Green offered the following as a substitute:

Whereas, The proposed statement of the grounds for the removal of John F. Dawson as Superintendent of Parks as now offered by Commissioner Lane does not present the truth nor the facts and is largely composed of inferences, arguments and conclusions which are incorrect and unjustifiable; therefore,

Resolved, That the same be not entered upon the minutes.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said substitute, and it was determined in the negative, a majority of all the members of the Board not voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Aye—Commissioner Green—1.

Noes—Commissioners Wenman, Conover, and Lane—3.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said resolution of Commissioner Lane, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Commissioners Wenman, Conover, and Lane—3.

No—Commissioner Green—1.

The President submitted a copy of a petition and writ of certiorari issued out of the Supreme Court, requiring the Board to make a return of all the papers and proceedings in the matter of the removal of John F. Dawson, late Superintendent of Parks.

Whereupon Commissioner Lane offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the petition of John F. Dawson, late Superintendent of Parks, and the writ of certiorari served upon the members of the Board be transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation, who is hereby requested to prepare the proper return, and to conduct the necessary legal proceedings in opposition to the reinstatement of said Dawson; said return to be submitted to the Board for their approval.

Commissioner Green offered the following as an amendment:

Resolved, That in conformity with and in obedience to the writ of certiorari issued out of the Supreme Court, all the documents, by-laws, minutes, and other information required by said writ, be transmitted to the Supreme Court, through the Counsel to the Corporation, he being the legal adviser of the Board.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to said amendment, and it was determined in the negative, a majority of all the members of the Board not voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Aye—Commissioner Green—1.

Noes—Commissioners Wenman, Conover, and Lane—3.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to the resolution as offered by Commissioner Lane, and it was determined in the affirmative, a majority of all the members of the Board voting in favor thereof, as follows:

Ayes—Commissioners Wenman, Conover, Lane, and Green—4.

The regular order of business was then resumed.

The following communications were received:

From the Clerk of the Common Council, transmitting copy of a resolution to permit property-owners to regulate and grade Brook avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-first and One Hundred and Forty-sixth streets, and an ordinance to secure the proper repavement of streets, avenues and places in the City of New York, after excavations for purposes except those directly authorized by law.

Ordered filed.

On motion of Commissioner Lane, it was

Resolved, That the ordinance of the Common Council passed August 3, 1880, entitled "An ordinance to secure the proper repavement of streets, avenues and places in the City of New York, after excavations for whatever purpose, except those directly authorized by law," be referred to the Executive Committee, who are hereby directed to prepare such rules and regulations as, in their judgment, shall be deemed necessary for the carrying out the provisions of the ordinance, and report the same to this Board for their action.

From the Health Department, transmitting copy of a resolution declaring the lands bounded by Westchester avenue, Brook avenue, One Hundred and Fortieth street, Willis and Bergen avenues, in Twenty-third Ward, a public nuisance by reason of defective drainage.

Referred to the Topographical Engineer.

From the Superintending Engineer, Riverside drive—Relative to a bill of B. Hufnagel for photographing on Riverside drive.

Referred to the Auditing Committee.

From the Clerk of the Common Council, transmitting a copy of an ordinance for flagging and setting curb in One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the two weeks ending August 7, 1880. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,513, as follows, viz.:

546 tenement-houses, 70 private dwellings, 77 other dwellings, 7 manufactories and workshops, 18 stores and warehouses, 41 stables, 47 slaughter-houses, 1 lime-kiln, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 2 docks, 2 public sewers, 30 sunken and vacant lots, 123 yards, courts, and areas, 111 cellars and basements, 122 waste pipes and drains, 213 privies and water-closets, 24 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 2 dangerous stairways, 4 cesspools, 6 smoky chimneys, 12 other nuisances, together with 52 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 563.

During the past week 147 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 114 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

151 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 30 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 30 houses, 30 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Corps have disinfected 3,484 privies, 212 cellars, 272 yards, 240 garbage boxes, and 90 miles of street gutters.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 510 births, 37 still-births, 139 marriages, and 654 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, August 7, 1880; this shows a decrease of 4 births and 7 still-births, and an increase of 19 marriages and 29 deaths when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was a decrease of 16 births, 2 still-births, and 56 deaths, and an increase of 32 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 2; croup, 7; whooping cough, 2; erysipelas, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 4; inanition, 3; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 10; phthisis pulmonalis, 27; direct effect of solar heat, 4; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 3; while the deaths from measles increased 1; scarlatina, 5; typhoid fever, 1; malarial fevers, 10; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 14; bronchitis, 6; pneumonia, 2; heart diseases, 1; aneurism 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 6; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; convulsions, 6; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 7; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 11; premature and preternatural births, 2; suicide, 1. The number of deaths from diphtheria, alcoholism, cyanosis and atelectasis, and drowning was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 113 were in institutions, 378 in tenement houses, 151 in houses containing three families or less, 2 in hotels and boarding-houses, 9 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 10 were on the basement floor, 153 on the first, 159 on the second, 112 on the third, 73 on the fourth, 23 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 650 were stated to be residents of New York City and 4 non-residents; 72 were stated to be single, 132 married, 56 widowed, and the condition of 394 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 654; still-births, 37; bodies in transitu, 35; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 74 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 510 births, 139 marriages, 37 still-births, 654 deaths, 35 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 51 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 5 transcripts of the birth record, 4 of marriage, and 29 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending August 7, 1880, was 73 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.979, the mean humidity was 76, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 872, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.96 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 621 deaths and still-births, or 89.87 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 16; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 286; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 62; Greenwood (undenominational), 35; Lutheran (undenominational), 97; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 26; Evergreen (undenominational), 49; Woodlawn (undenominational), 15; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 7; Union (Methodist Protestant), 5; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 10; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 1; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 6; Washington (undenominational), 6.

The actual mortality for the week ending July 31, 1880, was 641; this is 51 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1879, and 59 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.49 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,212,575.

## BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met in the Mayor's office, at 2 P. M., on Wednesday, August 4, 1880.

The following members were present, viz.:—Edward Cooper, Mayor; John Kelly, Comptroller; Allan Campbell, Commissioner of Public Works; John J. Morris, President of the Board of Aldermen.

Absent—James F. Wenman, President Department Public Parks.

The minutes of the meeting held May 18, 1880, were read and approved.

A call signed by all the members of the Board for the present meeting was read and ordered on file.

A certified copy of chapter 159, Laws of 1880, was then read and ordered on file.

Messrs. Franklin Edson, Alexander E. Orr, and William R. Foster, Jr., appeared on behalf of the Produce Exchange, and explained the necessity of closing Marketfield street and opening a new street from Beaver street to Marketfield street.

The meeting then adjourned to meet again in the Mayor's office at 2 P. M., August 5, 1880.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met pursuant to adjournment in the Mayor's office at 2 P. M., Thursday, August 5, 1880.

All the members were present except James F. Wenman, President of the Department of Public Parks, who was unavoidably absent.

The Mayor offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement deem it to be for the public interest to alter the map or plan of the City of New York by closing all that portion of Marketfield street, on both sides of which the New York Produce Exchange has acquired title to the land to be used by said Exchange for a new building, the said portion of Marketfield street being that part of said street commencing at Broadway and extending easterly from Broadway to a straight line, which is the prolongation in a southerly direction of a straight line drawn through a point on the southerly side of Beaver street, which is one hundred and fifty-four (154) feet two and a half (2½) inches easterly from the southeast corner of Broadway and Beaver street, and through a point on the northerly side of Marketfield street, which is one hundred and forty-seven (147) feet ten (10) inches from the northeast corner of Marketfield street and Broadway, and propose, in accordance with the authority conferred by chapter 159 of the Laws of 1880, passed April 28, 1880, entitled "An act to facilitate the erection of a new building by the New York Produce Exchange in the City of New York by authorizing the closing of Marketfield street and the sale of a lot of land and building on Stone street, in said city, the property of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the city of New York," to alter the map or plan of the City of New York so as to close the said portion of Marketfield street, and to close the same.

The Chairman put the question upon the adoption of the said resolution, which was adopted by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and the President of the Board of Aldermen—4.

The Mayor offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement deem it to be for the public interest to alter the map or plan of the City of New York so as to lay out and open a new street to extend from Beaver street to Marketfield street, the westerly side of said new street to be a straight line extending from a point on the southerly side of Beaver street one hundred and fifty-four (154) feet two and one-half (2½) inches easterly from the southeast corner of Beaver street and Broadway to a point on the northerly side of Marketfield street, one hundred and forty-seven (147) feet ten (10) inches easterly from the northeast corner of Marketfield street and Broadway; the easterly side of said street be parallel with and twenty-five (25) feet easterly from its westerly side so that the said new street will be of the uniform width of twenty-five (25) feet; and the said Board, in pursuance of authority conferred by chapter 159 of the Laws of 1880, passed April 28, 1880, entitled "An Act to facilitate the erection of a new building by the New York Produce Exchange in the City of New York by authorizing the closing of Marketfield street, and the sale of a lot of land and building on Stone street in said city, the property of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York," propose to alter the map or plan of the City of New York so as to lay out and open the said street, and to lay out and open the same.

The Chairman put the question upon the adoption of the said resolution, which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

The Chairman offered for adoption the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the aforesaid resolutions stating the proposed action of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement in respect to closing a portion of Marketfield street, and in respect to opening a new street from Beaver street to Marketfield street, be laid before the Board of Aldermen, and that full notice of the same be published for ten days in the CITY RECORD.

Resolved, That the Mayor be requested to transmit a copy of the aforesaid resolutions to the Board of Aldermen and to cause their publication in the CITY RECORD.

The Chairman put the question upon the adoption of the said resolutions, which were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

On motion, all future meetings of the Board were directed to be called by order of the Chairman.

CHAPTER 195.  
AN ACT in relation to the payment of assessments for local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 7, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable therefor may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment.

Sec. 2. Where any installment or installments of any assessments have been paid under the provisions of chapter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, or of chapter two hundred and fifty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, the amount of such assessment or assessments remaining unpaid may be paid within the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act and upon the same terms and conditions therein prescribed.

Sec. 3. Upon such payment in full, as hereinbefore provided, such assessment or assessments shall cease to be a lien upon the property, and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged; and there shall be no further interest or penalty by reason of such assessment or assessments not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute heretofore requiring the payment of any penalty or interest over the rate hereinbefore provided for upon any unpaid assessment.

Sec. 4. No provision of this act hereinbefore contained shall be construed as applicable to or affecting any assessment for the collection of which assessment the property has been sold.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

## ARREARS OF TAXES.

## NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW York hereby gives notice to owners of Real Estate in said city, that, as provided by chapter 123 of the Laws of 1880, they may now pay any arrears of taxes and Croton water rents levied prior to the year 1877, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum. If, however, such taxes and Croton water rents are not paid before the first day of October next, the property on which they are due will be sold for taxes immediately thereafter, with the addition of accrued interest thereon at the rate of 12 per cent. per annum from the respective dates on which they were levied.

## CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
