

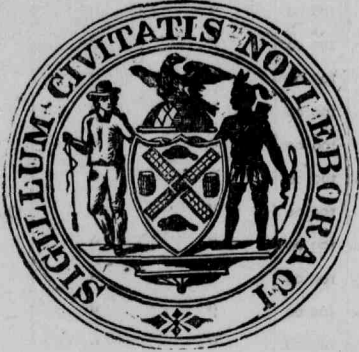

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Thursday, January 11, 1894, at 11 o'clock A. M.

Present—Commissioner Phelan.

Absent—President Cram.

The minutes of the meeting held on the 4th instant were read and approved.

A committee of wholesale lumber dealers and others were present and submitted a petition respecting the lack of wharfage facilities on the North river, between Twentieth and Thirty-fourth streets, and requested the building of a pier at the foot of West Twenty-third street.

On motion, the matter was tabled.

A representative of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company appeared and renewed their application of December 14, 1893, for a lease of twenty feet of bulkhead near the foot of Cortlandt street, North river.

A representative of John H. Starin was present in opposition. On motion, the matter was tabled. The Pennsylvania Railroad Company submitted an application to build the bulkhead or river wall between Vestry and Watts streets, North river, and requested the rescinding of the resolutions adopted on the 21st ultimo, whereby the Department agreed to do the work, except in front of the ferry premises of said company.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, if the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve, permission be and hereby is granted the Pennsylvania Railroad Company to extend the bulkhead-line of the property claimed to be owned by said company, from a point where the northerly line of Vestry street, if extended, would intersect the line of said bulkhead to a point where the southerly line of Watts street, if extended, would intersect the line of said bulkhead, in conformity with the plan adopted by this Department, at the cost and expense of said company, under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, as provided for in section 715 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 397 of the Laws of 1893; provided, however, that the said Pennsylvania Railroad Company shall, within ten days from the receipt hereof, file in this office its written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution.

Bernard Campbell, lessee, appeared respecting the order to raise the grade of the bulkhead foot of One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, North river.

On motion, the order dated January 4, 1894, was suspended.

He also requested the Board to suspend the order of October 4, 1893, relating to accommodations under the dumping-board foot of West Sixteenth street.

On motion, the application was granted, it being understood that horses are not to be kept there over night.

The offer of Thomas Patten to compromise the claim against him for rent of land under water north of Seventy-fourth street, East river, for the sum of \$350, was referred to the Treasurer.

The request of the Department of Public Works, to have the coal landing pier at High Bridge extended thirty feet into the Harlem river, was referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Morgan & McGovern, to dredge the slip south of the pier foot of East Seventh street.

Pennsylvania Railroad Company, to repair the damage to the outer end of Pier, old 41, North river.

New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company, to repair the outer corners of Piers, new 20 and 21, North river.

The following permits were granted, to continue only during the pleasure of the Board:

Daniel McCabe, to place a small sign on his office on the bulkhead at Pier 23, East river.

Osson P. Raynor, to maintain floats and boat-houses on the property of Henry Hart, between Third and Lexington avenues, Harlem river.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to return the floats belonging to said Raynor when applied for.

The following permits were granted, to continue only during the pleasure of the Board, compensation to be fixed by the Treasurer:

TO ARCHITECTS.

A general invitation is hereby extended to architects to furnish competitive designs for an armory building for the National Guard, State of New York, on the site recently acquired on the northerly side of Fourteenth street, extending through to Fifteenth street, commencing at a point on the northerly line of Fourteenth street, distant 175 feet 2 1/4 inches west from the westerly line of Sixth avenue; thence northerly and parallel with Sixth avenue, distance 103 feet 2 inches; thence westerly and parallel with Fourteenth street, distance 5 feet; thence northerly and parallel with Sixth avenue, distance 103 feet 4 inches to the southerly line of Fifteenth street; thence westerly along the southerly line of Fifteenth street, distance 250 feet 2 1/2 inches; thence southerly 206 feet 6 inches to the northerly line of Fourteenth street; thence easterly along the northerly line of Fourteenth street, distance 224 feet 10 1/4 inches, to the point or place of beginning.

The building to be designed to furnish accommodations for a regiment of Infantry.

The front on Fourteenth street to be of rock-faced granite, and the front on Fifteenth street to be of brick with stone trimmings.

The roof to be of slate tile or other suitable material.

So much of the space covered by the building as may be necessary to be excavated to a depth sufficient for the accommodation of the boiler-rooms, rifle-range, water-closets, kitchen and range, armorer's room, lavatory, janitor's room, storage-room, etc.

The designs to provide a main drill-room on the ground floor to cover as near as practicable the entire plot, reserving only so much as may be necessary for suitable main and side entrances on Fourteenth street and staircases to administration and company rooms and galleries above and basement below. An entrance to be provided on Fifteenth street opening into the main drill-room, and to be used only for an emergency.

Galleries to be provided for accommodation of visitors. The accommodation for officers, company-rooms, lockers, janitor's quarters, etc., to be suspended on Fourteenth and Fifteenth street fronts, in order to secure the greatest space on the ground floor for drill-room.

Consideration to be given to the necessary heating and lighting, the latter to be by combination gas and electric fixtures. Gun-racks and lockers to be provided for all the companies.

In order to secure conformity of drawings it is suggested that they be made on a scale of one-eighth of an inch to a foot.

The entire cost of the building, including all work and materials necessary to complete the same in every respect, both interior and exterior (other than fixtures for lighting, furniture for galleries, company and administration rooms, and which will be otherwise provided for), shall not exceed \$285,000, including the Architect's fees.

The Armory Board reserves the right to reject any or all plans that may be offered, if for any reason they deem it best so to do, and in case any plan is accepted as presented, or with alterations or suggestions of the Board, and it is subsequently found that contracts satisfactory to the Board can be made for the complete erection of the building, and the payment of the Architect's fees not to exceed the sum named, the Architect presenting such plans shall be engaged for the work, and his compensation for plans and superintendence shall be four per cent. of the amount of such contract. TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on

such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
