





The 665 deaths represent a death-rate of 17.59 against 19.40 for the previous week and 19.21 for the corresponding week of 1893.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a considerable increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 103, 24, 38, 27 and 5 against 98, 14, 17, 26 and 9 for the previous week, a total of 197 against 164. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Tenth and Sixteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Eleventh Ward. The increase of measles was most marked in the Tenth and Twelfth Wards, and the decrease in the Fourteenth Ward. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Twelfth Ward, the disease remaining stationary elsewhere. Fourteen of the 27 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 6 of the remaining 13 were below East Fourteenth street. Three of the five cases of small-pox were between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, West, and the remaining 2 were below Fourteenth street, East.
