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THAT WAS HARDER THAN THE LSAT

Welcome to another edition of what is, by default, the #1 most popular municipal ethics-themed puzzle newsletter in America: the *Public Service Puzzler!* Last month, we told the story of three very ethical public servants: Arthur, Beowulf, and Calliope. Big fans of <u>Chapter 68 of the City Charter</u>, these coworkers met up after work to brush up on some of their ethics knowledge; before starting, though, Calliope posed a question — a brain-teaser, really — to get everyone's thinking caps working:

"My birthday is one of these dates," she said.

May 15, May 16, May 19
June 17, June 18
July 14, July 16
August 14, August 15, August 17

Calliope then tells Arthur the *month* she was born. She tells Beowulf the *day*. Arthur replies, "I don't know when Calliope's birthday is, but I know Beowulf doesn't know either!" Which prompts Beowulf to state, "at first I didn't know when Calliope's birthday was — but I know now." Finally, Arthur responds, "OK, well, then I also know when Calliope's birthday is."

The question was: when is Calliope's birthday? We received an unprecedented number of submissions, but there could be only one winner. In this case, <u>NOWSHIN</u> FARA of <u>COMMUNITY BOARD 17 IN BROOKLYN</u>, who was randomly selected from among the correct answers of July 16th. How'd they get July 16th?

Answer: Puzzles like this rely on not just the information that each person in the puzzle knows, but **what they know about what the other person knows**. Arthur is the first to speak and, knowing the month, says "I don't know when Calliope's birthday is, but I know Beowulf doesn't know either!"

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So how can Arthur know that Beowulf *doesn't* know when Calliope's birthday is? To answer that, you'd have to know how Beowulf (who only knows the day) could know when her birthday is if he doesn't know the month. *The only way he could know* is if the day is one that only appears once in the entire list. So, for instance, if Calliope's birthday were May 19th or June 18th, Beowulf would know exactly when her birthday was just from the date alone. Since Arthur knows that Beowulf doesn't know when her birthday is, it must be because her birthday is not in May or June (and thus cannot be the 18th or 19th).

Easy, right? Let's keep going.

In the second step, Beowulf says, "At first I didn't know when Calliope's birthday was, but now I do." For that to happen, there must be a day that only appears once in the remaining months. This means that her birthday can't be on the 14th, because Beowulf still wouldn't know which month it was. So it must be the 15th, 16th, or 17th, because Beowulf could pick the exact month based only on the day.

At this point, Arthur says, "Then I also know when Calliope's birthday is!" The only way he could know that is if there's only one date left in the month that he was told by Calliope. So her birthday must be July 16th!

Congratulations to everyone who was able to figure out the correct answer, even if you weren't this month's winner! The good thing about the Puzzler is there's always another opportunity to sign your name forever in the **JONATHAN HOFFMAN + PETER KONTOGIANNIS HALL OF ETHICS AND EXCELLENCE**. - 11. The City employee with the text of Chapter 68 also has the MuniciPALS and Attorney of the Day videos.
- 12. The City employee in the first chair has the Annual Report and Tabletop Roleplaying Game.
- 13. Only two City employees have the Tabletop Roleplaying Game.
- 14. Sam has Alex Runs for Office and the Tabletop Roleplaying Game.
- 15. Luke has exactly two *types* of training materials.
- 16. The It's All About Ethics video is held by only two employees.
- 17. The Annual Report is held by a single employee.
- 18. Only one employee sitting next to Nick has the Attorney of the Day video.
- 19. Sam's seat is not the first or last.
- 20. Hank has no silly videos and does not have a copy of the Public Hearing Archive.
- 21. Paul has exactly three silly videos.
