AN ORDINANCE to permit Mrs. Marianna A. Ogden to build a retaining-wall.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

That permission be and the same is hereby given to Mrs. Marianna A. Ogden to build a stone wall not to exceed four and one-half feet in height along the westerly line of Aqueduct avenue, as now laid out, on what is known as the area or stoop-line of the property owned by her; said wall to extend from the "Gate-house," so-called, northerly to the line of the land of the Estate of James Lees, as shown on the accompanying diagram; the work to be done at her own expense, and at the pleasure of the Municipal Assembly, under such directions as shall be given by the Department of Highways, who may appoint an Inspector thereon, and one of the City Surveyors.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said ordinance.

#### QUESTION OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE.

At this point Alderman Woodward asked for the floor on a question of personal privilege and read the following statement:

No. 2958.

In the morning papers of June 14, 1899, appears what purports to be a statement made by me. While the language used in the published statements is not exactly as I worded it, it is, excepting the reports thereof contained in two papers, substantially correct.

I do not entertain the contempt for the courts which one paper gratuitously accorded me; I am here to obey the law, not to violate or defy it; but I do not believe any court can, within its jurisdiction, order the Board of Aldermen, or me as a member of it, to vote aye on any resolution which may come up for consideration. I believe they may order us to consider a matter and compel us to vote upon it, and justly so, but when it gets down to the voting, each member has the undoubted right to vote as it seems to him the merits of the case warrant. If, however, I am in error, and our prerogatives in these matters are purely ministerial, the sooner we are advised of it the better.

If it can be definitely determined that we have only ministerial power—that power which compels the legislature of the Greater New York to vote aye, when some individual, commissioner or department instructs us to—I will be one of the first to advocate that these alleged "powers" be taken from us, as I do not think that it adds to our utility to be compelled to act on the automatic system—that of some one pushing the button and we doing the rest.

I don't propose to pass an opinion at this time as to the reason or reasons those voting against certain resolutions may have for voting as they did or do, as they are responsible to themselves and their respective constituencies.

As for myself, my record speaks for itself. I have always been an ardent advocate of public improvements, and that fact appears from the minutes of this Board.

Alderman Woodward asked for consent to make his statement a part of the record, which was granted and it was ordered on file.

#### COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE COUNCIL AGAIN RESUMED.

No. 2959.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby granted to the Nassau Brewing Company to lay a single railroad track across the sidewalks on the west side of Franklin avenue, midway between Dean and Bergen streets, and on the east side of West Fifth street, about two hundred feet north of Sheepshead Bay road, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for the purpose of connecting their building with the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad tracks on said streets, provided, however, that the same is done under the direction and supervision of the Deputy Commissioner of Highways in Brooklyn; the said Nassau Brewing Company to bear the whole expense of said work, and this permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Municipal Assembly.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution. Which was decided in the affirmative.

No. 2960.

Whereas, The Ocean Electric Railway Company has presented to the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York its application in writing for a grant of the franchise or right to use certain streets, avenues and highways in Far Rockaway, in the Fifth Ward of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, for street railway purposes, and for the construction, maintenance and operation of a double-track street surface railroad through and upon the surface of said streets, and that the local authorities of said city give public notice thereof and of the time and place when and where it will be first considered; it is

Resolved, if the Board of Aldermen concur, That Friday, the 14th day of July, 1899, at two o'clock in the afternoon, at the Chamber of the Council in the City Hall of The City of New York, be and they hereby are designated as the time and place when and where the said application of the Ocean Electric Railway Company to the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York for a grant of the right or franchise to use certain streets, avenues and highways in Far Rockaway, in the Fifth Ward of the Borough of Queens, in said city, for street railway purposes, and for the construction, maintenance and operation of a double-track street surface railroad upon and along the surface of the said streets, avenues and highways in said application mentioned, in the manner and form as are particularly set forth in said application and therein described, will be first considered, and that the City Clerk shall cause public notice thereof to be published for at least fourteen days in two of the daily newspapers published in The City of New York, to be designated in writing therefor by his Honor the Mayor, according to the provisions of the laws in such case made and provided; such notice to be published at the expense of the applicant.

Resolved, further, That the notice to be published by said City Clerk shall be substantially in form and manner as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the Sheridan Boulevard and Mott avenue, in the Fifth Ward of the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York (formerly the Village of Far Rockaway); thence along Mott avenue to St. James street; thence along St. James street to Cornaga avenue, and across Cornaga avenue to the Turnpike; thence along the Turnpike to South street, and along South street to the easterly end thereof, and from the intersection of the Turnpike and South street, along South street, to Central avenue; and thence along Central avenue one hundred and fifty feet north of Mott avenue; and along the portions of Clark and Lockwood streets between Central avenue and the Turnpike, all in said Fifth Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York.

Route No. 2. Beginning at the intersection of the Sheridan Boulevard with the village line of said village of Far Rockaway; thence along the Sheridan Boulevard to Mott avenue; thence across Mott avenue to Oak place; thence through Oak place to Willow place; thence along Willow place to Holly Wood avenue; thence along Holly Wood avenue to Cornaga avenue; thence along Cornaga avenue to Ocean avenue; thence along Ocean avenue to Franklin street; and thence along Franklin street to Channel avenue; and thence along Channel avenue to the railroad track; and thence through private property parallel to the railroad track to the village line; and also from the intersection of Franklin avenue and Channel avenue, along Channel avenue to Ocean avenue; and thence along Ocean avenue to Bayswater avenue; and thence along Bayswater avenue to the Sheridan Boulevard, all in said Fifth Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York.

That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 24th day of May, 1899, be and the same hereby is approved, and the public work or improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized, and it is hereby determined that the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid as therein provided; namely,

Resolved, by the Board of Public Improvements, That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the grading, curbing, laying of crosswalks, guttering, and paving of the carriageway, with belgian-block pavement, of Sackman street, from Eastern parkway to Livonia avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways, be and the same hereby is authorized and approved, there having been presented to said Board an estimate in writing, in such detail as the said Board has directed, of the cost of the proposed work or improvement, and a statement of the assessed value, according to the last preceding tax-roll, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, the estimated cost of said work being twenty-two thousand five hundred dollars. By Alderman Goodman—

The petition of the undersigned respectfully represents that the German Housewives' Society is duly incorporated, its members being associated together for charitable purposes, pursuant to and in conformity with an act of the Legislature of the State of New York passed May 8, 1895, entitled "An Act relating to Membership Corporations" and the several acts of the said Legislature amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto.

That the particular objects for which the corporation is formed are:

To procure proper and suitable positions or employment for servants who are members, according to their ability, etc.

To provide suitable and proper servants and assistants to employers who are members.

To advance the friendly intercourse between employer and employee.

To operate and maintain a school wherein cooking and kitchen work are taught.

It is further represented that since the society began its work, September 1, 1896, applicants for positions aggregated 4,842.

That 2,569 were provided with positions. That, upon examination, it was found that 2,275 could not be consistently recommended.

That, on September 1, 1897, a home for friendless girls was established, in which 139 girls have been quartered.

That premiums are paid for continuous faithful service as a means of encouragement, and that in two years \$360 has been expended in that direction.

That free medical treatment and free medicine have been afforded to a number of servants.

That the present membership is over four hundred, among whom are many well known and prominent in the commercial world, in professional life and in social circles.

The objects of the society, as above recited, and its record of work done in the brief period of its existence prompt, and we believe justify, us to ask from the city authorities some aid in the field of effort in which we are engaged.

We respectfully request that the Municipal Assembly cause an investigation into existing conditions, with a view of bettering the general surroundings of hired help, of creating between mistress and servant a more thorough appreciation of the necessity and advantage of mutual interest, and of protecting each against unfairness and injustice, practiced by one against the other.

We submit:

That laws should be formulated which will provide a system, such as is in vogue in Europe in many places, by which each applicant for a servant's position can and must present credentials as to character, etc., duly and officially certified to.

That will protect the honest and faithful, and minimize the number of dishonest and faithless. That will afford to all domestics every right and equity in law that the mistress enjoys, yet will not give the former more consideration and privilege than is accorded to the latter.

That the entire subject of mistress and servant be looked into from an impartial standpoint, in order that both may have the benefits and advantages which modifications of existing law will afford, based upon testimony of the experienced in each and both sides of this much mooted public question.

The petition of the Ocean Electric Railway Company respectfully shows:

I.—That your petitioner is a street surface railroad corporation duly organized and incorporated under and in pursuance of an act of the Legislature of the State of New York, entitled "The Railroad Law."

II.—That the said corporation proposes to build, construct, maintain and operate a street surface railroad for public use in the conveyance of persons and property in cars, for compensation, in the Fifth Ward of the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, upon and along the surface of the following streets, avenues and highways in said ward, borough and city:

Route No. 1. Beginning at the intersection of the Sheridan Boulevard and Mott avenue, in the Fifth Ward of the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York (formerly the Village of Far Rockaway); thence along Mott avenue to St. James street; thence along St. James street to Cornaga avenue, and across Cornaga avenue to the Turnpike; thence along the Turnpike to South street, and along South street to the easterly end thereof, and from the intersection of the Turnpike and South street, along South street to Central avenue; and thence along Central avenue one hundred and fifty feet north of Mott avenue, and along the portions of Clark and Lockwood streets, between Central avenue and the Turnpike, all in said Fifth Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York.

Route No. 2. Beginning at the intersection of the Sheridan Boulevard with the village line of said Village of Far Rockaway; thence along the Sheridan Boulevard to Mott avenue; thence across Mott avenue to Oak place; thence through Oak place to Willow place; thence along Willow place to Holly Wood avenue; thence along Holly Wood avenue to Cornaga avenue; thence along Cornaga avenue to Ocean avenue; thence along Ocean avenue to Franklin street; and thence along Franklin street to Channel avenue; and thence along Channel avenue to the railroad track; and then ce through private property parallel to the railroad track to the village

line; and also from the intersection of Franklin avenue and Channel avenue, along Channel avenue to Ocean avenue; and thence along Ocean avenue to Bayswater avenue; and thence along Bayswater avenue to the Sheridan Boulevard, all in said Fifth Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York.

III.—That the railroad proposed to be built, constructed, maintained and operated by your petitioner, as hereinbefore set forth, is intended to be operated by electricity, or any motive power other than locomotive steam power, which now, or at any time hereafter, may lawfully be used and employed on its route.

IV.—Your petitioner further shows that heretofore, on the 24th day of May, 1897, the Board of Trustees of the former Village of Far Rockaway, in the County of Queens, within the territorial limits of which village the streets and highways above described as the route of the railroad of your petitioner are wholly located, did grant to your petitioner their assent and approval to the construction, operation and maintenance of the railroad of your petitioner over the streets and highways above named; but your petitioner is informed and believes that it is necessary that it should also obtain the consent of your Honorable Body to enable it to construct, maintain and operate the railroad aforesaid, and, accordingly, your petitioner now applies to your Honorable Body for such consent.

Wherefore, your petitioner prays and makes application to the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York for its consent and permission to be granted to your petitioner, its successor, successors, lessees and assigns, to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railroad for public use through, upon and along the avenues, streets and highways above set forth and described, together with all necessary connections, switches, sidings, turnouts, turntables, cross-overs and suitable stands for the convenient working of said railroad and for the accommodation of the company's cars which may be run over said railroad by your petitioner, its successors, lessees or assigns; and also that consent and permission be granted to your petitioner, its successors, lessees or assigns, to the erection upon said streets, avenues and highways of the necessary poles and the stringing of wires, so that the cars of said company may be used by the means or power of electricity.

No. 2990.—(G. O. 320.)

NEW YORK, May 2, 1899.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

The undersigned, Joint Committee on Public Health and on Docks and Ferries, have given due consideration to the following preamble and resolution, referred to us:

"Whereas, The Recreation Piers established in this city have been productive of much good and have proven beneficial breathing spots for the poor residing in the neighborhood where they are severally located; and

"Whereas, There is a popular demand for the public use of these piers during the winter season, as well as during the summer months; a demand which would doubtless be met and gratified were funds available; therefore

"Resolved, That the Committees on Health and on Docks and Piers—forming a joint committee—be and they are hereby instructed to confer with the proper authorities and departments, with a view of bringing about the results desired, though it be necessary to curtail the benefits thereof to some extent.

"Resolved, That said joint committee take proper steps to influence the necessary demand for adequate appropriation in the provisional estimate for the coming year, now under consideration, in order that the Recreation Piers may be devoted to winter use thereafter, to the fullest extent desired by the public.

"Resolved, further, That said joint committee shall also advocate and urge sufficient appropriation for building and establishing additional Recreation Piers at such points throughout the greater city as will meet the requirements and necessities of the neighborhood where the poor are most generally located.

"Resolved, That the joint committee shall report to this Board from time to time, showing what progress has been made, and shall introduce such resolutions or ordinances as will best serve the purpose of the foregoing, and provide all the legislative aid which the Municipal Assembly can render."

We are in full sympathy with the spirit of the foregoing, and believe all that is therein asked for should be complied with by the city authorities to the fullest extent.

We are gratified to report that additional Recreation Piers have been provided for, and that the Department of Docks and Ferries is disposed to continue locating these much-needed, health-promoting structures along our river front to the most liberal extent.

We are also pleased to state that the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment are all thoroughly impressed with the advisability of granting material aid, and will do so to a most satisfactory degree.

As to the proposition to heat these piers during the winter season, and thus utilize them at all times, much can be said favorable thereto. By attracting the poor to these places, and thus creating a love for the influences which the refining and elevating conditions and surroundings will occasion, is a long step in the right direction. To make these piers the rendezvous for men, women and children in the several neighborhoods of the poor, and to establish a plan or system of education for their moral and intellectual advancement, is worthy our earnest consideration and our most hearty support.

Under proper care of and supervision by the police, the respectable character of the piers will be maintained. The Board of Education and other city departments can and ought to be urged and induced to utilize the available and spacious quarters thus at their disposal for purposes of the most beneficial character, in many obvious ways.

Special Order No. 33, which has been on our calendar of unfinished business for many months, provides for adequate heating of one of the piers, the largest one of all.

As the reasons for the authorization asked for is not fully understood by our Board, we present herewith the following copy of a communication addressed to the President of the Board of Aldermen in 1897, which explains in the most satisfactory manner the causes which have prompted the request for legislative assistance on our part.

"OCTOBER 21, 1897.

"Hon. JOHN JEROLAMAN, President, Board of Aldermen:

"SIR—Under the present arrangement it is costing this Department about \$13,500 per annum to light the Recreation Pier at the foot of East Twenty-fourth street, and as the plans for



enclosing the building and using it in winter as well as in summer have been approved by the Board, it is estimated that it will cost about from \$10,000 to \$12,000 a year to heat the structure.

"In order that the structure may be maintained as economically as possible, the Department believes it to be for the best interests of the City that it establish its own electrical plant on the pier for the lighting and heating of the premises. The installation of the two plants will cost about \$35,000, and for this amount can be obtained the most economical plant possible for the purpose. The saving on the lighting alone will amount to about \$9,000 a year.

"The devices that will be needed for lighting, and a great many of those for heating, as well as the boilers required, are patented articles, and it would be illegal for this Department to specify them in an advertised contract; consequently we would be restricted to the old types of generators, the patents on which have long since expired; to plain, uneconomical cylindrical boilers, and we would entirely fail in being able to obtain modern electrical lamps for lighting purposes.

"I have been directed to request your Honorable Body to authorize this Department to incur the necessary expense for the installation of the heating and lighting plants otherwise than by contract.

We recommend the adoption of said Special Order No. 33. We also offer the following:  
Resolved, That the Commissioners of Docks and Ferries be and they are respectfully urged to locate Recreation Piers wherever the conditions of the surrounding neighborhood warrant it, and to do so at the earliest practical period.

Resolved, That the Board of Education be and is requested to co-operate with the Department of Docks and Ferries, with a view of preparing and completing arrangements during the summer months for a series of educational lectures, etc., at these piers during the season of winter.

Resolved, That the Park Department be requested to likewise co-operate with the Board of Commissioners of Docks and Ferries to place upon the piers next winter plants of various kinds; and to educate the near-by residents in botany, etc., and to teach them the benefits of cultivating a taste therefor.

#### BOARD OF LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS.

#### BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

The Local Board of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, held its regular weekly meeting in the Hackett Building, corner of Fifth street and Jackson avenue, Long Island City, May 26, 1899.

Present—Alderman William T. James and President of the Borough Frederick Bowley.



Minutes approved.

Upon consent of both sides, the hearing of complaint against the New York and Queens County Railway Company to remove its tracks off the sidewalks at Fiske avenue and Grand street, in Maspeth, was again laid over. The company claims to have made application for permit to change its route.

As no response was made by complainant against the trolley tracks in College Point, same was laid over.

Petition to make Grove street and Washington street in Maspeth passable was ordered to be recorded as withdrawn.

Public hearing was given on the matters set forth in the following petitions:

To flag part of Hempstead and Jamaica Plank road in Hollis, Fourth Ward.

To pave parts of Seventh street, between Vernon avenue and West avenue, First Ward.

To legally open Kouwenhoven street, or Ninth avenue, from Flushing avenue to Jackson avenue, First Ward.

To sewer, grade, pave, etc., and to lay water-mains and erect fire-hydrants in Ninth avenue, from Broadway to Graham avenue, First Ward.

On motion, action on the petition to flag sidewalks in Hollis deferred for one week, as was also in the matter of petition to pave parts of Seventh street, First Ward.

The following were duly adopted:

Whereas, Petition to legally open Ninth avenue, or Kouwenhoven street, from Flushing avenue to Jackson avenue, in First Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, was submitted to the Local Board of borough aforementioned, and public hearing had thereon, and said Board approving of such proceedings being instituted, does and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board does hereby recommend to the Board of Public Improvements the legal opening of the street or avenue as above named, as such is deemed by it to be for the public interest.

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did submit for the consideration of this the Local Board thereof at its meeting this 26th day of May, 1899, a petition of owners of real estat. along Kouwenhoven street or Ninth avenue, from Broadway to Graham avenue, in First Ward of borough as aforementioned, asking that a public sewer be constructed therein; and

Whereas, After public hearing thereon had, it appearing to this Board that such improvement should be made; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and the same is hereby made to the Board of Public Improvements, that it initiate the necessary proceedings whereby such sewer will be promptly built; and also the following:

Whereas, The owners of real estate along Ninth avenue or Kouwenhoven street, from Broadway to Graham avenue, in the First Ward of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did deliver to the President of the borough aforementioned a petition to grade, regulate, pave, curb and flag fronting the lands abutting said avenue and street and from and to the points as aforesaid; and

Whereas, Said petition having been submitted to and for the consideration of this Local Board at meeting May 26, 1899, and public hearing held thereon, and it appearing to our satisfaction that to so improve said avenue would be for the best interests of said city; now, be it accordingly

Resolved, That recommendation be and the same is hereby made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it initiate proceedings whereby the requirements of the petitioners will be promptly responded to.

The following, relating to supply of water, were duly adopted:

Whereas, Petition to cause the laying of public water-mains in Camelia street, from the Boulevard to Crescent, in First Ward, this Borough, were submitted to this the Local Board of the Borough of Queens at its meeting of May 26, 1899; and,

Whereas, The requirements of the petitioners claim the favorable action thereon of this Board; therefore, be it

Resolved, That recommendation be and the same is hereby made to the Board of Public Improvements; that it extend to the matter such consideration as will advance same so that city water-mains, with fire-hydrants connected therewith, may be promptly placed in street as aforesaid; also,

Whereas, Broadway, from the Boulevard at the East river and extending to the Old Bowery Bay road, the dividing line between the First and Second Wards of this Borough, as also Grand avenue, beginning at Main street, and by a block of the latter makes a connection with the Boulevard, and from Main street, running easterly extends also to aforesaid boundary line, are two important highways which to a considerable extent have been sewered, graded, paved and flagged, have trolley lines operating thereon and have electric lighting, but are deficient in not having the public water supply mains with fire hydrants extended throughout the entire length thereof.

Now, in view of the foregoing, be and it is

Resolved, That this the Local Board of the Borough of Queens, in meeting assembled this 26th day of May, 1899, deeming that the placing of public water mains with fire hydrants attached thereto throughout Broadway and Grand avenue, wherever the same is not already done, would be to the best interests of the City, do accordingly recommend the same to the Board of Public Improvements, for its favorable action thereon towards having the subject matter of the foregoing promptly attended to.

The following was also adopted:

Whereas, Petition has been submitted to this Board on the 26th day of May, 1899, for its indorsement of the request to have public lighting furnished to that section of Elmhurst as therein described; and

Whereas, The petition shows that the lands in said section have been mapped and laid out for the sale thereof, and make claim that such lighting would facilitate such disposition thereof, whereupon such lands would be promptly improved upon and thereby the valuations for the purposes of city taxation would be greatly increased; now, in view of the foregoing, be it

Resolved, That recommendation be and it is hereby made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it give the same favorable consideration, to the extent to which existing and prospective circumstances and conditions in connection therewith may warrant.

The following was also adopted:

Resolved, That this Board hereby again declares its appreciation of the urgent necessity that exists for the prompt establishment in this borough of great extent of territory of a branch of the Topographical Bureau of The City of New York.

The President made statement that at the meeting of the Board of Public Improvements on Wednesday last, report from the Chief of Expert Bureau of Finance Department was read, giving date, etc., in the matter of Tuohy & Co. of Flushing, claiming the right to be recognized as the contractors to construct sewer in Ingleside District, and that the matter was referred by said Board to the Corporation Counsel for his determination of the obligations of this city, from the facts as they existed prior to January 1, 1898; whereupon, it was

Ordered, That communication on behalf of this Board be addressed to the Corporation Counsel, urging him to give the subject his earliest consideration, as the requirements of said district for sewers so demands.

Adjourned to June 2, 1899.

### BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

IN BOARD OF EXAMINERS, MAY 31, 1899.

The Board of Examiners met this day at 2.30 P. M.

Present—Thomas J. Brady, Commissioner of Buildings for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (in the chair), and Messrs. Dobbs, Moore, Fryer, Conover, O'Reilly, Croker and McMillan.

Absent—Mr. Post.

The minutes of May 23, 1899, were read, and, on motion, approved.

Petitions were then submitted for approval, as follows:

Plan 69, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow the street and Riverside drive front walls to be built 12 inches in thickness, of brick for the four top stories, or 44 feet 5 inches from top of roof beams, 16 inches of brick for three stories, of 34 feet 6 inches and 20 inches, including 4-inch ashlar, for second story and down to first-story sill course, or 21 feet 7 inches, making a total distance from first-story sill course of 100 feet 6 inches to top of roof beams, of which 44 feet 5 inches is 12-inch wall, and 56 feet 1 inch is 16-inch, exclusive of stone ashlar, as stated in petition; east side of Riverside drive and Eighty-fourth street, northeast corner. Petitioner, George Keister. Approved on condition that a regular header is run not over 16 inches apart.

That, through the courtesy of Horace Loomis, Engineer of the Department of Sewers, copies of the report of Rudolph Hering on the Sewerage System of The City of New York, together with recommendations, May 31, 1889, were furnished this Bureau. An effort will be made to obtain similar information to the close of the year 1898 from the different boroughs of the city. The Bureau is also promised a map of the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx from the Department of Highways, which will show the variety of pavement used in the streets of these two boroughs.

That statistical and administration reports have been received from various municipal governments of the United States and of Europe, which are being included in the library of this office and will no doubt offer satisfactory material for information and comparison to all students of sociology and others interested in the development of this municipality. From several of these reports, such as, for instance: Yearly report of Berlin, 1896, published in 1898; yearly report of Vienna, 1895, published in 1897; Report of the Bureau of Municipal Statistics of Paris, 1896, published in 1898; year book of Leipzig, 1897, published in 1899, it will readily be seen that we are not behindhand but will be in advance of the larger cities of the world if we publish before the close of the year our annual volume for 1898. But, in order to do this, we require complete reports from all the city departments, the various branches of the judiciary, and the collection of all other information, statistical or otherwise, contemplated by the Legislature in enacting sections 135, 136 and 137 of the Charter, and which it may be deemed advisable to publish. It remains for the Commission to make their request of the various departments of the City Government and the various branches of the judiciary, through his Honor the Mayor, and with his approval, for statistical information upon blanks or otherwise. Of these blanks over two hundred manuscript pages have already been provided and approved by the Commission, and others are in course of preparation. When plans are all thoroughly outlined by the Commission for the collection and publication of statistical data deemed advisable to be published, then the Bureau can go ahead and take charge of their execution and attend to the collection, tabulation and publication of the reports, for which purpose, in the absence of such outlines, the groundwork has already been laid in great part by the Chief of the Bureau. When this work shall have been thoroughly performed, there will only remain to be obtained the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the publication of the annual volume.

I desire, however, to call your attention to the fact that this Bureau has now a force of but four assistants and an office boy, besides the Chief of the Bureau, to carry out the work required of it by section 137, chapter 378, Laws of 1897.

The Board, after considering such application, denies the same, and holds that a person who is a candidate for any office to be voted for at a primary election is ineligible for appointment as Inspector of Election, and his acceptance of the nomination for office at such primary election would be sufficient to vacate his office of Inspector of Election.  
The other request referred to by Mr. Atterbury, to wit, the right of enrollment for persons who had enlisted in the United States service during the late war with Spain, has been heretofore decided by the Board.

Communication having been received from Hon. Theodore Roosevelt, Governor, calling the attention of the Board to a communication received by him from the widow of Henry J. Eberman, late a member of the New York City Police Force, and who died from disease contracted during his service in the United States Army during the late war with Spain, the Board makes reply: Mr. Eberman was excused by the Police Department for the purpose of enlisting in the service of the United States during such war, and salary paid during all the time of service therein. The widow of Eberman subsequently applied for a pension, and the Board declined to allow such pension for the reason that Eberman was a member of the Police Force for three years, and under the law the Board is powerless to grant a pension to the widow of a deceased member of the force who has served less than ten years in its membership, unless he should have died from wounds or injuries received in the actual performance of his duties as a member of the Police Force. For this reason, therefore, the Board regret that it was compelled to deny the application. The only relief that can be had by Mrs. Eberman would be through an act of the Legislature enlarging the power of the Board in a matter of this kind. The Chief Clerk is directed to transmit, in the name of the Board, the foregoing statement to the Governor.
