FIRE DEPARTMENT.

REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDED JUNE 30, 1915.

Financial.

The budget appropriations made to this Department in the several Boroughs for the year 1915 aggregated \$9,243,535.22. Of this amount there was expended during the second quarter the sum of \$2,287,646.30, which, added to the outlay for the first quarter (\$2,144,558.58), made a total for the first half of the year of \$4,432,204.88, leaving a balance of \$4,811,330.34 for use during the remainder of the year.

Uniformed Force. On June 30, 1915, the membership of the uniformed force in all Boroughs totalled 4,966. Included in this number are 74 Chief Officers, ten being Medical Officers. There are also 4 Chaplains.

At the close of the quarter there were in service 296 companies, assigned to 44 battalions. The number of companies has not increased over the total in service at the close of the corresponding period of 1914.

During the second quarter 3.846 alarms for fire were received, of which 349 were false or unnecessary. For actual fires 3,137 alarms were received. Of this number 2.463 were confined to the buildings in which they originated; 56 extended to other buildings; 266 fires occurred in places other than buildings and 12 on vessels in the harbor. There were two small frame structures destroyed by fire. The estimated quantity of water used for fire extinguishing purposes was 17,422,225 gallons; 10,622,307 being salt water.

During the quarter 25 ununiformed firemen, having satisfactorily completed their probationary period of service, were appointed fourth-grade firemen. There were no appointments of ununiformed firemen, nor were there any promotions in the firefighting force during the second quarter.

The number of retirements, on application, was 14, on one-half pay; for disability there were 7 on one-half pay and 4 on one-third pay. The aggregate number of retirements was 25, with a total pension allowance of \$21,200, against a total of 14 for the corresponding period of 1914, involving a yearly outlay of \$13,733.32.

The resignations numbered 7. the dismissals 8 and the reinstatements 5. There were 4 deaths of men on the active list and 10 among those retired or

There were 530 cases of illness and 169 of injury treated by the Medical Officers, 699 in all, and the time lost from each cause was 9.031 and 2.931 days respectively. a total of 11.962 days. The combined total of these cases for the second quarter of the year 1914 was 634 and the time lost therefrom 9.483 days.

The civilian force on June 30, 1915, numbered 774 Fire Alarm Telegraph.

At the close of the second quarter the fire alarm telegraph system in the various Boroughs consisted in mileage of cable and conductors in subways, and of aerial conductors and circuit mileage (the latter both underground and aerial), as follows:

During the quarter there were tested at factories 701.719 feet of conductor and 85,453 of cable. The total length of cable installed was 57,097 feet and of installed cable tested, 124,735 feet.

Fire Prevention.

The estimated fire loss for the second quarter of the year 1915 was \$331,320 less and the number of fires 257 less than for the corresponding period of 1914.

During the period covered by this report 40,199 inspections were made by the various divisions of the Bureau of Fire Prevention; 3,465 orders were served or mailed covering 7,358 items and 3.486 were complied with, covering 6.946 items. Fire Appliances.

During the second quarter in this Division 15,842 inspections were made 2,157 orders were served or mailed containing 3,250 items and 2,538 orders were complied with covering 4,333 items. Plans, 587 in all, for the installation of standpipes, sprinklers, fire escapes, etc., were filed.

Places of Public Assembly.

The inspection force of the Division of Places of Public Assembly, during the second quarter of the current year, made 1,543 original inspections. The reinspec tions during the same period numbered 9,937, of which 6,584 were of motion picture shows and 2,960 of theatres.

The number of standee violations reported during the quarter was 16, which, with 16 pending from the preceding quarter, made a total of 32, of which 13 wer disposed of by fine or otherwise, leaving 19 pending at the close of the quarter. The number of orders served or mailed during the quarter was 218, embracing

564 items. Orders to the number of 193 were complied with, covering 489 items.

Combustibles and Explosives.

In the Division of Combustibles, all Boroughs, the amount of receipts for licenses and permits was \$40.805.50. an increase of \$6,492.50 over the total received for the corresponding period of 1914. Surveys to the number of 3.788 were made, on application, to determine the fitness of premises for the storage of combustibles and of explosive materials. Blasting operations to the number of 2,955 were supervised by civilian inspectors of blasting, and in 8,211 cases by members of the uniformed force, an aggregate of 11,166. Orders totalling 1,090 were served or mailed. involving 3,544 items and 755 orders were complied with, involving 2.124 items. Inspections totalling 12.877 were made. Permits, 9,120 in all, were issued.

Fires and Losses.

In the Division of Fire Marshal, Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Rich mond, during the second quarter, there were 2.015 fires, with a total estimated loss of \$754,604, representing an average loss per fire of \$374.49.

In the Division of Fire Marshal, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, during the same period, there were 1.122 fires, with a total estimated loss of \$529,850, and an average loss per fire of \$472.24.

The total estimated loss by fire during the second quarter of 1915, in all boroughs was \$1.284,454. During the corresponding period of 1914, the total estimated loss was \$1,615,774. There was a decrease of \$331,320, as compared with the loss for

the second quarter of 1914. The total number of fires in the second quarter of 1915 was 3,137 as against 3,394, during the corresponding period of 1914, a decrease of 257.

The average loss per fire for the second quarter of 1915 was \$409.45 as against \$476.07 for the like period of 1914.

Arson.

During the second quarter of the current year in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, there were 6 arrests for arson, which with 11 pending from the preceding quarter made the number to be disposed of 17. Of this total 4 of those apprehended were found guilty and sentenced, 2 were acquitted, in 2 cases the Grand Jury failed to indict, and one of those arrested was discharged on recommendation of the Grand Jury, leaving 8 under indictment and awaiting trial.

In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens during the same period, there were

4 arrests for arson, which with 12 pending from the preceding quarter made 16 cases to be disposed of. Of this number there were 3 convicted and 1 was acquitted, leaving 12 cases pending at the colse of the quarter,

There were in all boroughs 10 arrests for arson during the second quarter of 1915, a similar number to that for the corresponding period of 1914.

The number of convictions during the second quarter of 1915 was 7, as against 11 for the like period of 1914.

Apparatus and Hose.

During the period covered by this report, 9 regulation auto hose wagons were delivered under contract, as were also 22,500 feet of 2½-inch cotton fire hose. Buildings, Etc.

During the second quarter, 9 contracts were awarded at an aggregate cost of \$16,769.77 for alterations and repairs to quarters of Engine Companies 43, 52, 155, 205, 212, 231, 248, 249, 251, 258, 278 and Hook and Ladder Companies 115 and 119; for painting and repair work at quarters of Engine Companies 57, 66, 78, 85, 86 and 87; steam heating work at quarters of Engine Companies 64, 222, 233, 237 and 257; plumbing work at quarters of Engine Company 237; installing new electric lighting systems at quarters of Engine Companies 9, 11, 15, 21, 25, 70 and Hook and Ladder Company 6, and for furnishing and erecting lockers in quarters of Engine Companies 42, 95, 289, 292, 293 and Hook and Ladder Companies 50, 51, 139 and 141.

At the close of the quarter the department was prepared to invite bids at public letting for the following work, at the estimated cost stated: Laying cement floors at quarters of Engine Companies 201, 204 and 209 and Hook and Ladder Company 105, \$7,200; plumbing work in connection with the laying of such floors, \$600; iron work at quarters of Engine Companies 14, 34, 42, 59, 74, 237, 248, 258, 270, 271, 287, 294 and Hook and Ladder Companies 25, 104, 115, 124, 125 and 143, \$1,850, and installation of gasoline storage systems at quarters of Engine Companies 2, 10, 16, 34, 54, 65, 276 and Hook and Ladder Companies 17, 28, 35 and 118, \$2,400, an agregate of \$12,050.

Minor repair jobs, 249 in all, were done to buildings by Department mechanics, at an expenditure of \$9,493.21 and 55 by open market order at a cost of \$3,002.84.

Horses.

There were 1,025 horses in service at the close of the second quarter, a decrease of 210 as compared with the total at the close of the corresponding period of 1914, due to the progressive motorization of fire apparatus.

Stores. During the period covered by this report, 69 requisitions for furniture, linoleum, bedding, rugs, window shades, office cabinets, etc., calling for an expenditure of \$2,209.98, were turned over to the Division of Stores for investigation with a resulting saving of \$1,525.63. There were likewise investigated, preliminary to distribution to companies of supplies 297 requisitions, on which a saving was effected of \$2,651.94. The total saving for the quarter was \$4,177.57

Contracts and Open Market Orders.

Contracts executed for furnishing hose, apparatus, general and other supplies, coal, forage, and standard 3-inch iron pipe, for alterations and repairs to buildings, for installing electric lighting systems, for steam heating and plumbing work and for erecting lockers in various company quarters, amounted for the second quarter to \$165.924.69; joint contracts for the same period for furnishing forage and coal totaled \$7,180.96 and agreements entered into for furnishing general supplies and for repairs and alterations to company quarters to the total sum of \$1,953.99.

Contract orders to the number of 294 were issued, in the gross sum of \$214,-574.94 and 1.078 open market orders, involving an outlay of \$37,711.82. The number of open market orders issued during the second quarter of 1914 was 857, representing an expenditure of \$54,469.94.

There was thus an increase in the number of open market orders issued during the second quarter of 1915 as compared with that for the corresponding period of 1914, of 221, but a decrease in the outlay of \$16.758.12, or approximately 31 per cent.


