His Honor, the Mayor, New York City, N. Y.:

Sir—In view of the importance of your city from every standpoint and its fame, nationally and internationally, I am forwarding a copy of the ordinance passed by Baltimore, Md., concerning the "Star Spangled Banner."

As a matter worthy of consideration of all citizens of our country, will you not give it favorable consideration with the end in view of having your city pass a similar ordinance?

The whole object is to teach the idea to everyone, particularly young America, native or foreign born.

The City of Baltimore, Md.—Ordinance 167—July 7, 1916.  
AN ORDINANCE regulating the manner and places in which the "Star-Spangled Banner" may be played, sung or rendered.

Whereas, "The Star-Spangled Banner" is universally recognized as the national anthem of our country and has been adopted as such by both the War and Navy Departments of our government, and by reason of the fact that the City of Baltimore was the place of its composition, it is fitting that Baltimore should take suitable action to maintain its character as the national anthem; and

Whereas, The indiscriminate rendition of "The Star-Spangled Banner," or parts thereof, in connection with other compositions, tends to lower the esteem and reverence in which the national anthem should be held by the people of our nation, and to prevent its desecration; now, therefore,  
Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, That "The Star-Spangled Banner" shall not be played, sung or rendered in the City of Baltimore in any public place, or at any public entertainment, or in any theatre or moving-picture hall, restaurant or cafe, except as an entire and separate composition or number, without embellishments of national or other melodies, nor shall "The Star-Spangled Banner," or any part thereof, or selection from the same, be played as a part or selection of a medley of any kind, nor shall "The Star-Spangled Banner" be played at or in any of the places mentioned for dancing or as an exit march; and whenever and wherever practicable, the musicians, performers or other persons shall stand while playing, singing or rendering "The Star-Spangled Banner." Any person violating the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof before a court of competent jurisdiction of this State, shall be fined not more than one hundred dollars.

Sec. 2. And be it further ordained, No owner, proprietor or manager of any theatre, moving-picture hall, restaurant, cafe or other place in the City of Baltimore where the public gathers, shall permit or allow anyone playing, singing or performing therein to play, sing or render "The Star-Spangled Banner" in violation of the provisions of the foregoing section, and, in the event of any such permission or allowance, such owner, proprietor or manager, upon conviction thereof of aforesaid, shall be subject to the penalties imposed by the foregoing section.

Sec. 3. And be it further ordained, The City Librarian is hereby authorized and directed to have copies of this ordinance printed and distributed to all theatres, moving-picture halls, restaurants and cafes and to the offices of all musical unions or branches thereof in the City of Baltimore at least ten days before this ordinance

shall go into effect; the expenses thereof to be paid out of the funds of the City Librarian not otherwise appropriated.

President, Borough of Queens—Request for Authority to Draw on Account of Contingent Expenses.

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Queens, Long Island City, December 6, 1916.

To the Hon. Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Gentlemen—Your approval is hereby requested of a resolution authorizing this department to draw upon the Comptroller, by requisition, for the sum not exceeding five hundred (\$500) dollars for the purpose of additional expense applicable to this office for contingencies, such as postage stamps, expressage, etc., during the year 1917, upon condition that the same be renewed as often as necessary to the extent of the appropriation set apart to cover such expense, but that no renewal shall be made until the previous expenditure shall have been accounted for to the Comptroller by the transmittal of voucher or vouchers certified by the Borough President covering the expenditure previously made.

Every business building used as a *public* garage within the fire limits; every *public* garage within the suburban limits exceeding 600 square feet in area, or 15 feet in height, or not located as provided in section 91 of this chapter; and every *public* garage outside these restricted areas, over 40 feet in height;

#### Report of the Committee on Finance in Favor of Adopting Resolution Authorizing an Issue of Special Revenue Bonds, \$12,400, to Meet Deficits in Appropriations, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

The Committee on Finance, to which was referred on November 21, 1916 (Minutes, page 643), the annexed request of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for Special Revenue Bonds, \$16,000, to meet the deficits in the appropriations for fuel and medical and surgical supplies, respectfully

#### REPORTS:

That, having examined the subject, and basing its conclusions upon the annexed report of the Bureau of Contract Supervision, it recommends that the accompanying resolution be adopted.

Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of twelve thousand four hundred dollars (\$12,400), the proceeds whereof to be used by the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for the purpose of meeting deficits in appropriations for fuel and medical and surgical supplies:

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, Office of the Board of Trustees, 1st Avenue and 26th Street, New York, November 21, 1916.

Hon. FRANCIS L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Sir—The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals request the Board of Aldermen to authorize an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$16,000 to meet the deficits in the appropriations for fuel, and medical and surgical supplies.

The Department has entered into a contract for the purchase of No. 3 Buckwheat coal to be used in the power plant of Bellevue Hospital on the basis of completing certain boiler house equipment. The contractor for this work has failed to finish on time, and the Trustees under date of November 15th, declared the contract abandoned. As it is necessary to use until the new power plant equipment is installed some of the old boilers which cannot be heated effectively with No. 3 Buckwheat coal, it will be necessary to purchase No. 1 Buckwheat coal. The Department has no funds available for this purpose, and therefore requests your Board to authorize an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$4,000.

The General Drug Department of the Department of Public Charities has informed us that it is unable to deliver medical and surgical supplies required in the hospitals of this department as the appropriation for 1916 is exhausted. Funds for this purpose for 1916 for the use of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals were included in the 1916 Budget of the Department of Public Charities. As that department cannot furnish us with the medical and surgical supplies that are required, the Trustees request the Board of Aldermen to authorize an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$12,000 for this purpose. Sir—An investigation to determine the necessity for the funds requested developed the following facts:

Communications dated November 21, 1916, to the Board of Aldermen requesting the issue of \$12,000 special revenue bonds to meet deficits in appropriations for medical and surgical supplies.

The expenditures for medical and surgical supplies and equipment for the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals to November 1, 1916, have been as follows:

The budget allowance for 1916 for these two codes was:

Supplies, \$88,150; equipment, \$13,550.

On April 10, 1916, a communication was sent from the General Drug Department of the Department of Public Charities to the General Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, calling attention to the fact that the rate of expenditures for medical and surgical equipment would, if continued, exceed the appropriation for 1916. On June 27, 1916, a similar communication to the General Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals called attention to the expenditures and balance of the appropriations for medical and surgical supplies and medical and surgical equipment. Notwithstanding these communications, the quarterly expenditures for medical and surgical supplies have increased progressively without a proportionate increase in the activities of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

From this tabulation of activities and expenditures it would seem justifiable to raise the question whether the premature depletion of the appropriation for medical

and surgical supplies would not have been averted by careful supervision and control of the expenditures, rather than to attribute the lack of funds directly to a deficit in the 1916 appropriation.

The balance in this code on November 1, 1916, was \$4,747.61. The 1917 budget provides an average monthly allowance of \$6,583.33. The sum of \$8,400 is recommended to provide medical and surgical supplies for the remainder of the year. This allotment of sums is based on twice the average monthly allowance in 1917 budget, less the unexpended balance on November 1, 1916.

The budget allowance for the year 1916 to the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for coal was based upon the average yearly tonnage consumed, plus an additional allowance of 2,000 tons to provide for additional heating for new buildings. The cost per ton was based upon prices current at the time the budget was made and was for No. 1 buckwheat coal for the first three months and for No. 3 buckwheat coal for the remainder of the year. The budget also made provision for changing the grates and altering the boiler plants in order that the cheaper coal could be burned. This work has been completed in all other hospitals under the jurisdiction of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and the plants are in successful operation, except in Bellevue Hospital. The contractor for the work at Bellevue has abandoned his contract and it is not expected that the work can be completed before the end of the year.

Because of the increased cost of fuel and the necessity to burn No. 1 buckwheat coal at the Bellevue plant, the budget appropriation for coal is not sufficient to provide for the coal required until the end of the year.

It is estimated that besides the coal which can be provided by funds transferred from other accounts, it will be necessary to purchase one thousand (1,000) tons of No. 1 buckwheat coal. This coal will cost approximately four thousand dollars (\$4,000), the amount requested.

There appears to be need for additional funds as follows:

#### Report of the Committee on General Welfare in Favor of Filing an Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances Relating to "Licenses."

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on October 10, 1916 (Minutes, page 63), the annexed ordinance to amend section 144 of chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances relating to licenses, respectively

REPORTS:

That the Committee has been advised by the introducer, that it has been deemed advisable to submit an amended ordinance dealing more fully with the situation. The Committee, therefore, recommends that the accompanying ordinance be placed on file.

AN ORDINANCE to Amend Section 144 of Article 11 of Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances Relating to Licenses.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 144 of Article 11 of Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to licenses, is hereby amended to read as follows:

§144. Charges.

[1. *Special contract.* The amount to be charged for loading, transporting, or transmitting and unloading of merchandise, household or office furniture, or other bulky articles, by a public cartman, may be agreed upon in advance and such contract or agreement shall control and regulate the employment. In every case where such agreement is entered into, it shall be the duty of the public cartman to furnish the person with whom he contracts a written memorandum, to be signed by both parties, or their responsible and authorized representatives, setting forth clearly the terms of the contract. This memorandum shall be upon blanks to be approved by the department. (Id.)]

[2. *General.* The [legal rates] maximum rate for transporting merchandise, household or office furniture, or other bulky articles (other than pianos), including the loading and unloading thereof, [unless otherwise agreed upon as set forth in the foregoing paragraph], shall be as follows (said charges to commence from the time

of arrival of vehicle or vehicles at the place from which articles are to be transported, and to end when articles are delivered):

a. Where a vehicle drawn by 1 horse, and having an inside floor surface of at

least 40 square feet is used, \$1.25 per hour, said vehicle to be propelled at not less than 3 miles an hour;

b. Where a vehicle drawn by 2 or more horses, and having an inside floor surface of at least 70 square feet is used, \$1.50 per hour, said vehicle to be propelled at not less than 3 miles an hour;

c. Where a motor-driven vehicle, having an inside floor surface of at least 70 square feet is used, \$1.75 per hour, said vehicle to be propelled at not less than 8 miles per hour;

d. Where a motor-driven vehicle, having an inside floor surface of at least 90 square feet is used, \$2.50 per hour, said vehicle to be propelled at not less than 8 miles an hour;

e. For the services of each man in addition to the operator or driver, 50 cents per hour.

The number of men to be engaged on any [one] job or operation is not to exceed 4, including the driver, [except when specially agreed upon by the person hiring the public cart. In case any vehicle, while engaged in the transportation of merchandise, household or office furniture, or other bulky articles, should break down or become disabled from any cause, no charge shall be made for the period of such disability. (Id.)] unless the person hiring the public cart requires additional men, then he shall pay for each of the said additional men at the rate of 40 cents per hour.

2. [3.] *Pianos.* a. Where a piano is transported in the same public cart as other articles of household or office furniture, and is part of the same operation or job, an additional charge of not exceeding \$1.50 may be made for transporting it.

b. Where a piano is transported as a separate operation or job and the distance travelled is 3 miles or less, the charge therefor shall not exceed \$3, including labor and use of vehicle therefor; for each additional mile or part thereof, 50 cents.

c. For transporting pianos either up or down 1 or more flights of stairs, 50 cents for each flight.

d. For transporting pianos up or down, by means of elevator, \$1 additional.

e. Where the handling of a piano involves the use of a hoist, tackle and rigging, at either or both ends of the operation or job, a charge of not more than \$5 additional will be permitted.

4. *Adjustment of disputes.* All disputes as to the rate or amount of compensation shall be adjusted by the police officer in charge of the police station nearest to the place where such dispute is had. On failure to abide by the decision, the said load, or a part thereof sufficient to secure charges thereon, shall be taken to a convenient storage warehouse and a notice, in writing, with a brief statement of particulars, shall be sent at once by the public cartman to the commissioner of licenses. (Id.)

3. No vehicle shall be licensed until it has been thoroughly and carefully inspected and examined and the surface space of the said vehicle ascertained by an inspector of the License Department, which surface space so ascertained shall be legibly painted on each side of the vehicle, in a conspicuous place.

4. A copy of this section shall be posted in each wagon for inspection.

5. Each cartman under this article shall keep a record in which entries must be made of the person moved, his address, a brief description of the chattels and the price paid for the removal of the same, with the address of the place to where the said chattels have been moved; said record shall be open for inspection to any member of the Police or License Department of the City of New York, any person having a proprietary interest in said chattels, and any creditor of the person moved.

6. All disputes as to rate or amount of compensation shall be adjusted by the Police Officer in charge of the police station nearest to the place where said dispute is had. Failure to abide by the decision, the said load, or part thereof, sufficient to secure charges thereon, shall be taken to a convenient warehouse and a notice in writing with a brief statement of particulars, shall be sent at once by the public cartman to the Commissioner of Licenses. Upon the determination by the Commissioner of Licenses that the amount offered by the person hiring the said vehicle or vehicles was just, the said public cartman shall forthwith deliver the said articles stored, and pay all storage charges therefor. If the said Commissioner of Licenses shall determine that the charges demanded by the said public cartman were in excess of the maximum rates enumerated herein, said Commissioner of Licenses may revoke the said license and the public cartman shall be ineligible to procure a license as a public cartman, for a period of two years from the revocation of the said license.

7. Whenever a public cartman shall be hired to move any property, he shall forthwith cause a memorandum to be made in writing, the form of which shall be supplied by the Commissioner of Licenses; the said memorandum shall state the amount of charge for the removal of the said property, which shall not exceed the maximum rate as heretofore provided for; the place from which and the place to which the said property is to be moved and the day and hour at which the cartman is to commence the removal of said property. Said memorandum shall have printed on its reverse side the substance of the provision of this section, which must include the rates provided herein.

8. A violation of any of the provisions of this section shall render the offender or offenders liable, upon conviction before any City Magistrate, to a fine of not more than \$50 for each and every offense, and in default of the payment of such fine he may be committed to prison until the same shall be paid, but such imprisonment shall not exceed ten days.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

**Report of the Committee on General Welfare in Favor of Adopting Resolution Establishing Rules and Regulations Governing Massage Institutes and Operators.**

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on November 21, 1916 (Minutes, page 639), the annexed recommendation for rules and regulations with respect to massage institutes and operators, respectfully

**REPORTS:**

That having received from the Committee of Fourteen recommendations with respect to rules and regulations for the government of massage institutes and operators, and other recommendations having been passed on by the sub-committee, there is herewith reported for adoption by the Board of Aldermen a set of rules as founded by the sub-committee and approved by the committee as a whole. It, therefore, recommends the adoption of the accompanying resolution.

*Rules and Regulations for Massage Operators and Massage Institutes Made in Accordance with Ordinance No. 171.*

**Requirements—**

No person shall be licensed by the Department of Licenses in accordance with the provisions of an ordinance to amend chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances relating to licenses, entitled *Massage Institutions and Operators*, Approved November 27, 1916:

(A) Who is less than 21 years of age.

(B) Who does not present satisfactory references from (1) at least two reputable physicians licensed to practice in the State of New York; or (2) five reputable citizens residents of New York City.

(C) Who does not hold the occupational certificate of the Board of Health of New York City of freedom from communicable disease, as of date not more than 30 days prior to the date of application.

(D) Who does not (1) present evidence by the affidavits of at least two reputable physicians licensed to practice in the State of New York, or of three citizens, that he or she has practised massage continuously for five years, last passed, or for at least five years within the last ten years; or (2) file a certificate that he or she has satisfactorily completed the full course of training given by a school of massage duly recorded in the office of the Commissioner of Licenses; or (3) if application to be licensed in accordance herewith is made prior to April 1, 1917, offer the affidavits of five licensed massage operators that they have examined the applicant and that he or she is qualified, in their opinion, to give massage.

**Schools—**

*Certificates—*Schools of massage duly licensed under this ordinance shall be recorded in the office of the Commissioner of Licenses upon receipt of a certificate signed by a majority of a commission consisting of three physicians licensed to practice in the State of New York and two masseurs duly licensed under this ordinance to be appointed by the Mayor for a term of one year, certifying that, in their opinion, the course of instruction in the school is adequate and the staff competent to give the necessary instructions in massage.

*Structural—*No place shall be licensed as an institute which has not at least two rooms equipped with massage tables, with toilet facilities, having hot and cold running water adjacent thereto. These rooms shall have at least eighty square feet of floor area and at least six hundred cubic feet of space therein, with a window or windows, with not less than eight square feet of surface opening upon a street, open court, light shaft or open air, with independent access to each room by a door opening from a hallway, and these rooms shall not be furnished or apparently used as bedrooms.

Hon. HARRY ROBITZEK, Chairman, Committee on General Welfare, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Manhattan:

My dear Alderman—in response to your invitation to offer suggestions relative to the Rules and Regulations which must be adopted by the Board of Aldermen before the massage ordinance can become effective, I beg to offer the enclosed. I have taken the liberty of submitting them to Mr. Meade, who was present at several of the hearings, representing, I understand, the medical gymnasts and masseurs and also the American Social Hygiene Association. Both, I understand, feel that they adequately cover the ground.

Rules and Regulations for Massage Operators and Massage Institutes, Made in Accordance with Ordinance No. 171.

Requirements—

No person shall be licensed by the Department of Licenses, in accordance with the provisions of Ordinance No. 171—

(A) Who is less than 21 years of age.

(B) To whom objection is made on the grounds of character by the Police Department.

(C) Who does not present satisfactory references from (1) at least two reputable physicians licensed to practice in the State of New York; or (2) five reputable citizens residents of New York City.

(D) Who does not hold the occupational certificate of the Board of Health of New York City of freedom from communicable disease as of date not more than 30 days prior to the date of application.

(E) Who does not (1) present evidence by the affidavits of at least two reputable physicians licensed to practice in the State of New York; or of three citizens, that he or she has practised massage continuously for three years, last passed, or for at least three years within the last ten years; or (2) file a certificate that he or she has satisfactorily completed the full course of training given by a school of massage, duly recorded in the office of the Commissioner of Licenses; or (3) if application to be licensed in accordance herewith is made prior to April 1, 1917, offer the affidavits of three licensed massage operators that they have examined the applicant and that he or she is qualified, in their opinion, to give massage.

Schools—

Certification—Schools of massage shall be recorded in the office of the Commissioner of Licenses upon receipt of a certificate signed by ten physicians licensed to practice in the State of New York, certifying that in their opinion the course of instruction in the school is adequate and the staff competent to give the necessary instructions in massage.

Recording—Such certification shall not be accepted and the school entered as of record until thirty days after the receipt of the certification, during which time notice of its receipt and the names of those signing it shall be posted on a bulletin board in the public office of the Department of Licenses. A copy of such notice shall be forwarded to the Commissioner of the Department of Health for his information. The Commissioner shall have power to refuse such applications to be recorded, or to strike any school previously recorded from the record, but only after, in each instance, a public hearing and a public statement of his reasons for his action.

Structural—No place shall be licensed as an institute which has not at least two rooms equipped with massage tables, with toilet facilities, having hot and cold running water adjacent thereto. These rooms shall have at least eighty square feet of floor area and at least six hundred cubic feet of space therein, with a window or windows with not less than eight square feet of surface opening upon a street, open court, light shaft or open air, with independent access to each room by a door opening from a hallway, and these rooms shall not be furnished or apparently used as bedrooms.

Whereas, Previous to the arrival of these monster trucks upon the highways of New York the annual repair of the City streets was about one-half of one per cent. in area, where to-day it is about 30 per cent. for the same area; and

Whereas, Highway maintenance is a costly item in the City's annual expense bill and is an imposition on the taxpayers for the benefit of a few to permit this destruction of their property; and

Whereas, These motor trucks are growing in numbers to such a great extent that new problems must be met by the authorities of The City of New York having jurisdiction over the highways; therefore be it

Resolved, That this resolution be referred to the appropriate committee, with a view of drafting suitable legislation as to the desirability of licensing these trucks, regulating the width of tires that will maintain a load without sinking into the pavement, the width of these motor trucks, so as to permit them to pass without interfering with each other going in opposite directions, and for such further remedial legislation as may be necessary in the premises.





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



#### NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchman or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walls, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water tanks and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass pipe in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurte-

nances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furring, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, endorsed with the title of the bids or estimates is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificate of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount or not less than three not more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope, addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
