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MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of the City of New York, Held Wednesday, June 13, 1917, at 10.30 A. M.

Present: Darwin H. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners. Commissioner James presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the Non-Competitive Class, Part I, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Public Charities, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below (City Institutions)," the following:

Assistant Alienist, \$1,740 per annum, with maintenance. Clifford J. Gordon, Clerk in the Department of Public Charities, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the Non-Competitive Class, Part I, under the heading "Positions in the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below," the following:

Assistant Alienist, \$1,740 per annum, with maintenance. George O'Hanlon, General Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meetings held May 16th, 17th and 18th, 1917, were approved.

On motion, it was

2. By including therein for Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, under the sub-heading "With Maintenance," the following: "Assistant Alienist, \$1,740 per annum."

A report dated June 12 was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner recommending that an examination be ordered for promotion to District Health Officer, Grade 5, in the Department of Health, to be open to all persons employed in positions appearing in Part XII (The Medical Service) in Grade 2 and upward, who have served for not less than one year and who are otherwise eligible for examination; also recommending the following subjects and weights for the examination:

Record and Seniority, 50 per cent; Mental Examination, 50 per cent. Mental Examination: Experience, 3; written examination, 4; oral examination, 3. 70 per cent. to be required on experience; 70 per cent. to be required on written examination; 70 per cent. to be required on oral examination.

1. The subject "Experience" will be designed to test the past training and employment of candidates to qualify them for the duties of the position to be filled. This includes not only employment in the Department of Health but also outside experience.

2. The written examination will be based upon the duties of the position to be filled.

3. The oral examination will be designed to test the personal qualifications of candidates, including judgment, quickness of comprehension, address and other purely personal qualifications.

It was also recommended that a single eligible list be promulgated regardless of bureaus or other subdivisions of the department, and that seniority and record be rated on a basis of ten years' service. The recommendations were adopted.

A report dated June 6 was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner recommending that an examination be ordered for promotion to Assistant Sanitary Superintendent in the Department of Health, Brooklyn, to be open to all persons who are physicians licensed to practice in the State of New York, who have served in the Bureaus of Child Hygiene, Preventable Diseases and Sanitation in the Borough of Brooklyn, and who have served for not less than one year in positions appearing in Part XII (The Medical Service), at salaries comprised within the limits of Grade 2 and upwards, and are otherwise eligible for examination; also recommending the following subjects and weights for the examination:

Record and Seniority, 50 per cent; Mental Examination, 50 per cent.

Subjects and Weights of Mental Examination: Experience, 4, 70 per cent. required; written examination, 4, 70 per cent. required; oral test, 2, 70 per cent. required. Total, 10.

Duties: The duties of an Assistant Sanitary Superintendent are to act as a representative of the Board of Health in the Borough of Brooklyn, as defined in section 1183 of the Charter of the City of New York.

Requirements: Candidates must have had experience in positions of an executive character, either in the Department of Health or in outside service, tending to qualify them to perform the duties of the position.

It was also recommended that record and seniority be rated on a basis of ten years' service. The recommendations were adopted.

A report dated June 12 was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner recommending that the examination ordered May 16th for promotion to the position of Director, Bureau of Preventable Diseases, Department of Health, be open to all persons employed in positions appearing in Part XII (The Medical Service) who have served for at least one year in grades 2, 3, 4 or 5 and who are otherwise eligible for examination, and also recommending the following subjects and weights for the examination:

Record and seniority, 50 per cent.; mental examination, 50 per cent.

Subjects and weights of mental examination: Experience, 4; written examination, 4; oral test, 2; total, 10.

Duties—The Director of the Bureau of Preventable Diseases is responsible for the following activities: a infectious diseases, b tuberculosis, c epidemiology, d venereal diseases, e nursing, f institution inspection.

There are 558 employees under his direction, including positions in the Medical Service, in the Nursing Service, in the Clerical Service and other Services.

Duties—To take charge of combination stable and garage; supervise the care of horses, feed, horsedrawn vehicles, etc.; to exercise general supervision of motor-drawn ambulances, drivers of same and to maintain records of service, supplies, repairs, etc.

Requirements—Candidates should have had practical experience in the management and direction of men; should understand care and treatment of horses; have a general knowledge of motor-drawn vehicles and be able to write a report at regular intervals upon the things over which he has charge.

Candidates must be at least 21 years of age on or before the closing date for the receipt of applications.

There is one vacancy in the Department of Public Charities at \$1,000 per annum.

The term of the eligibility of the list resulting from this examination is fixed at not less than one year nor more than four years."
