Overview

In May 2010, following a hugely successful pilot program the previous fall, NYC Service and the NYC Department of Buildings launched the first full season of an exciting new program to promote and facilitate the cooling of New York City's rooftops.

The goals of NYC °CoolRoofs are to: combat the Urban Heat Island Effect, save New Yorkers money by cutting cooling costs, and support the City's PlaNYC goal to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 30% by 2030. To meet these ambitious goals, NYC °CoolRoofs relies on citizen volunteers, who are eager to help create a greener, greater New York.

In its inaugural program year, NYC °CoolRoofs surpassed its goal, coating a total of 1,168,369 square feet of rooftops across 135 buildings. 1,600 volunteers participated in these coating efforts, including both private citizens and seventeen corporate groups.

NYC °CoolRoofs is grateful to the nonprofit and corporate support that made this first year successful, especially Con Edison, the Community Environmental Center, and Green City Force.


2010 Coating Season by Borough Focusing coating efforts in designated neighborhoods – Long Island City, Crown Heights, Bedford-Stuyvesant, and the South Bronx – NYC °CoolRoofs helps to reduce the Urban Heat Island Effect in New York City. Bronx One million square feet of cool roofs should 210,164 sq. ft. reduce New York City's carbon emissions by 500,000 lbs or 227 metric tons. This reduction is equal to removing 50 cars from the road or having 300 New Yorkers not drive for an entire QQ year. Queens 296,890 sq. ft. Brooklyn 370,793 sq. ft. Staten Island 6,750 sq. ft.

NYC °CoolRoofs taps into the incredible spirit of volunteerism in New York City and harnesses that energy to tackle a challenge that government can't solve on its own - reducing the city's carbon footprint. 
