The harvests upon which we depend have been abundant, and no pestilence has scourged the City. Whereas, By a strange anomaly in the law, the canvassing of the votes cast at the preceding election, and the consideration of said Estimates, are simultaneously crowded into these fifteen days, leaving but little time for a careful scrutiny of the tax levy, whilst lessening none of the responsibilities of this Board for the amounts asked therein; therefore, be it

Resolved, That in taking up the Provisional Estimate for the year 1876, their consideration by this Board shall be proceeded with in the same order as arranged in the printed report thereof, to be continued day after day until the 25th instant, if not completed prior to that date.

MESSAGE FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, CITY HALL, NEW YORK, November 22, 1875.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen ;

GENTLEMEN—I have received the sad tidings of the death of Henry Wilson, Vice-President of the United States, which occurred this morning at Washington.

The country will lament the loss of one of the most useful, as of the most eminent, of the men who have been in public office during the generation which is now passing away.

Robust and vigorous, courageous and of manly directness of character, his kindness of heart, his approved sagacity and political wisdom, and his long experience and recognized authority in Congress, fitted him for the largest influence for good in the present condition of public opinion as to political questions.

He will be sincerely mourned by all who are solicitious for the general welfare.

I recommend that appropriate action be taken by the Board of Aldermen to express a proper respect for his memory, and in acknowledgment of his great public services.
