DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks, held Friday, November 9, 1900, at 2 o'clock p. m. Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held November 2, 1900, were approved.

James Shewan appeared in relation to his application for permission to berth a floating dry dock on the southerly side of the Pier at the foot of East Fourth street. Frederic D. Phillips, attorney for the owners of the bulkhead thereat, again appeared in opposition to the granting of said application, and requested that a hearing in the matter be had in the near future.

On motion of the Treasurer, a temporary permit was granted James Shewan & Sons to berth a floating dry dock on the southerly side of the Pier foot at East Fourth street, during the pleasure of the Board, for a period not exceeding thirty days, the granting of the permit to be without prejudice to any rights of the owners of the bulkhead, the compensation for the privilege to be fixed by the Treasurer, and the hearing in the matter of the protest against the granting of a permanent permit set for December 7, 1900.

Joseph Koch, attorney for the New Haven Steamboat Company, appeared and again requested a renewal of the lease of the premises occupied by said company in the vicinity of Peck slip, East river, from May 1, 1901, the date of the expiration of the present lease.

On motion of the Treasurer, the matter was referred to the President.

The communication from the New York Mutual Gas Light Company requesting permission to dump ashes and refuse on scows at its private dump at the foot of Thirteenth street, East river, was taken from the table and placed on file, and

On motion, permission was granted said company to use the dump for ashes and refuse from its gas works, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Board.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Eric Railroad Company, to take up pavement and repair water-pipe at the foot of Chambers street, North river, the pavement to be relaid by the force of this Department, at the cost and expense of said company.

Firm of L. J. Carpenter, to repair Pier 11, East river, the work to be kept within existing lines. Bowery Bay Building and Improvement Company, to drive two double rows of piles for the protection of their pontoon at North Beach, Borough of Queens.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Transmitting bills of costs in proceedings for the acquisition of the 88 feet of bulkhead near the foot of Clinton street, East river; of the bulkhead between Eighteenth and Twentieth streets, including the Pier foot of East Nineteenth street, and of the private interests in Pier, old 15, East river. Chief Clerk directed to draw the necessary regulations therefor.

2d. Advising that the repairs required to Pier 47, East river, should be made by Mary Bell, the alleged owner of the premises.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify Mary Bell to make necessary repairs required to said pier, in order to place same in a safe condition, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief; said repairs, unless commenced by the owner within ten days, to be made by the force of this Department at her cost and expense.

From the Department of Taxes and Assessments—Submitting statement of the valuation as assessed for purposes of taxation, of the southerly half of Pier, old 12, and the northerly half of Pier, old 14, North river. Secretary directed to transmit same to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and to request said Board to consent to the condemnation of the property by the Corporation Counsel.

From the Department of Correction—Requesting that repairs be made to the dock at Riker's Island. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make necessary repairs thereto.

From the Department of Bridges—Requesting permission to use such portion of the space in front of the bulkhead at the foot of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, Harlem river, as may be required by the contractor for the berthing of scows used in connection with the construction of the bridge thereat.

On motion, permission was granted to berth scows thereat during the pleasure of the Board, it being understood that said scows shall be so placed as not to interfere with the lessee of the bulkhead.

From the Metropolitan Street Railway Company—Accepting the terms of the permit for the maintenance of tracks and switches in front of the new ferry-house between Desbrosses and Watts streets, North river.

From John Early's Sons—Transmitting consent of sureties to the extension of time to October 26, 1900, granted for the completion of the work of delivering cement under Contract No. 675.

From Wickham Brothers—Requesting that the Pier foot of East Nineteenth street be not removed until other wharf accommodations are provided in the vicinity. Secretary directed to state that the people of the neighborhood will be accommodated as much as possible consistent with the prosecution of the work of improvement thereat.

From O'Brien Brothers—Stating that they no longer require a berth at the bulkhead between Eightieth and Eighty-first streets, North river. Permit revoked, to take effect immediately.

From the People's Co-operative Ice Company—Requesting permission to erect and maintain ice bridges between Piers, new 5 and 8, East river; on the bulkhead between Pike and Rutgers streets, East river; on the bulkhead north of Pier, new 46, North river, and on the bulkhead between Piers, old 58½ and 59, North river.

On motion, the application for permission to erect an ice bridge between Piers 5 and 8, East river, was denied, the premises having been set aside for the exclusive use of canal boats; the application for permission to place an ice bridge on the bulkhead between Pike and Rutgers streets, East river, denied, the Board not yet having decided the use to which said bulkhead shall be placed; the application for permission to maintain an ice bridge on the bulkhead north of Pier, new 46, North river, denied, the premises being leased; and the application for permission to maintain an ice bridge on the bulkhead between Piers, old 58½ and 59, North river, referred to the Dock Superintendent to examine and report.

From the Hush Company, Limited—

1st. Requesting permission to erect a wooden shed on the extension now being constructed at the outer end of its Pier 3, between Fortieth and Forty-first streets, South Brooklyn. Application denied, the plans being contrary to the Building Code.

2d. Requesting permission to use and occupy a space about 50 by 100 feet on one of the piers or bulkheads on the North or East rivers, south of Canal street. Secretary directed to state that a more definite application must be submitted.

From the Metropolitan Street Railway Company—Stating that it vacated on October 31, 1900, that portion of the newly-made land heretofore occupied, between Fifty-third and Fifty-fourth streets, North river; together with the report of the Treasurer recommending that the compensation for the remaining portion of the newly-made land between Fifty-second and Fifty-third streets, North river, be fixed at the rate of \$1,000 per annum, payable quarterly at the end of each quarter to the Treasurer. Recommendation of the Treasurer adopted.

From John J. O'Hare—Requesting permission to retail coal at the ice bridge, between Houston and East Third streets, East river, and to erect two coal-hoisting derricks thereat. Application denied, the carrying on of such business on a public street being contrary to law.

From the Pennsylvania Railroad Company—Requesting permission to use and occupy the premises at the foot of Thirteenth street, North river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Pennsylvania Railroad Company to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Board, the abandoned ferry premises near the foot of West Thirteenth street, North river; provided

First—That said company will agree to vacate the premises whenever so directed by the Board of Docks.

Second—That it will pay as compensation for the use thereof, the rate to be hereafter fixed by the Treasurer of this Department.

Third—That it will file an agreement in form satisfactory to this Department, waiving all claims against the City for the value of the said ferry structures.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company for the use of the westerly half of Pier, old 15, East river, be fixed at the rate of \$10,000 per annum, payable quarterly at the end of each quarter to the Treasurer. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that the compensation to be charged John Walden for the privilege of berthing a pleasure boat at the Pier foot of Broadway, Astoria, Borough of Queens, be fixed at the rate of \$1 per month, payable at the end of each month to the Dock Master, and that a similar amount be charged any other boats berthed thereat. Recommendation adopted.

From the Dock Superintendent—

1st. Report for the week ending November 3, 1900.

2d. Reporting that the Brooklyn Sanitary Company is operating a dump south of Sixth street, Borough of Brooklyn. Secretary directed to notify said company to discontinue the use of the dump until such time as a permit shall have been obtained.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

2d. Reporting the completion of the work of furnishing cement under Contract No. 675, October 26, 1900.

3d.
