A proper district of assessment would be one-half the block on each side of the street, exclusive of improvements, having an assessed valuation of \$100,000.

In connection with the above improvement would state that the present grade charts show a crown on each of these two blocks, but it is found that both Bushwick avenue and Bogart street are improved at an elevation varying 1 foot from the chart grades; if Siegel street were to be paved on a grade running from both Bushwick avenue and Bogart street to Waterbury street (which is the intermediate street) at the legal grade established for that street ample drainage would be afforded without introducing any crown, the rate of fall being 5 inches or more in 100 feet.

The above estimate therefore is based upon the omission of these crowns, reducing the amount of filling required, 4,600 cubic yards, and the expense of grading, about \$1,700.

DEAR SIR—I inclose herewith a copy of a communication from the President of the Borough dated March 19, 1901, together with a copy of a petition in relation to the construction of sewers to:

Waterbury street, from Stage street to Meserole street; and
Meserole street, from Waterbury street to Morgan avenue.

I beg to report that a sewer already exists in Waterbury street, between Schleser street and Stage street, therefore estimate of cost for sewers in Waterbury street, between Schleser street and Meserole street, and in Meserole street, between Waterbury street and Morgan avenue, is given, which is \$7,000, and the assessed valuation of the real estate within the prudential area of assessment is \$65,570.

In regard to outlet sewers, information of which is requested by the President of the Borough, I beg to state that an outlet sewer will be required in Bogart street, between Meserole street and Johnson avenue, the estimated cost being \$2,100, and the assessed valuation of the real estate within the prudential area of assessment for said outlet sewer being \$140,500.

In regard to the legal opening of the streets, information of which is requested by the President of the Borough, I beg to state that no record can be found of the opening of Meserole street within the limits petitioned for, although it has apparently been traveled over for a great number of years.

Waterbury street, within the limits above, was declared open by the Common Council of the old City of Brooklyn on December 23, 1894.

Bogart street, within the above limits, was also declared open by the Common Council of the old City of Brooklyn on the same date.

DEAR SIR—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 10th instant, transmitting petition signed by Charles Schleser and others for the grading and paving of Waterbury street, between Stagg and Meserole streets, and of Meserole street, between Waterbury street and Morgan avenue.

In reply, I beg to advise you that an examination of this locality shows it to be largely a manufacturing neighborhood, and while these streets have no travel at the present time, same being untraveled, they undoubtedly will have considerable after they are paved. Granite-block pavement will certainly be the most suitable surface, and as the present conditions will hardly warrant the laying of the same on a concrete foundation I therefore beg to submit the following estimates for—

1. Regulating, grading and paving Waterbury street, between Stagg and Meserole streets, with granite-block pavement on sand foundation:

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed change of grade of the above-named streets at a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 1st day of August, 1901, at 10 o'clock A.M., at which such proposed change and discontinuing will be considered by said Board, all of which is more particularly set forth and described in the following resolutions, adopted by said Board on the 1st day of July, 1901, notice of the adoption of which is hereby given, viz.:

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 420 of chapter 778, Laws of 1901, desiring it for the public interest, so to do, proposes to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by closing and discontinuing of Forty-fourth, Forty-seventh, Forty-ninth, and Fifty-first streets, from First avenue to high-water line, New York bay, in the Eighth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, more particularly described as follows:

"B."—Forty-fourth Street.

Beginning at the intersection of the northern side-line of Forty-fourth street with the western side-line of First avenue.

1. Thence westerly along the northern side-line of Forty-fourth street for 302 feet to the high-water line.

2. Thence southerly along the high-water line to the southern side-line of Forty-fourth street, said southern side-line is 60 feet from and parallel to the northern side-line of Forty-fourth street.

3. Thence easterly along the southern side-line of Forty-fourth street for 302 feet to the western side-line of First avenue.

4. Thence northerly along the western side-line of First avenue for 60 feet to the point of beginning.

"B."—Forty-seventh Street.

Beginning at the intersection of the northern side-line of Forty-seventh street with the western side-line of First avenue.

1. Thence westerly along the northern side-line of Forty-seventh street for 302 feet to the high-water line.

2. Thence southerly along the high-water line to the southern side-line of Forty-seventh street; said southern side-line is 60 feet from and parallel to the northern side-line of Forty-seventh street.

3. Thence easterly along the southern side-line of Forty-seventh street for 302 feet to the western side-line of First avenue.

4. Thence northerly along the western side-line of First avenue for 60 feet to the point of beginning.

"B."—Forty-ninth Street.

Beginning at the intersection of the northern side-line of Forty-ninth street with the western side-line of First avenue.

1. Thence westerly along the northern side-line of Forty-ninth street for 302 feet to the high-water line.

2. Thence southerly along the high-water line to the southern side-line of Forty-ninth street; said southern side-line is 60 feet from and parallel to the northern side-line of Forty-ninth street.

3. Thence easterly along the southern side-line of Forty-ninth street for 302 feet to the western side-line of First avenue.

4. Thence northerly along the western side-line of First avenue for 60 feet to the point of beginning.

"B."—Fifty-first Street.

Beginning at the intersection of the northern side-line of Fifty-first street with the western side-line of First avenue.

1. Thence westerly along the northern side-line of Fifty-first street for 302 feet to the high-water line.

2. Thence southerly along the high-water line to the southern side-line of Fifty-first street; said southern side-line is 60 feet from and parallel to the northern side-line of Fifty-first street.

3. Thence easterly along the southern side-line of Fifty-first street for 302 feet to the western side-line of First avenue.

4. Thence northerly along the western side-line of First avenue for 60 feet to the point of beginning.

"C."—Fifty-first Street.

Beginning at the intersection of the northern side-line of Fifty-first street with the western side-line of First avenue.

1. Thence westerly along the northern side-line of Fifty-first street for 302 feet to the high-water line.

2. Thence southerly along the high-water line to the southern side-line of Fifty-first street; said southern side-line is 60 feet from and parallel to the northern side-line of Fifty-first street.

3. Thence easterly along the southern side-line of Fifty-first street for 302 feet to the western side-line of First avenue.

4. Thence northerly along the western side-line of First avenue for 60 feet to the point of beginning.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed closing and discontinuing of the above-named streets at a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 1st day of August, 1901, at 10 o'clock A.M.

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
