DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES.

Dear Sir-Pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 6, 1902, I beg to send herewith a revised estimate of this Department for the year 1902, together with an explanatory letter. I have the honor to remain

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen-I beg to submit herewith, pursuant to a resolution adopted by your honorable body on January 6, 1902, an estimate of the expenditure of this Department for the year 1902, showing the amount allowed for each purpose by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 30, 1901, for the year 1902, and the amount now proposed for each purpose. In explanation of these estimates I desire to submit the

SALARIES.

In preparing this schedule I have had constantly in mind the desire of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that every item of expense not absolutely necessary for conducting the public business should be excluded and every item included should be reduced to the lowest possible expenditure consistent with efficient service. You will note that in every instance the payrolls of the various offices in this Department have been decreased; that the payroll of the Central Office in Manhattan and The Bronx has been decreased from \$38.830 to \$35,206, of the Central Office in Brooklyn from \$52,640 to \$41.420 and of the Outdoor Poor Department from \$30,853 to \$29,908. After a careful examination, however, I have not felt able to recommend any reduction in the numbers of those actually engaged in the care of patients in the hospitals and other institutions in this Department; in fact, in two or three instances, I have felt constrained to ask for an increase in the number of nurses, having become convinced that the present nursing service in two or three of the institutions is inadequate for the proper and creditable care of the sick.

I have also felt obliged to ask for an increase in the number of Engineers employed in several of the institutions. I find that this Department has been violating both the spirit and the letter of the law requiring a licensed engineer to be in charge at all times of boiler plants. The hours of service required of the engineers have also been excessive. The increase which is necessary to comply with the law regarding licensed engineers, to approximate the eight-hour day (though not to secure this fully) and to more nearly approach the prevailing rate of wages, amounts to \$5.300 per annum.

The Bakery in this department was, during the latter part of 1900 and the early part of 1901, manued by paid men, but on account of the scarcity of funds, prison labor was again restored in the Bakery about the middle of 1901. The paid Bakers, were, however, reinstated by my predecessor in December last, to take effect on January 1, throughout the department that the results when paid men are employed are much more necessary. satisfactory than when the work is performed by prisoners. I have also been obliged to ask for a moderate appropriation for the salaries of nurses and helpers in the new tuberculosis paviliion, which I have opened in connection with the Metropolitan Hos-

In Brooklyn, two new hospitals are about to be opened by this department, and this necessitates a considerable increase in the salary list for 1902, as compared with December 31, 1901. Another fact which increases the payroll for 1902, as compared with December 31, 1001, is that a Reception Hospital is maintained during the summer months at Coney Island, the employees of which do not appear on any payroll of December 31, 1901.

### SUPPLIES.

The appropriation for supplies includes not only food supplies, but also fuel and light, clothing, bedding, lumber, hardware, paints, glass, crockery, tinware, brooms and brushes, soap, furniture, medicines and medical supplies including liquors, surgical supplies, horsefeed, harness, postage, etc., etc. The actual expenditure for food supplies consists of about 60 per cent. of the total appropriation

In the item for supplies the appropriation made for 1901 affords no proper standard for the necessary appropriation for 1902. The appropriation for 1901 seems to have been based upon the supposition that the Department would close the year with absolutely no stock on hand-a result which in this Department is impossible. The appropriation for 1901 was added to in the course of the year by the transfer by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of \$25,000 from the appropriation for Alterations, Additions and Repairs, although the appropriation made for that purpose was also insufficient, and with the result that necessary and urgent repairs could not be made. It was further added to by a transfer by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of \$13,000 from an unexpended balance of the appropriation for some other Department. In addition to this there were unexpended balances on the contracts of 1899 and 1900 amounting to \$28,168.48, which were called in and used in 1901. Notwithstanding these additions to the original appropriation, the supplies provided were wholly inadequate. A cut of about 20 per cent, on the most expensive items of supplies, that of meats, was made in May, 1901. The amount of clothing and bedding provided was extremely inadequate and led to much discomfort and suffering on the part of the patients in the hospitals and to great embarrassment to those in charge. Practically no lumber was supplied for making the ordinary and usual repairs. Little or no hospital furniture was supplied with the result that the medical service became greatly embarrassed and discouraged by lack of the ordinary facilities for carrying on their work. The Department opened the year 1902 with extraordinary and immediate needs in all of these directions.

The estimates for supplies submitted herewith have been based on the system recommended by the Commissioners of Accounts on October 27, 1899. This calculation has heretofore been made on the actual expenditure for the first six months of the year preceding that for which the estimate is made, which amount has been doubled, and then increased or diminished for each institution, according to the movement of the census during the six months of actual expenditure as compared with the corresponding six months of the preceding year. Making the revised estimate after the close of the year, we have been able to base the calculation on the actual expenditure for the whole of 1901, instead of the first six months, as hereto-fore. This per capita method of making the estimate for supplies would be a good one if the amount given for supplies for the preceding year had been based on a careful consideration of what was actually and properly required, or if the amounts provided had been found by experience to afford proper care for the inmates of the

CITY OF city's charitable institutions. As a matter of fact, neither of these suppositions was true. I here therefore felt compelled to add to the estimate, as reached by the per capita calculation, sums necessary to supplement in part the deficiency in the appropriations of 1900 and 1901. I have also added an estimate for supplies for the new tuberculosis division of the Metropolitan Hospital. This estimate is based on the actual cost of supplies for the patients in the Metropolitan Hospital during 1901—namely, .3813 cents per diem. The amount paid by the city to private institutions of the care of consumptives is one dollar per diem. The objects of the establishment of this tuberculosis pavilion are two: First, to provide a retreat for those who are in the advanced stages of the disease in which they may spend the remainder of their days in reasonable comfort, with adequate shelter and care. Heretofore there has been no institution in which many of these unfortunates could find anything more than temporary care, and they have passed from hospital to hospital and from institution to institution. Second, to provide for the small number of tuberculosis patients in the early stages of the disease who come under the care of the Department such remedial treatment as is possible. Of the tuberculosis patients under the care of this city when this tuberculosis division was established, February 4, 1902, there were 26 who were in the less advanced stages of the disease and for whom it was thought there was some hope of improvement. These were given accommodations separate from the advanced cases. I have just received (February 25) detailed history of each of these patients since admission. This report shows that of these 26 patients 20 have improved and show an average gain in weight of 4 and 13-32 pounds during the period of 19 days, with, in many cases, a marked diminution of the active symptoms of tuberculosis. Six patients are unimproved and show an average loss in weight of I and I-3 pounds. I am well aware that the period covered is a short one but these results at least afford rational ground for hope that the disease may be arrested, if not cured, in a fair proportion of incipient cases coming under the city's

If it should seem best to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to disregard the per capita of calculation based on the actual expenditure of 1901 and make an appropriation to this Department for supplies, based on the rate of 40 cents per capita per diem for hospitals, 22 cents per capita per diem for almshouses, and 30 cents per capita per diem for the asylum and schools, which figures, I feel confident, will not appear to you to be excessive, such an appropriation would be entirely agreeable to this Department.

#### ALTERATIONS, ADDITIONS AND REPAIRS TO BUILDINGS AND APPARATUS.

As stated above, the appropriation for this purpose for 1901 (Manhattan and The Bronx), was \$70,000, of which sum \$25,000 was subsequently transferred to the Supply Account. The original appropriation of \$70,000 was, however, grossly inadequate, the corresponding appropriation for 1900 having been \$133,500, and for 1899 \$200,000. It must be remembered that the buildings in this Department accommodated in 1901 an average of 7,909 inmates. A moderate estimate of their cost would be \$450 per capita, or a total of \$3,599,650. Many of these buildings are old and there is constant need of minor repairs, renewal of plumbing, heating and ventilating apparatus, etc., etc. An estimate for repairs of 4 per cent. per annum on the original cost of the buildings would certainly be a very moderate one and would indicate an expenditure of \$143.986 annually for ordinary repairs. In addition to this certain alterations and additions are necessary in order to fit the buildings for their respective uses, many of them having been built for quite different purposes.

I have given in the estimate a detailed statement of each item of repairs, alterations and additions which we can now foresee to be necessary during 1902 for the economical protection of the buildings from further deterioration, for securing sanitary conditions for the inmates of the hospitals and almshouses of this Department and for making such minor alterations as will fit the buildings reasonably well for the uses to which they are now put.

### MISCELLANEOUS APPROPRIATIONS.

In the minor appropriations for transportation of paupers, poor adult blind, 1902. I have continued the employment of paid men, finding a concensus of opinion etc., etc., no changes from the appropriations already granted for 1902 seem to be

The Department would strongly recommend that appropriations be made to it without regard to borough lines. This will permit of the free transfer of inmates so that those of similar grade can be grouped together and a better classification secured; overcrowding in any borough can be relieved, or at least equalized throughout the city without the construction of additional buildings; the distribution of the adult blind can be made in uniform sums throughout the entire city, as has been suggested by the Board of Aldermen; employees can be transferred to meet special needs arising in any borough and a better organization of the Department as a whole effected.

The Department is now for the first time under one Commissioner. There will be many advantages, and as far as can be seen no disadvantages by making its appropriations without regard to borough divisions, as is the evident intention of the Charter.

The preparation of the map of the Borough of Richmond is an absolute necessity and precedes any proper system of public improvements. No work has as yet been done in any accurate manner, except the United States Coast Survey Chart prepared many years ago.

The Revised Charter (section 439) imposes on the Borough President this im-

portant duty, and requires its completion by January 1, 1907. Richmond is the only borough where the surveys have not been started, though appropriations have been asked for year after year.

Many improvements are desired by the residents; some have been actually authorized by the late Board of Public Improvements, but few of them can be carried out until the basic plan is ready.

The hilly nature of the borough furnishes many series of water courses, and consequently many groups of street systems. It is the intention, if the appropriation now asked for is granted, to at once organize the proper corps, and this season complete the base lines, triangulations and co-ordinate systems, and in the thickly settled portions and those parts petitioning for improvements, as much of the filling in as possible.

In order to complete the fifty-seven square miles of area within the prescribe! time, next year and thereafter the corps of employees will need to be very materially increased beyond those estimated for this budget; a larger number than those herein considered would be unwieldy until the primary work is finished.

Dear Sir-In reply to your communication of January 13, 1902, with which you transmitted a communication from the Secretary of the President of the Borough, transmitting original petition of the Germania Real Estate & Improvement Co., and others, in relation to the construction of sewers through the following

Avenue G, from Coney Island to Flatbush avenue. Flatbush avenue, westerly side, from its northerly intersection with Avenue G to its southerly intersection with Avenue G, Avenue G, from Flatbush to Nostrand avenue; Nostrand avenue, from Avenue

G to Avenue F, Avenue F, from Nostrand to Paerdegat avenue, southerly side, Paerdegat avenue, southerly side, from Avenue F to East Forty-fifth street, East Forty-fifth street, from Paerdegat avenue, southerly side to Avenue G, Avenue G, from East Forty-fifth street to Paerdegat avenue, southerly side, Paerdegat avenue, southerly side, from Avenue G to Flatlands avenue,

Also, Avenue F, from East Twenty-sixth street to Nostrand avenue. I beg to state that it has been reported to me by the Chief Engineer of Sewers. Borough of Brooklyn, to whom this matter was referred, as follows:

I beg to report that the estimated cost for the above mentioned improvement, with a silt and trap basin at Flatlands and Paerdegat avenues, south side, is \$266,-700, and that the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$6,723,214.

I also beg to report that if it is the desire of the authorities of the city to institute proceedings to complete the entire drainage plan as adopted, outlet sewers will be necessary for the dry-weather flow of the above mentioned sewers in the streets hereinafter mentioned.

A pumping plant and building will be required to be built on land to be procured near Flatlands and Paerdegat avenues, north side, with a force main from said pumping plant through Paerdegat avenue, northerly side, from Flatlands to Ralph avenues; Ralph avenue, from Paerdegat avenue, northerly side, to Avenue D; also gravity sewers in

Ralph avenue, from Avenue D to Avenue C: Avenue C, from Ralph avenue to Avenue D; Avenue D, from Avenue C to Powell street; Powell street, from Avenue D to Vienna avenue; Vienna avenue, from Powell street to Williams avenue;

Williams avenue, from Vienna avenue to Fresh Creek Basin, -to conduct the dramage of Map X in addition to the dry-weather flow of the ter-

ritory in question. For dry-weather flow only, an outlet is also required in Vienna avenue, from Williams to Malta avenue;

Malta avenue, from Vienna to Wortman avenue, -and in Wortman avenue, from Malta to New Jersey avenue, the estimated cost for which is \$465,300, and the assessed valuation of the real estate within the proba-

I beg to state, however, that by the utilization of the trap basin as a temporary purification basin, the outlet sewers above mentioned would not be necessary for a year after the sewers petitioned for are built.

I also beg to explain that the dry-weather flow would be conducted from New Jersey avenue and Wortman avenue through sewers already built to the Twentysixth Ward purification plants, providing said outlets are authorized and built. In regard to streets legally open, in which the sewers petitioned for, if built, will

be authorized, I beg to report as follows: Avenue G, from Foster avenue to Ralph avenue, which includes all the above

limits petitioned for, opening proceedings passed the Board of Public Improvements July 17, 1901. (Page 1488, Bd. Pub. Imp. Minutes.) Flatbush avenue, within the above limits, is legally open.

Nostrand avenue, from Avenue G to Avenue F, no record. This street is now occupied by trolley tracks, however, and the Corporation Counsel has ruled that Avenue F, from East Twenty-sixth street to Nostrand avenue. Proceedings

to open this street from Foster avenue to Paerdegat Basin were advertised for a hearing before the Local Board March 1, 1900. ("City Record," February 19, 1900. page 1130.) This street has been closed, however, between Foster avenue and Ocean

Paerdegat avenue, south side, within the limits above described, no record. East Forty-fifth street-Proceedings to open this street from Holy Cross Cemetery to Flatbush avenue passed Local Board October 30, 1899, and were referred to the Chief Topographical Engineer. (Bd. Pub. Imp. Minutes. page 2317, November

Dear Sir—I herewith inclose a copy of a communication from the Secretary of the President of the Borough, with the original petition of Albert Kuelling and others, in relation to the construction of a sewer in New York avenue, between Avenue C and Avenue D.

I beg to state that the matter was referred to the Chief Engineer of Sewers.

Borough of Brooklyn, who reports as follows:

'I beg to report that the estimated cost for the above improvement is \$2,000, and the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$27,430.
"In regard to outlet sewers which will be necessary to provide drainage for the

above, I beg to report that they will be needed in New York avenue, between Avenue D and Newkirk avenue; in Newkirk avenue, between New York and Nostrand avenues, and in Nostrand avenue, between Newkirk avenue and Avenue F, the estimated cost of which is \$14,600, and the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment, which is \$843.735.

"Other outlet sewers are necessary, but are included in my letter of this date to you, under the heading of 'Avenue G, from Coney Island to Flatbush avenue, I refrain from repeating them, with the estimated cost, in order to avoid confusing information to the President of the Borough and the Local Board of the

"In regard to the status of the legally opened streets, I find no record of New

York avenue between these limits being open.

"Nostrand avenue, from Newkirk avenue to the old town line between Flatbush and Flatlands avenues (just south of Ditmas avenue), is open. From this line to Avenue F there is no record. The street has been occupied by trolley tracks for some years, however, and thereby thrown open to public usage.

'Newkirk avenue, between above limits, no record, but the same has ben open upon the ground and publicly used for many years. (See Board Public Improvement proceedings for the year 1899, page 2321.)'

All the lands within the following boundaries, namely: The southerly line of park lands lying between Flatbush and Washington avenues, and constituting the old boundary line between the former City of Brooklyn and the former Town of Flatbush on the north; Washington avenue on the east; Lefferts avenue on the south, and Flatbush avenue on the west, excepting such lands as may be necessary for use by the Brighton Beach Railroad for the right of way for a double track road diagonally through the lands as already laid out on the Map of The City of New York.

Park Commissioner Young submitted a plan of the improvement and also a

blue print showing the assessable values of the adjoining property.

Professor Franklin H. Hooper submitted a plan of University Park and a map showing the roadway to the ocean, which would be made complete by these improvements.


