Dr. William Mabon, Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, reported as follows:

It is recommended that inasmuch as the amount expended thus far this year for hose is only \$154.40, and if advertised for it cannot be supplied until after the 1st of January, it be purchased on the open market.

The hospital formularies have been supplied, and an opinion is requested as to whether or not substitutes on the House Staff shall be supplied with them.

The trial balance has not yet been completed, but there will probably be about forty thousand dollars for the month's supplies, and this will enable us to purchase for stock a number of important supplies from the prisons. The balance for repairs on the 1st of December amounted to about twenty-five hundred dollars, and nearly all of this balance has since been used.

It is recommended that two manholes be placed in the main conduit between the administration building and the power house, and bids on the work are herewith submitted. The changing of the pipes for refrigerating in the morgue is also recommended, and bids are herewith submitted for the work.

The cost of the heating apparatus for the Orderlies' dining room is approximately \$250.

The change in Gouverneur Hospital will necessitate the tearing down of the old building and the clinic for trachoma will have to be held in the hospital proper, and it is recommended that such changes as are necessary to install this clinic be undertaken at once. A number of employees now occupy the old hospital building, and some are at present housed in a building near the institution. The only suitable place for the twenty-two employees we have thus far been able to find is in Henry street, and the house can be rented for \$900. It is therefore recommended that this house be inspected.

A safe for the use of the Board of Trustees has been purchased from the Herring-Hall-Marvin Safe Company at \$225.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the Superintendent be authorized to have placed in the main conduit, between the administration building and the power house, two manholes at a sum not to exceed \$86.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the pipes for refrigerating in the morgue be changed at a cost not to exceed \$390.

Dr. William Mahon, Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, reported as follows:

"After conference with the President of the Board of Trustees, it is recommended, at his suggestion, that women Head Nurses be appointed for the prison and alcoholic wards for men.

The Contract Clerk, Bookkeeper and Supervising Engineer have removed their offices to the rooms provided for them in the dormitory building, and it is recommended that one of the rooms formerly used by the Bookkeeper be assigned as an extra dining-room for certain of the Clerks employed in the Bookkeeper's office, and for the Foreman of the stable and the Ambulance Drivers. The present Orderlies' dining-room is very crowded, and is used by all classes of employees. By removing seventeen or eighteen employees from this dining-room to the new one suggested the service will be much improved, and we shall be able to provide better facilities for a very desirable class of our help. This change will necessitate the employment of an additional Waitress.

The Bookkeeper reports that up to December 1 there was a balance of \$41,142.43 and that the estimated expenses for the month, including articles already purchased, amounts to \$37,000. This leaves an available balance of about \$4,000 for providing additional stock. The available balance for alterations, additions and repairs is less than \$1,000.

A communication from Mr. Jones, Supervising Engineer, is herewith presented in regard to the heating of the Out Patient Department of Harlem Hospital. The furnace installed there is not large enough for the demands made upon it. When this building was first leased it was to be used for out-patient work alone, but we have since provided a maternity and children's ward, a room for the Nurse and a clinical laboratory.

It is recommended that the Board of Coroners be requested to hold an autopsy on all so-called Coroners' cases which die in Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

Gouverneur Hospital.

The house, which Miss Stowers wished examined to see if it was suitable for housing the employees who now occupy the old Gouverneur Hospital, was found to be in bad repair. The rent, \$900, is excessive. After conferring with the President of the Board it was decided to have Miss Stowers look up apartments in the vicinity. She will be able to get a sufficient number of rooms near the institution at a much lower cost.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That a woman Head Nurse be employed in the prison ward for men and in the alcoholic ward for men as soon as the proper persons can be found.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That one of the rooms formerly occupied by the Bookkeeper be equipped as a dining room for certain Clerks and for the Foreman of the Stable and the Ambulance Drivers.

On motion, duly seconded, it was


