The following contracts were entered into:

Twenty-four for paving and repaving, estimated cost, \$388,327.66; six for regulating and grading, estimated cost, \$357,936.60; twelve for sewers, estimated cost, \$127,396.13; twenty-four special contracts, estimated cost, \$4,501.92; three miscellaneous contracts, estimated cost, \$55,289.80. Total contracts entered into, sixty-nine.

Contracts were completed as follows:

Forty-four for paving and repaving, cost, \$538,537.83; five for regulating and grading, cost, \$181,747.49; four for sewers, cost, \$30,303.95; thirty for flagging, etc., cost, \$5,475.35; five miscellaneous contracts, cost, \$102,496.26. Total, eighty-eight contracts completed at an aggregate cost of \$858,560.88.

Principal items of work done under these contracts are as follows:

Thirty-five thousand five hundred and eighty-nine cubic yards earth excavated; 18,895 cubic yards rock excavated; 18,234 cubic yards filling furnished; 16,938 linear feet curbstones furnished and set; 55,716 square feet flagging furnished and laid; 8,416 square feet flagging relaid; 20,037 square yards pavement laid; 3,499 square feet bridge-stones laid; 1,549 linear feet gutter paved; 2,690 linear feet iron fence built; 3,962 cubic yards concrete laid; 5,820 cubic yards rubble backing furnished; 43,759 cubic feet granite, hammer dressed; 422,700 pounds steel beams furnished; 3,181,600 pounds steel girders furnished; 3,000 feet, B. M., timber furnished.

New pavements were laid as follows:

Sheet asphalt, 2.07 miles; asphalt block, 4.43; wood block, 1.27 miles; granite block, 1.36 miles, making a total of 9.13 miles.

The working force of the Bureau of Highways took up and relaid 76,942 square yards of stone block pavement, and performed other necessary work.

Permits were issued as follows:

To construct vaults, 74; to repair vaults, 60; to place guy posts, 19; to place tar kettles, 130; to place boilers on streets, 303; to set banner poles, 41; to repair pavement at expense of applicants, 6; making a total of 633.

The receipts for vault permits amounted to \$95,575.11.

In making repairs to macadamized and unpaved roads in the upper section of the borough, the Division of Streets and Roads used 435 loads of broken stone; removed 661 loads of dirt; hauled 473 loads of earth; removed 1,502 loads of refuse, and 324 loads of ashes; filled in a large number of washouts, cleaned the roadways and crosswalks, drains and gutters, and cut down weeds and did the necessary sprinkling to prevent dust.

New mains were laid as follows:

Electric main conduits, 121,843 linear feet; gas mains, 12,440 linear feet; water mains, 20,053 linear feet; salt water mains, 47,151 linear feet; pneumatic tubes, 1,370 linear feet.

In addition to the laying of these new mains, 8,846 linear feet of gas mains and 4,126 linear feet of electric mains were overhauled.

The following openings were made in the pavement:

To lay and overhaul electric mains, 473; to lay and overhaul gas mains, 39; to lay and overhaul steam mains, 5; to lay and overhaul mains for other purposes, 53; to lay and overhaul water mains, 615; to lay and overhaul sewers, 44; to lay and repair electric services, 2,794; to lay and repair gas services, 1,940; to lay and repair steam services, 120; to lay and repair water services, 451; to lay and repair sewer services, 259; to construct and repair railways, 341, making a total of 7,134.

The Bureau of Sewers constructed 1,622 linear feet of sewer during the quarter, and the present total length of the sewerage system in the Borough of Manhattan is 513.88 miles, with 6,232 sewer basins.

The labor force of the Bureau of Sewers relieved 283 receiving basins; cleaned 3,117 receiving basins, and 225,031 linear feet of sewer.

They also relieved 53,377 linear feet of sewer; laid 233 linear feet of culvert; built 2,107 cubic feet of brick work; laid 241 square yards of pavement; excavated and re-filled 344 cubic yards of earth and removed 10,527 cart loads of dirt.

The Bureau of Incumbrances received and attended to 602 complaints of obstructions; made 175 seizures and removals of obstructions; issued 1,526 permits for building material; 206 permits to cross sidewalks with horses and carts, and 177 to erect temporary sheds over sidewalks.

This Bureau also removed 366 loads of dirt, stone and rubbish; 8 fallen trees, dangerous stumps, etc.

The report of the Engineer of Street Openings gives in detail the work done in making surveys, maps and reports for opening new streets, parks, etc.

The work done and supplies furnished by the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices is set forth in detail in the report of the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices.

STATEMENT No. 2.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER LOOMIS.

October 11, 1906.

Hon. JOHN V. COGGEY, Superintendent of Sewers:

Dear Sir—In compliance with your instructions I hand you herewith a report of the work done and in course of construction under my supervision for the quarter ending September 30, 1906, with a statement of work done by mechanics and laborers. The present total length of the sewerage system in the Borough of Manhattan is 2,713,314 linear feet, or 513.88 miles with 6,232 basins, making the amount done of new sewer during the quarter 1,622 linear feet of sewer.

The following sewers have been completed during the quarter:

Sewer in West One Hundred and Forty-third street, between Harlem river and Lenox avenue.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, between Harlem river and Lenox avenue.

Alterations and improvements to sewer in Columbus avenue, east side, between Seventy-fourth and Seventy-fifth streets.

Reconstruction of sewer in First avenue, between One Hundred and Ninth and One Hundred and Tenth streets.

There are now in active progress seventeen contracts payable from Street Improvement Fund, amounting to \$209,630.38. There are also two reconstruction contracts in progress, payable from appropriation "Reconstruction of Sewers, Borough of Manhattan," amounting to \$27,572.25. A detailed statement of all the above works appears in schedule annexed.

The following contracts are contemplated and as soon as the surveys are made and the plans prepared they will be advertised at public letting:

Sewer in One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, between Broadway and Claremont avenue.

Sewer in One Hundred and Ninety-first street, between Wadsworth and St. Nicholas avenues.

Extension of sewer at Seventy-fourth street and East river.

Receiving basin on southwest corner Seventh avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street.

Extension of sewer in Sixty-first street, between Broadway and Central Park West.

Sewer in Two Hundred and Fourteenth street, between Tenth avenue and Harlem river.

Rebuilding of sewer in Twenty-sixth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues.

Rebuilding of sewer in Liberty street—Greenwich to West streets.

Rebuilding of sewer in Liberty street, between Nassau street and Maiden lane.

Rebuilding of sewer in John street—Broadway to Pearl street.

Rebuilding of sewer in Cedar street, between Broadway and Nassau street.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, between Convent and Amsterdam avenues.

Restoring outlets at Nineteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets at Hudson river.

Sewer in Seaman avenue, between Academy and Emerson streets.

Sewer in One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, between Fort Washington and Haven avenues.

Twin sewers under New York Central Building, Twelfth avenue, Forty-second and Forty-third streets.

Extension of sewer in One Hundred and Twentieth street and East river.

Sewer in Fairview avenue, between Eleventh avenue and Broadway.

One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, between Audubon and St. Nicholas avenues.

Basin, southwest corner One Hundred and Twentieth street and St. Nicholas avenue.

Basin, northwest corner One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street and Lenox avenue.

The following work will be let at public letting as soon as the contracts are approved:

Outlet sewer in West Two Hundred and Eleventh street, between Harlem river and Broadway.

Sewer in Seventh avenue, west side, between One Hundred and Forty-fourth and One Hundred and Forty-fifth streets.

Sewer in Seventh avenue, west side, between One Hundred and Forty-fifth and One Hundred and Forty-sixth streets.

Sewer in Two Hundred and Third street, between Harlem river and summit west of Ninth avenue, and Ninth avenue, between Two Hundred and Second and Two Hundred and Fourth streets.

Sewer in Two Hundred and Fourth street, between Harlem river and Ninth avenue.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Fifty-second street, between Eighth avenue and Macomb's Dam road.

Little is to be added to the remarks on the general subject of sewer construction in this borough to what was said in my last quarterly report. All the works mentioned therein are progressing favorably. Sewer in Two Hundred and Sixteenth street between Harlem river and Broadway is about finished. Work is now going on in sewer in Ninth avenue, between Two Hundred and Fifteenth and Two Hundred and Sixteenth streets, and in Two Hundred and Fifteenth street, between Ninth avenue and Broadway; also on sewer in Two Hundred and Thirteenth street, between Tenth avenue and Harlem river.

Contract for sewer in Two Hundred and Eleventh street, between Broadway and Harlem river, has been signed and contractor ordered to go to work. Several other sewers in that neighborhood are in contemplation and in various stages of advancement in the way of plans, specifications, contracts, etc.

The following have been let, but contractor not ordered to work:

Sewer in One Hundred and Seventy-first street, between Fort Washington and Haven avenues.

Sewer in Seventh avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-fourth and One Hundred and Forty-fifth streets.

Sewer in Seventh avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-fifth and One Hundred and Forty-sixth streets.

Sewer in Two Hundred and Third street, between Harlem river and summit west of Ninth avenue.

Sewer in Two Hundred and Fourth street, between Harlem river and Ninth avenue.

Sewer in One Hundred and Fifty-second street, between Eighth avenue and Macomb's Dam road.

Plans have been forwarded for the reconstruction of sewer at Twenty-third street and North river and One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, between Riverside drive and Broadway.

All these works will be soon under way.

The work of reconstructing and rebuilding outlet sewers in the lower part of the City in conformity with the new construction of the Department of Docks and Ferries will engage our attention for some time to come.

Considerable work is being done by corporations, in connection with the Rapid Transit System and the underground roads of several railroad companies, notably the reconstruction of sewer in Eighteenth street, between Sixth avenue and the Hudson river, together with the rearrangement and rebuilding of sewers in Sixth avenue, between Twelfth and Thirty-third streets by the same company.

Permit has recently been given to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to build a low-level sewer for the drainage of their terminal yard in Forty-sixth street, from Madison avenue to the East river.

Sewer Permits.

One hundred and ninety-three permits issued for new connections and two hundred and eighty-one permits issued for repairs.

Engineers' Fees.

Amount of Engineers' fees assessed on property benefited and charged to Street Improvement Fund was \$1,367.07.

Hon. WILLIAM DALTON, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending September 30, 1906:

Criminal Courts Building.

The janitor and engineer were supplied with the usual cleaning articles and tools, as required. Orders were also issued monthly for the care and maintenance of the plumbing, steam and gas systems. The contract which was let in April for the completion of the electrical wiring system and providing for the running of the wires in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Board of Underwriters and the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, has proceeded in a satisfactory manner, and is now almost completed. Orders were also issued for the installation of two additional 5-light clusters, four additional 4-light, one 5-light and two 3-light clusters with flush switches and circuit connections in anteroom, third floor, jury room and stenographer's room. One floor receptacle was installed in each of the following rooms: Justices Cowing's, Rosalsky's and Recorder Goff's. Two desk receptacles were installed in the District Attorney's room and four desk receptacles in each of the six court rooms. Nine additional outlets and one base receptacle were furnished for the telephone room on third floor. Three outlets in Justice Foster's rooms on third floor; three outlets including two 4-light pendants in room occupied by Assistant District Attorney Taylor on the fourth floor were also installed. The walls, ceilings and woodwork were cleaned off, prepared and painted with oil paint after repairs were made to the plastering in the following offices and court rooms: Coroners' office—Coroners Acritelli and Harburger; medical room and private hall; Supreme Court, Criminal Branch, Clerk's office; District Attorney's offices on the Centre street side of building, between Franklin and White streets; hallway on Elm street side, between the

same streets, which is used by the Justices of the Courts of Special and General Sessions; passageways to the toilets connected with the District Attorney's offices; rooms occupied by Justices Rosalsky, Foster and Cowing; offices occupied by Assistant District Attorneys Lockwood, Corrigan, Kresel, Vandiver, Trowbridge, Perkins, Krotel, Pinchot, Howe, O'Connell, Meising and O'Neill; also Detective Sergeants' and Reporters' rooms; private rooms occupied by Justice O'Sullivan and Recorder Goff.

The arches under boilers in the engine room, Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4, were rebuilt and left in working condition. The automatic temperature regulators were equipped with new parts as required. The thermostats were adjusted as required and new ones furnished where necessary. Thirty-three McClave grate bars were installed in the boilers and defective bars removed; twenty-four caps and plugs were also furnished. Pump No. 1 in the engine room was thoroughly overhauled and repaired, and new parts furnished where required. 2,500 16-candle-power incandescent lamps, six inner globes for arc lamps, six outside globes and twenty-four brushes were furnished for use in the building; also one porcelain lined refrigerator for use of the justices. Orders were also issued for the use of water cooler with a supply of water weekly in the jury room in above building.

The Elevators—No. 1. The lower gate valve was renewed, also gate valves and stem and upper gate valve; repairs were made to cut-off and hand rope in No. 2 was pieced out, the cut-off on No. 3 repaired, the cut-off on No. 4 repaired and adjusted, repairs were made to the stop balls in No. 5 and levers adjusted, the levers of No. 6 were also repaired and the elevators left in a first class condition. Two barrels of lubricating oil soap were furnished for use on the elevators.

Courts of General and Special Sessions—One mahogany sectional bookcase, 9½ inches deep, with corner brackets, was furnished for Judge Rosalsky's chambers. About 600 yards of muslin were used in protecting the furniture during the painting and alterations to the electrical systems in the various court rooms.

District Attorney's Office—One oak correspondence unit, together with guides, cards, keys, etc., and one oak card case fitted with locks and cards, and one set of blue celluloid guides, were furnished for the Detectives' room.

Clerk of Court of General Sessions—About 65 yards of Wilton velvet carpet were furnished and laid in Mr. Carroll's office.

Coroner's Office—Five electric fans were furnished and installed in the various offices and one golden oak roll top desk, one golden oak revolving chair, nine golden oak chairs and one golden oak costumer.

County Court House.

The usual supplies were furnished for the Janitor and Engineer in small quantities, as required. The contract for the installation of lighting fixtures has proceeded in a satisfactory manner and is now almost completed. Additional orders were issued for the installation of one hanging globe fixture with holophane glass and bronze finish for the Judge's dining room. Three 6-gas and electric chandeliers, two 1-electric standards, two 3-electric standards, two 1-electric portable and six ornamental caps and plates were furnished for the Trial Term, Part XIII. Wiring was installed for additional lights in the Judge's library, with provision for fan outlets. A new panel board was also installed. New parts were furnished for the gas lighting system, such as mantles, burners, etc., during the quarter and the defective parts removed. Ventilator covers were installed throughout the various court rooms. Repairs were also made to the Johnson temperature regulator system throughout the building. The walls were repaired and painted in seventeen court rooms where registers were removed, matching the present painting.

Supreme Court—All of the draperies, hangings, curtains, etc., were taken down and cleaned, and the same reset properly. About 1,000 yards of carpet were also cleaned and relaid in the various parts of this Court. About 138 yards of plain linoleum were furnished and laid in Part I. Orders were issued for the usual supply of filtered water for the use of the Judges.

City Hall.

The usual supplies were furnished in small quantities for the use of the Janitor and Engineer, as required. One Worthington steam pump, with all necessary piping connections, was furnished and installed. Repairs were made to exhaust fans, armature rewound, and new parts furnished as required. Defective piping in the pipe gallery in basement was replaced; repairs were made to steam traps, valves and hot water heater. Overflow was put in from temperature regulator to sewer. Radiators connected, pipes cleaned and repaired.

City Clerk's Office—The radiators throughout the building were repaired. All of the steam pipes throughout the building were covered with canvas, magnesia and hair felt, as directed. Two screens were furnished.

Mayor's Office—The Mayor's office was thoroughly overhauled, repaired and altered under a Revenue Bond fund, and was supervised by Mr. W. A. Welsh, architect, and consisted of the following work: The installation of electrical outlets, base receptacle outlets and feeders; new hardware for doors, etc.; carpentering work and altering furniture, etc.; cleaning the marble mantel and hearth, furnishing new black and gold marble facings, making, modeling and casting New York City coat of arms to replace clock dial in the Mayor's private room; disconnecting and reconnecting radiators, painting, installation of electrical fixtures and standards; candelabra lamps and furnishing one clock. One golden oak flat top desk furnished for Chief Clerk, with chair; also two glass tops. Electric annunciator system installed.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment—One oval mahogany table was furnished. Orders were issued for supply of towels weekly, and the use of cabinets.

President of the Borough of Manhattan—Two file cases were furnished; also supplies for the use of the President's automobile; one City and one business directory; one Smith Premier typewriting machine installed.

Governor's Room—Portraits of Governors Tompkins and Bouck were lined, and the portrait of Governor Young was cleaned and varnished. The accumulations of dust were removed from all the pictures in the room, the same taken from their frames, stretched and replaced in proper position; new material furnished where required, and frames retouched.

President of the Board of Aldermen—One rug was furnished as selected.

Brown Stone Building.

The usual supplies were furnished as required, and ordered for the janitor. Repairs were made to both elevators in this building; pistons repacked, operating valves and stuffing boxes. One bottom valve bonnet renewed and the ropes adjusted.

West Fifty-fourth Street Court House.

Cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished as required, also supplies for the gas lighting system, mantles, burners and chimneys. Repairs were made to the steam, return and drip pipes, also to the steam pump. Defective parts were removed and replaced with new. All valves, pipings, etc., necessary to complete the job were furnished. One set of double action eccentric motion grate bars were furnished for the boilers.

Harlem Court House.

Repairs were made to the tile roof where necessary. The elevators were examined and repaired, cables shortened, guides secured and safety adjusted. The pump and piston valves of stuffing boxes were repacked, hinges of gate repaired, and also elevator door locks. New toilet fixtures, with all necessary connections, including marble work, etc., were installed on the third floor. New gas piping and lights were installed on the second floor; toilet fixtures repaired on the third floor; fixtures cleared and repaired in basement. New basin installed on third floor. Ceilings and walls, the Magistrate's hallway, toilet room on Magistrate's floor and room occupied by the Gerry Society, were cleaned off, plastering repaired, painted, kalsomined and varnished, as required. Croton risers were installed from basement to top floor. Piping reconnected, waste pipes cleared on top floor, repairs made to toilet fixtures in prison pen, and basin in Magistrate's Court reset. The usual supplies were furnished for Janitor and Engineer's use.

East Fifty-seventh Street Court.

Additional steam work was installed in the above building. New radiator put in new examination room and one outside of same. New wall coil placed under the window of Clerk's office. All necessary valves, connections, bronzing, etc., furnished to complete the job. One large gas radiator was furnished for the Gerry Society, second floor, and two dozen chairs were distributed throughout the building. Supplies were furnished from time to time to the Janitor and Engineer.

Jefferson Market Court House.

Defective radiators in the Magistrate's court room and lobby were removed and replaced with new ones, and all valves and connections furnished. The toilet fixtures on the Municipal Court floor were repaired. Gas burners were installed on the same floor. Leaks in gas piping in tower repaired, and gas outlets installed in Magistrate's court and Sergeant's rooms. One dozen bent wood chairs furnished.

Children's Court.

Cleaning supplies were furnished as required.

Thirteenth District Municipal Court.

The usual cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished from time to time. Thirty-six sections of quartered oak adjustable bookcases were also furnished. About fifty electric fans were furnished and installed, with all necessary wiring to complete the job.

Essex Market Court House.

The usual cleaning and engineer's supplies were furnished. One rug, 12 feet by 9 feet; three rugs, 6 feet by 3 feet, and one rug, 3 feet by 2 feet 6 inches, and seven chairs were also furnished. Twenty yards of linoleum were laid in the Sergeant's room.

First District Municipal Court.

The usual supplies were furnished for cleaning the building, and the roof was repaired and painted, and the valleys and gutters cleaned out. The present defective wooden tank on the roof was removed, and the same replaced with a new 2-inch cypress wooden tank; size, 7 feet 8 inch in diameter by 7 feet high. All necessary connections were made to same, and the tank was left in good working order.

Second District Municipal Court.

The usual cleaning supplies were furnished.

Fourth District Municipal Court.

The usual cleaning supplies were furnished.

Fifth District Municipal Court.

The usual cleaning supplies were furnished.

Twelfth District Municipal Court.

About 67 yards of linoleum were furnished and laid, and about 137 yards of body Brussels carpet were furnished and laid as directed, and about 110 yards of rubber runner. Twenty-seven opaque hand-made shades were also furnished and hung on tin rollers. Judge's platform was erected, jury box installed, judge's desks rearranged, new desks built for Clerks and all carpenter work necessary to fit up courtrooms. Old railing was removed from the old courtroom in One Hundredth street and reinstalled with about 160 square feet of new railing in the new courtroom on Ninety-sixth street and Broadway. All of the hardwood where necessary was cleaned off and painted; the old furniture revarnished, and the new work around Judge's platform painted, grained and varnished.

Fourteenth District Municipal Court.

Fourteen electric light fixtures and fourteen combination fixtures were installed and wired as required. All of the hardwood was cleaned off and painted as required, and the new work around Judge's platform, all of the new closets, shelving and lockers were painted, grained and varnished. Thirty sectional bookcases, with tops and bases similar in design to present work in courtroom, were furnished. One clock was also placed in the courtroom.

Department of Finance.

Bureau of Investigation and Statistics—The following office furniture was furnished and supplied: Four golden oak flat-top desks, three rolltop desks, 5 feet; seven revolving chairs, four chairs, eight bookcases for desks, one cabinet for stationery, one typewriter chair, one vertical letter file, one 6-foot rolltop desk, one 8-foot library table, one revolving chair, six chairs, one revolving bookcase, one costumer, three bookcases, three typewriter desks, 5 feet; three typewriter desks, 45 inches; four chairs; three costumers, one 6-foot library table, one golden oak rolltop desk, 6 feet; one library table, 8 feet; one revolving chair, six chairs, one costumer, one rolltop desk, 6 feet; one revolving chair, three chairs, one costumer, one rolltop desk, 6 feet; one revolving chair, one 5-foot typewriter desk, one revolving chair, one wardrobe. All of the above furniture was of golden oak of the best manufacture.

The offices of the Comptroller were thoroughly cleaned by the vacuum cleaning process and left in a sanitary condition. One slant top desk was furnished for the Deputy Comptroller's room; also one rolltop desk, 6 feet, and one revolving chair of golden oak in the same room.

One Smyrna rug and about 120 yards of plain linoleum were furnished and laid in Room 128; two 3-fold screens were delivered to Room 10. The following articles of furniture were delivered as set forth:

Bureau of Law and Adjustment—One vertical steel document file, arranged to order; one rolltop desk and one revolving chair for the Charitable Institutions Division.

Auditing Bureau—One quartered oak special wardrobe, one golden oak rolltop desk as selected, and another rolltop golden oak desk of a larger size than the one above mentioned was also furnished.

Contract Bureau—One golden oak rolltop desk and one chair; in Room 195, one dozen chairs; Room 11, one 66-inch golden oak rolltop desk. Three pieces of plate glass were fitted on desks in Comptroller's office as directed. Room 11, one Remington No. 6 typewriter and one quartered oak rolltop desk; golden oak slant top desk for Deputy Comptroller McCooley; golden oak revolving chair for Assistant Deputy Comptroller Smith; golden oak rolltop desk and one revolving chair for Mr. Fuller. One typewriter chair and one ordinary chair were furnished for use in this department.

Chief Clerk's Office—One rolltop desk. Room 27, two costumers. About 160 yards of inlaid linoleum were laid in Room 178, also two Wilton rugs, about 20 yards of cocoa matting, four rubber ends and about 100 yards of plain linoleum. All the cabinet work required in repairing and refinishing the Comptroller's desk was done as directed, and one revolving chair furnished in his office. One Remington typewriter No. 6 and one rolltop typewriter desk furnished for Mr. Stanton's room. One rolltop typewriter desk was furnished for the Comptroller's office. Two sets of window ventilators were installed in the Bureau of Franchises; one rolltop desk and chair in Room 11; one large size hat tree for Chief Clerk's office; about 52 yards of linoleum laid in Room 4; Room 55, one rolltop desk, one dozen chairs and one table; one typewriter cabinet, 50 inches long, 32 inches wide, 30 inches deep.

City Chamberlain's Office—Two umbrella stands.

Receiver of Taxes—Two fireproof safes, with combination locks, etc., 54 by 46 by 18, and cabinet work arranged to order, were installed. One 30-circuit panel board, with 30 switches and fuses, installed complete. All the carpentering work required in extending the office, erecting partitions, cases, railings, etc., installing new desks, cases and shelving and making repairs to office furniture was done. All the wiring required for 36 outlets was also performed. About 20 electric light fixtures, with 125 green shades, also 26 combination gas and electric fixtures and 150 green shades, were furnished. One safe was removed from Stapleton, Staten Island, and transferred to the Manhattan office. All the old counters and partitions were cleaned off and varnished, also grained as required. One Bailey letterpress and stand were also furnished. Partitions were removed from Stapleton to the Manhattan office. Forty-eight revolving desk stools, cane seat, spindle back, were furnished as directed.

Municipal Civil Service Commission.

Two mats were furnished. All the lettering required on the doors of the various offices was performed; 4 dozen tables were loaned to the Commission; one hat tree; 2½ dozen bent wood chairs; 3 tables; 3 chairs as selected and three dozen additional bent wood chairs; one golden oak table, 4 feet 4 inches by 2 feet 4 inches; two tables, 3 feet by 2 feet, for the Certification Bureau; 2 tables, 3 feet by 2 feet, for Payroll Bureau; 2 imitation mahogany chairs; two costumers; partitions on the second and third floors were removed, rearranged and set up, and old material used with the new in extending the same.

Hall of Records Building.

Sufficient cleaning supplies were furnished to keep the building in proper condition, together with supplies of tools and electrical supplies for the engineer and electrician.

Orders were issued to the New York Telephone Company for telephone equipment for all of the tenants in the building. The following departments will occupy offices in this structure: Record room, Finance Department; Department of Taxes and Assessments, Register's office, Surrogate's Court and Corporation Counsel's office. Supplies of cups, pails, cuspidors, soap, cleaning bleach, brooms, dusters, brushes, etc., were furnished for the care of the building. One wardrobe, four rubber mats, and a supply of gauge glasses were furnished. Three fire hose, 10 feet 6 inches long, three 6 feet long, and two rakes, and one dozen iron pipe handles were furnished. One pipe railing was erected in pit of boiler room, and one flight of stairs installed from floor level to pit. All of the pumps and machinery were thoroughly inspected and overhauled, and any small parts required were furnished. Bars and inter-bars were cut out where required, and gates installed instead. All of the labor and material required for the installation of ladies' toilet, including all plumbing fixtures, piping, air and vent pipes, etc., basins, marble, etc., were furnished and the work completed in a first class manner. A fireproof partition was erected in new ladies' toilet similar in design to those in the building. Twenty-two dozen golden oak chairs were furnished and delivered for use in the building.

Williamsburg Bridge.

Three hundred and twenty-four outdoor settees, 8 feet long, were furnished and distributed at the approach to the above bridge from Essex street to the Bowery.

County Jail.

Two Coir mats and one refrigerator were furnished. A complete set of new grate bars were installed.

The Markets.

Washington—New flooring was installed at the following stand numbers: 44, 45, 110, 300, 303, 331, 332, 312, 313, 232, 133, 85 and 86. New leaders were installed at the following stands, and the defective ones removed: 56, 64, 99, 131, 225, 163, 255, 285, 323, 295, 13, 59, 21, 22, 93, 272 and 293.

West Washington—Owing to the dangerous condition of the corner piers at Bloomfield and Lawton avenues, and the northeast pier at Bloomfield street and Lawton avenue, it was necessary to take same down; do all necessary shoring and underpinning required to make same safe, and to rebuild new piers. Repairs were made to the gutters, cornices and roof at the northeast and northwest corners of Bloomfield street and Lawton avenue, damage which was caused by the masonry work above mentioned. New galvanized iron leaders were furnished at the following stands: Nos. 34, 47 and 63 Grace avenue; Nos. 31, 32 and 48 Hewitt avenue; Nos. 31, 33, 34 and 64 Loew avenue; Nos. 17 and 32 Thompson avenue; Nos. 35 and 63 Gansvoort street and No. 64 Bloomfield street. The awnings were extended and new parts installed on cornices, gutters and roof on the northeast and southeast corners of Thirteenth and Loew avenues. Cleaning supplies were furnished as required.

Fulton—All of the material necessary and labor required to complete the draining and sewage systems at stands Nos. 264 and 214 was done. New pipes, bends, hoops, ferules, etc., required for 39 leaders were furnished and installed. The roof of the above market was painted with the best Prince's metallic paint ground in linseed oil on the Beekman, South and Fulton street sides. All the rust was scraped off from the under side of awnings, and the same prepared and painted with the best quality oil paint.

Jefferson—The gutters were straightened, new leaders installed where required, and the same properly connected with sewer.

The Baths.

Rivington Street Bath—The usual supplies for cleaning for the use of the engineer were furnished. About ten No. 1 nickel plated gegenstroms, together with gaskets, sheet packing and piston rings, also about 25 feet of steam hose with couplings furnished. Three slop sinks were installed, cellar drainer connected, leaks on the second floor repaired, floor drain connected with sewer, hose connection put in, defective returner from gegenstrom replaced. Four drains installed on first floor; hot water pipes on second floor cleared, all pipes, elbows, valves, etc., furnished to complete the job.

East Seventy-sixth Street Bath—All the work required in placing the steam-fitting in engine room in first class condition was done. New injector to boiler room installed; new piping, elbows, tees, unions, globe check and gate valves furnished to complete the same. Cleaning and engineer supplies were furnished as usual. Slop sinks and wash basins with all necessary connections were installed on the first and second floors, men's side, and on the first floor of the women's side. Sinks were made of porcelain with enameled iron traps, etc., and Italian marble basin.

Allen Street Bath—The usual cleaning supplies were furnished. Defective return pipes under floor were replaced, reducing valve installed on steam line to hot water tank, new valves to steam traps were installed where required; new steam coil installed in hot water heater; additional radiators placed on women's side, and brick trench with slate slabs built in engine room for the return pipe. The floor drains to showers which were defective were placed in working order. Trench in boiler room concreted, marble seats installed in shower rooms, and ventilator in side walls. New injector installed to boiler room; new regulator at heater; repairs made to steam leaks in the engine room; defective valves at pump repaired, and new ones furnished where required. New valve installed at steam trap; new gaskets on main steam flanges, and all work to complete the job satisfactorily done. One 4-inch Trident water meter, No. 328967, with elbows, couplings, nipples, piping, etc., was installed.

West Sixtieth Street Bath—One 4-inch Trident water meter No. 328131, with all elbows, nipples, piping, gate valves, etc., installed as directed. One syphon was installed to steam pit in cellar; vapor pipe from blow-off tank to roof, valve to control radiators upstairs, relief and check valves on hot water tanks and returns, vent to suction tank, foot valve on suction pump, and other work to complete steam equipment was installed. It was necessary to install additional radiators on the men's and women's side, furnish new piping, valves and connections to increase the heating system. Extra heavy wire grating was furnished and put in place. All of the tanks in the above building and the hot and cold water pipes were covered to protect them from damage in cold weather, and to conserve steam supply. All the lettering required on the interior and outside of the bath was done. The dynamos painted and varnished, ash cans lettered and railing painted. Hoisting apparatus was installed for lifting ashes from engine room. Orders were issued for use of the telephone during the year. Two dozen bent wood chairs, two wardrobes, one revolving stool, two rubber mats for engine room, a supply of packing for the engineer, half a dozen chairs and cleaning and other supplies for keeping the building in proper condition were furnished.

East Eleventh Street Bath—Additional hot water heater was installed to give an adequate supply of hot water to showers. All valves, connections, etc., to complete same were furnished. The shower bath system in the bath was thoroughly examined and overhauled, and defects corrected. New parts were furnished where required, showers made secure to hardwood, marble stall partitions pointed up at flooring to prevent leakage in cellar, and toilet fixtures throughout building placed in proper condition. Drainer installed in cellar of boiler room; new basin connections furnished, and gas light system installed as directed. Two exhaust fans were rewound, repaired and placed in proper position. Janitor and engineer supplies were also furnished as required.

One Hundred and Ninth Street Bath—Mixing valves which did not work satisfactorily were placed in good order. New parts for showers furnished and installed where required. Floors of shower stalls cemented and joints pointed up between the floors to prevent leakage. Floor drains and toilet fixtures placed in good working order. One gong was installed, new feed pipes and valves installed to both boilers; new pipes and valves installed to blow-off; leaks in piping corrected; new steam pipes and valves installed in boilers to replace defective ones. Steam injector to feed both boilers installed; new pipes and valves to water columns furnished and set, steam coils repaired; new brass pipe put in place of defective pipe around skylight. New gaskets installed and flanges tightened. Cleaning and engineer supplies were furnished as needed.

West Forty-first Street Bath—Cleaning supplies were furnished as required. Also supplies of oil, etc., for the engineer. One 4-inch water main with a 2-inch connection to street main was installed, together with water meter and all necessary connections in order to provide water supply for second floor bathing. Two sets of grate bars were installed complete on boilers. New drips and exhaust pipes to engines were installed; oil separators removed, new return pipes from heaters installed, also traps to tanks. New steam trap on high pressure line; new line from steam pumps direct to boiler, new drips to steam pumps installed. Returns from heating plant changed, and all piping valves, etc., furnished. New injectors to boilers connected, leaks in piping repaired, trench built for drip and return pipes, same covered with slate slabs in order

to make repairs easier to accomplish. Hot water ventilator repaired, and the plant put in good working order.

Twenty-third Street Bath has not as yet been turned over to the City, but is progressing satisfactorily.

Free Floating Baths.

Small supplies were delivered as required. All of the connections required for lighting the baths at their several locations on the North and East rivers were done. Boats, rigging, labor, etc., to raise anchors and moor baths were also furnished. Orders were issued for the carpenter work required in erecting platforms, and for small repairs on the baths at their various locations. The baths furnished bathing facilities to an unusually large number of patrons.

Public Bath Nos. 83 and 85 Carmine Street—Orders were issued for a survey of premises above mentioned for proposed new public bath.

East Fifty-fourth Street new Public Bath—Orders were issued for survey of premises on East Fifty-fourth-street west of First avenue on the south side for the proposed new public bath.

Public Comfort Stations.

Battery Park, Hanover Square, City Hall Park, Chatham Square, Sheriff and Delancey Streets, Greeley Square, Long Acre Square, One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Street. The stations above mentioned were supplied with disinfectant and other cleaning supplies of a small nature. No repairs were required, or any alterations.

Officers of the Commissioner of Public Works, Bureau of Buildings—

Three roll top desks and three revolving chairs; one 50-inch roll top desk and one revolving chair for same, also four directories, two wardrobes, 100 Bailey rubber sheets and three dozen roller towels; two cushions for chairs, one No. 65 roll top desk, one No. 255½ revolving chair, one No. 57 roll top desk, one No. 253½ revolving chair were furnished. Supplies for use of the Superintendent's automobile were furnished. Oak partition was erected in the office of the Chief of the Plumbing Division on the third floor, and all necessary hardware furnished.

Bureau of Sewers—One oak roll top desk, one revolving chair for same, two arm chairs and two wardrobes were furnished, also one copying press for Assistant Engineer at No. 81 East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, and the roof of the Corporation Yard at Rivington street was repaired and made water tight.

Bureau of Highways—About 70 yards of linoleum were furnished and laid in rooms Nos. 1606, 1607 and 1608. Two roll top desks and one chair were furnished.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices—The usual janitor's and engineer's supplies were furnished from the store room, and distributed to the various public buildings and offices as required. The order for the use of horse, wagon and driver for the Superintendent was renewed each month, and the contract for cleaning all of the glass in the public buildings was carried out in a satisfactory manner. The following supplies were distributed as needed: Coal and wood for heating; ice, brooms, pails, soap, waste paper baskets, sapolio, sponges, mop handles, feather dusters, scrubbing brushes, ash cans, etc., for the use of the various public buildings, courts and offices under the care of the Bureau. Among the many items of repair made to the various courts and offices not hereinbefore mentioned, are plumbing, steamfitting, carpentering, roofing, plastering, mason work, painting, electrical work, repairs to safes, repairs to machinery in elevators and repairs to furniture. This work was done during the quarter under monthly orders. For the use of the mechanics in the employ of this Bureau supplies of lumber, hardware, paints, varnish, etc., were furnished.

BOARD OF REVISION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision of Assessments was held in the Council Chamber, City Hall, on Thursday, January 10, 1907, at 11.10 o'clock a. m.

Present—N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; George L. Sterling, Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, and Lawson Purdy, President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the minutes of meeting of December 13, 1906, were approved as printed in the CITY RECORD.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Regulating, Paving, etc., Ovington Avenue.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, paving with sheet and block asphalt pavement, curbing and laying cement sidewalks in Ovington avenue, between Third and Fifth avenues (together with a

list of awards for damages caused by a change of grade), and applications for awards for damages, objections filed by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney for Annie Thorer and others; by John R. McMullen, attorney for Otto Heinicke and others; by Ridgway & Dessar, attorneys for William E. Taylor and others; and copy of testimony taken in said matter, the hearing of which was postponed at meeting of December 13, 1906, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of December 11, 1906.

The Assessors reported that a pro rata reduction of 10 per cent. had been made in the assessment as determined by them at meetings held September 25 and November 27, 1906.

Messrs. Ridgway & Dessar, attorneys, were heard, and objected to the excessive cost of the work and to the disallowance of the claim for damages to the property of their clients.

Mr. McMullen, attorney, was heard, and claimed that the amount allowed for awards for damages should be borne by the City and deducted from the assessment for the regulating and grading.

Mr. Flannery, attorney, appeared by representative.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for alteration and improvement to sewer in Avenue St. Nicholas, west side, between One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, and new sewer in Avenue St. Nicholas, east side, between One Hundred and Fiftieth and One Hundred and Fifty-first streets, with objections, filed in said matter, viz.:

Joseph A. Flannery, attorney for Max Marx and others; Edward W. Murphy, attorney for H. N. Baruch and others; Harry G. Smith, attorney for Max Marx and Nathan Wise; Charles L. Fleming, attorney for Lydia A. Fleming and others, executors; also communication from the Commissioner of Public Works transmitting report of the Chief Engineer and Acting Superintendent of Sewers in the matter of the objections, dated December 8, 1906, the hearing of which was postponed at meeting of December 13, 1906, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of December 11, 1906.

Mr. Murphy, attorney, was heard and objected to the excessive cost of the work, and also that the final returns of the expense greatly exceed that estimated.

Mr. Flannery, attorney, appeared by representative.

No others appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to reduce the assessment pro rata by 10 per cent., and to confirm the same as so reduced, all the members voting in the affirmative.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh Street, between St. Nicholas Avenue and Broadway.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, between St. Nicholas Avenue and Broadway, and objections of William Rankin and others filed by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney; M. J. Mahony, owner, and of Atlantic Realty Company filed by E. J. Tinsdale, attorney, received from the Board of Assessors under date of December 20, 1906.

Mr. Tinsdale, attorney, was heard in opposition to the excessive sums proposed to be levied upon the property of his clients, on the ground that the sewer is of no direct benefit to it and that by reason of its peculiar condition a large portion of the cost of the work should be borne by the City.

Mr. Flannery, attorney, appeared by representative.

Mr. Chirney was heard in opposition to the assessment upon his property, No. 721 Greenwich street, as the sidewalk, he stated, was in good order, and that he had received no notice in regard to the matter.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

St. Nicholas Avenue Sewer, between One Hundred and Eighty-first and One Hundred and Eighty-third Streets.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
