COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

Hon. P. F. McGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen, New York City:

Dear Sir—The bills rendered by the Citizens' Water Supply Company and the Bowery Bay Improvement Company for water furnished by these companies to certain sections in the Borough of Queens remain unpaid, the department being unable to certify same, as there are no available funds against which these expenses would properly be chargeable.

The supply of water to be furnished by these companies up to and including December 31 will amount to about \$35,000, and as there already exists a deficit in several of the bureau appropriations and there is no account from which this money can be transferred, it becomes necessary that the expense for furnishing this water be met by an issue of Special Revenue Bonds. I therefore respectfully request that you recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the issuance of bonds in this sum of money. I attach herewith form of resolution for adoption.

Sir—At a meeting of the Board of Health of the Department of Health, held December 11, 1907, the following preambles and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, At the present time there is an unusual increase in the number of cases of contagious disease in The City of New York; and

Whereas, The demands made upon the Department of Health for the care of such cases is most extraordinary for this season of the year, the number of cases at the time being more than double those of last year; and

Whereas, The hospitals under the jurisdiction of the Department of Health are now almost full to the limit of their capacity; and

Whereas, Immediate provision must be made for receiving and caring for additional cases of contagious disease by the erection of temporary buildings at the various hospital plants under the jurisdiction of the Department of Health; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen be and are respectfully requested to authorize the purchase, without public letting, of portable houses, lumber and building materials sufficient to construct eight temporary frame buildings, at a cost not to exceed \$12,000.

Whereas, A communication has been received from the Building Code Revision Commission, stating that said Commission has made its report to the Board of Aldermen without the amendment to section 103, exempting certain school buildings from the provisions requiring fire escapes, and suggesting that any further communication on the subject be addressed to the Board of Aldermen; therefore be it

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Buildings respectfully reports that, under date of April 25, 1907, a thirty-eight-page report, approved by the Fire Commissioner, was received from Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, giving the locations of various public school buildings in all boroughs requiring fire escapes and fire appliances, and stating that violation notices regarding the same would be served at the earliest possible moment.

The matter was referred to the Chairman of your committee, and he addressed a communication to the President, stating that, while there was no doubt as to the good faith of the examination on which the requirements of the Fire Department were based, they exhibited a lack of uniformity and a failure to recognize the facts that many of the school buildings are fireproof and comply most strictly with all provisions of the law; that said buildings, no matter of what construction, are not hotels, lodging houses or places of residence; that efficient discipline and fire drills are maintained in the schools organized therein; that these requirements are en-

tirely different from those previously made and carried out; that the thought naturally arises as to whether or not it would be feasible to arrive at some standard of safety, based upon, say, the celerity with which pupils and Teachers can leave the building, and that he would suggest that a conference be held in the Hall of the Board of Education between representatives of the Fire and Building Departments and the Board of Education for the purpose of reaching a settlement of what promises to be a vexatious and extremely expensive problem.

In accordance with this suggestion and at the request of the President, a meeting was held and a committee appointed, consisting of representatives of the Bureaus of Buildings of the several boroughs, a representative of the Fire Department, and a representative of the Department of Education, which, after careful investigation of the subject, submitted the following report under date of October 30, 1907:

"Dear Sir—In June last, at the request of Mr. Egerton L. Winthrop, Jr., President of the Board of Education, a committee was appointed, consisting of a representative of each of the Bureaus of Buildings of the various boroughs, a representative of the Fire Department and a representative of the Department of Education to consider the recommendations of the Fire Department, dated April 25, 1907, as to fire protection in public schools; also to formulate some rules whereby a school building might be judged as to its safety or adequate equipment with stairways or fire escapes, and, further, to make whatever recommendations might seem proper in the premises.

"The committee has held several meetings and adopted rules for the general betterment of conditions in non-fireproof schools; have visited and inspected several schools, in four of which rapid dismissal drills were had for the benefit of the committee, three of the schools being of the old style non-fireproof; the average time of dismissal was three minutes. It being admitted by the Fire Department that it would take the first or nearest fire company on an average of about three minutes to reach the scene of a fire and prepare for work; within that period the majority of schools would be free of occupants, and the Fire Department would have free and unobstructed entrance thereto. The committee is, therefore, of the opinion, as the result of its inspections made to date, that outside fire escapes on the average public school are not required, as under the present system of drilling the scholars they can be much better and more expeditiously handled and guided by their Teachers on a continuous line of stairs leading to exits, than they could if compelled to pass through rooms and halls leading to windows or openings on to broken lines of outside stairs; and as the stairways in most schools at the present time are practically fireproof, the danger of fire or smoke obstructing any or all of the several lines of stairs within the short space of three minutes, is very remote. In one school on the lower East side, containing over twenty-three hundred (2,300) pupils, the dismissal took place in two minutes and thirty-one seconds. The main objection to placing outside fire escapes on public schools, by the Department of Education, is that they would greatly obstruct the light in class rooms; secondly, that stairways are preferable to outside escapes, and third, that the cost of carrying out the recommendations of the Fire Department, as to outside escapes, would entail upon the City an expenditure of millions of dollars.

"As before stated, the committee, in view of its experience, is of the opinion that outside fire escapes are not required or necessary on such of the public schools wherein it can be demonstrated that such schools can be dismissed within a period of time of three minutes or less, and at its meeting of October 25, a resolution was passed directing that an amendment be drawn and submitted to the Building Code Revision Commission, for its approval and adoption, exempting such schools from the provisions of section 103 of the Building Code.

"The committee respectfully requests that you give the proposed amendment your personal consideration, and if it meets with your approval, that you sanction its adoption by the Building Code Revision Commission.

The proposed amendment referred to is to the following effect:

Amendment Recommended for Insertion in Section 103 of the Building Code.

Provided, however, that whenever it shall be demonstrated that any public school building in The City of New York can be actually vacated by its occupants at the rate of four hundred in three minutes through one five-foot exit, and that a sufficient number of exits are provided to permit such building to be vacated by all its occupants in not more than three minutes, then the provisions of this section as to providing outside means of escape from such building shall not apply; and any and all school buildings which shall meet the above prescribed requirements shall be exempt from the provisions of this section as to fire escapes. Such exemption shall be determined in the case of any school building as the result of an actual inspection of a rapid dismissal of pupils during regular school hours, such inspection to be made by an officer of the Fire Department attached to the battalion or company in the district in which the school building is located; an officer of the Bureau of Buildings of the borough in which the school building is located, and a representative of the Superintendent of School Buildings of the Department of Education. An official record of the reports of all such inspections shall be kept in the office of the Bureau of Violations and Auxiliary Fire Appliances of the Fire Department, and copies of said reports shall be forwarded to the Superintendent of Buildings for the Borough in which such inspections may take place, and to the Department of Education.

The Committee on Buildings has carefully considered this matter, heartily endorses the above mentioned report, and recommends approval of the amendment to the Building Code as above quoted.

The following resolution is submitted for adoption:

Resolved, That a certified copy of the foregoing be transmitted to the Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Building Code Revision Commission, with the approval of the Board of Education, and with the earnest request that affirmative action be taken thereon.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

Sir—Hon. Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx, in communication under date of November 11, 1907, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of \$16,000 for drainage and sewerage district plans, Borough of The Bronx. I would report:

Accompanying the request of President Haffen is a communication to Mr. Josiah A. Briggs, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx, signed by Charles H. Graham, Engineer in charge of Sewers. In this communication, Mr. Graham says that the funds available on this account would be insufficient for the remainder of the year; that the work for which the money is required is of great importance, and that the amount named should be provided that the said work may be continued for not only the balance of this year, but also during the year 1908.

Appropriations have hitherto been made for drainage and sewerage plans, Borough of The Bronx, as follows: Under resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated December 23, 1905, the sum of \$12,500, and on October 26, 1906, the sum of \$13,110 were authorized. The balance now in this fund is only \$1,425.

The work for which the said appropriation is requested consists of making studies, investigations, surveys, etc., and in making new sewerage and drainage plans and maps for the outlying districts of said Borough.

I append a statement furnished me by Mr. Graham, Engineer in charge of the work, showing the force employed and manner in which the said amount is to be expended.

The amount asked for this year is somewhat increased over that of a year ago, but this is explained by Mr. Graham to be due to the extended character of the work to be done during the ensuing year.

It is necessary that this work should be continued, and I suggest that you advise the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that it may properly authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$16,000 in addition to the amount heretofore authorized, to provide means for carrying on the work of making maps, etc., and for making drainage and sewerage plans of the Borough of The Bronx.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of corporate stock in the sum of sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000), to provide additional means to carry on the work of making maps, etc., and for making drainage and sewerage district plans of the Borough of The Bronx.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment December 13, 1907, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue corporate stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of corporate stock of The City of New York, to an amount not exceeding sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000), in addition to the amount heretofore authorized, to provide means for carrying on the work of making maps, etc., and for making drainage and sewerage district plans of the Borough of The Bronx, and when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue corporate stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

Report of Committee on Laws and Legislation—

No. 2626.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to which was referred on December 10, 1907 (Minutes, page 979), the annexed "Ordinance regulating the matters provided for in section 1481 of the Laws of 1897, as amended by chapter 456 of the Laws of 1901, known as the Greater New York Charter," respectfully

REPORTS:

Pursuant to the resolution of the Board, adopted at its meeting, December 10, 1907, a public hearing was held by your Committee on December 13, which was attended by a large number of those affected by the proposed ordinance. All interests were represented, and were heard in support of their respective views.

The Committee addressed a letter to the Corporation Counsel asking his opinion relative to the power of the Board in the premises, and received his reply to the effect that the Board is empowered to pass rules governing the subject, provided, however, that they are not in conflict with existing laws; and that the Board is empowered "to permit what the proposed ordinance allows, viz., sacred or educational, vocal or instrumental concerts, lectures, addresses, recitations and singing." The opinion of the Corporation Counsel is filed herewith.

Your Committee recommends the adoption of the following Substitute Ordinance.

(SUBSTITUTE.)

AN ORDINANCE regulating the matters provided for in section 1481 of the Laws of 1897, as amended by chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901, known as the Greater New York Charter.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. It shall not be lawful to exhibit to the public on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, in any building, garden, grounds, concert room, or other room or place, within The City of New York, the performance in whole or in part of any interlude, tragedy, comedy, opera, ballet, play, farce, negro minstrelsy, negro or other dancing or any other entertainment of the stage or any part or parts therein, wrestling, boxing, with or without gloves, sparring contest, trial of strength, or any circus, equestrian or dramatic performance or exercise, or any performance or exercise of jugglers, acrobats, club performances, or rope dancers.

Provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to prohibit at any such place or places on said first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, wholly sacred or educational concerts, vocal or instrumental, lectures, addresses, recitations, readings, or singing, provided that such entertainments shall be given in such manner as not to disturb the public peace, or to disturb or interrupt the quiet, the repose, and the religious observances of the community and of the neighborhoods in which such place or places may be situated.

Sec. 2. Every person wilfully offending against the provisions of this ordinance, and every person knowingly aiding in such exhibitions, except as herein provided, by advertisements, posting or otherwise, and every owner or lessee of any building or part thereof, grounds, garden, or concert room, or other room or place, who shall lease, hire, or let out the same, for the purpose of any such exhibition or performance, except as herein provided, or shall assent that the same shall be used for any such purpose, shall be subject to a penalty of five hundred dollars, which penalty the Corporation Counsel of The City of New York is hereby authorized, in the name of said City, to prosecute, sue for and recover.

In addition to said penalty, every such exhibition or performance shall of itself vacate and annul and render void and of no effect any license which shall have been previously obtained by any manager, proprietor, owner or lessee consenting to, causing or allowing, or letting any part of a building, garden, grounds, room or place for the purpose of any such exhibition or performance, and the said Corporation Counsel shall forthwith upon the complaint of two citizens institute proceedings for the vacating of such license. Every such complaint shall be accompanied with good and sufficient security in an amount not to exceed \$500, to be approved by said Corporation Counsel, conditioned for the payment to the party or parties proceeded against, of all costs and expenses of the proceeding, in the event that the same shall not be sustained.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed as in any manner affecting any of the provisions of the Penal Code relating to any of the subject matters of this ordinance; or as affecting any of the duties or responsibilities of any department of The City of New York with respect thereto.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

That a public hearing was held by your committee on December 13, which was largely attended by persons interested in the proposed ordinance; that, having examined the subject, they believe that the substitute ordinance presented by a majority of this committee is of doubtful legal authority for adoption by this Board, as it is an attempt to amend and change the language of section 277 of the Penal Code. It also makes mandatory an action for the recovery of a penalty by the Corporation Counsel upon the complaint of two citizens alleging a violation, before a violation of the ordinance has been charged and proved, and before the persons alleged to be guilty have had an opportunity of being heard. Therefore, we recommend the adoption of the ordinance, the provisions of which have been approved by the Corporation Counsel, as referred to the committee.

It is assumed that no ordinance can be enacted which will in any manner conflict with any of the provisions of the Penal Code.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

—and requesting to be advised "as to the power of the Board to enact such an ordinance or one of similar purport."

According to Justice O'Gorman's construction of section 1481 of the revised Charter, in the Hammerstein case, all entertainments of the stage on Sunday are prohibited. That section, however, only continues in force until the Board passes ordinances regulating the matter (revised Charter, section 3). The term "regulate" is one of broad import. The power to "regulate" does not properly include a power to "suppress" or "prohibit," for the very essence of regulation is the existence of something to be regulated (24 Am. & Eng. Ency. Law, 2d ed., p. 243).

You therefore have the power to pass rules governing the subject, provided, however, that they are not in conflict with existing laws. Section 277 of the Penal Code forbids:

"The performance of any tragedy, comedy, opera, ballet, farce, negro minstrelsy, negro or other dancing, wrestling, boxing with or without gloves, sparring contests, trial of strength, or any part or parts therein, or any circus, equestrian or dramatic performance or exercise, or any performance or exercise of jugglers, acrobats, club performances or rope dancers on the first day of the week."

—and it is questionable and not necessary to decide at the present time whether you can authorize that which the Penal Code prohibits.

Those classes of performances, if they may be so characterized, which are not directly forbidden may be authorized. It seems to me, therefore, that you have the power to permit what the proposed ordinance allows, viz., "sacred or educational, vocal or instrumental concerts, lectures, addresses, recitations and singing."

Resolved, that the Secretary be and is hereby directed to make requisition No. 3, 1907, upon the Comptroller for the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150), account of Revenue Bond Fund for Department of Health, Supplies and Contingencies, Deficiency in Appropriation, June 21, 1907 (Richmond), for the purpose of defraying any minor or incidental expenses contingent to the Department of Health, pursuant to the resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen, July 1, 1902, and approved by the Mayor, July 15, 1902.

The General Medical Officer recommended that section 5 of the Sanitary Code be amended by leaving out the words "and any person who pursues the business of or acts as midwife," and, on motion, it was

Resolved, That section 5 of the Sanitary Code of the Department of Health be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 5. The word "physician" shall include every person who practices about the cure of the sick or injured, or who has the charge of, or professionally prescribes for, any person sick, injured or diseased; and the phrase "infectious disease" shall be held to include all diseases of an infectious, contagious or pestilential nature.

Rules suggested for the regulation of the practice of midwifery in The City of New York were submitted, and, on recommendation of the President, it was.

Resolved, That the following rules for the regulation of the practice of midwifery in The City of New York be and the same are hereby adopted:

Rules for Midwives.

First—No permit to engage in the practice of midwifery will be granted by the Board of Health unless an application made on the printed blank form issued by the Board has been filed with the Department of Health.

Second—This application must be certified to by two regularly licensed and registered physicians and by one reputable and responsible layman (preferably a clergyman, priest or rabbi).

Third—The applicant must be over twenty-one years of age and of moral character. She must be able to read and write. She must be clean and constantly show evidences in general appearance of habits of cleanliness. She must have attended, under the instruction of a licensed and registered physician, at least twenty cases of labor and have had the care of at least twenty mothers and new-born infants during the lying-in period (ten days).

Fourth—Within thirty days after the filing with the Department of Health of an application for a permit to practice midwifery, the Board of Health may issue such permit if, after inspection and investigation, the applicant is considered competent to care for women in normal labor.

Fifth—This permit will allow the holder to act as a midwife for one year from the date of issuance, and must be renewed at the end of that time. The Board of Health can at any time revoke this permit.

Sixth—Any midwife who has been or shall be convicted of criminal practice will not be granted a permit or will have her permit revoked permanently.

Seventh—Before a permit is given to an applicant she must appear in person at the Department of Health (Fifty-fifth street and Sixth avenue), and register her name and address with the Bureau of Records. She will also receive and receipt for a copy of the rules and regulations governing the practice of midwifery which have been adopted by the Board of Health. These rules and regulations must be explicitly followed. Any midwife changing her name or address must at once report such changes to the Department of Health.

Eighth—A midwife can attend only cases of labor in which there is an uncomplicated vertex (head) presentation. In all other cases a physician must be called.

Ninth—The home of a midwife, her equipment, record of cases and registry of births shall at all times be open to inspection by the authorized officer, inspectors and agents of the Department of Health.

Tenth—If, during pregnancy, any of the following conditions develop or are suspected, a midwife shall not engage to attend the case, but must refer it to a physician:

- (a) A contracted pelvis or other deformity that will interfere with labor.
- (b) Bleeding from the uterus.
- (c) Swelling of the face and hands.
- (d) Excessive vomiting.
- (e) Persistent headache.
- (f) Dimness of vision.
- (g) Convulsions.

Eleventh—If, during labor, any of the following conditions exist or develop, a physician must be summoned:

- (a) Presenting part is other than uncomplicated vertex (head).
- (b) Convulsions.
- (c) Excessive bleeding.
- (d) Prolapse of the cord.
- (e) A swelling or tumor that obstructs the birth of the child.
- (f) Signs of exhaustion or collapse.

Twelfth—Under no circumstances shall a midwife introduce her hand into the vagina or uterus to remove either the placenta or membranes. If, after an hour from the birth of the child (the mother being in otherwise good condition) the afterbirth (placenta and membranes) are not expelled or cannot be expressed by manipulation of the uterus through the abdominal walls, a physician must be called to extract them.

Thirteenth—If, after the birth of the child, the mother develops convulsions or has excessive bleeding or has been lacerated, a physician must be called in attendance.

Fourteenth—In her attendance on a case of labor, a midwife must be scrupulously clean in every way. She should wear a clean dress of washable material and over this a clean washable apron.

(Note—The sleeves of the dress should be such that they can be rolled up above the elbow.)

Fifteenth—She shall take to each case the following equipment:

Nail brush.

Wooden or bone nail cleaner.

Jar of green or soft castile soap.

Tube of vaseline.

Clinical thermometer.

Agate or glass douche reservoir.

Two rounded vaginal douche nozzles.

Two rectal nozzles, large and small.

One soft rubber catheter.

Blunt scissors for cutting cord.

Either—

Lysol,

Carbolic acid,

Bichloride of mercury tablets.

Boric acid powder.

One per cent. sol. nitrate of silver.

Medicine dropper.

Narrow tape or soft twine for tying cord.

Absorbent cotton (preferably in one-quarter pound packages).

No other instruments are to be used, owned or possessed by a midwife.

Sixteenth—This equipment should be carried either in a metal case that can be easily boiled or in a bag fitted with an inner lining of washable material that can be easily removed and washed and boiled.

Seventeenth—At every case before using the nail brush, nail cleaner, douche can and tubing, vaginal nozzle, catheter scissor and tape or twine, they must be boiled for five minutes; when the labor is terminated, the douche can and tubing, vaginal nozzles, catheter scissor, nail brush, nail cleaner must be washed with soap and boiled before replacing them in the bag or can.

Eighteenth—Before examining a woman in labor the midwife must roll her dress sleeve above the elbow and scrub the hands and forearms in warm water with the nail brush and castile or green soap for at least five minutes; during this washing the skin under and around the nails must be cleaned with the nail cleaner.

19. The woman's external genitals, skin over the lower part of the abdomen and the inner side of the thighs must then be washed with soap and water and afterward sponged with absorbent cotton soaked in either:

Sol. of lysol, two per cent.

Sol. of carbolic, two per cent.

Sol. of bichloride of mercury, 1-5,000.

—and a pad of cotton wet with the solution left over the vulva. No vaginal douche shall be given before labor.

Twentieth—The hands of the midwife must then be scrubbed with the nail brush for five minutes in either the lysol, carbolic or bichloride of mercury solution before making an internal examination. Before every subsequent internal examination or before passing the catheter, the midwife must wash and scrub her hands with soap and warm water and afterward in the antiseptic solution and the woman's external genitals must be washed with the antiseptic solution. As few vaginal examinations as possible should be made.

Twenty-first—As soon as the child's head is born, the eyes should be washed with boric acid solution. After the birth of the child, and if possible before the expulsion of the afterbirth, the eyelids must be separated and one or two drops of a (1) one per cent. solution of silver nitrate dropped on the eyeball and the lids then brought together.

Twenty-second—Should the child not breathe after birth the fact must be reported at once by telephone or messenger to the Department of Health, when an Inspector will visit the case and issue a still-birth certificate.

Twenty-third—In caring for a woman after labor and throughout the lying-in period the midwife must exercise the same care in washing her hands when dressing or catheterizing the case as is called for in rule 20.

Twenty-fourth—If, during the lying-in period, any of the following conditions develop, a physician must be summoned:

- (a) Convulsion.
- (b) Excessive bleeding.
- (c) Foul smelling discharge (lochia).
- (f) Persistent rise of temperature to 101 degrees F. for twenty-four hours.
- (e) Swelling and redness of the breasts.
- (f) Severe chill (rigor) with rise of temperature.
- (g) Inability to nurse the child.

Twenty-fifth—Every child should be thoroughly examined after birth, and if the child has or develops any of the following conditions a physician must be summoned:

- (a) Deformities or malformations or injuries.
- (b) Inability to suckle or nurse.
- (c) Inflammation around or discharge from the navel.
- (d) Swelling and redness of the eyelids with a discharge of matter from the eyes.
- (e) Bleeding from the mouth, navel or bowels.

Twenty-sixth—Within ten days of the birth of a child a midwife must send a report of the birth to the Department of Health on one of the blanks issued for that purpose. She must also keep on the stubs of her birth certificate book a record of every birth she attends.

Twenty-seventh—In every case after labor the temperature must be taken morning and night for five days (preferably by the mouth). If, during this time or at any later period of the lying-in the temperature reaches or exceeds 101 degrees F., and continues at this for twenty-four hours, the case must be reported to the Department of Health. The midwife must not go from such a case to other cases that are free from fever or to a woman in labor, until she has made an entire change of clothing, her arms, hands and hair have been thoroughly washed with soap and warm water and her entire equipment has been washed and boiled.

Communication from the president of the Medical Society of the County of New York regarding the use of the records made by Inspectors of the Department of Health in the schools of the Department of Education and the Teachers in the classification of the children who are recorded as physically and mentally defective, was received and referred to the General Medical Officer.

Report in respect to the condition of the swamp land on Queensboro' Hill, Borough of Queens, was received, and the Secretary was directed to forward a copy of said report to the Committee of Special Schools of the Board of Education, with the request that said committee take immediate steps to co-operate with the other owners of the land, in order that the swamp may be drained before the formation of mosquito larvae commences in the spring.

Report in respect to the dangerous condition of the vacant lots situated on the east side of Washington avenue, about 75 feet north of One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, and extending about 75 feet, and at Nos. 1344, 1346 and 1348 Webster avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, with the recommendation of the Sanitary Superintendent

that the President of the Borough of The Bronx be requested to have said lots properly fenced, was received, and, on motion, it was

Y., will give them useful occupation in their enforced idleness, that will contribute materially to their well-being, and be an aid in bringing about a restoration to health; therefore be it
