To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Finance respectfully reports that certain additional judgments have been entered against the Board of Education in favor of Draftsmen employed in the Building Bureau, amounting to \$2,586.04, for which unforfeited liabilities no funds are available. It therefore becomes necessary to secure the issue of special revenue bonds to the amount requisite to pay the judgments, plus interest to the date of settlement.

The following resolution is submitted for adoption:

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen be and it is hereby respectfully requested to adopt a resolution requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of two thousand five hundred eighty-six dollars and four cents (\$2,586.04), pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the revised Charter, said sum to be used to provide means for the payment of certain judgments which have been entered against the Board of Education in favor of Draftsmen employed in the Building Bureau, plus such further amount as may be necessary to cover the interest charges up to a day of settlement to be fixed by the Comptroller.

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Finance respectfully reports that the Committee on Supplies has presented to it the following communication:

"New York, June 9, 1911.

"To the Committee on Finance:

"Gentlemen—The Committee on Supplies respectfully requests that you present a report at the meeting of the Board of Education to be held on the 14th instant, requesting an issue of special revenue bonds sufficient to enable the Committee on Supplies to complete the furnishing of all necessary supplies to the schools for the current year.

"The following appeared in the Budget estimate as presented by your Committee for the year 1911:

"After looking into each detail carefully, it has been decided to attempt to carry on the schools, as now in operation, with the same amount for the year 1911 as was appropriated for the year 1910. It is necessary, however, to request additional funds for increased revenue during 1911, and for the enlargement of special activities enumerated above.

"The supplies furnished to the schools during the years 1907, 1908, 1909 and 1910, under the closest supervision, amounted to the following:

1907	\$1,136,957 17
1908	1,240,327 38
1909	1,218,754 56
1910	1,161,185 57

"The average amount of supplies delivered for the four years is \$1,189,306.22.

"Total Amount Available for the Year 1911.

"This shows a deficit, as compared with previous years, as follows:

1907	\$25,039 61
1908	128,409 82
1909	106,837 00
1910	49,268 21

—and a deficit, as per average for four years, of \$77,388.66.

"The extra amount asked for in the Budget for 1911, for all new activities, including new pupils, represented \$139,467.57. The Committee on Supplies is of the opinion that this amount should be allowed, in the best interests of the children.

"The Committee was given to understand that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would not allow funds for the extension of new activities such as workshops, kitchens and kindergartens, etc. Allowing for this disposition of the matter, it is obviously necessary to secure a minimum of \$100,000 in order that the schools may be adequately supplied.

"During the years 1908 and 1909 the principals seemed to be fairly well satisfied with the amounts allowed, although we did not furnish all the supplies demanded. It is a fact that we curtailed extra appropriations and supplies for the year 1908 aggregating \$54,939.70; for the year 1909, \$49,892.42; for the year 1910, \$57,764.22.

"In explanation of the decreased volume of supplies furnished to the schools for 1910, as compared with each of the two previous years, the Committee wishes to state that it realized that the funds available were limited and, therefore, an arbitrary cut of \$57,457.90 was made.

"Besides this, we reduced requisitions and refused requests for extra moneys aggregating \$57,764.22.

"So that when you take the actual deliveries to the schools, the arbitrary cut and the amount of supplies and applications for additional funds refused, you will see that the amount for 1910 would be in excess of each of the two previous years if we had given the schools all they demanded.

"This proves that every care was taken by the Committee on Supplies to keep the Budget of 1911 down to the lowest point. You are, therefore, urged to ask the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for at least \$100,000, so that we may be able to give the schools an adequate quantity of supplies.

"The Committee would have liked to ask for a much larger appropriation for 1911, so as to have some money available to purchase stock at the end of the year, in order that there might be no difficulty in furnishing the schools for the February promotions (because contracts are not approved until after the first of the year and there must necessarily be delay in supplying the schools on account of this fact); but the Committee was reluctant to ask for an enlarged appropriation for this purpose when the Budget for 1911 was being prepared, although it now sees that it would have been wise to have done so.

The statement above is self-explanatory, and this Committee recommends that a request be made for the issuance of special revenue bonds for the required purposes. The President of the Board of Education and Chairman of the Committee on Finance have consulted with the Comptroller in regard to this matter, and it is understood that the request will receive favorable attention.

The following resolution is submitted for adoption:

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen be and it is hereby respectfully requested to adopt a resolution requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the revised Charter, for the purpose of replenishing the supplies account for the current year; and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby respectfully requested to authorize such issue upon the request of the Board of Aldermen.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

No. 3919.

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Commissioner's Office, 13-21 Park Row, City of New York, July 5, 1911.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—At the present time the Department is without authority to enforce compliance with its rules and regulations in respect to the installation and maintenance of electric wiring, heat and power. Some of the lighting companies, by mutual agreement, decline to furnish electric current where the Department has filed a violation and where it would appear dangerous to continue the further operation and use of the electric wiring or apparatus.

A number of fires have occurred, presumably as the result of defective wiring. Many of the buildings in which electricity is generated are used for factory purposes, employing large numbers of people, and the City should, in my opinion, afford the occupants every protection possible, compelling the owners or lessees to keep their electric equipment in a good and safe condition.

I am, therefore, submitting for the consideration of the Board of Aldermen, a proposed section to be added to the Building Code, which the Corporation Council has approved. A violation of its provisions should be considered a misdemeanor.

Proposed Section to be Added to the Building Code.

(Re-drafted June 29, 1911.)

No person shall place or permit to be placed, electric current on any wiring or appliances for electric light, heat or power, or on any alterations, additions or changes to such electric wiring or appliances, in any building in The City of New York until the construction and installation of said wiring or appliances shall have been approved by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. Such approval shall be based upon conformity with the requirements of the National Electrical Code as adopted, promulgated and interpreted by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for use in The City of New York.

No person shall undertake to install, alter, add to or otherwise change any electric wiring or appliances installed in any building in The City of New York for electric light, heat or power without filing with the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity a notice of such intended installation or change.

No person shall refuse admittance to any building in The City of New York during reasonable hours to any authorized representative of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity who shall desire entrance for the purpose of inspecting any electric wiring or appliances installed for the service of electric light, heat or power.

In case the owner, lessee, manager, corporation or other person having charge or control of any electric wiring or appliances comprising a light, heat or power installation in The City of New York shall neglect or refuse to make such repairs or corrections in said electric installation, the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity shall have power to suspend the operation of such installation until such time as the required repairs and corrections shall have been made to his satisfaction. Dear Sir—I hand you herewith a copy of communication received from Stubenbord Brothers, Coney Island, recommending that the fire limits be extended to that resort, together with a report upon the same from the Superintendent of the Bureau of Buildings.

I should be pleased to have this matter brought to the attention of the Board, as I regard the extension of the fire limits to Coney Island as a sound proposition.

I would respectfully suggest that the business interests of Coney Island, as represented by their Board of Trade or other business associations, join in this movement and co-operate with the Board of Aldermen toward having the necessary legislation promptly enacted. Department of Street Cleaning of The City of New York, 13-21 Park Row, New York, July 10, 1911.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—Under section 188, subdivision 8 of the Greater New York Charter, I respectfully request your honorable Board to authorize the issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of two hundred and ten thousand dollars (\$210,000), in order to meet the apparent deficit in the appropriation allowed this Department for the year 1911, in the accounts of Sweeping and Carting and Stable, in the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx, due to the Budget allowance for the year 1911, being insufficient on account of a decreased amount being allowed the Department of Street Cleaning by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under the appropriation allowed for 1910.

The following is a statement of the original appropriation allowed for the year 1910, compared with the Budget allowed for the year 1911, showing a decrease of \$278,510.50:

*These bonds amounting to the sum of \$49,271.83 were allowed for the last seven months of 1910 only. If they were allowed for the year the amount would be \$84,466 or for Division of Sweeping, \$42,500 and Carting and Stable, \$41,966.—which is further illustrated in the attached summary showing the anticipated

condition of the appropriation for year 1911, on the basis of the payrolls for the week ended June 22, 1911. This shows an apparent deficit of \$164,307.29.

The difference between the apparent deficit and the amount requested, equaling the sum of \$35,692.71, is due to the taking of the June 22, 1911, payroll as a basis of calculation for the balance of the year.

As the fall and winter approaches, it will be necessary to augment the present force of Drivers materially, hence this increase.

I therefore request that the sum of two hundred and ten thousand dollars (\$210,000) be divided as follows:

State of New York, Public Service Commission, Second District, Albany, July 8, 1911.

P. J. SCULLY, Clerk, Board of Aldermen, New York City:

Dear Sir—This is to acknowledge receipt of resolution passed by the Board of Aldermen, June 13, 1911, requesting the Commission to investigate and grant relief to the people of The Bronx east of Bronx River for telephone charges for messages south of 106th street, Borough of Manhattan.

In November, 1910, the Commission received from your honorable Board a like petition, also petitions from many civic bodies and individuals in regard to telephone charge between several Boroughs of Greater New York. In view of these petitions and complaints, the Commission undertook an investigation upon its own motion of the telephone charges between the Boroughs and has held four hearing in the course of this investigation.

After due deliberation upon the evidence secured by its own investigations and that produced at the hearings, a decision has been reached by the Commission which in part is as follows:

"Complaint has been made to us that the rate from Zone 3, being part of the Borough of The Bronx, to Zone 1, in Manhattan, should be reduced to five cents. We have been unable to find sufficient reason for ordering such reduction."

The matter of the rates between The Bronx and lower Manhattan has received equal attention and consideration in this investigation with all other interborough rates, and having found no reasonable ground for ordering a reduction of the toll rate between these points the present rate has been allowed to stand.

In view of the recent investigation and findings, it is not considered advisable to reopen this question, at least until the present order affecting other rate changes has become effective and sufficient time thereafter has elapsed to show whether there may be further inequalities which should be corrected.

In connection with this matter, we beg leave to call your attention to the formal notice sent you under date of November 3 advising you of the first hearing, together with the request that you be represented at such hearing, also to subsequent notices of hearings under dates of December 2, 1910, February 11, 1911, and June 16, 1911. The Board of Aldermen has not been represented at any of these hearings nor in any manner given assistance to the Commission in the determination of this case.

This allowance is insufficient owing to the greatly increased pumpage in all the stations, which requires that the pumps be maintained in service practically every day in the year, so that it is necessary to do a large amount of the repair work on holidays, Sundays and at night, in order that the pumps may be kept in service.

This deficiency can only be remedied by the issue of revenue bonds, of which the sum of \$2,054 is necessary; and I respectfully ask that the honorable Board of Aldermen request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of special revenue bonds in that sum. Yours truly,

Gentlemen—On March 8, 1911, the President of the Borough of The Bronx re-quested the establishmet in his office, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, of the position of Foreman of Automobile Enginemen, at \$1,350 per annum, for one incumbent. In connection therewith we report as follows:

The position is proposed for William H. McCormick, Automobile Engineman for the President, at \$1,200 per annum. McCormick was appointed on July 20, 1908, as an Automobile Engineman, at \$4 a day. It is stated that he worked 365 days in the year, giving a per annum total of \$1,460 until January 1, 1911, when he was placed at the present rate. The President states the following:

McCormick is now performing the duties of Foreman. It is necessary to have a Foreman who is a thorough mechanic and can repair cars, as well as direct their repair. He also keeps the stock of oil, cotton waste, etc., and does them out as needed, upon requisition. He also keeps the cost data of maintenance of the machines in this Department. For this extra work I think it would be very advisable to pay him an extra salary of \$150, or \$1,350 in all.

It is stated that the \$150 for the increase will be available without additional appropriation.

The President further states that Mr. Soteldo has been accustomed to the train-ing and care of horses all his life, and was for several years the Purchasing Agent in the Fire Department of The City of New York, where his duties extended to the purchase of all forage, requiring a knowledge as to the different qualities of hay, oats, etc., and the purchase of horses. In addition to this experience it was his duty to pass all stable supplies, repairs to vehicles, etc.

This request was referred to the Select Committee, consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

The President of the Borough of The Bronx followed up his request with a further communication dated September 24 1910, addressed to the members of the Select Committee, giving arguments to support his request. In urging a higher salary for the Commissioner and Assistant Commissioner of Public Works, the President said:

"The duties devolving upon the Commissioner of Public Works and the Assistant Commissioner in the administration of the business of this Department, as now constituted, I am well informed are of much greater importance and responsibility than prevailed in said offices during the previous administration, the entire direction of all public works of construction, including regulating, grading, paving, sewers, and maintenance of highways and sewers, as well as all the work of an executive nature incidental thereto, now come under the supervision of these officers, which previously had been performed by the respective Bureau heads of the several Divisions of this Department prior to its reorganization.

"It seems, therefore, but just that a higher rate of compensation should be fixed for these officers, their duties requiring extraordinary skill. Further, in comparison with the rates established in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, viz.: \$7,200 and \$6,000, respectively, for Commissioner of Public Works, and \$6,000 in Manhattan, and \$5,000 in Brooklyn for Assistant Commissioner, seem to justify the rates proposed for similar duties in the Bronx."

The proposed increases of the Commissioner and Assistant Commissioner of Public Works seems to your Committee to be well justified by the facts stated in the opinion of the Borough President quoted above. The Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Manhattan, receives \$7,200 per annum, or \$1,700 more than it is proposed to pay the Commissioner in the Borough of The Bronx. The Assistant Commissioner in Manhattan receives \$6,000 per annum, or \$1,500 more than it is proposed to pay the Assistant Commissioner in the Bronx. In Brooklyn, the Commissioner and Assistant Commissioner receives respectively \$500 per annum more than it is proposed to pay those officials in the Bronx. The duties and responsibilities of the latter are fully as great as are those of officials occupying similar positions in the other Boroughs mentioned. Both are men of marked ability, who have brought the work of the Bronx President's office to a high standard of efficiency and economy.

The request for the grade of \$4,000 per annum for the General Bookkeeper has already been granted.

We recommend that the remaining portions of the President's request of September 22, 1910, be granted by the adoption of the attached resolution.

Gentlemen—On February 27, 1911, the Chief City Magistrate, of the City Magistrates' Courts, Second Division, comprising Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, requested that the salaries of the City Magistrates of these courts be equalized with the salaries paid the City Magistrates, First Division, comprising Manhattan and The Bronx. In connection therewith, we report as follows:

The sixteen City Magistrates in the First Division receive compensation at the rate of \$7,000 per annum each. There are sixteen City Magistrates in the Second Division. The ten Magistrates in Brooklyn receive \$6,000 per annum each, while four Magistrates in Queens and two Magistrates in Richmond receive \$5,000 per annum each.

The duties of the Magistrates in the two Divisions are identical. They are appointed under their actions governed by the same law. Although the number of prisoners arraigned in the Courts in the First Division exceeds the number arraigned in the Second Division, the requirements for the daily opening and closing of the sessions of the courts are similar.

There are eleven courts in the First Division and fifteen in the Second Division. The Magistrates in the First Division serve on the bench, on an average, twenty-two days a month. The Magistrates in the Second Division average twenty-eight days of service every month, owing to the four extra courts in the Division. A Magistrate in the Second Division frequently sits in two courts on the same day.

Chapter 659, Laws of 1910, "An Act in Relation to the Inferior Courts of Criminal Jurisdiction in The City of New York," provides that "the Board of Aldermen, upon the recommendation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, is hereby authorized to equalize the salaries of the Associate Justices of the Court of Special Sessions, and of the City Magistrates of the First and Second Divisions."

The salaries of the Justices of the Court of Special Sessions, in Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, have been equalized with the compensation paid the Justices of the same Court in Manhattan and The Bronx.

Mr. Faron was appointed in 1898, and is at \$1,950 per annum. He has charge of all Richmond and Queens assessment lists after the area, rates, etc., have been determined by the Board of Assessors. He is called on to explain to owners and attorneys detail in connection with the individual assessments.

Mr. Spitzer was appointed in 1901, and is at \$1,950 per annum. He has charge of the records, financial accounts and statistics of the office; and also of all advertising of assessment lists. In addition he is qualified as a Stenographer and Typewriter and is frequently called on to do stenographic work.

The \$1,800 grade of Stenographer is proposed to increase Arthur H. Parry, at \$1,650 per annum. Mr. Parry was transferred from the Board of Water Supply in 1906. The office of the Board of Assessors, prior to February, 1910, had a Stenographer at \$2,250 per annum, whose duties consisted of the taking of testimony and keeping of papers in connection with claims for damages brought under special acts of the Legislature. Since the resignation of the above Stenographer, Mr. Parry has taken all testimony submitted in these special matters. The position of Stenographer at \$2,250 per annum was stricken from the Budget for 1911.

The Board of Assessors states the following:

"In requesting the establishment of the above grades of positions we would most respectfully call the attention of your Board to the present condition of the office compared with its condition at any time between January 1, 1898, and January 1, 1910. Without going into details, it may be said the records show from the years 1900 to 1909, inclusive, the average amount of unapportioned assessment lists totaled \$3,121,000 annually. Interest on this sum or the use of this sum by the Street Improvement Fund was absolutely lost to the City.

"On June 9, 1911, there was in the office of the Board of Assessors less than \$100,000 of unapportioned assessment lists, all of which were regulating and grading lists affected by claims for damages.

"The Board of Assessors feels that all of the above promotions requested are well merited and most respectfully ask favorable consideration by your honorable Body."

The Secretary states that request for Stenographer, at \$1,800, should be for Stenographer and Typewriter, at the same rate. The latter title is in conformity with the rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—It becomes imperative at times that a part of the mechanical force at the Repair Shops of this Department, which force is paid on a per diem basis, work overtime in repairing wrecked fire apparatus, in order that the same may be placed in condition for service at the earliest possible moment.

During the year 1910 the outlay for this emergency service at the Repair Shops, Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, amounted to \$252.53 and compensation was made therefor from accruals, a course which the Department of Finance will no longer sanction. At the Repair Shops, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, there was no overtime work of this nature during the year 1910.

During the present year obligations thus far incurred on this account at the Repair Shops, Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, amount to \$93.65, and at the Repair Shops in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens to \$304.22. As regards the first mentioned amount, it is proper to state that it cannot safely be accepted as a basis for computing the estimated expense for the entire year, as it is exceptionally low.

It is estimated that for the entire year 1911 the emergency work of this kind required to be performed at the Repair Shops, Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, will entail an expense of \$500, and at the Repair Shops, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, of \$700, a total of \$1,200, as shown in the accompanying statement.

As no provision for this expense was made in the Budget for the current year, and as there are no funds available to meet the same, I have the honor to request that, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Aldermen apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds for this purpose to an amount not to exceed twelve hundred dollars.

Dear Sir—In presenting the Department estimate for moneys required for the year 1911, I anticipated that a delivery main would be installed some time during this year, extending from Manhattan Island, under the East River, across to the Borough of Queens, and that there would be furnished a quantity of water which would make it unnecessary for the Department to purchase from the Citizens' Water Supply Company, of Newtown, an average of eight or nine million gallons of water daily. In consequence thereof I did not make application for the total amount of money which I would have applied for had the Department thought it necessary to purchase water

during the entire year from the private water company. Owing to the difficulties experienced in obtaining a suitable location for the pipe line under the East River, it has been impracticable, up to date, to construct a line connecting the Boroughs of Manhattan and Queens, and there is no possibility now of the Department being in a position to install this main and to deliver water to the Borough of Queens this year. In view of what has developed, it will be necessary for the Citizens' Water Company to continue their service of water throughout the year.

The average amount of water being furnished is between eight and nine million gallons daily. This is delivered principally through the First Ward, or what was formerly known as Long Island City. This is the most thickly populated section of the Borough and where many manufactories are located. At this rate of consumption, including also the amounts which the Department is obliged to pay for the rental of hydrants, there is estimated that the deficit will be \$59,000. I would, therefore, respectfully ask that this amount to replenish the Budget account be provided for by an issue of special revenue bonds. Yours truly,

AN ACT to amend chapter seven hundred and seventy-two of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-six, relative to the office of the district attorney of the county of Kings, became a law June 23, 1911, with the approval of the Governor; passed, three-fifths being present.

The people of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section three of chapter seven hundred and seventy-two of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-six, entitled: "An act in relation to the office of the district attorney of the county of Kings, providing for the election of district attorney and the appointment of clerks, stenographers and county detectives for said office," as amended by chapter one hundred and twenty-six of the laws of nineteen hundred,

and further amended by chapter five hundred and fifty-six of the laws of nineteen hundred and one, is hereby further amended to read as follows:

Section 3. The said district attorney shall have also the power to appoint one chief clerk, whose compensation shall not exceed five thousand dollars per annum, one bail bond clerk, whose compensation shall not exceed two thousand five hundred dollars per annum, and five additional clerks, whose compensation shall not exceed two thousand dollars each per annum, one messenger whose compensation shall not exceed one thousand two hundred dollars per annum, and one doorkeeper, whose compensation shall not exceed one thousand two hundred dollars per annum, said compensation of the said several clerks, messenger and doorkeeper to be fixed and determined by the said district attorney and to be paid monthly by the comptroller of the city of New York.

This act shall take effect immediately.

Whereas, It was arranged that the equivalent of four hundred and twenty dollars (\$420) in fireworks should be furnished to each Aldermanic District in Brooklyn with the exception of the Sixty-fifth District, which was to receive two hundred and fifty dollars worth, and

Whereas, It has developed that the quantity of fireworks actually furnished each district by the concern known as United Fireworks Company of New Jersey, it is alleged, was worth less than one hundred dollars (\$100) and many of the employees furnished by said Company to superintend and set off said displays of fireworks were admittedly incompetent to perform their duties, which in itself was a violation of contract, and

Whereas, Many thousands of the residents of said districts were led to expect an elaborate display but were utterly disappointed owing to the meager supply and poor quality of fireworks furnished, with the result that reflection has been cast on this body, and

Whereas, It is apparent to any one at all familiar with the cost of fireworks that something more serious than a mistake has occurred; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board requests the Comptroller of The City of New York to withhold payment on the bills of the concern known as the United Fireworks Company of New Jersey until he has made a thorough investigation and determined the proper market value of the fireworks furnished, and has received a report from the Commissioner of Accounts upon the matter; and be it further

Reports of Committees.

Mr. Farley, Chairman of the Building Committee, reported that a conference had been held on April 28 with representatives of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in regard to the lighting fixtures which had been installed in the psychopathic pavilion, and that as a result he had granted authority to have these fixtures accepted, provided they are shortened and enameled and

will be removed when fixtures are desired in some other building. Mr. Farley also stated that as a result of this decision the contractor had proceeded to complete the work. This report was approved.

The Fordham Hospital Conference Committee recommended the appointment of Dr. Walter D. Weil as Assistant Physician to Out Patients (children's service). This report was approved.

Dr. Brannan reported that he had conferred with the Comptroller in regard to the question of a site for the school for Hospital Attendants, and as a result, it was ordered that provision be made in the Corporate Stock Budget for the purchase of four lots, with a frontage of fifty feet on 26th st., and running through to 25th st., as a site for the proposed school.

Dr. Brannan reported that he had also conferred with the Comptroller in regard to the instructions received from the Department of Finance that the day camp "Westfield" be moved to some other site, and that the Comptroller had decided to allow the boat to be continued at its present berth until further notice.

Dr. Brannan reported progress in regard to the establishment of the school for Midwives, and submitted a tentative plan of organization which had been prepared. This schedule was endorsed by the Board and the matter continued in the hands of the President.

It was resolved to request the Civil Service Commission to classify the place of Resident Obstetrician as non-competitive, in order to provide Obstetricians for the proposed training school.

The President submitted a list of bids received on April 25 for the enlargement of the balconies at Fordham Hospital as follows:

Masonry Construction Company, \$20,499; extra, \$1,536; total, \$22,035.

John H. Parker Company, \$21,300; extra, \$3,100; total, \$24,400.

Hahn & O'Reilly, \$23,334; extra, \$1,919; total, \$25,253.

Letters were presented from the architect recommending, in the best interests of the City, that the bids be rejected.

This recommendation was adopted and the work ordered to be readvertised.

The General Medical Superintendent submitted communications received from the Contract Clerk under date of April 28, and from the Director of Laboratories under date of April 24, relative to the list of bids received on March 20 for furnishing the laboratory apparatus, equipment, etc., required for the new pathological building. These communications listed the various line numbers which should be rejected, and in the case of the bids those which should be awarded to certain contractors. Mr. Paulding, of the Committee on Supplies, reported that he had inspected these bids and suggested that the recommendations of the Contract Clerk be adopted, and that the lowest bids on each of the line numbers 1 to 288, and 1272 to 1716, inclusive, be accepted, with the exception of those enumerated in the letter of the Contract Clerk referred to. These recommendations were adopted, and it was resolved to grant authority to readvertise for bids on the lines which were rejected.

Communications.

A communication dated April 25 was presented from the Law Department relative to the demand of Miss S. A. Gainsforth, through her attorney, Alfred J. Talley, for reinstatement as Supervising Nurse of Harlem Hospital. The President reported that subsequent to the receipt of this communication, and prior to the meeting, he had been served with a copy of an application by Miss Gainsforth for a peremptory writ of mandamus against the Trustees, and that he had forwarded the papers to the Corporation Counsel with the request that he protect the interests of the Department. The action of the President was approved.

Reports were received from the State Board of Charities, dated April 24, of inspections of Gouverneur, Harlem and Fordham Hospitals. Extracts from these reports showing the needs as described by the Inspector had been sent to each member.

A communication was received from McKim, Mead and White under date of May 2, stating that the New York Tennis Racket Company had agreed to keep their estimate amounting to \$850 for the tennis court at Bellevue Hospital, which had expired on April 10, open for a few days longer. It was resolved to accept this estimate and to request the architects to see that the work is completed at the earliest possible date.

A communication dated April 27 was received from McKim, Mead & White, stating that the preliminary estimate for the installation of the laundry machinery according to the modified specifications amounts to \$70,000. Inasmuch as this is in excess of the appropriation available, the communication was referred to the Building Committee for recommendation.

A communication dated April 25 was received from Dr. John Howland, resigning from the place of Assistant Vis-

ing Physician to the First Division of Bellevue Hospital, to take effect on May 25, 1911. The resignation was accepted.

A communication dated April 17 was received from Miss Harriette Rogers, Second Vice-President of the Board of Managers of the Training School, recommending that the course for Pupil Nurses be extended from two and one-half years to two years and nine months, by including in the term of service the three months' period of probation. The letter gave reasons for this recommendation, including a statement that the necessary training has been crowded into so short a time that there is danger of careless work and of the breaking down of the Nurses' health.

This recommendation was approved, and the extension of the course for the training of Pupil Nurses to two years and nine months, was approved.

A communication dated April 18 was received from Dr. Charles F. Sanborn of the Cook County Institutions, Dunbar, Illinois, applying for the place of Assistant Medical Superintendent.

The President reported that he had received two communications from H. F. J. Porter, containing suggestions in regard to the fire alarm system to be installed in the new Bellevue Hospital, and recommended that these communications be referred to the Chairman of the Building Committee for his information. This recommendation was adopted.

A communication dated April 24 was received from Dr. Herbert L. Wheeler, recommending the appointment of Dr. W. H. Wolff as Assistant Visiting Dentist to Harlem Hospital for the remainder of the year 1911. Approved, and Dr. Wolff appointed accordingly.

Three reports dated April 15 were presented from Mr. L. C. Frees, General Inspector of Construction, relative to the progress of the work on the buildings of the new Bellevue Hospital.

A communication dated April 28 was received from McKim, Mead & White reporting upon the progress which had been made with the plans and specifications for Pavilions I and K, and stating that as soon as these are finished they will proceed with the scale plans for the other portions of the hospital.

The General Medical Superintendent presented a list of Special Nurses which had been authorized at Bellevue Hospital from April 19 to May 2; the appointment of these Nurses was approved.

A copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on April 4, establishing the grade of Instructor in Anaesthesia at \$750, and abolishing the position of Anaesthetist at \$750, was presented and ordered placed on file.

Resolutions adopted by the Board of Aldermen on April 11 were presented as follows: (1) Establishing the grade of Hospital Attendant at \$240, \$300, \$360, \$420 and \$480; (2) authorizing the issue of \$2,500 corporate stock to provide means for the installation of new floors on the balconies of Harlem Hospital; (3) amending the appropriation for the construction of Harlem Hospital from \$213,000 to \$210,500. Filed.

A communication dated April 21 was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copy of standard specifications for the supply of milk, cream, etc.

It was resolved to adopt these specifications, and they were ordered referred to the General Medical Superintendent.

A communication dated May 2 was received from Dr. J. A. Miller, transmitting a report of the various divisions of the Tuberculosis Clinic of Bellevue Hospital for the year 1910.

It was resolved to request Dr. Huddleston to supply a similar report of the work of the Tuberculosis Clinic at Gouverneur Hospital, and to ask Dr. A. M. Shady to prepare a report covering the work at Harlem Hospital.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital held on May 1 were presented.

The nominations of Dr. Sophian and Dr. LeFetra were referred to the Conference Committee, as was also the recommendation for the promotion of Dr. Douglas.

The minutes of the meeting of the Gouverneur Hospital Medical Board held on May 1 were presented. The nominations for the place of Consulting Ophthalmologist were referred to the Conference Committee.

Unfinished Business.

It was resolved that the School for Hospital Attendants should not be placed under an Advisory Board of Managers, but under a Board of Managers.

New Business.

Dr. Brannan reported that he had conferred with the Comptroller in regard to the payment of a bill for \$150 for plates required to be used in connection with the publication of an article by Dr. Pappenheimer, and that the Comptroller had requested that before a similar expense is incurred his approval should be obtained. It was thereupon resolved to order that no expense under similar circumstances should be incurred without

the approval of the Board of Trustees of the Department of Finance.

The President suggested the assignment of a Social Service Nurse to the Obstetrical Wards of Bellevue Hospital, her principal duties to be the visitation of the homes of the children born in the hospital and the instruction of the mothers in general hygiene, care of the babies, etc. A copy of a report of a similar service in the Lying-In-Hospital had been sent to each member, and the Trustees individually heartily approved of the proposition.

The suggestion of the President to order the assignment of a Nurse was recommended.

It was resolved to order that all moneys collected in the Department shall be deposited in the Fifth National Bank in the name of the Board of Trustees, to be drawn upon only by the President. Adjourned.

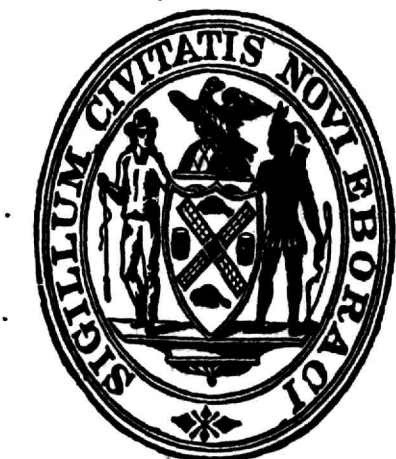

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the De-

partment of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that it has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioner of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there,
