MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, October 15, 1913, at 10 o'clock A. M.

Present—President Frank Gallagher and Commissioners Alexander Keogh and Richard Welling.

The President presided.

The public hearing ordered on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the exempt class, under the heading "Department of Education," the following: Director of Division of Reference and Research, Assistant Director of Division of Reference and Research, was postponed for two weeks.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meetings held October 8 and 10 were approved.

Alfred J. Talley, Esq., attorney and counsellor at law, appeared in connection with his request that the name of Victor Weintraub be restored to the eligible list of Topographical Draftsman for appointment at \$1,500 per annum. The request was denied.

David Hammer, of 52 Cannon st., New York City, appeared, as directed, to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list of Axemen for misstatements as to experience. The matter was referred back to the Examiners who rated his experience paper for a report as to whether or not he had received a higher rating than that to which a true statement of his experience would have entitled him.

Samuel Bolitho, of 2241 Homecrest ave., Brooklyn, N. Y., appeared in connection with his request that his name be removed from the list of persons disqualified for employment in the city service upon which it had been placed as the result of his resignation from the position of Draftsman in the Bureau of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, while charges were pending against him. The request was denied.

James J. Burke, of 350 E. 42d st., New York City, having failed to appear, as directed, relative to his request that his name be removed from the list of persons disqualified for employment in the city service upon which it had been placed as a result of his dismissal from the position of Patrolman in the Police Department, the request was denied.

Michael J. Egan, of 608 Oak Tree place, New York City, appeared, as directed, in connection with his request that his name be removed from the list of persons disqualified for employment in the city service upon which it had been placed as the result of his dismissal from the position of Patrolman in the Police Department. The request was denied.

Edward Cahill, of 332 W. 47th st., New York City, appeared, as directed, to explain the circumstances of arrests in connection with his application for the position of Fireman. After consideration of the matter the Secretary was instructed to remove the disqualification appearing against the candidate's name on the eligible list.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Regulation 15 (the labor class) of the Regulations of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, be and the same hereby is amended to read as follows:

1. Applications for employment in the labor class shall be received only for positions the titles of which are classified.

2. Each applicant shall be given a receipt for his application, on which shall be noted his name, address, the position sought, the date and the application number, and such number shall be furnished to the applicant on his request at any future time.

3. Applicants must report for the physical examination promptly at the time and place stated in the notice given thereof, and must present the notice of examination before they can be examined.

4. The results of the physical examination shall be entered on the application form of the applicant, and following the examination both the said form and notice of examination shall be stamped with the date and the word "Examined." Should the applicant fail to pass, the form shall be stamped with the word "Rejected." The notice shall be returned to the applicant. The following are causes of rejection for all titles in the labor class: Defect of any extremity necessitating artificial aid or support; tuberculosis of all kinds; hernia, inguinal or scrotal; vision below 20-30; hearing, markedly impaired (except in the case of boilermakers and some other workers in allied trades, who, from the nature of the work, are more or less subject to aural defects); obesity; inability to fully extend above the head a dumbbell with each arm; evidence of syphilis and excessive use of alcohol or drugs; certification of eligibles for employment of laborers shall be made in the manner prescribed for positions in the competitive class, and the appointing officer, or his representative, shall forward to the Commission an identification sheet with such entries as may be necessary to permit of their comparison with the statements and description of the applicant at the time of his application for registration.

6. The minimum relative measurements required for the position of Driver, Department of Street Cleaning, shall be as follows: Height 5 feet 4 inches; weight, 130 pounds. Height, 5 feet 5 inches; weight, 135 pounds. Height, 5 feet 6 inches; weight, 140 pounds. Height, 5 feet 7 inches; weight, 145 pounds. Height, 5 feet 8 inches; weight, 150 pounds; Height, 5 feet 9 inches; weight, 155 pounds. Height, 5 feet 10 inches; weight, 160 pounds. Height, 5 feet 11 inches; weight, 165 pounds. Height, 6 feet and over; weight, 170 pounds.

Between William st. and Park Row progress is being made on both subways, the floor and sidewalks of both being partially completed.

The Third Avenue Railroad is removing their old cableway yards in order to allow enough clearance for the subways.

Williamsburg Bridge.

The additional platform for the Bedford ave. trolley station was completed during the quarter.

Observations of electrical conditions especially in regard to stray currents in the main cables have been made.

Plans and specifications have been completed for Island platforms between roadway and surface car tracks to accommodate east-bound passengers on Brooklyn lines and west-bound passengers on the New York line.

The work of cutting through the west wall of the Delancey st. subway station has been completed. The platforms have been cut, track laid and electrical equipment installed for the Centre st. subway extension.

Studies were made for moving cables and of alterations in subway station for the operation of the proposed 10-foot wide subway cars.

Strengthening End Spans, Manhattan—Work continued on this contract.

Strengthening End Spans, Brooklyn—Work was resumed in April.

Erected roadway side of diagonal member 29-30 and pin on noria side, removed old overhead lateral system between panel points 6 and 9 and completed new system between 6th and 12th, etc.

The work is about 94.5 per cent complete.

Strengthening Main Span—About 2,600 feet of wooden rails were erected on the top chord.

Construction of Top Chords—Brooklyn side, South truss panels 36 to 44 completed. Manhattan side, North truss panels 32 to 34 completed. Manhattan side, South truss panels 30 to 41 completed.

In addition, all routine maintenance requirements were looked after.

Queensboro Bridge.

Shop work has progressed on the steel beams and hangers for the permanent runway for trolley hangers to be used for suspending scaffolds for inspection, painting and repairs under the deck of the Queens approach viaduct. A part of the runway immediately east of the anchor pier has been erected.

Detail plans were completed and material ordered for pipe railings on the south side of the Subway station near Bent 26. These railings are to be erected on each side of the surface car tracks to lessen the liability of accidents occurring at that point.

Work on the park space on the north side of the Queens plaza, adjacent to Skillman place, was completed on May 24th. The charge of this area was formally turned over to this department on January 21, 1913.

The new shelter house at the end loops adjacent to Jackson av. on the Queens plaza was completed and opened to the public on June 7th. Plans have been prepared for using the toll houses, which were formerly used for a shelter house on the plaza, for temporary comfort stations at the Second ave. entrance to the bridge.

The Bradley Contracting Company has completed about 103,000 cubic yards of filling under the Queens approach viaduct, between Ely and Vernon aves. during the quarter.

Observations of cars of the Manhattan and Queens Traction Corporation showed that on several occasions cars were operated up grade, against traffic, in order to reach the lay-up track on the north side of the subway station. Orders were issued to stop this operation and also to abandon, before July 10, this track, which has previously been used by the company for storage and repairs. The work of removing the cars and material has been started.

Wash borings were made and test pits excavated to rock under the middle portion of the Island Span to determine conditions for a foundation for the proposed elevator at this point.

Work has been started on preparing a new set of plans for the elevators on the Queensboro Bridge to Blackwells Island.

All routine maintenance requirements were carried on without interruption during the quarter.

Manhattan Bridge.

The fire alarm signal system on the bridge has been completely installed and connected up to the Brooklyn and Manhattan Borough systems.

Plans have been made for trailer platforms to be operated in connection with motor driven painters' platforms under the deck of the main and side spans. With these auxiliary platforms it will be possible to have the entire area between the floor beams of the bridge planked over, thus affording adequate protection to the workmen and better facilities for painting or repair work. Work has also progressed on erecting new hangers, cars and trolley wire for operating these platforms.

Under the permit issued by this Department to the New York Municipal Railway Corporation, the installation of the high tension cable across the structure to the Centre Street Subway has been completed.

In accordance with a request from the Commissioner of Public Works, Manhattan, the block under the structure between Madison and Monroe streets was turned over to the Borough President for use as a corporation yard.

Routine maintenance work was taken care of during the quarter.

Improvement of Brooklyn Plaza.

The plans and specifications for Improvement of Brooklyn Plaza received on May 22 and the contract was awarded to the North Eastern Construction Company.

Plans for additions to painting platforms are nearly completed.

Work was commenced on the plans and specifications for the equipment of the upper deck, easterly side, for the operation of surface cars, and this work is being hurried as fast as possible.

Improvement of Manhattan Plaza.

Excavation—Excavating easterly subway between stations 3-50 and 1-49, and trench for the Bowery retaining wall foundation.

Excavation and sheeting for Forsyth st. wall completed.

A travelling derrick, with double electric hoist, has been in use for subway excavations between Canal st. and station 3-50.

Gas and Water Mains—All this work has been completed, with the exception of the 20-inch gas main in Canal st. between Chrystie st. and the Bowery. The Contractor is at work changing this main.

Sewer Manholes and Electric Conduits—These have all been raised to new grades.

Fill—The property owners have built retaining walls in front of their buildings on Chrystie and Canal sts. No wall has been built in front of Public School 7 as yet.

Canal st. from Forsyth st. to the west side of Chrystie st. has been filled, practically to new subgrade. Chrystie st. north of Canal st. is in the same condition.

Concrete—The foundation for the Forsyth st. retaining wall, and concrete under arch foundation grillage, has been put in place. Concrete is being placed in subway walls between stations 3-22 and 2-40. The timber bulkhead and fence have been completed.

Steelwork—The contractor has started setting steel grillage in the arch foundation. A guyed derrick has been set up on the east side of the subway cut.

Municipal Building.

The work under the contract for the completion of the substructure, the erection of the superstructure, etc., of the Municipal Building was completed so far as practical; the final completion thereof awaits further progress on the contract for the interior finish.

The contract for the interior finish was advanced nineteen per cent. towards thirty-four per cent. complete.

Robert Wetherill & Co., Inc., completed eighty per cent. of the work to be done under the contract for installing the elevators.

On June 13, a contract was executed with Abraham and Straus for furnishing and installing the window shades in the building.

The Department of Bridges moved into offices into the building during this quarter.



Road known as Lake street, situated in the Town of Harrison, beginning at a point in Post road and running in a westerly direction and then in a southwesterly direction to a point about 260 feet inside of the taking line, which point is the beginning of substituted new Road T. Length, 0.52 mile.

17.

Road known as Post road, situated in the Town of Harrison, beginning at a point near its junction with Lake street, the end of substituted new Road T, and running in a southwesterly direction to a point at the beginning of substituted new Road V. Length, 0.3 mile.

Crossroad leading to Purchase, connecting Lake street with Post road, situated in the Town of Harrison, beginning at a point in Lake street and running in a southerly direction to the beginning of substituted new Road X. Length, 0.2 mile.

Route Y is situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning at a point in Broadway and running in an easterly direction, crossing Route A to a point in the taking line. Being 50 feet in width and 0.07 mile in length.

Z1.

Route Z1 is situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning at a point in King street just east of the old line of King street and running in a southeasterly direction to a point in King street. Being 50 feet in width and 0.09 mile in length.

Z2.

Route Z2 is situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning at a point in the taking line just east of the old line of King street and running in a southeasterly direction to a point in King street. Being 50 feet in width and 0.09 mile in length.

Z3.

Route Z3 is situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning at a point in the road to Armonk a few feet easterly from where Route A crosses the road to Armonk and running thence in a southerly direction to a point in King street; also including a Y branch connecting with Route A.
