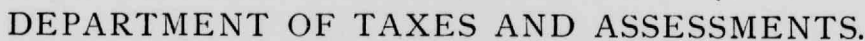

To Hon. SMITH ELY, Jr., Mayor :

SIR—The quarterly report of the Board of Assessors for the three months ending June 30, 1877, is herewith respectfully submitted.

At the date of the last report there were remaining in this office 78 assessment lists, showing an aggregate amount of \$2,608,833.37. Up to the 30th of June the number of lists received from the Commissioner of Public Works (per Schedule "A"), was 18, adding \$193,076.12 to the amount to be apportioned, and making an aggregate of \$2,801,909.49 for the 96 lists.

Of this number (per Schedule "B"), 25, involving an apportionment of \$341,668.72, were transmitted to the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments, leaving 71 lists in the office at the present date, and exhibiting a total of \$2,460,240.77 to be assessed on property benefited.

This number will be still further reduced to 60 by the 11 lists which are now made up and which were advertised in the CITY RECORD on 23d ult., being required, according to law, to remain in this office for the period of thirty days.

Street Cleaning.

Resolved, That requisition be and is hereby made upon the Comptroller for the sum of fifty-nine thousand seven hundred and ninety-one dollars and sixty-six cents (\$59,791.66), to defray the expenses of street cleaning for the current month of July—all voting aye.

NEW COURT-HOUSE COMMISSION.

Abstract of the proceedings of the Commissioners for the Completion of the New County Court-house.

MAY 31, 1877.

The sum of \$5,000 was certified to the Finance Department for payment to Messrs. J. and W. C. Spears, that sum being the amount of the fourth and tenth installments in their contract, which became due to them when the brick work of the walls of the ground-floor story of the extension was built up to the top of the first story floor; and the brick work in the rotunda carried up to sixteen feet above the balcony-floor of the second story.

The sum of \$18,000 was likewise certified for payment to Messrs. Sinclair and Milne for the installment numbered second in their contract, which was due to them for completing the stonework of the walls of the extension up to the top of the first floor.

JUNE 11, 1877.

The Chairman stated that the amount of the funds raised from the proceeds of the installment of stock heretofore authorized to be issued by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was almost all expended, and submitted a communication containing a requisition for a further issue of stock, which was approved, signed by all the Commissioners, and transmitted as follows:

Hon. JOHN KELLY, Comptroller:

SIR—This Commission, in June 1876, addressed a communication to the Board of Apportionment, giving the estimated amount of cost to finish the Court-house.

In July following, another communication was transmitted, stating that proposals for doing the several works had been received, after public competition, and asking the assent of the Board to their proceedings, by authorizing the issue of the bonds before the contracts were awarded. This communication was referred to the Comptroller. On September 15 he offered a resolution, which was unanimously adopted by the Board of Apportionment, authorizing the issue of \$100,000 for our use, by way of an installment.

The foregoing-mentioned sum of \$100,000 having been expended, we respectfully ask for a further issue of "New York County Court-house Stock, No. 5," to the amount of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

A communication was received from Mr. John Wheeler, Secretary, forwarding a certified copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Apportionment, authorizing the issue of "New York County House Stock, No. 5," one hundred thousand dollars.

The stonework of the rotunda having been completed to fourteen feet above the balcony of the second floor (not including the staircase), Messrs. Sinclair and Milne became entitled to the payment of \$20,000, the amount of the thirteenth installment in their contract. Said claim was presented to the Comptroller for payment.

The sum of \$5,500 was certified to the Finance Department for payment to Messrs. J. and W. C. Spears, said sum being the aggregate amount of the fifth and eleventh installments, which were due them for finishing the brick work of the first story walls of extension up to ten feet above the first story floor, and in the rotunda, thirty-two feet above the balcony floor of the second floor.

JUNE 27, 1877.

The sum of \$20,000 was certified to the Finance Department, for payment to Messrs. Sinclair and Milne, contractors for the stonework, being the amount due them for the third installment, when the stonework of the walls of the extension was completed up to five feet above the first floor.

The bill of Mr. Leopold Eidlitz, Architect and Superintendent, amounting to \$2,091.25, for professional services, at the rate (as per agreement), of 1 1/4 per cent. on the amount of payments made to the several contractors, to wit, \$110,500, was transmitted to the Comptroller for payment.

The several bills of Mr. John Kerby, Contractor for the carpenter's work, amounting to \$595.20, for extra work in removing and refixing certain heavy blackwalnut partitions and removing sundry iron, lath, and plaster partitions, and constructing temporary wood partitions, were audited and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

The Chairman submitted the customary report on the condition of the several works, and concluded by stating that the execution of the same was being pushed forward with unexpected speed, considering the confined space to which the workmen are limited; and the contractors were deserving of commendation for the extreme caution they perseveringly exercised in the performance of their duties in order to avoid accident to the officials and the multitude of frequenters of the Court-House.

The architect was directed to prepare and submit to the Board a design for a proposed stairway in the Rotunda, leading from the ground floor to the main floor.

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section to the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 187. That every person who omits or refuses to comply with, or who resists any of the provisions of the Sanitary Code, or any of the rules, orders, sanitary regulations, or ordinances established or declared by this Board, under or pursuant to any of the provisions of the seventh-fourth chapter of the Laws of 1866; or of chapter six hundred and eighty-six of the Laws of 1866; or of chapter nine hundred and fifty-six of the Laws of 1867; or of chapter three hundred and thirty-five of the Laws of 1873; or of chapter seven hundred and fifty-seven of the Laws of 1873; or of chapter six hundred and thirty-six of the Laws of 1874; or refuses or neglects to comply with any of the provisions of the said laws, in so far as the same are now in force, and applicable to the City of New York; or omits or refuses, or neglects the execution of any order or special regulation of this Department, will be liable to the arrest, suit, penalty, fine, and punishment in said laws provided and declared; of all of which, notice must be taken.
